# Ellsworth heads up teen program

Call it gratitude to a community who has served him well, call it concern for young people, call it dedication to an ideal or simply call it love -- whatever the reason, Gary Ellsworth has taken the helm of a Spearman youth support group and has committed himself to the task of a special public alcohol and drug awareness effort.

What began as a favor for a friend has turned into a labor of love for the Spearman born and bred resident, and he's taken to the task with a commitment which is uncommon for a single person with no children in the community.

Ellsworth is president of Families in Action in Spearman, a youth support group who sponsors The Hideout, a teen activities center.

Under his guidance, the group has also become the focal point for

Spearman's efforts on the nationwide "Just Say No" program which focuses on alcohol and drug abuse and teens' right to refuse the mentally debilitating effects of chemical abuse.

Outspoken and easy to talk with, the Spearman man will share his recent experiences at a special Texas War on Drugs seminar with any and all who will take the time to listen -- and he speaks with a sincerity and conviction which readily comes through in any discussion.

"Kids learn from what's around them," he remarks. "So we adults have to take the responsibility for some of their actions."

That's a statement Ellsworth puts his actions behind. And he's not only working with Spearman's youth, but he's also busy making

the civic group circuit to inform and enlist adult support as well as to make his contemporaries aware that an alcohol problem really exists in the community.

"You have to be aware of a problem before you can correct it," he notes. "Public awareness is a key part of any program, and this one is no different."

A 1967 graduate of Spearman high school, Ellsworth left Spearman to attend West Texas State University in Canyon for a couple of years.

He finished out of Amarillo College school of vocational arts with an associate's degree in applied Science, focusing on commercial electronics.

Since that time he's used his expertise in the electronics field; first to begin his own business in

Amarillo, and, later after selling out his business interests, in related fields before turning to management with a large corporation in Dallas.

Ellsworth admits to a lot of miles and a great deal of experience in his life since he graduated from high school. Some of those experiences give added impetus to his efforts in Spearman with the youth.

The easy-going Spearman businessman has lived through more than on rough spot in his 38 years and has a 10-year old daughter, Jana Jean, in Houston.

It's obvious in talking with him that he has a special affection for his daughter -- that's probably what carries over into his work with The Hideout and Spearman youth.

It makes sense that a man who lied to promote activities not in the best interests of the United States should become a sort of folk hero with the American public.

Sure it does. All of it. Doesn't it?

Prohibition proved that government cannot regulate morality which the public does not want regulated.

Gary's project right now is one of public awareness. First, of course, he's got to believe that the public really wants to know.

Some do . . . many don't. It's

those don'ts who'll prove frustrating for him.

Somehow, I don't think that will deter Gary a great deal. And that's promising and speaks well for the younger Ellsworth.

Who knows, maybe he'll prove me wrong. It would sure be nice if he did.

## Another \$37,000 added to budget . . .

# Hospital district reinstates pay cuts lopped from 1987-88 fiscal budget

A portion of scheduled salary increases which had been lopped off the 1987-88 Hansford County Hospital District budget earlier this year were reinstated by district board directors during their monthly meeting Thursday evening in Spearman.

A total of \$37,035 in pay raises were okayed by the hospital district board to be added back into a budget which had a total of \$51,698 in wage increases pared during hearings this past summer.

"We were able to do this due to a number of factors," notes hospital administrator Al La Rochelle. "We came out of the 1986-87 budget about \$100,000 better than we had anticipated and, after the first month into our new budget, it appears we are well within the parameters of that budget."

Competitiveness with area hospitals was another key consideration in looking over the cut backs on pay increases as well, he notes.

The last pay raises instituted at

the hospital district went into effect in Oct., 1985.

During the budget cutting session, pay raises for a group of employees were pared off for the upcoming year as directors tried to

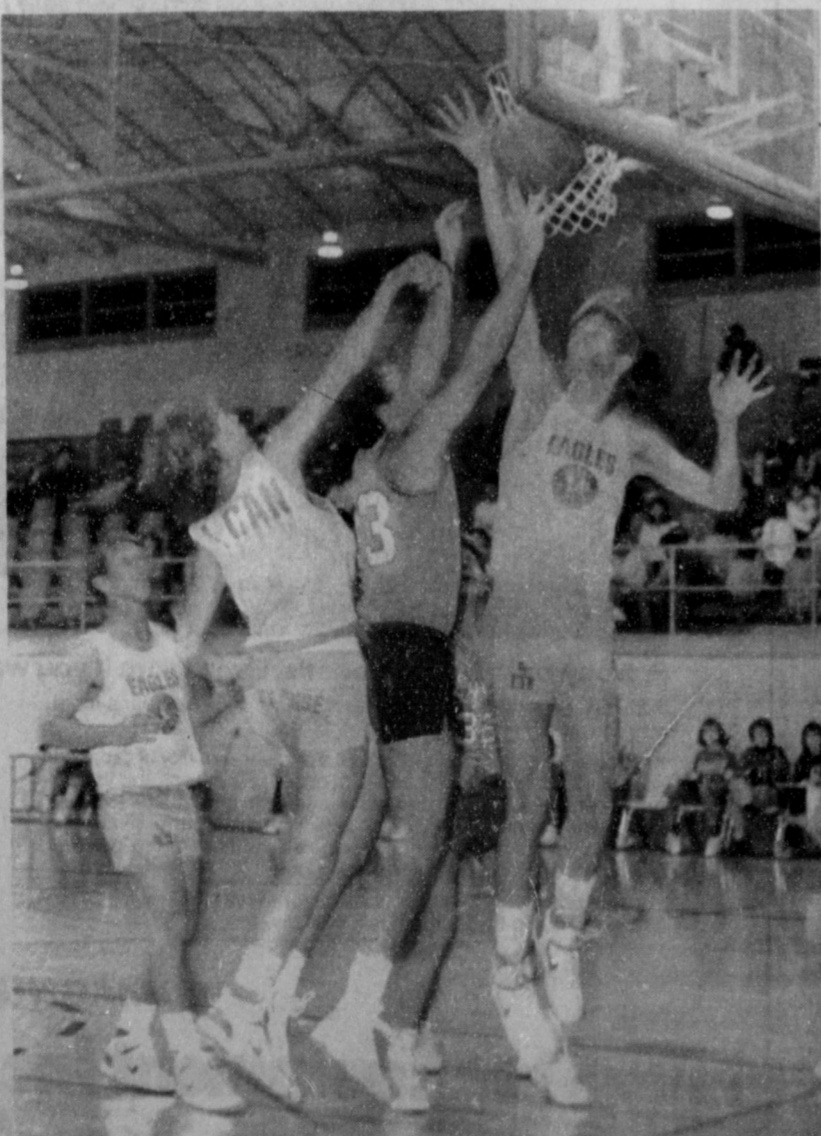
## SHS student council hosts blood drive

## Spearman cagers to have new look in '87-88 season

Spearman basketball fans will get their first look at a newly revamped boys and girls cager program when the Lynx and Lynxettes take to the court Tuesday evening in Spearman.

The Lynxettes -- pre-season favorites to capture the 1-AA girls roundball crown -- go into Tuesday's opener under the guidance of new head coach Jim Kirkland while the Lynx take to the courts under the tutelage of new head coach H. M. Garrett.

Both are introducing their own brand of coaching philosophy into the two programs and the season opener will unveil their efforts

when the teams take on the 1-AAA Perryton squads.

The Lynx will be returning a good deal of experience but lack any players whose height could provide Spearman with strong board domination.

"We have good overall height," notes Garrett. "And the team is pretty sound."

That soundness comes from the return of all five starters from last year's 17-8 cager crew.

Despite only four days of workouts of date, Garrett and company are looking to work a strong full-court press and a run-and-gun approach which most fans find

exciting.

"We've got some conditioning to do," notes the Lynx head mentor. "This is the hardest I've ever worked a group of kids and they're responding well."

For Lynxette head coach Kirkland, coaching the Spearman girls squad is more than a job -- it's a return to his home town and high school Alma Mater.

Despite losing all their starters to graduation last year, the Lynxettes are early picks for the district crown -- mostly due to Kirkland's reputation and the addition of his daughter, Krista, who was an

Kirkland, however, isn't as impressed with himself as he is with his young charges.

"We've got some good players," he reports. "And they're working hard. But we've got a good amount of competition in the district and we have to get past them first."

On the boys side of the ledger, Brett Davis (6-0, senior), Carl Urban (5-8, senior), Kevin Nelson (6-4, senior), Keith Benson (6-2, senior) and Tim Woolley (6-2, senior) make up the returning starters from last year's Lynx cage squad.

Returning lettermen also include Jeff Gustin, Charles Roper and Carson Womble.

Coming off a scrimmage Thursday evening, Garrett was able to make a few assessments of his crew.

"We've got some work to do," he notes. "We played well when we stayed in our offensive game, but our transition from offense to defense and defense to offense needs some work."

The Lynx played a multi-team scrimmage against Fritch and Hooker Thursday evening in Spearman.

Meanwhile, Kirkland will be looking to utilize the services of returning lettermen Heather Murrell (5-6, junior), Kim Jenkins (5-2, senior) and Ginger Pearson (5-8, junior).

keep an increase in taxes as low as possible.

At that time, directors were looking at a possible cash flow deficit of \$325,000 to end the 1986-87 fiscal year. Actual expenditures found the deficit at only \$212,000 leaving the district \$113,000 to the better.

Not all salary increases which were cut were reinstated in Thursday's board action.

Some of the positions had been eliminated in restructuring at the hospital. A few others were already at the top of the pay scale for comparable positions in area hospitals while some had received a slight pay increase despite the budget cuts earlier.

Total dollar figures were allocated by the board to departments in the hospital and nursing home with instructions to the administrator to give pay raises on a merit system, rather than as an across the board raise.

The total dollar figures in each department amount to an overall five percent increase.

"Some will receive two percent, some four, maybe some will receive more than five," La Rochelle notes. "It will be a merit raise with a five percent cap."

Departments which had the wage increases reinstated at the hospital include RN's, LVN's, office help and contract labor.

The hospital administrator also had a portion of his wage increase cut reinstated during the meeting.

In other board action Thursday, directors awarded a bid on the purchase of five typewriters to Southern Office Supply of Guymon, Ok. for a total price of \$3,166.

The only other bid came from Stanfield Printing Company, also of Guymon, for a total bid of \$2,941.32.

Directors went with the higher bid when office personnel requested the machines being bid by Southern, stating their preference between the two bid offers.

During the meeting directors went into executive session to discuss possible law suits for collection of bad debts and for department head evaluations.

Once back in open session, the board voted to proceed with the filing of suits to collect debts owed to the hospital and voted in the reinstatement of pay hike cuts.

gress toward physician recruitment. "I'm not getting much cooperation from the medical schools," he told directors Thursday. "They are not responding to my queries and things have bogged down a bit."

Recruitment efforts by the hospital were begun in early October following the resignation of Dr. Fred Taylor who had been in the Spearman community for about a year.

Information on the hospital's continuing quality assurance program was presented by the administrator.

Nursing home administrator Carol Hergert presented the Manor's monthly update with Hergert informing the administrator's that a spot inspection by the Texas Department of Health and Human Services showed a few minor discrepancies which were quickly corrected.

"We still maintain our Superior rating," she told directors. "And we completed the 2-day inspection with no demerits."

"I got back to Dallas and nothing seemed to fit into place," he laughs. "I just didn't feel at ease, so I came back to Spearman."

That also was in February and he came back with a decision to make Spearman his home. Shortly after his return for good, he was asked to substitute at a Hideout activity for a friend.

"I did it as a favor," Ellsworth remembers. "That's when I got my

introduction to the kids and to the adults who are working with the teen center program."

At that time the group was looking at renovating the teen center building. When Ellsworth found out about this later, he volunteered his labor free of charge toward the effort.

As he worked with the renovation project, he became more and more interested in the youth and their problems -- as a result he became more and more involved in the program.

When election of officers came up this summer, he was asked to serve as president of the Families In Action group, a position he accepted.

It's been a good thing for Gary Ellsworth and the new F.I.A. leader has proven a one-man public relations task force for the group as well.

Currently Ellsworth keeps himself busy with a variety of jobs -- from working his remodeling and renovation business to helping his father at the theatre and maintaining an every-Saturday evening Top 40 music program on KRDF-FM in Spearman.

His active schedule, combined with his work at the teen center and now by giving presentations to local civic groups keeps the Spearman man more than busy.

But, as he says, he's single and really has nothing better to do.

"And it's a way for me to pay Spearman back for all the good things it's done for me," he declares. "I owe this community a lot and it's about time I did something in return."

Perhaps that's the beginning of another one of those never-ending stories, as Ellsworth's life and efforts touches the lives of another generation of Spearman young people who, someday, will be returning those same favors to yet another generation of Spearman youth.

"Kids are our most important product," he notes. "It's important to me that they have the opportunity to be the best they can be -- and that means alcohol and drug free."

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# Manor maintains state's Superior nursing rating

A surprise spot inspection by the Texas Department of Health and Human Services at the Hansford Manor Nursing Home found few discrepancies and left the Spearman-based nursing home in possession of its Superior rating by the state agency.

The unannounced inspection is a semi-annual event at all Medicaid-approved nursing home facilities across the state. A team of three inspectors spent all day Monday and Tuesday at Hansford Manor this past week.

"This was our licensure inspection," notes Manor administrator Carol Hergert. "It's their responsibility to check compliance with Medicaid standards."

Americans drink over a billion pounds of coffee per year and around five billion bottles of pop.

During the licensure inspection, nursing homes are given bonus points for added services and demerits for any standard services which do not meet state requirements.

Bonus points are added and demerits subtracted to arrive at the nursing home's total score. A score of 95 or better is required to get a Superior rating.

The Hansford Manor facility was noted for a few minor discrepancies but received no demerits during the 2-day inspection.

"We corrected most of the discrepancies on site during the inspection," notes the administrator. "And we're always working to improve all our services."

The Hansford Manor nursing home facility has received the Superior rating from the TDHS since 1984.

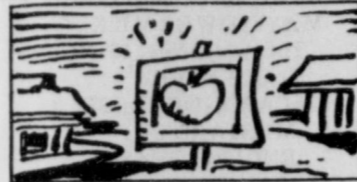
Each of the students was presented a check for \$250 toward their semester's expense at PSU.

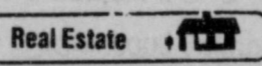

**HIGHLIGHTS**

AUSTIN—Texans voted last week to return to electing members of the State Board of Education, but some folks wonder what would have happened if the Texas Supreme Court issue had been on the ballot.

The day before the election, a comprehensive media probe revealed that eight parties with major stakes riding on supreme court decisions have contributed nearly \$1.4 million to men sitting

on the high court.

The news disturbed San Antonio state Sen. Frank Tejeda, who monitors judicial ethics. But when he asked two candidates for chief justice to return such contributions, they refused.

Texans vote again in March to elect, among other things, some new seats on the Texas Supreme Court, and Tejeda and outgoing Chief Justice John Hill will question whether justice is for sale when campaign contributions are needed.

**Eight Big Ones**

Those eight contributors include some lawyers and law firms well known and respected in Texas. No one has suggested, however, that the contributions were illegal.

Houston's Vinson & Elkins and Russell McMains of Corpus Christi, were involved in the megabucks Pennzoil-Texaco lawsuit. That suit was decided the day after the story broke last week.

Other names are Joe Jamail; Ernest Cannon; Helm, Pletcher,

Hogan, Bowen & Sanders, and Abraham, Watkins, Nichols, Ballard, Onstad & Friend, all from Houston.

Also, the Pat Malone firm of San Antonio; Bill Edwards, David Perry and Anthony Constant of Corpus Christi, and Fisher, Gallagher, Perrin & Lewis, a Houston firm.

**How Many Dollars**

Records show that contributions from eight Texas lawyers and law firms account for nearly 18 percent of the campaign dollars received by current justices this decade.

Although he has been on the court the shortest time, former state Sen. Oscar Mauzy has received the most money from the eight parties, some \$327,420. Mauzy was elected last year.

Next highest is C. L. Ray with \$282,837. Ray was one of the targets of the House probe by Sen. Tejeda last year, along with William Kilgarlin who, reports show, received \$174,578, third

highest. Next is Raul Gonzales, the first Hispanic elected to the court, with \$141,000.

The other justices received gifts in the \$100,000 range, except for Franklin Spears, a frequent critic of such practices. Spears was last with \$27,950.

Two justices, Ted Robertson and Robert Campbell, are running for chief justice in 1988. Two others, Kilgarlin and Gonzales, are seeking re-election then.

**Renting the Capitol**

Yuppie financing has surfaced at the Texas Capitol.

A proposal to lease the Capitol for funds to underwrite its \$5 million renovation was called pathetic legal gimmickry, perhaps unconstitutional, by the chairman of the Texas Public Finance Authority.

Under the complex proposal, the finance authority would issue \$5 million in bonds to finance the State Preservation Board's renovation work.

The principal and interest on the bonds would be paid from "rent" paid by the Preservation Board to the Finance Authority.

The Preservation Board would lease the Capitol to the Finance Authority, which would sublease the building back to the Preservation Board. Neither would be in the business of operating the Capitol.

The Preservation Board would get its rent money from tax dollars appropriated by the Legislature.

**Another Debate**

Texas Democrats will hold a televised presidential debate next month at a site to be selected in the Rio Grande Valley.
