Two Countries Reach Verge of an Open Break Today

VIENNA, Dec. 6. (AP)—Mass expulsions of Hungarians from Jugoslavia in reprisal for the assassination of King Alexander brought these countries to the verge of an open break today.

INDIGNATION SPREADS THROUGHOUT HUNGARY BUDAPEST, Hungary, Dec. 6. (AP)—Intense indignation spread through the country today at the expulsion of Hungarian families by Jugoslavia in vicarious revenge for the murder of King Alexander.

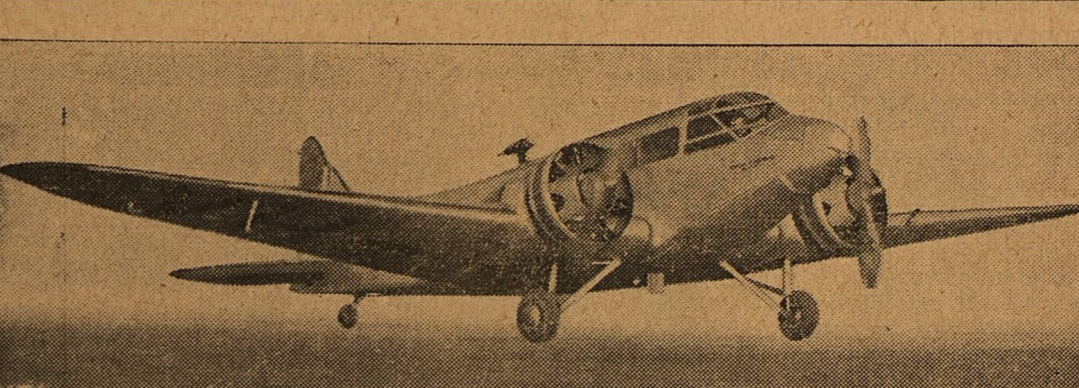
Slain Russian Is Given Hero Funeral

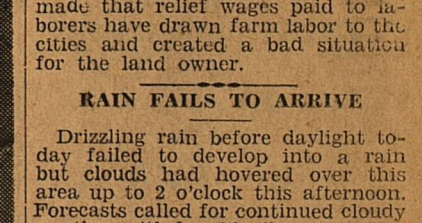

MORE FACTS ARE NECESSARY

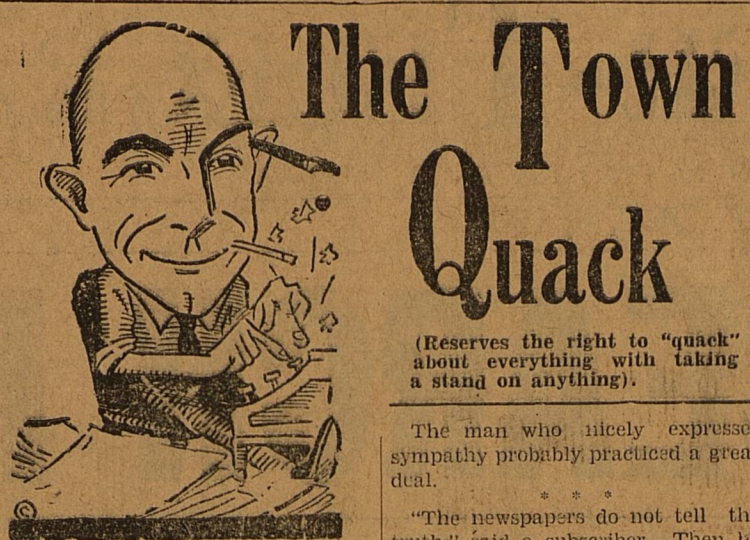

I should have to summon enough adjectives to fill the classic Mr. Webster to describe my reaction to the association of these women—the club women composing the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs. And as your President, I must that from the experience I have returned to you with a bigger, broader spirit and one that is capable of a more self forgetting service.

The women of the State Federation, many of them, show in their faces the chiseling hand of time. Have never seen so much white hair. At times we felt we were attending a revue featuring platinum blonds. Why Mrs. Haley appeared positively juvenile. But how these club women of all ages, young and old alike, have learned to live and to live more abundantly. How wonderful to note how they meet all major problems which confront us today skillfully and intellectually, and with a courage it should be to our best efforts.

OPINION ASKED OF PRINCIPLES, REGIONAL BODY

The Midland chamber of commerce has been requested by the West Texas chamber of commerce to consider the declaration of principles of the all-state council of regional chambers of commerce adopted at the Waco meeting of the Council in October, with a view to adopting the principles as the local chamber's policy also.

The request was received by M. C. Ulmer, the West Texas Chamber of Commerce director for Midland, and Mrs. Sallye Covington, acting secretary of the local chamber. It was sent by J. A. Rix, assistant manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce in charge of organizational activities at the direction of president James D. Hamlin.

The principles which the local chamber has been asked to adopt are as follows: First: We stand for a championship of private business, industry, and ownership of property as the road to recovery, to which end we shall sponsor all Federal and State measures, which tend to lend encouragement and confidence to private business and shall oppose all measures and administrative acts which have or will destroy the confidence of business and capital and retard its welfare.

Second: We call for a rapid balancing of the Federal budget; for a reduction of the Government's extraordinary expense and for a drastic curtailment of existing and proposed Government bureaus.

Third: We shall oppose every effort of the Federal and State Governments to go into business in competition with private and semi-private business. Although granting to the Government the right of regulation of public utilities, we oppose the Government destroying private investments by competing with utilities.

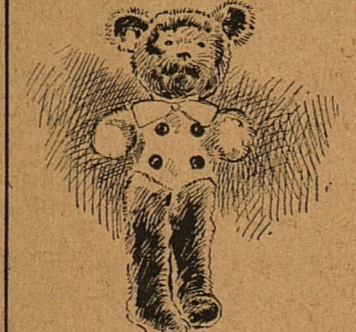

Gasoline Dollar Sliced by Taxes

SYRACUSE, N. Y.—The oil industry got less than 70¢ of each \$1 spent by motorists for gasoline last year, Dr. F. G. Crawford, of Syracuse University, says. The tax collector took the balance.

In 15 years the gasoline tax has risen from an insignificant fraction of a dollar to more than 30.4 per cent of the amount paid for motor fuel, a study made by Dr. Crawford shows.

Motorists purchase about 600 gallons of gasoline annually upon which they pay from \$18 to \$48 in taxes, depending upon the tax rates in the state where they reside.

Figures released at the recent convention of the American Petroleum Institute in Dallas show that if all types of federal, state and local motor vehicle taxes currently imposed were paid on a single passenger car, estimated to be worth

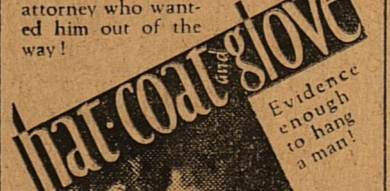
