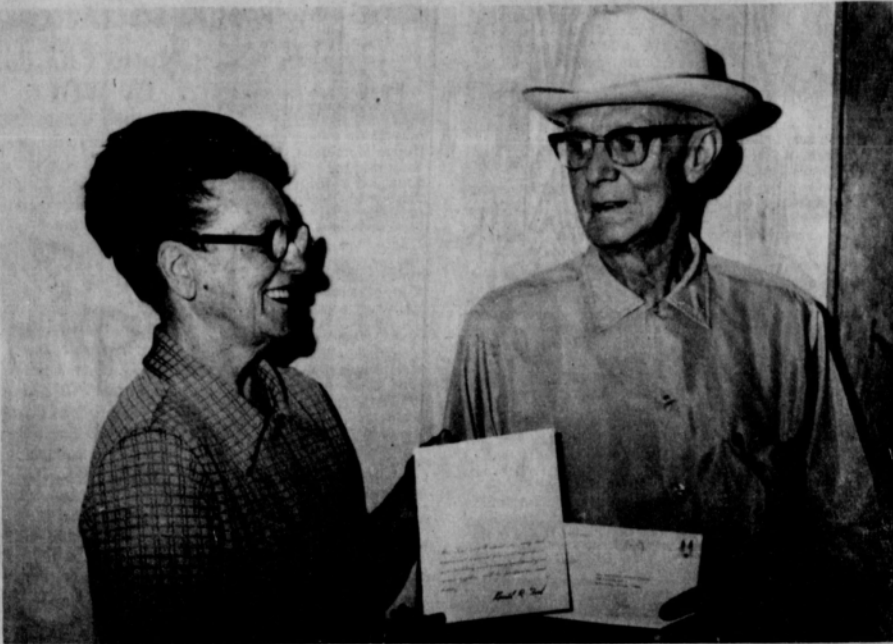

Three Retire From Teaching Careers

Three teachers in the Spearman Elementary School system, who have racked up a combined total of 78 years of teaching, will retire at the end of this week when school closes for this year. They are Mrs. Dee Deere, Mrs. Elva Lee Sheets, and Mrs. Louise Archer. Mrs. Deere has taught school 25 years, 14 of these have been in Spearman. Mrs. Deere's husband, Hugh, is a retired farmer. They have always made their home in Guymon. Mrs. Deere has commuted while holding her job with the Spearman schools. Living in the home of Mrs. A. F. Lofrin and going home on weekends.

She received her BS degree from South Eastern State University at Durant, Oklahoma in 1940. Her first teaching job was in Hugo, Oklahoma where she taught the first four grades there for three years in 1936-1938. Following this she taught at Bryan, Oklahoma for one year and at Herdsey, Oklahoma for seven years.

A first grade teacher for the 14 years she has been in Spearman, Dee Deere said probably the most difficult thing to get across to first graders was "to learn to listen, and to discipline themselves."

Mrs. Deere said what she plans to "miss" most of all when she retires is "being with children." What she plans to do with her time, now that it will be her own, is catch up on her fishing, pursue her hobbies of painting, sewing and needlepointing and to get in lots of travel. Her first trip will be next week, as soon as school is out, when she will be going to Ft. Lauderdale, Fla. to watch two of her grandchildren participate in swimming contests.

Mr. and Mrs. Deere have four children: Mrs. Sherry Hodges, a teacher at Forgan, Okla.; Mrs. Doris Ann Sipes, who is the Assistant District Attorney at El Paso, Texas and their two sons Joe and Johnny Deere who are partners in a trailer rental and manufacturer at Ardmore, Oklahoma.

Elva Lee Sheets has taught school for 28 years, 25 consecutive years in the Spearman Elementary School. She received her educational training at WTSU, Canyon, receiving her BA in 1933 and her MA in 1957.

Her first school teaching job was in the one-room school house located on the banks of the Canadian River just south and east of Spearman--the Couch Creek School. She recalls the oldest boy in her school was the son of Sid Powers. Another one of her seven students was Eddie Bralnard. The only problem at Couch Creek School was rattlesnakes, and lots of them. Lee said they always managed to ward them off with "a handy hoe, a rock or a stick."

She married Bill Sheets at the end of that school term in 1935 and her teaching career ended until in the early 1940's when the need for teachers became so great because of the war and she began to substitute. This was the period of time when the then Baptist Church pastor, Rev. Stevens was helping out by serving as principal in the Spearman Schools. He also taught arithmetic science, etc. and on the days he would make his pastoral rounds, she would fill in for him. The need for teachers was so great during those years, women teachers would bring their babies to school in bassinets to help fill classroom teacher duties.

In 1950 she became a fulltime teacher of the 4th grade. In 1966 Mrs. Sheets was widowed by the death of her husband and "that's when teaching was truly a blessing to me because it kept me busy and the life with my children filled my empty days," she said.

"Methods have changed, texts have changed, but it has never been monotonous" Mrs. Sheets concluded. The greatest change in teaching methods has been in the field of "trying to reach more children on their level" and she feels that this has truly been the field achieving the greatest accomplishment during her 28 years of teaching.

Mrs. Sheets has two sons: Durland, who lives in Canadian, and Lowell, who owns and operates an aerial spraying service in Booker. She has 6 grandchildren.

Elva Lee said she will miss most of all, upon her retirement, the children, and the association of the wonderful teachers, personally, her principal Allen Alford and "all those wonderful people I have worked with so long."

Of children, Mrs. Sheets said, "they make you grey and keep you young--all at the same time. I've never had a child I didn't love, and I have enjoyed every minute of my 28 years."

Mrs. Sheets is looking forward to a very happy future... when she will get to do lots of things she has put off for a long time. Things like re-doing some old furniture and getting caught up on her painting hobby.

Mrs. Louise Archer is retiring this week after 25 years. Twenty-four of these years she has spent as a third grade teacher in Spearman Elementary School.

The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. T.C. Harvey, Sr. of Hansford County, Louise received her college education with 3 years training at Parkville A & M and her final year at WTSU, at Canyon where she re-

She taught school in 1935 at Keeton, Texas, in Wheeler County. At the end of that term she married Ernest Archer and spent her time as a housewife and mother until 1951 when she began her fulltime teaching career in the Spearman Elementary School.

Louise looked back over the years and commented on how methods had changed. For a while the teaching "stress" was on arithmetic, and while numbers were being pounded into third grade minds, the children fell down on other subjects. Then for years the stress was on science, and it seemed there was nothing but science. Now the hammer is on reading. The thought is now that if the child can learn to become a good reader, he can get everything else better, and certainly with more ease.

Mrs. Archer stated that her years spent in training young minds has been more than a job... it has been enjoyable. "I know I will miss it, but there comes a time when one feels he must let up some, and let the younger people fill one's place."

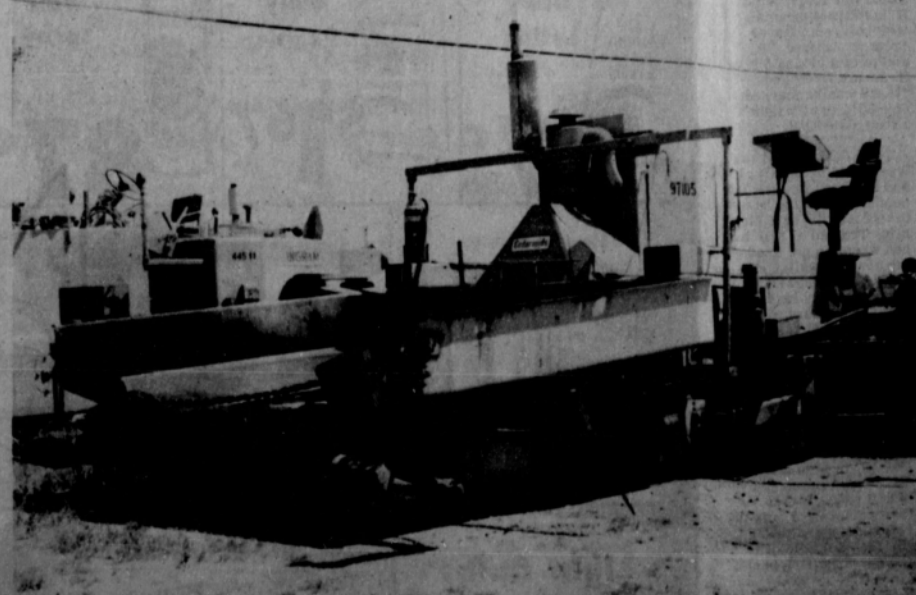
Most Businesses To Observe Memorial Day

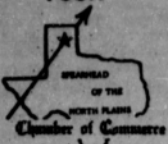

He and his wife have a son and daughter, married and living in Amarillo and Spearman respectively.

The three named for the new terms had in response to "legal notices" applied to have their names placed on the ballot and supported by 10 local pro-

ducers. In addition there were 24 write-in names placed on the ballot in blanks provided for that purpose, none gaining a majority.

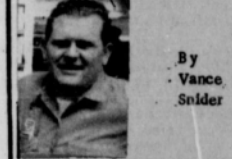

Advice about watching the big seed companies to see which of them breaks through with a super-hybrid wheat. So far the 200 bushel per acre hybrid has proved elusive for developers but it's difficult now to review a current agri-business corporate report without reading of the possibilities.

Many of the Green Revolution's observers say the 200 bushel per acre target is still out of sight and probably cannot be developed until interim hybrid varieties are completed and stabilized. Implications are nearly staggering since potential production for the United States alone could approach nine billion bushels.

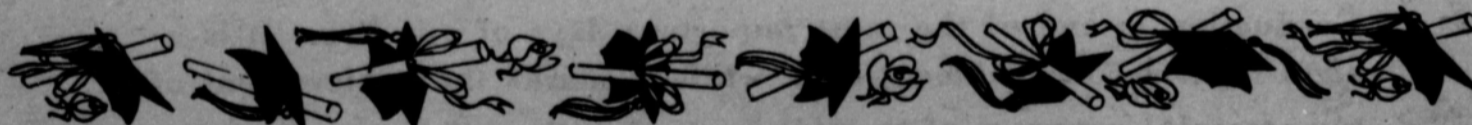

The Spearman Lynx will meet the Newton Eagles at Wichita Falls Memorial Stadium, Wichita Falls, Texas, Saturday night at 7:30 p.m. to decide the State AA football championship of the great State of Texas. It will be the first time that either team has played on astro turf, and it will be the first time that a Spearman team has ever played for the state football championship.

We know very little about the Newton Eagles, except that they have had a fantastic season, in a really tough district, losing only one game to Hampshire Fannett, and eventually they defeated this team, to have the honor of defeating every team they have played this year.

On the other hand, the Lynx lost their opening game to Stratford, but have won every game since. They are getting

better and developed into a real championship ball club when they defeated Alpine in the quarter finals; or at least that is what most fans think.

Many strange things are happening in Spearman as a result of this state championship game next Saturday night. People in Gruver, Morse and Spearman are almost "outa their heads" with excitement as the countdown for the big game begins. Last Friday night one man journeyed to Pampa to watch the Lynx, and he was so excited over the football game that when he got home he forgot his small son was in the back of the car asleep and just went in without him. About 3:00 a.m. the boy woke up and knocked on the door informing his daddy that he was ready for bed and asked him what was going on! Dad replied that the Lynx had won, and to go to sleep.

One fellow from Spearman was in Gruver last week and signed two checks on two banks that he didn't even have any money in. The local bankers say this isn't too unusual, cause this fellow was the local country editor.

We talked with the man on the street this week, and Bill Douglas says the game will be tough, and close, but picks the Lynx to win.

Elzey Vanderburg says the Newton game will be great, and that the Lynx will win.

We will see you at the game this Saturday night in Wichita Falls.

The Purple Pride team for Spearman, Texas, landed 5 players on the all-state grid teams this year. Spearman, 1974 runner-up in AA grabbed five all-state team spots, more than any other AA all-state football team in the state. Local fans were pleased with the picks, and especially when their pride and joy, Donnie Davis, was named to the first team backfield. Donnie Davis not only scored many, many crucial touchdowns for the Lynx, but he also stopped the other team from scoring on some of his terrific defensive playing. Of course, fans were equally as proud of the other men who made the all-state teams. Don Cooper made the teams, both offensive and defensive; Terrill Evans was picked at center

position, Roger Jones at linebacker and Roger Brown lineman.

The only other Panhandle gridder named to the first team was Friona's Gene Strickland, a two-way all-district 3-AA selection.

Cooper, a 6-2, 211 pound senior, used his 4.2 quickness in the 40 to spark an unusually quick Lynx offensive line, then averaged 13 tackles a game on defense. "He's the best offensive lineman I've coached in 16 years", said Spearman coach, Greg Sherwood, "and he's the best defensive lineman I've ever coached." He averaged 13 tackles, and they ran away from him all year long.

Davis, only 5-9, and 165 pounds but exceptionally quick, averaged nearly eight yards a carry all season long and was the offensive key to Spearman's playoff success. He scored 28 touchdowns for the season and gained more than 1700 yards.

Jones, though only a junior, already twice has been a unanimous all-district 1-AA selection at linebacker. He averaged 23 tackles a game and had 26 in the Lynx quarterfinal win against Alpine.

Jones, Davis and Cooper were members of the 1974 Panhandle Plains Super team picked by the Globe-News.

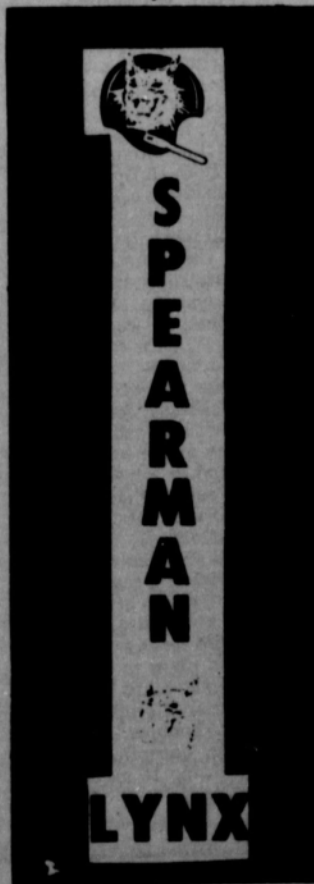
Evans was the all-district 1-AA center and is just a junior. Spearman guard Roger Brown was named to the second team. Roger Brown and Roger Jones are

In the meantime, the Spearman School Board had a special 3-hour meeting concerning a new stadium for the Lynx last Saturday. The new 2,000 seat stadium, complete with rest room facilities and all of the trimmings, will be under construction as soon as the Board can let the contracts. The Board has already decided to take bids on a steel-aluminum stadium, instead of the pre-stressed concrete stadium. The savings will allow the Board to stay within the bond money that was voted, and not take away any of the remodeling on the Junior High School. Another meeting to decide the final step will be held this Thursday. The new stadium will include 2,000 new seats and the moving of the old seats to the new stadium site.

HISTORY OF THE PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE TO THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA.

The Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States first came into widespread usage and acceptance on Columbus Day, 1892.

In the 77th Congress, its official recognition was granted when Congress codified all rules and customs pertaining to the display and use of our Flag. Then, in 1954, the words "under God" were added to the Pledge by congress.

In the year 1620, the Mayflower Compact, a document which contained the first constitution in America for complete self-government, declared in the opening sentence "In the name of God, Amen."

On July 4, 1776, our founding Fathers proclaimed our Declaration of Independence which no less than four times refers to the existence of the Creator.

It was during the Presidency of Abraham Lincoln that Congress directed the inscription "In God We Trust" be placed on our coins.

With this in mind, several Congressmen and Senators suggested legislation adding the phrase "under God" to our Pledge. Congressman Oliver Bolton asked that there be no comma separating "one nation" from "under God" and the Congress adopted his version in 1954.

Thus, when the Pledge is recited, it should be remembered that nothing stands between our Nation and our God, and nopause should occur at this point in its recitation.

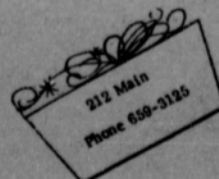

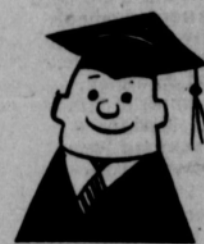

Lynx Win Regional 27-14

Spearman took advantage of three first-half turnovers by Olton, rolled up 385 yards total offense, and defeated the

Mustangs 27-14, before about 1,500 fans Friday at Dick Bivins Stadium in a Class AA Regional playoff game.

The Lynx advance to next week's Quarterfinals, and will meet Alpine at a site to be determined this weekend.

Alpine turned back Denver City, 13-3.

Olton fumbled twice in its first three possessions, and the Lynx turned two of them into touchdowns in the first half.

Donnie Davis, who had rushed for over 1,200 yards prior to the game, carried 25 times for 171 yards and scored three times, on runs of 13, 36 and three yards.

Glenn Johnson, Olton's workhorse tailback, rushed for 151 yards on 24 carries. He came into the game with 1,611 yards this season.

Spearman, which won its 11th straight game this season against one loss, amassed 326 yards on the ground and added 59 through the air as quarter-

back Tim Harper completed two of four passes.

Olton, which ended the season with a 10-2 record, had 227 yards rushing and 79 passing as quarterback Jimmy Parker hit on four of 10 aerials.

A fumble by Parker at the Olton 37, on the second play of the game, led to Spearman's first TD.

Harper recovered, and it took the Lynx just seven plays to find paydirt.

The big play of the drive was a 12-yard sweep by Davis to the Mustang 16 on a fourth-and-one play.

Fullback Kent Hargis, who carried 22 times for 79 yards, scored on a trap play from the five with 7:56 left in the first period. Mike Tucker missed the extra point.

After Bryan Allcorn returned the ensuing kickoff 11 yards to his 37, the Mustangs took seven plays to score.

After Johnson and Parker had moved the ball to the Spearman 39 in six plays, the Mustang signal caller found daylight on an option play and scored with 5:22 left in the quarter.

Parker's 39-yard dash knotted the count at 6-6 as he failed to score on a run for the two points.

Spearman ran out of downs at

the Olton 35, and Davis punted to the 14 with 51 seconds to play

in the period.

On the first play, Parker fumbled the snap from center and Spearman's Carl Robinson fell on the loose ball.

Davis took a handoff, started to his right but cut back across the grain and raced in for the score with 40 seconds still left in the quarter. Davis ran for conversion and a 14-6 bulge.

Olton took the ensuing kickoff and drove from its 12 to the Lynx 11, but failed to score. A fourth down pass from Parker fell incomplete in the end zone.

Spearman then marched 89 yards in just six plays to hike its lead to 20-6. An 11-yard run by Hargis, an 18-yard scamper by Harper and an 11-yard sweep by Davis moved the ball to Olton's 36.

Two plays later, Davis broke loose over right tackle and raced 36 yards for the touchdown with 2:23 left in the half.

Olton came right back, reaching the Lynx 21 before Parker fumbled for the third time.

A 42-yard pass from Harp to Jeff Beedy moved the ball to the Mustang 27 with 14 seconds remaining in the half.

Blast Bunnies 43-8!

The Spearman Lynx played letter perfect football at Harvester Park Friday night, rolled up 31 points in the third period, and walked in to the state finals against the winner of the Newton-LeGrange game, which will be played (today) Saturday.

The Lynx had a (play back) of the Henrietta game and if you didn't know better, you would swear that it was instant replay of the Henrietta game, two weeks ago, when the Lynx scored 50 points.

Davis opened the scoring with a 45 yard run in the first quarter, scoring a TD rather easily behind fantastic blocking. Tucker missed the kick, and the Lynx had a 6 point lead, with 5:31 left in the first period.

Davis came back with 27 seconds left in the half and scored another TD, and once again the try for extra point failed, and the Lynx went to the showers with a rather un-impressive 12 point lead.

open on the first play and raced 50 yards to the 10 yard line, and after a 5 yard penalty against Bowie, Hargis raced over for the third touchdown. Davis made the PAT good and the Lynx had a 20-0 lead with only one minute, and thirty six seconds gone in the 3rd quarter.

Harper broke loose on a beautiful 50 yard scamper for another TD, and passed to Switzer as the Lynx took a 28-0 lead with 3:38 left in the third period.

Harper passed to Switzer for 13 yards and a TD, still in the third quarter, and then Harper passed to White for the PAT as the Lynx continued their slaughter in the third period.

Harper then hit Tucker on a 59 yard touchdown play, still in the third period, and Tucker kicked the extra point, and the

Lynx still had 1 1/2 seconds left in the third quarter, leading the fine Bowie team, 43-0.

Coach Sherwood put in his reserves the last quarter of the game, and the reserves literally "stole the show" with their fine pass catching, and playing, but they did allow the Rabbits to score one TD late in the 4th, as Massey passed to Turner for the TD, and then hit Matlock in the end zone for the PAT.

The Spearman coaches left for Conroe, Texas, Saturday morning, to meet with the winner of the Newton-LeGrange game, which will be played at 2 p.m., today (Sat.) and they will decide where the final game will be played.
