CNN Newsroom: live from Lazbuddie

Junior High and High School students across the nation will soon be learning about Lazbuddie and its six-man football program.

CNN Newsroom, a special program produced for classrooms, spent a few days in Lazbuddie this past week visiting with community members about the uniqueness of their hometown, the school and especially their six-man football program.

Friday morning, local residents met, as they usually do, at Treider Hardware and Supply to shoot the breeze.

"Right now, football is the social event of each week, when its not football, its basketball, "said lifelong resident Scott Hicks, explaining about the usual daily conversations around town.

This Friday was a bit different than normal with CNN correspondent Joel Hochmuth from Atlanta joining the group.

As the reporter listened, the locals eagerly explained some of the major

differences between 6-man football and 11-man football.

"It's much faster, more like basketball. The teams swap ends all the time and its a long running and passing game. Also, there's a lot of scoring," said community member Brad Treider.

"In 6-man, the kids have to be pretty versatile. It would be hard to pick out a single person that does the best because the kids have to, and do, play as a team,"

Rangers run over Mules

PERRYTON — Muleshoe couldn't stop Allan Adkison or the big play Friday in a 41-18 District 1-3A loss to Perryton.

Adkison rushed for 242 yards and five touchdowns as the Rangers (5-2) remained at least tied for the district lead at 4-0.

The loss eliminated any real hope the Mules (2-5, 1-3) had of making the playoffs.

Adkison scored three times in the second half when the Rangers broke the game open. The Rangers led 13-3 at halftime.

Adkison scored on a 65-yard run one minute into second half and quarterback Trey Duke and Brian Gilbert hooked up on a 72-yard scoring pass later in the third quarter.

The Rangers finished with 450 yards.

Gilbert Vela broke the 100yard barrier for the secondstraight week, finishing with 113 yards on 19 carries. Matt McClanahan passed for a season-high 173 yards as Muleshoe finished with 308 yards.

Muleshoe took a 3-0 first quarter lead on Ryan Hodge's 27-yard field goal.

In the second half, Vela scored on a 16-yard run and McClanahan scored from two yards out.

The Bailey County Commissioners' Court met in regular session Monday, Oct. 13 at the Bailey County Courthouse.

The court accepted a bid for courthouse lawn maintenance from Shafer Nursery of Muleshoe. Shafer currently supplies the lawn care, but sealed bids were requested in order to ensure that the county was paying the lowest possible fee.

County Judge Marilyn Cox was authorized by the board to advertise for bids on a new 1997 or 1998 car for the Sheriff's Department.

According to Sheriff Jerry Hicks, the new car will replace one of the car's currently being used that has close to 100,000

Hicks said that replacing the car now is good management and will prevent costly problems that could arise in the future due to high mileage and aging of the vehicle.

The Commissioners approved a bond on new Deputy County Clerk Jana Leal who started Sept. 22.

Also Monday, the board appointed Mary Nell Bleeker as Alternate Election Judge for voting box 1. She will replace Clara Harbin, who resigned due to health concerns.

Bleeker will be responsible for assisting during elections, and to act as election judge if for any reason the person that holds that position can not fulfill their duties.

Horns defense spurs 50-21 win

LAZBUDDIE A matchup of the two of the area's top offenses came down to de-

Josh Morris passed for 257 yards and four touchdowns and Lazbuddie played smothering defense, leading the Longhorns to a 50-21 win against Silverton Friday in a key District 3-1A six-man game.

Lazbuddie (6-1 overall, 2-0 in district) held the high-flying Owls (5-2, 1-1) to 242 yards, nearly 150 yards below its sea-

This is a big win because it puts us in the driver's seat," azbuddie coach Mark Scisson said. "That's the best defense we've played all year.'

Lazbuddie did play well despite the distraction of having national network CNN in town the last two days taping a documentary on six-man foot- to pressure Owl quarterback

Led by Adam St. Clair and Jeffrey Seaton, the Longhorns added 198 yards rushing and finished right at its season average with 458 yards of total

St. Clair rushed for 70 yards

on 13 carries and caught a 22yard touchdown pass that gave the Longhorns a 28-15 halftime lead. Seaton rushed for 65 yards on four carries, including a 52-yard touchdown burst three minutes into the fourth quarter that sealed the win.

Morris completed 18 of 24 passes, spreading the ball around to eight different receivers.

First-year Silverton coach Larry Mantle, the younger brother of New York Yankee legend Mickey Mantle, came away impressed with the Long-


"I told the kids after the game: 'it ain't anything you did wrong, they just kicked our butts," Mantle said in the translated PG version. "Give them the credit.'





John Denver has unfortunately joined a prestigous list of prominent entertainers that have been killed in plane crashes.

Last Sunday, Denver, who sold millions of records in the 1970s including "Rocky Mountain High" and "Thank God I'm A Country Boy" was piloting a single engine, fiberglass, two-seat plane when it crashed off the coast of California near Monterey.

A utumn is here. The calendar says so. The temperatures say so. And I know because at our house we are fighting our annual battle

Yes, we have a mouse. Or, well, to be strictly accurate, he has us. I know this from previous experience. I know that our lives will not be worth living until this little rodent is history.

I myself could probably have

lived with him a little while. I give him the benefit of the doubt. He lives in a parsonage. He is probably, therefore, a church mouse and very likely possesses high principles and a sound character. If he had just asked, I could have told him that we'd be okay if he'd keep his nibbles inconspicuous, his holes small, and his hygiene impeccable. He could have lived long in our home and prospered. But not now.

A few days ago, my wife began seeing "mouse signs." Brow furrowed, nostrils flaring, murder in her green and glaring eyes, she began to make preparations for a holy war.

She dispatched one rodent two nights ago. Last night she tiled the kitchen floor with traps (worrying me more about broken toes and consequent medical bills than mice, but protest was futile). Then this morning, she banged the light on and pierced my unconsciousness screaming that the vile, vicious, pestilencespreading rodent had just cleaned the traps and sped, right under her gaze, to safety behind the dishwasher.

Under the covers, I muttered, "I am incensed." She glared at me. I didn't see it, but I could feel it.

I had been worrying a bit lately about concerns common to forty year olds. Pretty mundane stuff like how we're going to pay for college, replace an aging vehicle, achieve personal and work-related goals, etc. And I'd worried about worrying, since Christians are not supposed to be given to anxiety. This mouse, I suppose, has blessed me. I promise you, until he is dead, no one in our house will be able to worry about anything else.

This mouse is good, I'll give him that. Unlike his clumsy kinsman who perished in our kitchen floor, caught in the jaws of a vicious trap set by my usually kind wife, this surviving rodent licks peanut butter (no kidding, it works better than cheese) right off the hinges of traps, wipes his lips, and burps contentedly as he slips away. This mouse

He's also dead, of course. He doesn't know it yet, but he's a dead mouse walking. He should give himself up. Throw himself on the mercy of the court. Not that he would get any. Not from the judge he'll face. And I'm not her.

I'm glad that your Judge and mine is full of mercy. I'm glad that our Judge is also our Savior.

Blackwater Valley Soil and Water Conservation District

ANNUAL REPORT 1996-1997

The Blackwater Valley Soil and Water Conservation District has completed their 56th year in Bailey County. E.L. Smith and N.C. Moore, County Directors at that time, submitted a petition requesting that a District be formed and approved by the State of Texas. On March 20th, 1941, the Secretary of State for the State of Texas certified the formation of Blackwater Valley Soil and Water Conservation District. It was number 111 and included all of Bailey County. As a legal sub-division of State Government, they requested the assistance for the District. The Soil Conservation Service is now renamed Natural Resources Conservation Service, but still provides the technical assistance on soil and water erosion problems. Today, there are over 200 Districts state wide working toward the same goal of wise use of all natural resources. Assistance is voluntary and private property right's are strictly observed.

The Blackwater Valley SWCD is divided into 5 zones with each zone having a director. Each zone director must own land within the zone served and serves a four year term. The director's attend monthly meetings at the NRCS office in Muleshoe. These meetings are open to the public.

Present directors are: Ernest Ramm, Zone 1, Nick Bamert, Zone 2, Sharon Dale, Zone 3, Larry Clawson, Zone 4, and Johnny Furgeson, Zone 5.

The District provides services to all individuals without regard to: race, color, creed, sex, national origin and complies with the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990.


