EIGHTH POTASH TEST TO BE STARTED BY GOVERNMENT IN CROCKETT COU

TEST FIFTEEN MILES SOUTHWEST OF RANKIN ON UNI-VERSITY LAND TO BE SPUDDED WITH CORE DRILL ABOUT APRIL 20

Government potash test No. 8 is to be started about April 20, according to H. R. Norsworthy of the U. S. Bureau of Mines who has been temporarily located in Midland collecting samples from Oil wells in this area.

The eighth test is to be on University land, in the southwest



Seven laughs in the first three minutes following the opening curtain is the record-breaking report on "Applesauce." It is a play that never fails to please with its three acts of sparkling humor, witty repartee, and screamingly funny sit-

rheumatism! In the last act the little bride makes all the traditional mistakes of the newlywed. However, Bill's "applesauce" carries them through -even the tearful scene of the proverbial burned biscuits. The play ends with the two families becoming reconciled and Bill proves that a family may exist on-"ap-



Having completed the first column on page one of a story in which you are interested, you are confronted by the admonition: "Turn to page 6, column 1." Sounds easy, doesn't it? But in a high wind such as has prevailed in Alpine for the past few weeks, the reader immediately meets with almost insurmountable obstacles when attempting to make the suggested turn. 




