Muleshoe is the kind of place where if someone stubs their toe, the whole community feels it.

So when a fire just a week before Christmas robbed a local family of all its earthly possessions, the community was quick and humanitarian in its response.


Before firefighters had put out the fire that burned to the ground the simple, two-bedroom house in a poor section of town known as the "Flats," friends and neighbors were already dropping off clothes and money to the Lewis family.

To make matters worse, the house was unin-

In the following weeks, mountains of clothes were collected and money poured in from all over to trust funds set up at two local banks.

The community was feeling the Lewis' pain. What if it was my house that burned down? What if it was me that lost everything I owned?

SPS merger close

AUSTIN - State regulators indicated Wednesday that they will approve the merger between Southwestern Public Service and the Public Service Company of Colorado.

The three-member Texas Public Utility Commission instructed its staff to draft an interim order approving the merger. The order will call for SPS to reduce its Texas retail rates by \$3 million per year, instead of an SPS proposal of a \$3 million annual credit over a five-year period.

The commission will consider the interim order Feb. 5.

The commission also requested that SPS report by Jan. 31 its current post-merger plans relative to employment levels in Texas. The commission said it wants assurances that the quality of service to Texas customers does not deteriorate.

SPS and PSCo officials have proposed that 569 jobs will be eliminated in the merger, but have not indicated which positions would be cut.

Reductions are expected to be "roughly proportional" to the size of each company's workforce, according to SPS spokesman Bill Crenshaw. SPS has about 2,000 employees, while PSCo has 5,000.

"For our employees, it's another delay in knowing what the organizational chart for New Century Energies will be, and what positions will be open," Crenshaw said. "We had hope to have some conclusive action by now."

Fox fumbling with local **Super Bowl** coverage

Fox TV, which is telecasting this year's Super Bowl Sunday from New Orleans, has been off the air in the Lubbock area since Wednesday morning.

Fox KJTV 34 officials said Friday in a press release Friday that a faulty transmission line feeding their antenna is the cause of the station outage.

"They're waiting for a part to fix the antenna," said Ralph Skaggs, a technician with Classic Cable in Muleshoe. "It should be fixed by Saturday."

KJTV has made plans to air the Super Bowl on its sister sention, KUPT-UPN 22, if the antenna is not fixed by noon Sunday.

However, Muleshoe does not receive KUPT as a part of its regular cable line-up.


