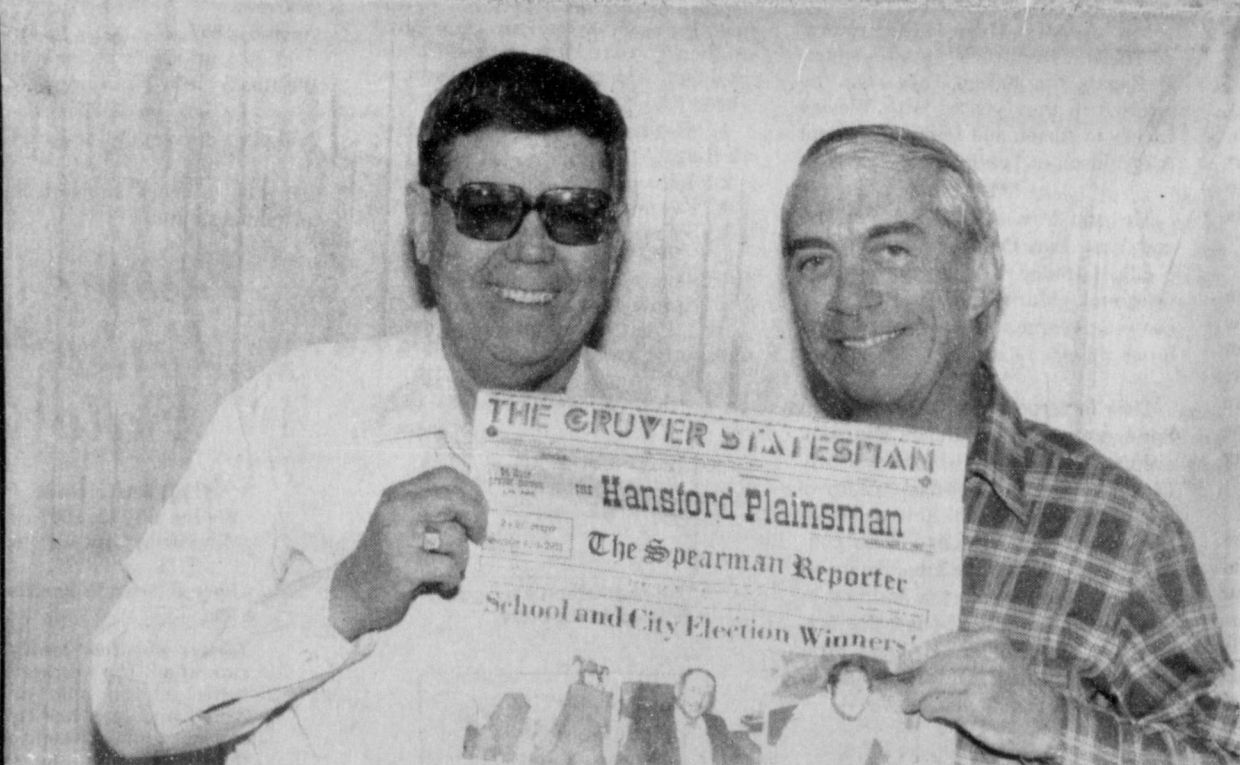

The Spearman Reporter, The Gruver Statesman, and the Hansford Plainsman were sold this week to Texas Independent Newspapers, Inc. They were purchased from Mr. William M. Miller, whose family has operated them since 1920. The Spearman paper is the oldest continuously operated business in Hansford County.

The Newspaper Publishing Company is headed by President and Publisher Howard L. Schramm, a 28 year newspaper veteran. Mr. Schramm's prior publishing experience was most recently in Houston, Texas where he was Chief Operator Officer of the 7 paper, Houston Community Newspaper chain.

Schramm stated that T.I.N. is actively looking for other acquisitions and intends to expand to at least 10 newspapers in the next 2 years. "Our intention is to expand with acquisitions of other Texas weeklies," said Schramm.

"Then Came the Morning," an Easter musical, will be presented this week-end by the combined choirs of First Christian Church of Spearman and First Baptist Church. The musical ends, not with the resurrection, but with Pentecost, when the 'eternity' in Christ's words consumes and possesses these believers, banishing their fear, and driving them into the street to share the news of the Unshakable Kingdom Christ had come to build. Several soloists and narrators will be featured in the presentation of the musical. Two narrators guide the story line and plot of the musical speaking as men who walked with Jesus and were called by Him to be two of the twelve disciples. These roles are portrayed by Mark Butts and Stan Cobb. Vocal soloists in the choral

Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor

Lately, there has been an uproar across the country regarding Judge Hand's decision against Humanism being taught in Alabama schools. Some call the decision a violation of basic rights. Other call it judicial censorship. Are these reasonable charges?

Here's another letter of thanks from a satisfied client to the Panhandle Crisis Center:

"This morning I started my day being thankful for all of the people who have been so helpful to me and my family.

The Crisis Center stands out No. 1. For the past 2 years I've had 2 great counselors. A very special 'Thank You' to them. Also, Jeanie (the office manager; for always being so concerned, thoughtful, and making me feel so good. Always with a smile and a hug.

Although it's still very hard being a single parent, they have made it easier.

I've been able to be self-supporting, have a better outlook on life, and a much better self-image.

I never thought it possible. Again 'thank you' for the hugs, shoulders and the kleenex. Love you all God Bless." (Name withheld by request).

The next comment is for the sake of those law officers who feel frustrated when the woman they have 'rescued' refuses to prosecute. An average of five visits to the shelter seems necessary for women to become convinced that some action is necessary. This is true not only for us here, but across the nation. It is hard for them not to believe the batterer when he seems so contrite and promises never again - again! Especially when you want so much to believe him. Part of this gullibility is due to the fact that the woman feels herself to be inadequate for earning her own living - and heaven knows that everything in her experience tells her she is incapable and worthless. She must overcome this feeling to be able to take charge of her life.

Note the letter above quoted. So, gentlemen of the law, please continue to render aid to these women. They will catch on, especially if you continue to recommend the Panhandle Crisis Center to them. And they will be forever grateful to you for your support. You should hear them sing the praises of those law officers whose patience did not run out!

Have you time to read one more thing?

The current Texas Law describes various aspects of the sexual act as rape when it is engaged in without the other person's consent, and/or if threats of violence, or actual violence is used. **UNLESS THE OTHER PERSON IS THE SPOUSE OF THE ACTOR!**

How about that? Even if violence or threats of violence are used, a spouse can be raped without penalty! A bill is currently being presented to the legislature to delete the phrase "who is not the spouse of the actor," so as to include spousal rape (which happens way to often!) in the list of criminal offenses.

CONSIDERATION OF THE MONTHLY BILLS PAYABLE AND CURRENT CASH POSITION.

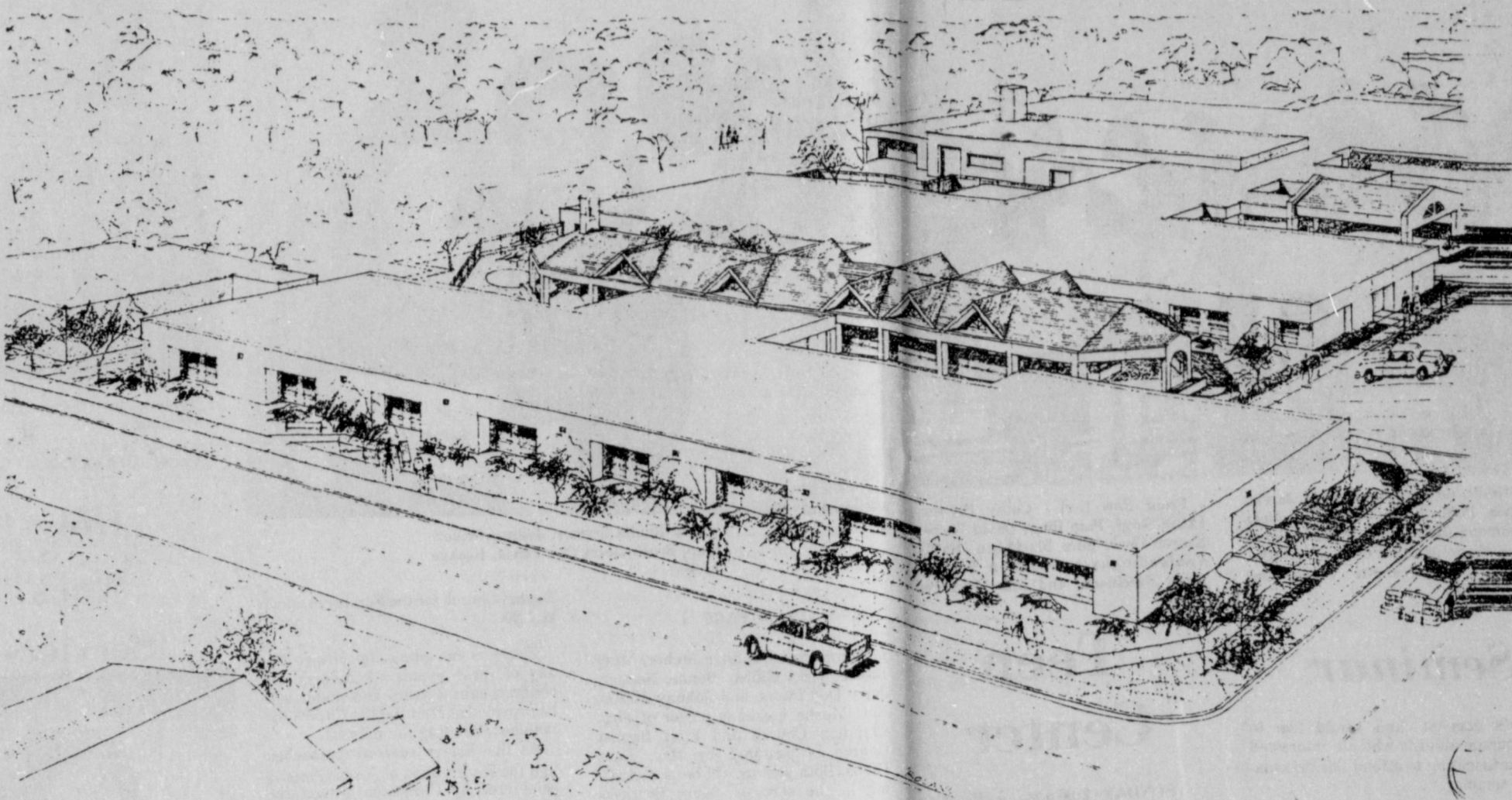
Motion was made by Cudd to approve the monthly bills payable in the amount of \$352,323.72 and the current cash position. Second by Garner. Motion unanimously carried.
