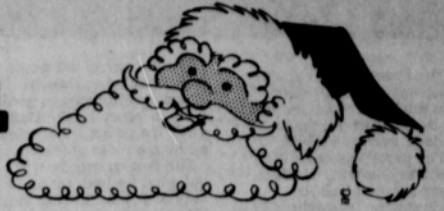

The Canadian Boys team is led by 6'2" Scott Hand a Senior and 6'0" Junior Mike Schaffer. Also leading the attack is 6'1" Junior Richard Reeves. The team has 3 seniors on the squad and 2 juniors and the rest are made up of sophomores and freshmen. They have 5 starters off last year's 19-9 record, with 3 of the starters being seniors and

the other 2 juniors. The Canadian Boys team strives on an inside game if it develops. They also have good outside shooting guards.

With seven lettermen, including three starters returning to the Canadian girl's team, the team will have experience but the defense won't be proven until they find a post guard.

The Spearman 7th grade girls traveled to Dalhart Thursday afternoon and lost to the Dalhart 7th grade girls in overtime 27-24.

The game was close in the first quarter as neither team scored much on each other. Throughout the whole game neither team had a advantage over each other. The first quarter ended with the 7th grade girls behind by 2 points 6-4.

The second quarter both teams started shooting better shots and scoring more points. The Spearman 7th graders outscored the Dalhart 7th graders 7-4 in the second quarter to take a slim 1 point lead at half-time 11-10.

The third quarter was all Dalhart as they stopped the Spearman offense and let them score only 6 points while they scored 11 themselves and led at the end of the third quarter 21-17. The team in the Spearman 7th grade side the third quarter was Trena Howell who until the third quarter, had not scored any points, but scored all of Dalhart's points the third quarter.

Kendra Burke kept the Spearman 7th graders close as she scored 6 of the 7 points that were scored by Spearman in the third quarter.

The fourth quarter was just the opposite as the third quarter as Spearman shut down Dalhart's offense to only scoring 3 points while scoring 7 themselves. Though Spearman scored enough to tie Dalhart at the end of regulation play the score was tied 24-24.

The Spearman 9th grade girls traveled to Dalhart Thursday afternoon to avoid a clean sweep by the Dalhart girls' teams but were defeated by the score of 59-34.

The first quarter started out good for both teams as they both were hitting their shots, but at the same time, Dalhart was getting more shots at the basket and making most of their chances, led at the end of the first quarter 13-10.

The second quarter saw both teams trade basket for basket as the Dalhart 9th graders still held their 3 point lead at half-time 30-27. The second quarter also saw both teams going to their strength for the 9th graders as she made 10 of her 14 points in the first half.

The Spearman 8th grade girls traveled to Dalhart Thursday afternoon and were soundly beaten 42-27.

Lynx lose to Rangers by 72-71 score

The Spearman Lynx lost another heartbreaker at Perryton Friday night as the host Perryton Rangers edged the Spearman Lynx 72-71 before a "standing room only" crowd at the Perryton high school gym.

The loss was the second in a row in the young season for the Lynx while this was Perryton's second win this year and their record now is 2-6.

The Spearman Lynx led throughout the whole game. With 4:03 left in the game, Spearman was leading by 10 points they made five straight turnovers, and the red hot Rangers turned each turnover into a basket and within a minute the game had been tied at 70-70.

The Rangers then went ahead as Mark Cunningham fouled Jim Lanning intentionally and Lanning made both free throw shots to put the Rangers ahead for the first time in the ball game 72-70. Spearman took the ball and passed to Roger Jones and he was fouled attempting a shot and the Senior made the first one but missed the second one and the Lynx could not get another shot off at the basket.

Two things hurt the Lynx Friday night. One of these things was the inability to stop Russ Regean and the other was turnovers at the wrong time in the ball game. The game was close all through the first quarter at

Spearman led by Roger Jones inside shooting and Randy Reid's playmaking, the Lynx controlled the tempo of the game. Russ Regean kept Perryton close in the first quarter as he scored 10 points. The first quarter ended with the Lynx on top by one point 15-14.

The second quarter started good for the Lynx as they opened a quick 5 point lead, with the Lynx still controlling the tempo of the game. Of the 26 points that the Lynx scored in the second quarter, David Steele, Roger Jones and Randy Reid each scored 8 points. The other 2 points were scored by Jim Jones. Again Russ Regean kept the Rangers close as he scored 11 points in the quarter with 5 of those points coming on free throws. Also helping out was Roger Reimer and James Ridgeway each with 6 points. The second quarter ended with the Lynx on top by 5 41-36.

The third quarter started out with the Lynx still holding on to their 5 point lead, led by the shooting of Roger Jones who scored 12 points in the third quarter, as the Lynx opened up a 10 point lead. Leon Hagerman pitched in 4 points along with Zane Newton who had 2. Scoring for the Perryton Rangers was again Russ Regean and Roger Reimer as they combined to score all of Perryton's 14 third quarter points with Regean getting 8 and Reimer getting the other 6 points. The third quarter ended with the Lynx on top by 7, 57-50.

The fourth quarter saw the Lynx holding on to their 7 point lead as the ball game seemed won; but the turnover which had not hurt the Lynx in the first 3 quarters came in a rash, as the Lynx turned the ball over five straight times to reduce their 10 point lead to a tie ball game at 70-70. Also hurting the Lynx were the fouls as the Rangers went to the line 7 times and made 6. Also hurting the Lynx was their inability to hit any free throws as the Lynx went to the line 15 times in the fourth quarter but could make only 7. Randy Reid made 3 of those 7 free throws that were made, as Roger Jones made the other four and he was 4 out of 9 from the free throw line.

For Perryton, Russ Regean and Roger Reimer again led Perryton as they scored 12 of the 22 points that Perryton scored in the last quarter. Jim Lanning who had not scored until the fourth quarter went to the line 4 times and connected on 3. The Rangers outscored the Lynx in the final period 22-18, which helped offset Spearman's 7 and sometimes 10 point leads. The game ended with the Rangers on top 72-71.

High for the Spearman Lynx was again Roger Jones as he led Spearman with 33 points followed by Randy Reid with 13 and David Steele with 10. Also scoring for the Lynx were Leon Hagerman with 6, Jim Jones with 2, Zane Newton with 5 and Jeff Beedy with 2 points. Next game for the Lynx will be Tuesday night in Lynx gym as the Canadian Wildcats invade Lynx gym with a 7-3 record. They are currently playing in a tournament along with the Canadian girl's who will also play here.

High for the Perryton Rangers was Russ Regean with 35 points followed by Roger Reimer with 22. Also scoring for the Rangers was Jim Lanning with 6, James Ridgeway with 6, Gary Irwin with 2 and Dan Repogle with 1 point.

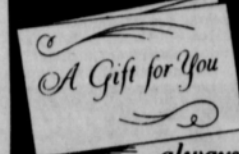

Small wooden ornaments, tiny mirrors, or other small items can spruce up any store-bought wreath.

Decorate a wreath with snowflakes, baskets or balls created with liquid solder. To make them just take a breakable shape -- a small balloon, a hollow egg or a glass ornament and sketch the design you want on the outside. Go over it with solder. When the solder has hardened, gently remove the base shape by breaking it gently.

For a flat design -- a snowflake, star, angel or Santa figure, draw the outline on wax paper. It will peel away after the solder hardens.

Spray paint the shape with gold or silver and attach it to the wreath (or tree) with fishing line.

Fill the baskets with mock presents, red berries or miniature pine cones.

Another idea aside from the wreath uses macramé in the shape of a Christmas tree to hang on the front door.

A large ojas with many intricate points can be effective, or you can use the same technique to develop a tree shape to which accessories might be attached.

A completely different approach might be saying Merry Christmas in a different language--with ideas based on family heritage, or the traditions and custom of another country, such as Germany, France, Norway or Spain. The local library is sure to have many ideas for adapting.

For the strictly All-American family, the "decora can look to the Colonial period for inspiration, to the Victorian era or the Roaring Twenties.

Old Christmas cards also can spark creativity--like a favorite from just last year. It can be a guide.

And whatever you decide your door will be, add a wreath or other decoration indoors for the family to enjoy--and to wish your friends well as they leave.

Holiday snacks have to be "made with care" for diabetics and people on calorie-restricted diets.

This is because food plays a major part in controlling metabolic disorders such as diabetes, commonly called 'sugar diabetes'. Too many carbohydrates, starches and sugars are bad for diabetics because their bodies don't produce enough insulin to counteract the effects of these types of food.

Diabetics can eat fresh fruits or unsweetened canned fruits--a baked apple sweetened with artificial sweetener, cinnamon and dietetic lemon-lime soft drink makes a festive dessert.

pumpkin custard--can be made of unsweetened cooked pumpkin combined with artificial sweetener, cinnamon, ginger and saccharin. This baked custard would be counted as a B vegetable or half slice of bread.

Plain or dietetic gelatins can be prepared with or without fruits for many desserts. Try combining plain gelatin with low-calorie cranberry juice, artificial sweetener and orange rind. Pour into orange shells and refrigerate. If fruit is added to the gelatin, count the fruit as the fruit exchange for that meal.

Many diabetics are unaware that they can eat regular ice cream--in limited amounts--in place of a slice of bread and two fat exchanges.

Avoid diabetic candy and ice cream because they may be high in fat and extremely expensive. Also, the labels may be confusing.

If diabetic ice creams are used, they must be calculated into the diet. Dietetic soft drinks are allowed and can be used to flavor desserts or even in baking a candied holiday ham.

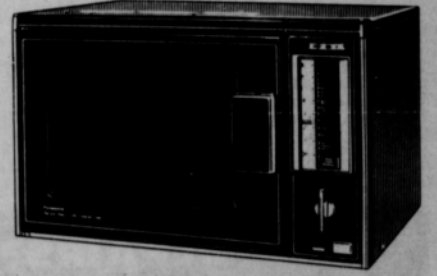

Hansford Library Qualifies For System Membership

Seventeen libraries in the 25-county area served by the Texas Panhandle Library System have qualified for system membership for the fiscal year that began September 1. They are among 247 libraries that have qualified for membership in ten Texas systems. A total of 86 percent of all Texans are served by these system member libraries. As members, they are participating in activities to improve public library service in the region.

Libraries qualifying for membership in the Texas Panhandle Library System are Amarillo Public Library, Lovett Memorial Library in Pampa, Hutchinson County Library in Boger, Hemphill County Library in Canadian, Canyon Public Library, Rhoads Memorial Library in Dimmitt, Killgore Memorial Library in Dumas, Friona Public Library, Deaf Smith County Library in Hereford, Lovett Memorial Library in McLean, Carson County Public Library in Panhandle, Perry Memorial Library in Perryton, Shamrock Public Library, Hansford County Library in Spearman, Sherman County Public Library in Stratford, and Swisher County Library in Tulia.

The regional systems are authorized under provisions of the Texas Library Systems Act and are supported by funds administered by The Texas State Library. In order to qualify for system activities, libraries must meet certain criteria concerning number of volumes, amount of local per capita support, and staff.

Each member participates in planning for system activities. Lay representatives from all member libraries attend the annual meeting of the Advisory Council at which council members are elected. The Systems Act gives the Major Resource Center responsibility for drawing up the annual program of service, and Rules and Regulations for its administration direct that the Advisory Council and librarians participate in formulation of the plan.

System funds are allocated according to a per capita formula. They may be used for a variety of cooperative activities, including purchase of materials for local collections, development of

film collections to which all system members have access, centralized purchasing of materials to obtain discounts for large orders, and technical assistance for small libraries. Books-by-mail and deposit collections extend service to persons who are isolated from library service.
