

# WELCOME HOME

Muleshoe is the kind of place where if someone stubs their toe, the whole community feels it.

So when a fire just a week before Christmas robbed a local family of all its earthly possessions, the community was quick and humanitarian in its response.

Before firefighters had put out the fire that burned to the ground the simple, two-bedroom house in a poor section of town known as the "Flats," friends and neighbors were already dropping off clothes and money to the Lewis family.

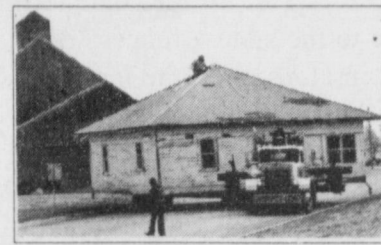
To make matters worse, the house was uninsured.

In the following weeks, mountains of clothes were collected and money poured in from all over to trust funds set up at two local banks.

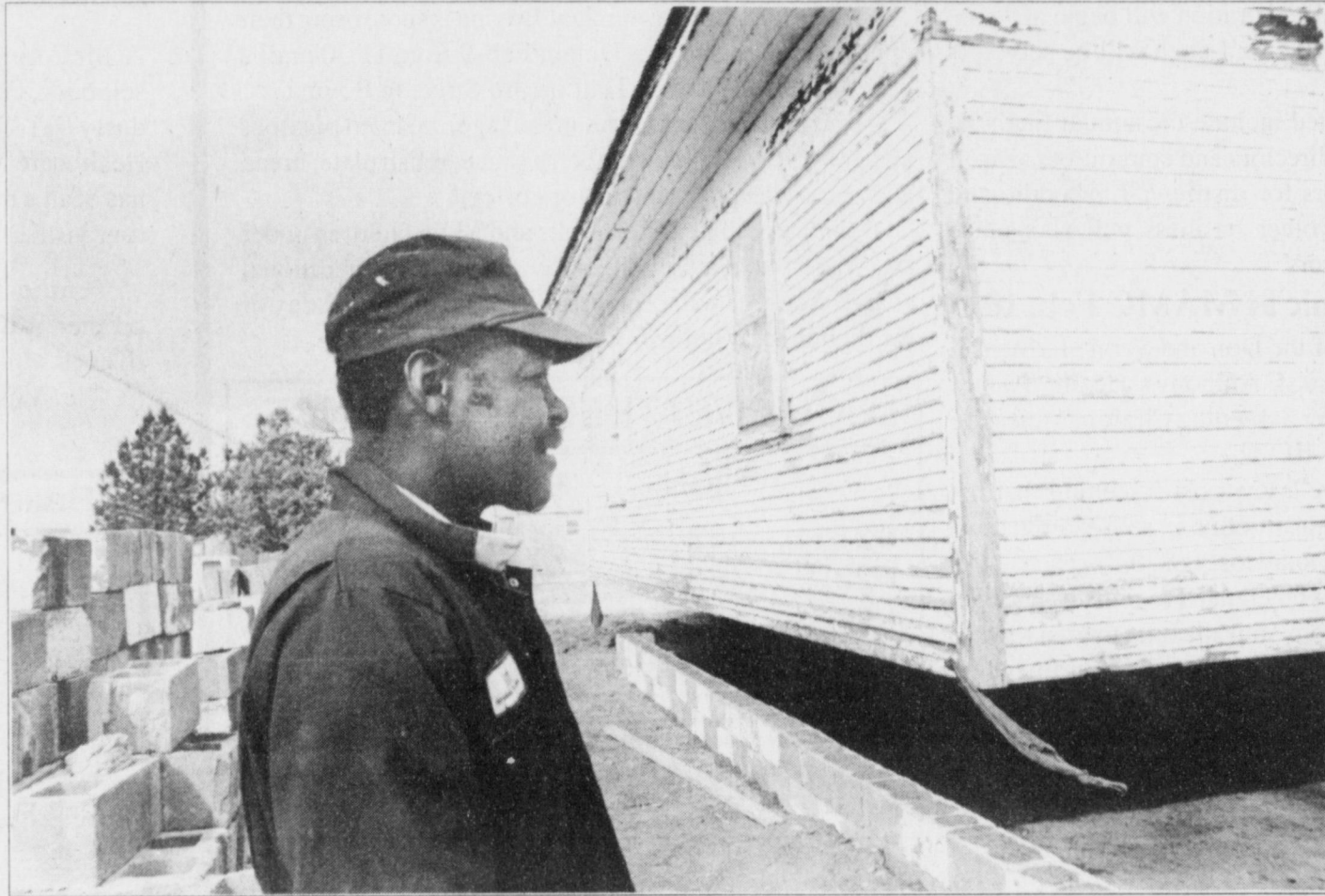
The community was feeling the Lewis' pain. What if it was my house that burned down? What if it was me that lost everything I owned?

"Everybody feels vulnerable to things like that," said John Knox, pastor of the Muleshoe Church of Christ and a former crisis intervention counselor with the Wichita Falls Police

# SPS merger close

AUSTIN — State regulators indicated Wednesday that they will approve the merger between Southwestern Public Service and the Public Service Company of Colorado.

The three-member Texas Public Utility Commission instructed its staff to draft an interim order approving the merger. The order will call for SPS to reduce its Texas retail rates by \$3 million per year, instead of an SPS proposal of a \$3 million annual credit over a five-year period.

The commission will consider the interim order Feb. 5.

The commission also requested that SPS report by Jan. 31 its current post-merger plans relative to employment levels in Texas. The commission said it wants assurances that the quality of service to Texas customers does not deteriorate.

SPS and PSCo officials have proposed that 569 jobs will be eliminated in the merger, but have not indicated which positions would be cut.

Reductions are expected to be "roughly proportional" to the size of each company's workforce, according to SPS spokesman Bill Crenshaw. SPS has about 2,000 employees, while PSCo has 5,000.

"For our employees, it's another delay in knowing what the organizational chart for New Century Energies will be, and what positions will be open," Crenshaw said. "We had hope to have some conclusive action by now."

# Mules continue road success

FRIONA — Muleshoe's improvement this season can be measured in miles — road miles.

The Mules kept their perfect league road record intact and improved to 5-2 at the halfway point of the District 1-3A season with a 74-66 win Tuesday at Friona.

Dustin Cleavinger had 15 points and 13 rebounds and the point guard combination of Matt Mason and Carlton Lewis combined for 10 points and 15

assists as the Mules improved to 4-0 on the district road.

Douglass Field led Muleshoe (16-9) with 16 points and Alfonso Mendoza chipped in three 3-pointers and 12 points as the Mules remained two games behind Tulia (7-0). Tulia edged Dimmitt (6-1) 45-44 Tuesday in a battle of ranked teams.

Muleshoe plays at No. 5 Dimmitt (20-6) next Tuesday.

"Any time you win at Friona it's big," Muleshoe coach

Ralph Mason said. "We were focused and worked real hard. We had to because we didn't shoot the ball well."

Muleshoe was 29 for 73 from the field, including 5 of 21 from 3-point range, and made just half of its 22 free throws.

Cleavinger scored 10 points in the fourth quarter and Field added six points, helping the Mules pull away from their Parmer County rival. Friona (5-7, 2-5) scored five points on

its last two possessions to make the score close.

"Our kids finished the game," said Mason, who cited at least a half dozen examples of quality plays down the stretch. "The kids did some real good things."

With Muleshoe struggling early, Mendoza came off the bench and hit a pair of 3-pointers in the first quarter which ended with Friona leading 13-

## Fox fumbling with local Super Bowl coverage

Mechanical failure might leave thousands of local football fans in the dark.

Fox TV, which is telecasting this year's Super Bowl Sunday from New Orleans, has been off the air in the Lubbock area since Wednesday morning.

Fox KJTV 34 officials said Friday in a press release Friday that a faulty transmission line feeding their antenna is the cause of the station outage.

"They're waiting for a part to fix the antenna," said Ralph Skaggs, a technician with Classic Cable in Muleshoe. "It should be fixed by Saturday."

KJTV has made plans to air the Super Bowl on its sister station, KUPT-UPN 22, if the antenna is not fixed by noon Sunday.

However, Muleshoe does not receive KUPT as a part of its regular cable line-up.

Tennie Arminta Mullins McCormick has seen a lot of changes over the course of her lifetime.

Tennie will be honored by family and friends with a reception celebrating her 100th birthday Saturday, Feb. 1 from 9-11 a.m. at the 16th & D Church of Christ Fellowship Hall.

She was born Feb. 4, 1897, in Mason County, Texas. Over the years, she has

Tennie attributes her longevity to keeping busy and trusting in the Lord.

Tennie still lives in the house she and her husband built in 1946. The house, located near Muleshoe High School, was once on the outskirts of town.

"When we built our house, we had to

tear down barbed wire fence," Tennie said. "The house was in the middle of a bunch of sand hills."

Tennie graduated from high school in Eden, Texas, where she was raised with three sisters and four brothers. After high school, she attended Gunter College.

Knox feels most of West Texas still harbors a pioneer spirit and a belief that they need to take care of their own.

"Characteristically, this is a very generous, caring community," Knox said. "It has its faults, but it's an exceptionally generous community."

Wednesday, Clarence and Sadie Lewis got their biggest present of all, a house donated by local cattleman Randy Johnson.

The two-bedroom clapboard house, built sometime near the turn of the century, is off the old Halsell Ranch about 14 miles east of Muleshoe.

It was trucked down the Plainview Highway Wednesday morning by a Clovis, NM company to the lot on West Chicago Avenue where the Lewises had lived for 10 years.

"I feel a whole lot better now," said Clarence Lewis, taking a break from spreading dirt in preparation for pouring a cement floor for the front porch of the house. "I can rest now."

Most folks describe Johnson as an astute businessman, but a bit of a curmudgeon.

Lewis, who worked as a hired hand for Johnson for 18 years, simply calls him a friend.

"He's got his ways about him, but to me he's one of the best men you find," he said.

In fact, Johnson loaned the Lewises the money to buy the first house.

Sadie Lewis, working side-by-side with her husband shoveling dirt, said from day one that they were going to find a way to return to the "Flats."

"(The old house) was the first thing besides a car we ever owned," Sadie Lewis said. "This is where our friends are."

The house needs a lot of work, but Sadie Lewis doesn't mind.

"We've never been hard to please," said Sadie, who cleans houses in Muleshoe for a living. "We've never had much."

Clarence Lewis' bosses at Hi-Pro Feeds in Friona, Calvin Mason and John Ingram, were busy Thursday installing the plumbing necessary for Sadie, Clarence and their four kids to move into their new home.

"You hate to see somebody lose everything they've got," Ingram said. "I can't think of anything worse."

The Lewises have been staying in a rented apartment, which Sadie said "was like being on vacation. I want to go home."

Dozens of office workers from Hi-Pro are coming next week to help paint and fix up the well-worn interior.

Mason said Thursday he thinks the house will be ready to live in by the first of February.

Muleshoe CPA and family friend Pat Angeley, who has helped oversee and coordinate the trust funds, said the response from Hi-Pro officials has been tremendous.

"I think they remember what it was like after the tornado (in the summer of 1995), there was such an outpouring of concern from not only the community but the state," Angeley said. "They saw how much the community wanted them to stay."

Angeley was one of dozens of well-wishers who stopped by to offer help that frightfully cold December morning.

"I thought I'd nearly die," Angeley said. "I went over there and I saw there was nothing left to the house. Nothing."

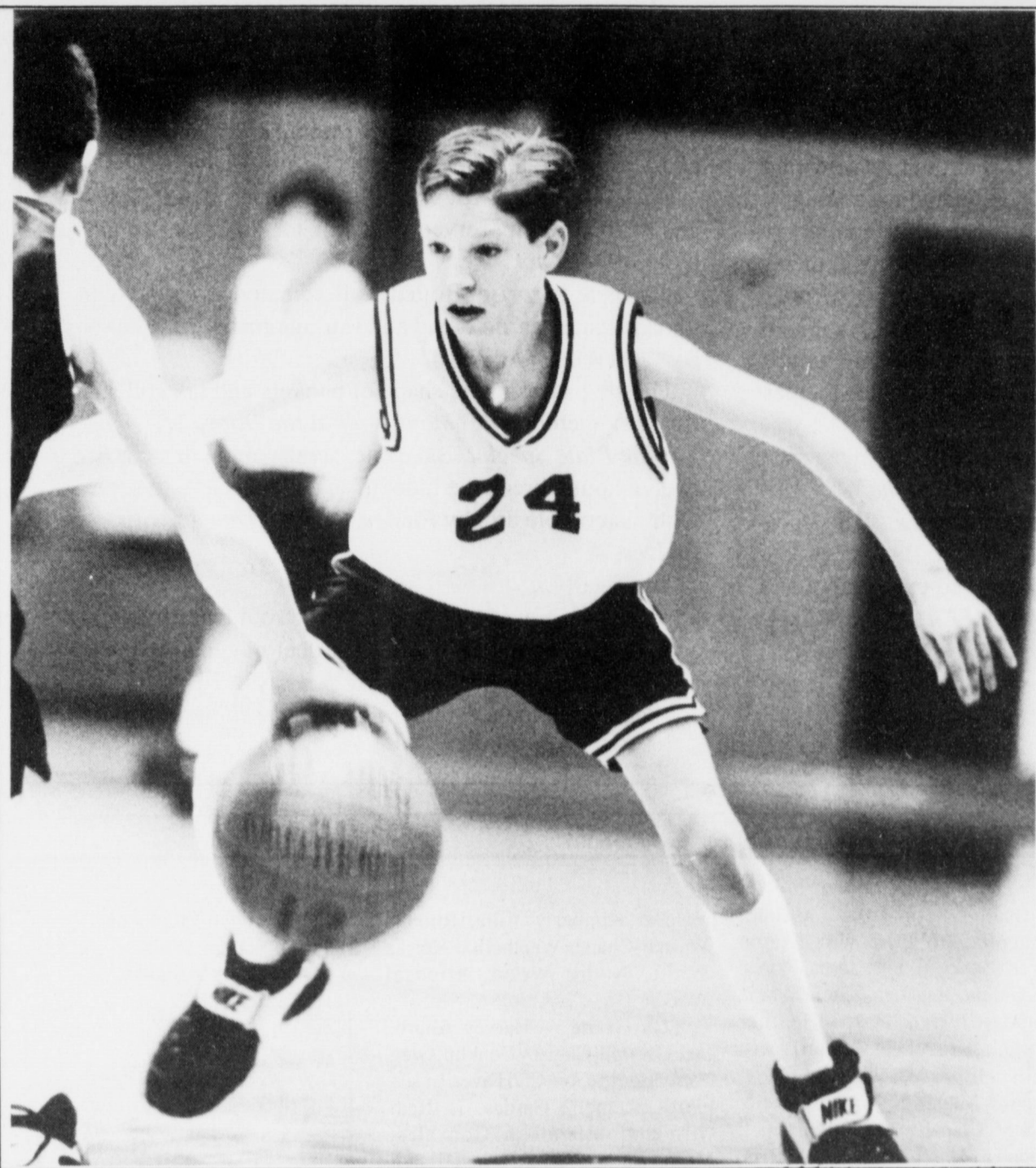

I was pleased recently to be among several members of our church as they were discussing what a fine group of ministers our town is presently enjoying. For what it's worth, I agree (and I hope my presence doesn't dilute the group's quality too seriously!).

Edward Fudge penned in response to this question put to him by a young man contemplating professional ministry: "I want to serve God as the preacher or pastor of a local church. Do you have any suggestions for my personal and professional goals?"

Fudge shared with him the ten traits of Christian leaders which his (Fudge's) own congregation has used during a recent year-long search for a new pulpit minister. Edward also wisely remarked that most of these are traits of any successful Christian leader, preacher or not. He says that the successful leader:

- 1) evidences a warm personal commitment to Jesus Christ as living Savior and Lord;
- 2) desires to follow the Holy Spirit, by submission to Scripture as

authoritative canon and by prayerfully seeking ongoing divine guidance with the elders and the church;

3) strives to grow personally and to be receptive to others' points of view;

4) delivers consistently excellent sermons or lessons that relate biblical truth to contemporary life;

5) devotes oneself to building strong marriages and families, beginning with the one at home;

6) inspires and motivates others to daily, active discipleship and sharing the faith;

7) demonstrates compassion and sensitivity to human needs, in counseling and in daily life;

8) reflects reverent scholarship in speaking and writing, and remembers that the goal of study is a changed life;

9) perceives oneself and the congregation as belonging first to the universal Christian church, with an appropriate appreciation for one's own particular heritage or tradition as part (but only part) of the Body of Christ;

10) combines strong administrative skills with an ability to work collegially with the church's leaders, staff, and volunteers.

This means, I think, that the "successful" Christian minister must love God, His/his people (family first and flock second), His word, and be able by temperament and training to wisely communicate that love in a way that helps others to share it. When the churches in our community have pastors who fit this bill, we're all blessed!

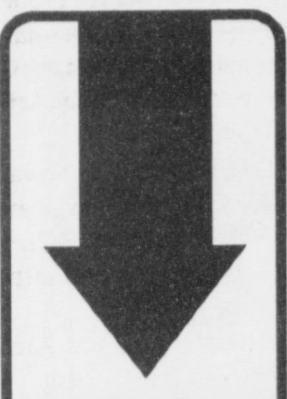

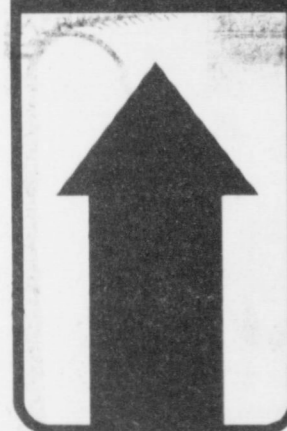

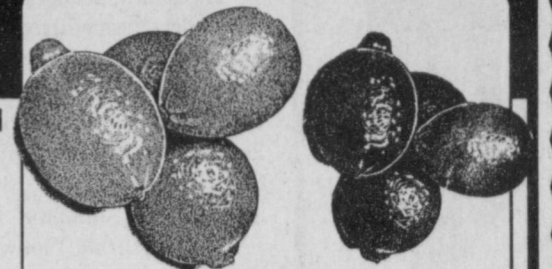
