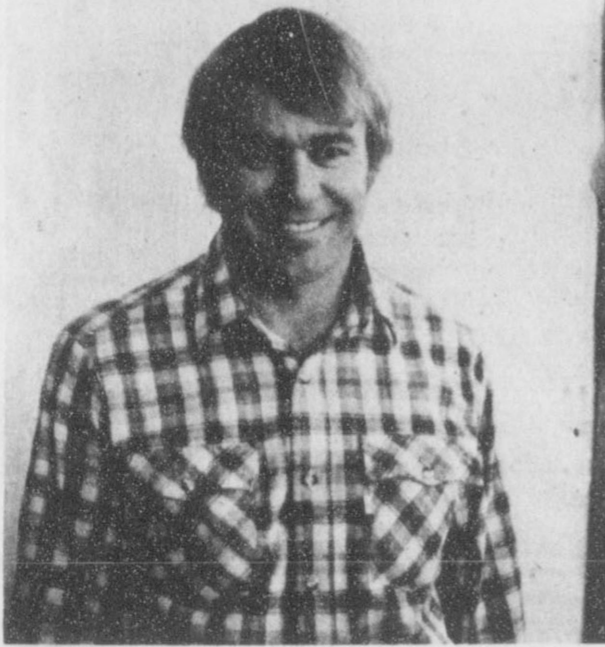


Schumann is candidate

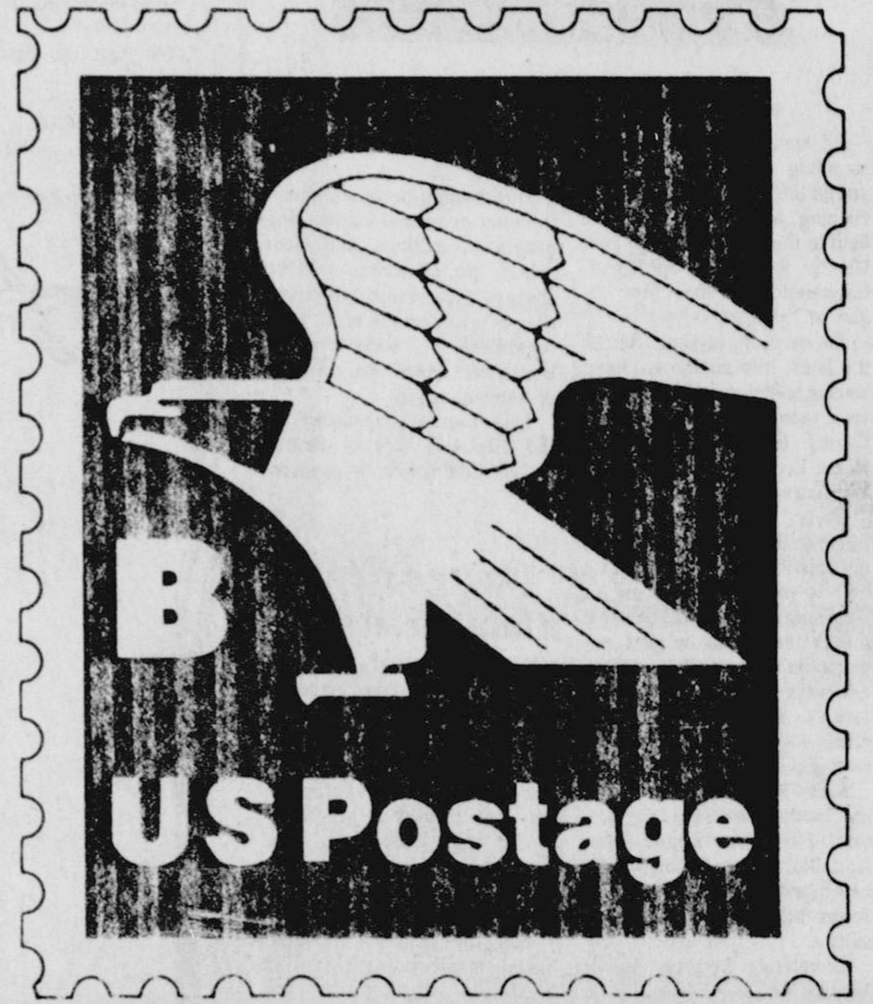

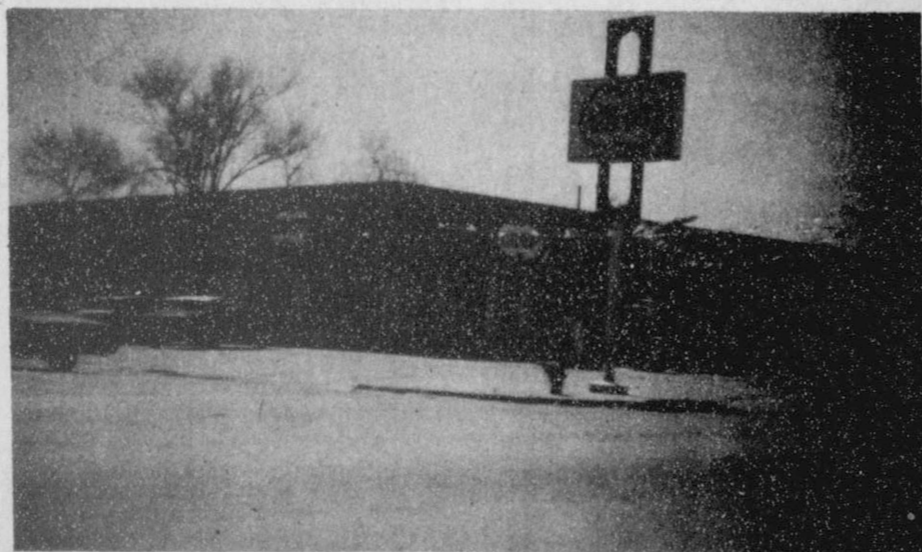

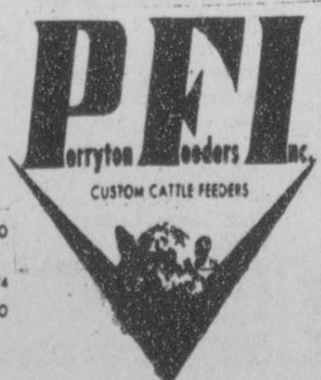

The Lynx traveled to Gruver, just over the hill, to compete in the Greyhound Relays. There was a lot of stiff competition from the 9 Lynx competitors!

The Lynx were going up against Dalhart, Sunray, Perryton, the host team—Gruver Greyhounds, Boise City, Stratford, Phillips, Texhoma and White Deer.

The Lynx DID NOT place in 9 events—the SHOT PUT, DISCUS, POLE VAULT, 400 METER RELAY, 3200 METER RUN, 800 METER RUN, 400 METER DASH, 200 METER DASH and the 1600 METER RUN.

The Shot Put Event was won by Brown from Sunray with a "throw" of 53' 3/4". This was a New Record! SPORTS LIABILITY

Golf was one of the first games to be covered by an insurance liability policy. It was called the "golfers' liability policy" and protected club-swingers against claims of injury while they went for those long drives on the fairway. Later, other kinds of sports such as basketball, tennis, football, baseball, hunting, and fishing were included in the policy.

After that, a broad sports liability form came into use. With this form, the insured was covered for bodily injury liability involving any kind of athletic sport or game. Bicycle riding was also included, as well as activities on the water with canoes and rowboats, as long as they were not being used for commercial purposes. There was also liability using sailboats or power boats not owned or chartered by the insured.

Individual sports liability for nonprofessionals is seldom written now because of the use of the Comprehensive Personal Liability Policy. That form includes sports protection. However, professional athletes still get sports liability because the comprehensive form excludes occupational and business activities.
