



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### STUDY MADE OF **MARKETING GOODS MADE IN PRISONS**

Tagging prison-made products to distinctly identify them from the products of "free" labor will serve to eliminate one of the chief objections raised in connection with the marketing of prison goods, in the opinion of a committee of penologists, manufacturers and labor representatives which has been acting as an advisory body to the Department of Commerce in a study of prison industries.

According to the committee the "differentiation obvious to the buyer would make it possible to sell similar goods even in the same retail store with different prices for the prison products and the 'free' products." The only other alternative to this tagging method, the committee believes would be the removal of prison-made products entirely from the open market. (The report has been accepted by the entire committee except by two dissenting letter which are to the re-
