## Blackwater Valley Soil and Water Conservation District

## ANNUAL REPORT 1996-1997

The Blackwater Valley Soil and Water Conservation District has completed their 56th year in Bailey County. E.L. Smith and N.C. Moore, County Directors at that time, submitted a petition requesting that a District be formed and approved by the State of Texas. On March 20th, 1941, the Secretary of State for the State of Texas certified the formation of Blackwater Valley Soil and Water Conservation District. It was number 111 and included all of Bailey County. As a legal sub-division of State Government, they requested the assistance for the District. The Soil Conserva tion Service is now renamed Natural Resources Conservation Service, but still provides the technical assistance on soil and water erosion problems. Today, there are over 200 Districts state wide working toward the same goal of wise use of all natural resources. Assistance is voluntary and private property right's are strictly observed.
The Blackwater Valley SWCD is divided into 5 zones with each zone having a director. Each zone director must own land within the zone served and serves a four year term. The director's attend monthly meetings at the NRCS office in Muleshoe. These meetings are open to the public.
Present directors are: Emest Ramm, Zone 1, Nick Bamert, Zone 2, Sharon Dale, Zone 3, Larry Clawson, Zone 4, and Johnny Furgeson, Zone 5.
The District provides services to all individuals without regard to: race, color, creed, sex, national origin and complies with the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990.
