

Back To School...

SISD Staff Ready for 1989-90 School Year

High School, junior high and elementary school staffs and administrators have spent this past week attending inservice workshops, enrolling students, fielding telephone calls and bustling in and out of their classrooms and offices as they prepare for the 1989-90 school year, which begins tomorrow, August 28.

Adding a bit of confusion for a few parents to the traditional back-to-school hubbub of activity was the fact that elementary campuses, the telephones there were not hooked up until Monday, August 21 and there was no power in the buildings at all until Sunday, August 20. Junior High Principal Richard Olsen reports that this situation caused parents trying to call these schools before August 21 to get a signal that the phones in the school offices were ringing, when actually they were not even plugged in. "Nevertheless, we were here all summer," he says, and adds that the telephone and power systems are now fully installed and "on."

At the elementary school building, the 1989-90 school year's biggest change is the campus itself, as the east end of the old junior high was demolished this summer and a large new addition constructed on the elementary building. This addition on the south side of the elementary campus will house all special programs, such as special education and Chapter 1 Reading, as well as the building's offices, Parent-teacher conference room, and a new, fully-designed Media Center, which replaces the old library. There is also a new teacher's lounge in the addition.

The old elementary school offices, reports Principal Eddie Gage, have been made into a Nurse's Station, where school

nurse Linda Winegarner will have an office and sick room.

The other major change at the elementary school is that the fifth grade classes have been moved over from the junior high building, making the campus a kindergarten-through-fifth grade campus.

Principal Gage comments that the Kindergarten through third grade curriculum and schedule remains essentially the same as last year's with the same emphasis on student achievement, but adds that the fourth and fifth grades will be departmentalized this year instead of self-contained. This means that children in these grades will have a homeroom and homeroom teacher but will move to various classrooms for instruction by different teachers in the different subject areas, as opposed to a homeroom teacher instructing them in one classroom in all subjects.

"We find that this system of departmentalization allows teachers to teach to their strengths," comments Gage. "The fourth and fifth grade classrooms are very close to one another, too, so moving into other classrooms won't be a problem." Fourth and fifth graders will have each of their teachers for two-period time blocks during the school day.

Another new aspect of teaching at elementary school this year will be the approach to teaching gifted and talented children. From the second through fifth grades, children identified as gifted will take part in a pull-out program coordinated by Wynette Mullins, advanced pupil training (APT) teacher, Sandy Smith, third grade teacher, and Paula Butler, school librarian. Paula Butler will teach a special lesson weekly in the first grade classrooms to all students with supplementary activities for those

who are identified as gifted. The lower grades did not participate in a gifted and talented program in past years, but state mandates will make such a program a required offering by the 1990-91 school year. "Our target is for 5% of the student body to be in the gifted and talented program," says Gage.

Gage's slogan for the elementary school this year is "Expect the Best." "This includes all the areas—expect the best effort, the best person, the best scholastically," he says. "When you expect the best from your students, you find that that's what they will give."

Principal Richard Olsen has implemented a new schedule at the Spearman Junior High for the 1989-90 school year. There will be eight 45-minute class periods with an additional lunch period from 12:12 p.m. to 12:42 p.m. and a special daily "Tutorial/Study" period from 3:09 p.m. to 3:35 p.m.

"This period at the end of the day was created for several reasons," Olsen explains. "Parents had been requesting a study hall during the school day and we found that our early morning before-school tutorial time brought in very few kids, and it wasn't an option for the bus-rid-

ers." He says the new period will avail study hall and tutoring time to all students and will also be used for special events, such as Pep sessions, and University Interscholastic League (UIL) classes next winter. Band and choir classes could also use this time for special practice sessions.

"This schedule will keep us on the same schedule all year long," Olsen adds, explaining that the daily schedule at the junior high used to be changed several times a year to accommodate special programs, such as pep sessions, and the UIL courses. In addition, the newly scheduled Tutorial/Study period will make it easier for specific teachers to break away from other duties to tutor specific students.

Olsen reports that the overall goal at the junior high this year is "improved instruction and student output." He says there is "plenty of room" at the junior high since the fifth grade music, art, ESL and other classes have relocated to the elementary building.

"We have an excellent, experienced staff," Olsen summarized "and I think our new teachers will fit in very well."

The New Spearman High School

Principal, Jimmy Kirkland, plans to implement a few new programs and classes this year. One of these is a Student of the Month award to be given monthly in recognition of a high school boy and girl for achievements in citizenship, leadership, academics, and extra-curricular activities.

The student of the Month individuals will be teacher-nominated and elected and profiled in the **Spearman Reporter** newspaper, Kirkland says.

Another new program at the high school will be Good News Notes. "These are letters which will be mailed out by the school after they are written by teachers," says Kirkland. "It's a positive mail-out campaign. All too often when a parent hears from the school by mail, it is bad news. This will be good news!" He adds that he has worked in districts using the Good News Notes and Student of the Month Programs and was impressed with how well they worked to boost student pride and parental support.

The basic schedule at the high school will remain the same this year, but several new classes have been added to the curriculum. "Office Processes," which will teach everything from electronic

machinery to filing systems, will be taught by business teacher Wanda Jones. Typing is a pre-requisite for this one-semester course.

"Computer Applications" is a word processing course using various computer programs and will be taught by computer science teacher Wesley Jarvis. Typing is also a pre-requisite for this year-long course.

Phyllis Kirkland will be teaching a new Theatre Arts class which will emphasize acting and stage work. It will be a year-long course and will earn its participants a credit in fine arts.

Three new agriculture courses have been added to the curriculum by new vocational agriculture teacher Kelly Slover. "Equine Science" will teach various aspects of rearing and training horses. "Power Technology" will deal with agricultural machinery, and "Agriculture Metal Fabrication" will instruct in welding and metal-cutting. These courses are a semester in length.

"I've got a super staff and I think this will be a good school year in a very good school system," comments Kirkland. "I want there to be a positive climate at the high school and I want the students to enjoy their school day."

"Community Fest" Welcomes New SISD Staff

After about an hour in time, and about 20 gallons of ice cream, Don Townsend of the SISD School Board stood up and introduced Larry Butler, SISD Superintendent, who introduced the new teachers and staff for the 1989-1990 school year.

Karen Thompson will teach third grade this year. A Sunray High School graduate of 1971, she completed her B.S. degree in elementary education at Panhandle State in 1975. Thompson has also earned credits at Tarleton State University in Stephenville, Tx. and at West Texas State University. She taught one year of

special education at Sunray from 1976-77, and then spent eight years teaching in private pre-schools in Sunray and Spearman. Thompson comes to Spearman schools after five years of teaching fifth through seventh grade language arts at Waka, where she also coached girls' basketball and track.

Her husband Ritchie is the owner-manager of Five Star Equipment and the Thompsons have two children. Bonnie 16, is a Spearman High School junior and Toby, 13, is an eighth grader.

Thompson comments that she is looking forward to meeting the challenges that this year's grade level change will present, adding, "Teaching third grade will be a big switch and an enjoyable one." She emphasizes the learning abilities of all students in her approach to teaching.

Shelley [Freimel] Edenborough joins the Spearman Elementary School staff this year as Kindergarten teacher. She completed her high school education at Spearman in 1982 and went on to receive her B.S. in Elementary Education at Panhandle State in 1989. Edenborough then student taught at Gruver last fall.

She is married to Roger, who

works for Speartex.

"I hope it will be a fun year," she comments, "and I am looking forward to working as a Kindergarten teacher."

Kristi Ramon joins the Spearman Elementary School staff as a first grade teacher this year. A 1981 graduate of Turpin High School in Oklahoma, she earned a B.S. degree in Home Economics Education in 1985 and a B.S. in Elementary Education in 1989 at Panhandle State. She student taught in Guymon after earning her first teaching degree.

Ramon's husband Trindle is the Assistant Vice President and Comptroller at First National Bank of Spearman. Their children are Amber, who will be a second grader, Nicole, 4, and Ryan, eight months.

"I really enjoy young children and I want to give them a good positive start in their schooling," she says.

Stephanie Brock is the new first grade teacher. Graduated from Borger High School in 1973, Brock attended West Texas State University and came away with a B.S. in elementary education in 1977. She taught third grade in the

Spearman school system for one year, 1978-79, before leaving teaching for 10 years. During that time she had four children. Brock lives in Spearman with her husband Kim, who works for Brock Insurance, and their children Janna, 9, Jordan, 7, John, 5, and Jeffrey, 3.

Having experience with children both in and out of the school setting, Brock can see the importance of our youth. She says, "I've always wanted to touch the lives of kids in a positive way because they are our future generation."

Brenda Winegarner is new to the second grade this year. A Natick, Mass. high school graduate in 1977, she attended Panhandle State University and received a B.S. in elementary education in 1989.

second place finisher in Calf Roping and the third place winner in Goat tying.

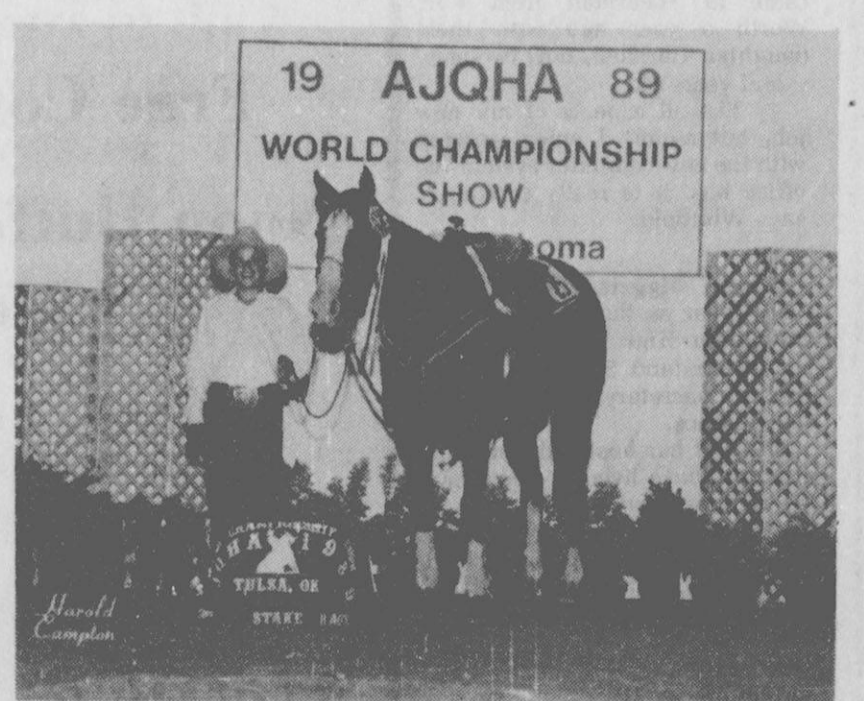

PARTNERS FOR PARENTING

High incidences of child abuse, teen suicide and teen pregnancy in Texas call attention to the fact that parents need additional skills. Hence, a collaborative effort between the Children's Trust Fund of Texas and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service called Partners for Parenting has been initiated.

Partners for Parenting links the funding of the Children's Trust Fund of Texas with Extension's expertise and delivery system. During the next nine months teams of professionals concerned about parenting and child abuse prevention will be equipped with resources and program strategies for conducting parenting educational activities in 1990 and into the future.

The project will establish a parenting education curriculum library and provide training for county teams to develop, implement and evaluate parenting programs. The library, housed on the Texas A&M University campus, will contain curricula and resources for use by a cross section of people within communities. Parenting materials will include three categories: (1) Developmental, from prenatal to adolescence; (2) Special Parenting; parenting children with special needs, foster parenting, step-parenting, adoptive parenting, single parenting and teen parenting; and (3) Parenting and Work.

County teams involving extension agents, related professionals and volunteers such as medical professionals, church affiliated leaders, youth leaders, social service agencies, parents, teachers and others will receive six hours of training this fall.

Team participation is limited to four per county for the 1989 training, but these teams may be expanded to reflect total interest in any given county as parenting programming is initiated in 1990. The training will prepare teams to develop, implement and evaluate parenting education programs in their communities to reach expectant parents, parents of infants, parents of toddlers and preschoolers, parents of elementary/pre-adolescent youth, and parents of adolescents.

Following the training, county agents will serve as facilitators for parenting task forces in each county. While most counties will be participating in the training, parenting programming in 1990 will vary widely. Included will be parenting activities for single parents, expectant teenagers, church related groups, noon-hour work place groups, classes on self-esteem, discipline techniques or communication, parents on military bases, parents anonymous, classes for grandparents and parent-to-parent activities. Task forces within each county will determine their most critical needs and plan accordingly.

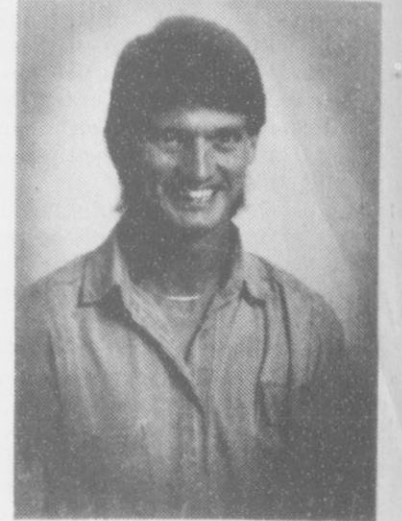
and a straight knee-length skirt for Fuller Jewelry Store of Spearman, she modeled a sterling silver choker chain and matching bracelet accenting the black outfit.
