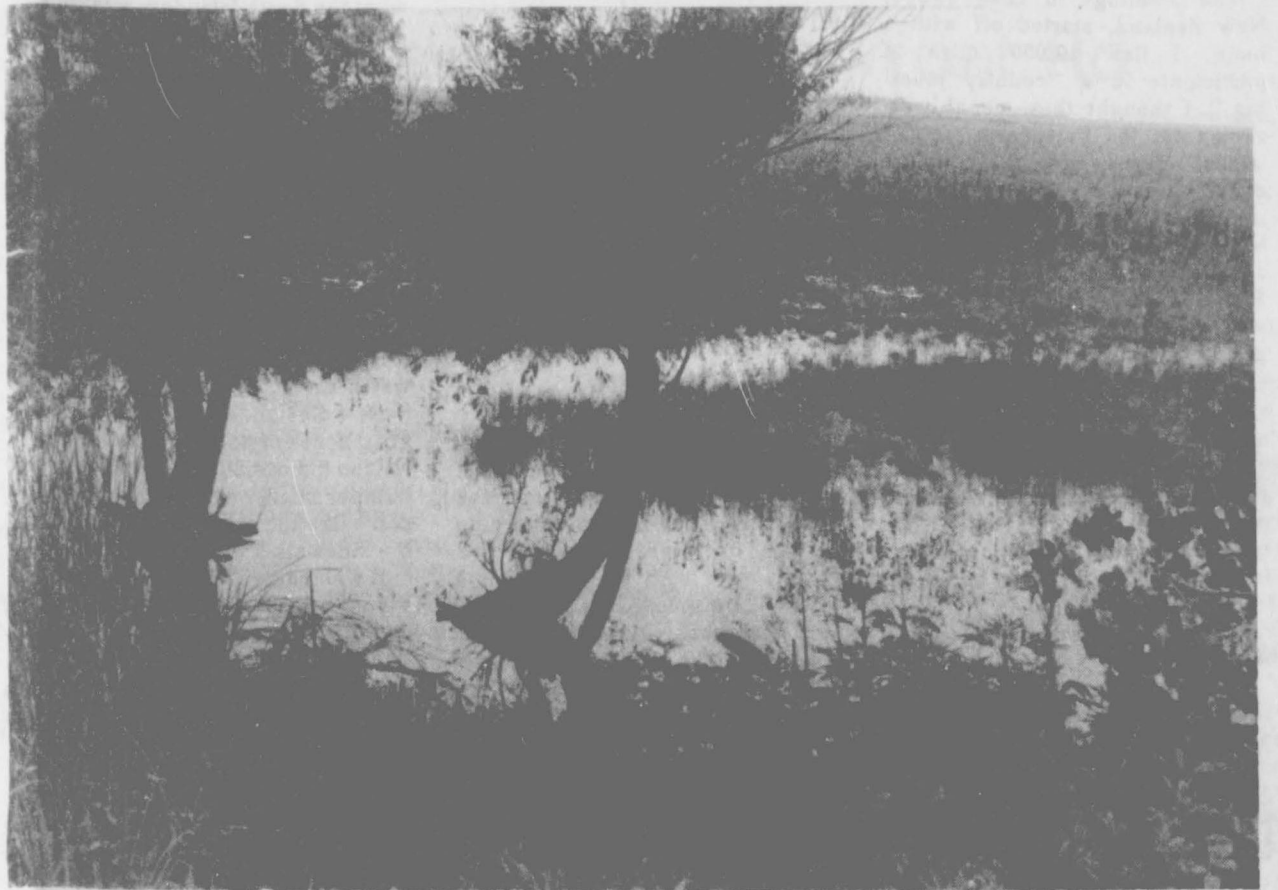

Beef Checkoff deemed success by TCU expert

Texas Christian University ranching expert John Merrill has voted the National Beef Check-Off campaign a success. In an effort to better market their product, beef producers have contributed check-off dollars to increase research, education, advertising and promotion. According to Merrill, these efforts are beginning to pay off in higher consumer demand for beef and increased profits for ranchers. For the first time in several years the demand for beef in the last quarter of 1987 increased, and Merrill expects that demand will continue to improve. Updated research and a response to consumer's concerns about too much fat are cited as major reasons for the upswing in beef sales, Merrill noted.

"From our research we learned that the dietary guidelines available for beef were based on samples taken in the 1960s when beef was much fatter," stated Merrill. "In addition, past statistics used the whole carcass rather than the trimmed, cooked portions we actually eat." The latest research also shows that a change in cattle feeding practices has produced a dramatic change in the fat content of beef. "A market basket survey just completed shows 27 percent less fat on the beef produced in 1987 than in 1986," Merrill said. "New research also indicates that much of the saturated fatty acids found in beef are in fact stearic acid which may actually reduce heart problems."

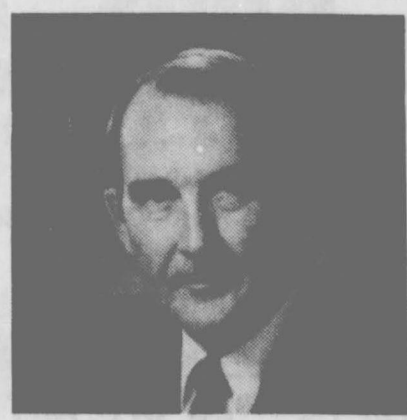
President of Texas-New Mexico Co. retires

R.D. Woofter retired July 1 as chief executive officer of Texas-New Mexico Power Company and as president and chief executive officer of the Fort Worth-based utility's holding company, TNP Enterprises, Inc. J.M. Tarpley, who has served as president and chief operating officer of the utility since February 1987, will assume the position of chief executive officer of both entities and become president of the holding company.

Woofter, who will remain as chairman of the board of both entities, steps down after 38 years of service with TNP. He began his career as an engineer in Texas City and was promoted to the company's Fort Worth headquarters as an electric operating engineer in 1959. Woofter was named vice president-commercial manager in 1967 and vice president-operations in 1973. A promotion to executive vice president in 1974 preceded his election as president, chief executive officer and director of the power company in 1975. He added the duties of chairman in 1977 and was elected president, chairman and chief executive officer when the holding company was formed in 1981. He also served as chairman of three TNPE subsidiaries, Bayport Cogeneration, Inc., Texas

Generating Company, and TNP Operating Company. Woofter has been a director of the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce and a past president of the West Texas and Texas State Chambers of Commerce. He is currently treasurer of the board of directors of Senior Citizens Services of Greater Tarrant County and a member of the Fort Worth Rotary Club. Tarpley began his career with the company in Texas City in 1954 and held various field engineering positions before transferring to Fort Worth in 1970. He was named superintendent of distribution a year later and elected vice president-contracts and regulation in 1974. In 1985 he was named executive vice president. He currently serves on the boards of the holding company and all four

subsidiaries. Tarpley is a Registered Professional Engineer in the states of New Mexico and Texas and a member of the national and Texas Society of Professional Engineers.

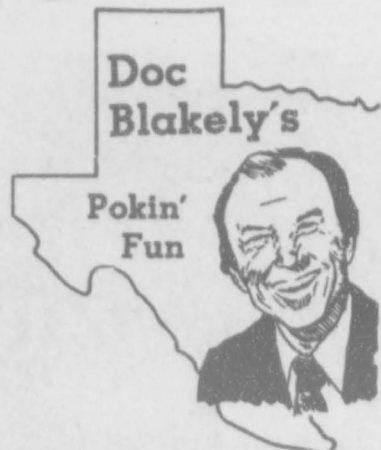

Going over down under

The meetings in Lake Taupo, New Zealand, started off with a bang. I flew 10,000 miles to participate in a "country meeting." I thought they meant warriors from the Polynesian warrior tribes. Turns out they meant country-western and everybody was wearing boots and Stetsons. I said to a dark-skinned fellow I assumed was a Maori, "Pango Pango Wairakei" which I was told was a friendly greeting. He replied, "Howdy."

Stetsons are not made in the U.S. anymore, but there is a black market trade for them in New Zealand and they can still be had if you know the right hatter. They are made from rabbit fur. It takes ten rabbits for a hat. I was warned not to buy two and keep them together. "What would happen?" I asked. "You'd be overrun by caps," was the answer.

Lake Taupo is the home of thermal springs, lots of geysers, and steam spouts out of the



ground. Because of this, the swimming pools are like giant jacuzzis. It is Fall down under and the temperature can drop to near zero (celsius) overnight. I never learned exactly how cold that was but I learned how to ice skate on the way to my morning swim.

Leaving the North Island we drove (on the left . . . most of the time) to the South Island of New Zealand (via a 3-hour ferry ride) to

what the South Islanders refer to as "The Mainland." I felt like I had entered the Confederacy.

This is still a young country, no more than 150 years old, 3 million people, 1 million under the age of 21, and 65 million sheep. Some 100,000 are unemployed. The people, not the sheep.

There are two TV stations in the entire country and everybody who has a set has his choice of watching Channel 1 or 2. To tell you how exciting they are, most people watch sheep.

New Zealanders (Kiwis) have a great sense of humor. I saw a car in Nelson (on the South Island) with a bumper sticker that read, "If you don't like the way I drive, stay off the sidewalk."

It was parked on the sidewalk. Just outside Greymouth, I stopped in a service station for petrol. The owner told me he had no petrol because of his banker's narrow-minded attitude about credit and government policy which stifled

individual initiative. I have no idea what that meant, but I bought refreshments from him to do what I could to help. Next to the cash register was a sign that read, "Work for your tupper. Don't steal --The government hates competition."

"How would you describe the accomplishments of your politicians," I asked.

"They don't know cheese from chalk," he replied.

I rather like the descriptive powers of that remark.

As one Kiwi told me in Queens-town, "The government is like my wife. She wants to have me cremated and put in an egg timer so even after I'm gone, I can go right on working."

Back in Wellington, on my way to Australia, I stopped in a tearoom (place to eat) and saw a sign that summed up the spirit of these hearty people. "Those of you who think you know everything are very annoying to those of us who do."

The First Texas Panhandle Relay Race will bring some money in by August 20th, the day of the Race, and the Harvest Ball will bring in

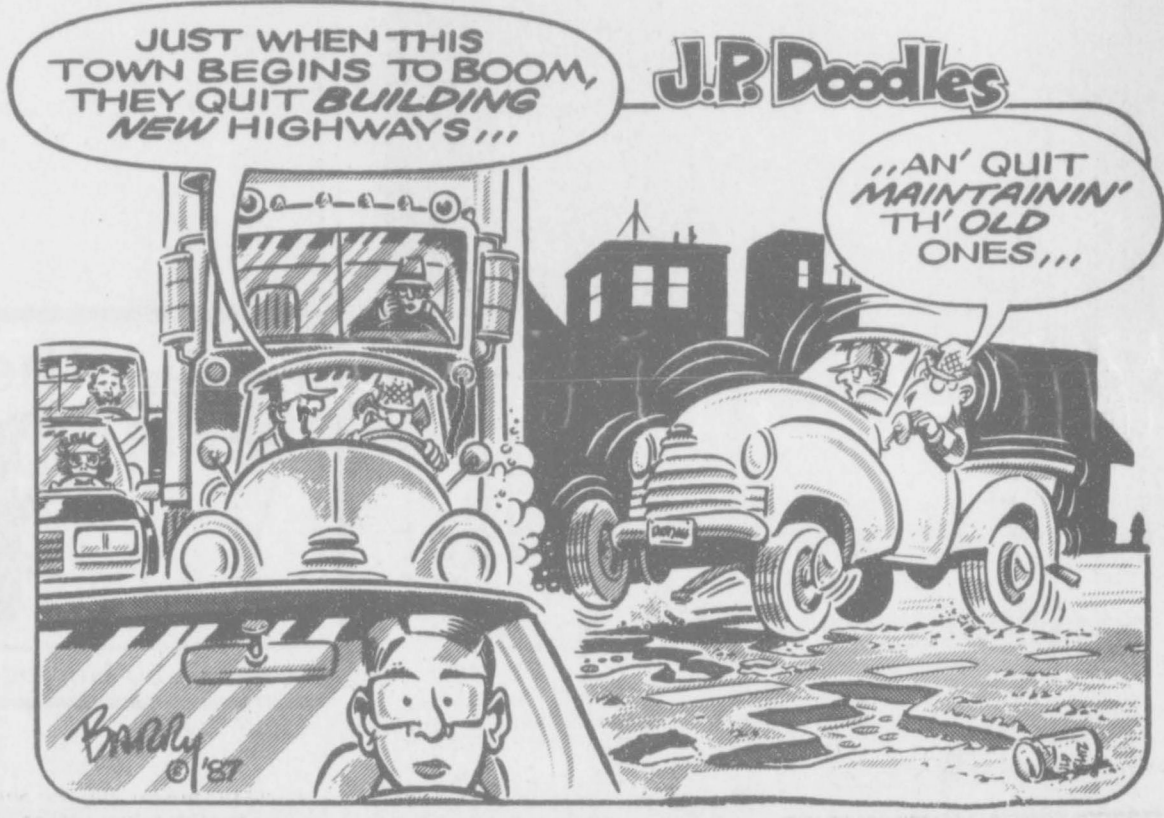
more during November so, with the support of those who normally donate, the Center will stay open.

Heart Association has 53 meeting in Houston

"Volunteers Make a Difference" is the theme of the American Heart Association, Texas Affiliate's 53rd Annual Meeting of the Membership on July 15 - 17 at the Westin Galleria Hotel in Houston.

The AHA is a community-based volunteer organization that devotes all of its human and financial resources to preventing premature death and disability due to heart disease and stroke. Over two hundred volunteer leaders serving as delegates, officers, and board members from across the state are gathering in Houston to review the policies and goals for the coming year and elect officers and directors for 1988-89.

A Leadership Conference designed to help volunteers sharpen leadership skills as officers, directors, and chairmen on the local level will be held on Friday, July 15. Participants will learn how to conduct successful fund raising activities, market AHA community service programs, and inform the public of AHA activities.

Newly elected National Chairman of the Board of the American Heart Association, W.W. (Bill) Aston will close the Leadership Conference. Aston is the former president, chairman, and chief executive officer of the Dallas Power and Light Company. Aston first became an AHA volunteer in the Dallas Division and served as its Chairman of the Board. He served as the Texas Affiliate's Chairman of the Board from 1976-78.

The 15th Annual Stroke Conference, with this year's theme of "Getting On With It: Returning to Independence," will also be held in conjunction with the Annual Meet-

ing. This conference is designed to demonstrate how stroke victims can help themselves, and how the family takes a role in the patient's rehabilitation. Stroke victims will give a special demonstration on one-handed functions for daily living, such as how to dress and how to get food out of a can.

Stroke Conference speakers include: James B. Murphy, Ph.D. speaking on the topic "Going and Getting: Using Support Groups to Get On With Life" and Kathy-Adler Baugh, ACSW, CSW-HCP speaking on "Community Resources -- Gaining and Maintaining Independence."

Also at the Research Luncheon, J. Kent Trinkle, M.D., a cardiothoracic surgeon from the University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio, will talk about the heart and heart lung transplantation program at his institution and will relate some successful transplants. Also, Dr. Trinkle will discuss the importance of organ donor programs.

The Annual Meeting's highlight is the Awards Dinner on Saturday evening. Awards will be presented to the outstanding lay, nurse and medical professional volunteers to over twenty other outstanding volunteers for their service in Texas.

The Paul R. Ellis Media Awards, given to members of the Texas media who have done an outstanding job of covering the cardiovascular disease problem during the last year, will also be presented at the Awards Dinner. The 1988 Ellis Award winners, by category, include: Radio -- Large Markets: Tim Fleck, "Cardiac Crisis" -- five-part news series on the dangers, early warning signs, and

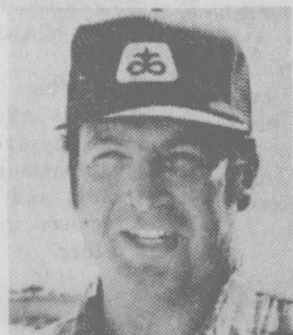
