Close Files Advertising Bid Bill

State Representative Bob Close of Perryton has pre-filed House Bill 193 which relates to the advertisement of bids for material to be used by a county. House Bill 193 would remove the requirement for advertising the bidding for materials in a daily newspaper published and circulated in the county. It is impossible to comply with the state law since there is no newspaper published and circulated on a daily basis in any county in the 64th District.
Rep. Close credited Mr. Dick Reavis, Editor of the Moore County News of Dumas, Texas for calling this matter to his attention. House Bill 193 amends Article 1659 of the Texas Statutes to eliminate the requirement for advertisement in a daily newspaper.
Close pointed out that there are probably very few counties in Texas in which a daily newspaper is published and circulated.

Four Accidents Investigated

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated four accidents on rural highways in Hansford County during the month of November, 1976 according to Sergeant C. E. Henderson, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.
These crashes resulted in no persons killed and three persons injured.
The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first eleven months of 1976 shows a total of 35 accidents resulting in five persons killed and 20 persons injured.
The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for November, 1976, shows a total of 567 accidents resulting in 14 persons killed and 261 injured, as compared to November, 1975, with 530 accidents resulting in 14 persons killed and 258 persons injured. This was 37 more accidents, the same killed, and three more injured in 1976 at the same period of time.
The 14 traffic deaths for the month of November, 1976, occurred in the following counties: Two each in Carson, Gray; One each in Castro, Oldham, Potter, Floyd, Lamb, Palo Pinto, Parker, Wichita, Wise, and Yoakum.

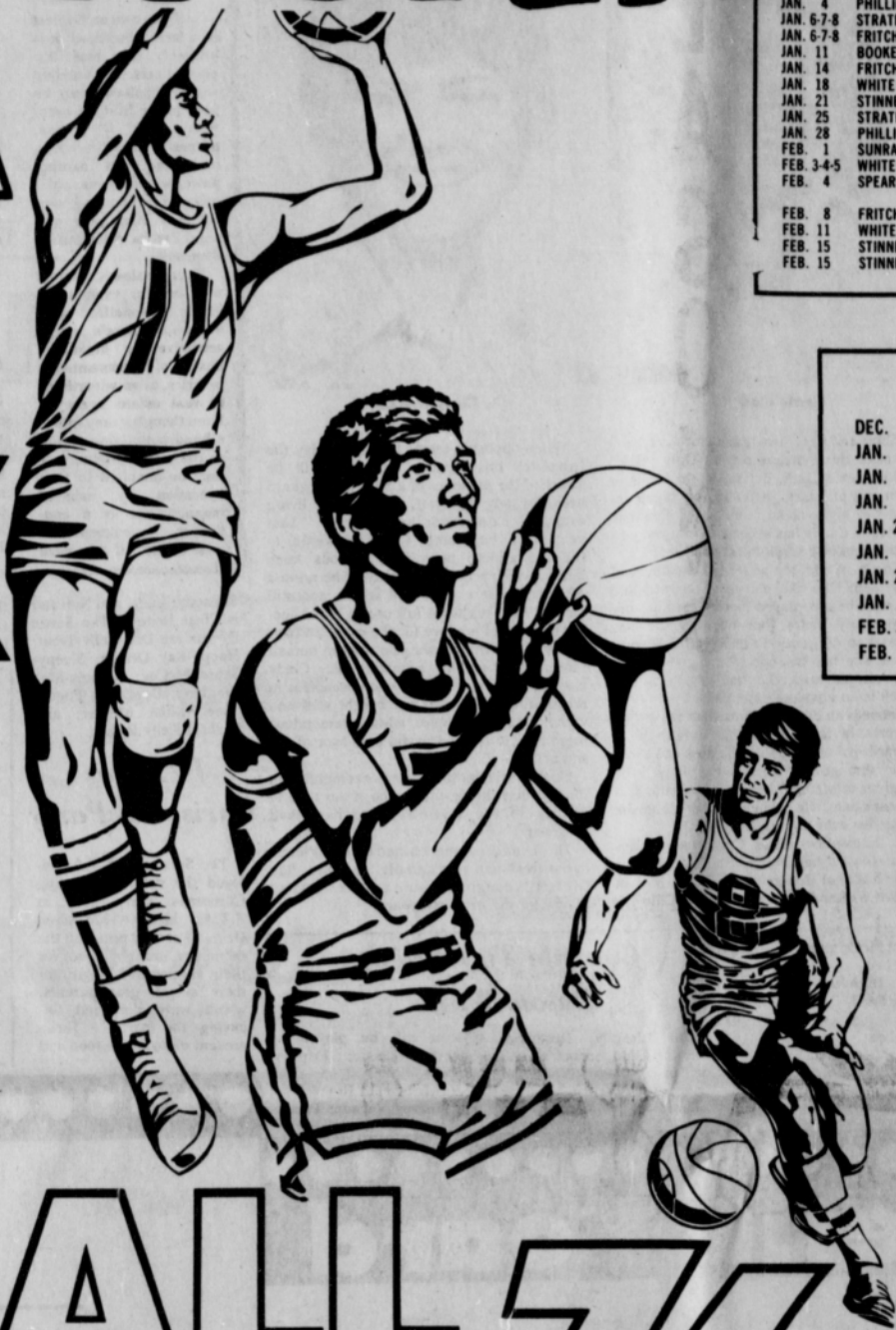

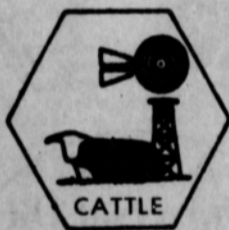

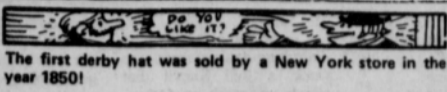

Gruver Man Ranks High In Corn Production

Q. D. Bevill, of Gruver, has ranked high among area corn growers enrolled in a national corn growing program.

Although all of the entries have not yet been received, Bevill's yield of 190.9 bushels per acre places him high in the scoring for 1976 Project:200, sponsored by The Producers of Funk's G-Hybrids. Project:200 is the largest program of its kind in the nation.

Bevill's yield was with Funk's G-4449. It was adjusted to No. 2 corn at 15.5 percent moisture from 2.2 acres. To qualify as an official entry, Bevill had to harvest shelled corn from not less than four adjacent rows running the full length of the field.

Bevill's crop was planted on April 14 in 30-inch rows at 26,000 seeds per acre. (His

crop was prewarred once and irrigated 5 times.) It was harvested on September 20 at 24.3 percent moisture. Harvest population was 24,000 plants per acre.

Bevill applied a total of 100 pounds nitrogen, 144 pounds phosphorus, and 101 pounds potash in his fertilizer program. He used AAtrex for weed control. The yield was verified by a disinterested witness.

More than 30,000 corn growers have entered Project:200 over the past 5 years. Each year The Producers of Funk's G-Hybrids publish computerized summaries of the management methods employed by the Project:200 entrants, giving the nation's corn growers a comparison of their own corn growing methods with those of other top producers in the country.

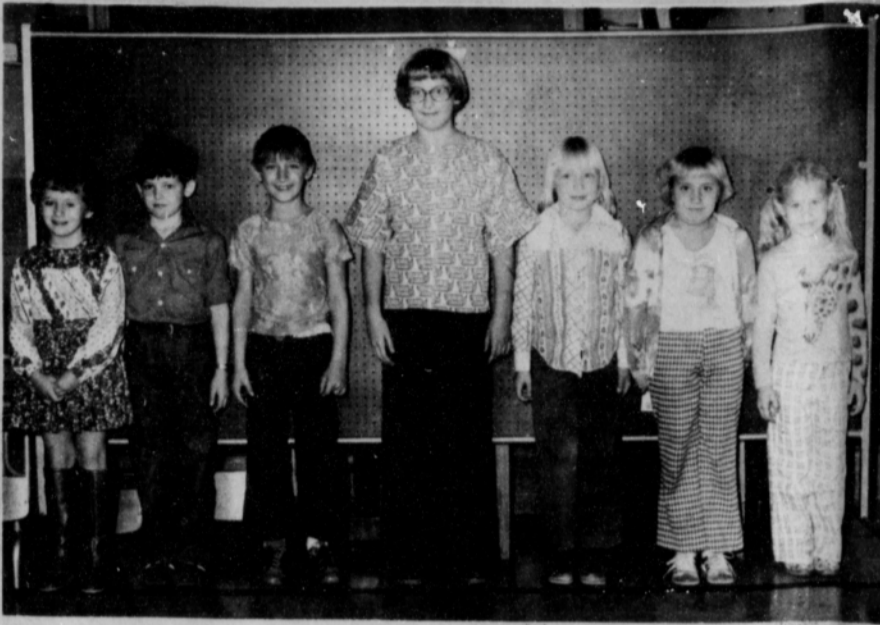

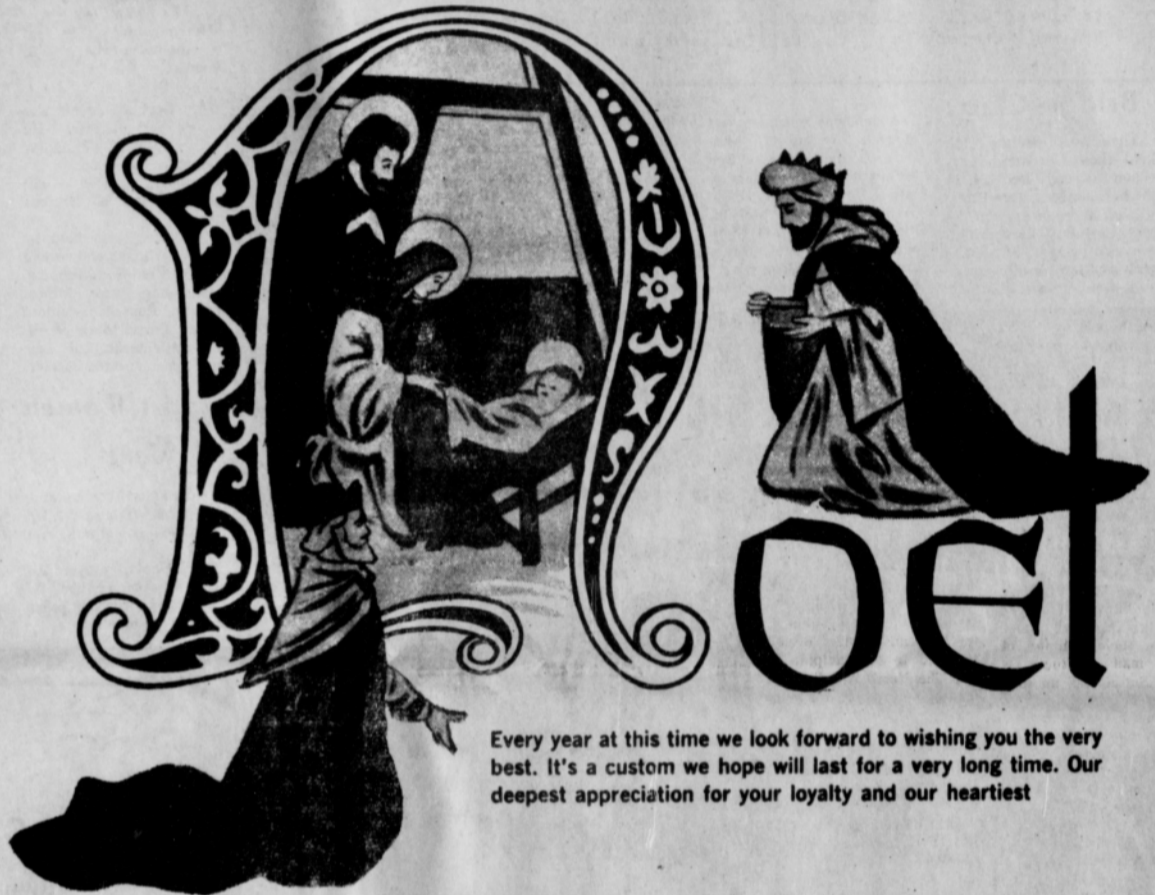

70th Christmas Seal Campaign

A million packages, two million, five million and more. Christmas mail.

In 1904 when Finar Holboell, postal clerk in Denmark, first thought of designing a Christmas Seal, there was no such volume of holiday mail as there is today. But it was an idea with a great future.

The postal clerk took his idea to the postmaster and obtained his support. News of the "stamp" eventually reached the royal family and King Christian of Denmark gave it his full support and personal endorsement. As the 1904 Danish Stamp's success story spread, a worldwide crusade was set into motion.

TB sanitariums in the United States never seemed to have enough money to sufficiently operate during the first decade of the 20th Century. One such sanitarium was in Delaware where Joseph Wales, MD, and a group of doctors had established a small cottage-hospital on the banks of the Brandywine River. A mere \$300 was needed to continue their work, but closing seemed inevitable.

In desperation, Dr. Wales appealed to his cousin, Emily Bissell, an active Red Cross volunteer with fund raising experience. Miss Bissell had recently read an article by a well respected Danish-American writer, Jacob Riis, who pleaded with Americans to use the Christmas Stamp idea that worked so well in Denmark.

Miss Bissell thought a stamp would work for her purpose of raising money to save her cousin's sanitarium. She discussed the idea with the American Red Cross who okayed using the Red Cross symbol on such a stamp. She then talked to the local postmaster in Wilmington—but since a "Christmas Stamp" was not issued by the U.S. Government, the post office could not promote it. However, the postmaster allowed her to set up a stand to sell stamps in the post office lobby.

With the path seemingly clear of obstacles, Miss Bissell designed the stamp and friends helped her print 50,000 with 2,000 small envelopes. The envelopes carried this message: "25 Christmas Stamps, one penny apiece, issued by the Delaware Red Cross to stamp out the White Plague. Put this stamp with message bright on every Christmas letter; Help the tuberculosis fight, and make the New Year better. These stamps do not carry any kind of mail,

but any kind of mail will carry them."

In the post office lobby, everyone stopped to look, but few would purchase the stamps. Seeking publicity for her cause, Miss Bissell traveled to Philadelphia to ask The North American, a leading newspaper, for help.

Leigh Mitchell Hodges, a staff writer with the paper, liked the idea and convinced his editor to run the Christmas Stamp on every page for the next three weeks.

Soon thereafter, President Theodore Roosevelt, leaders of religious organizations, and powerful social groups lent their support. Sales boomed and 50,000 additional stamps were printed.

At the end of the Christmas Season, to everyone's amazement and delight, over \$3,000 had been raised. The sanitarium on the Brandywine River was saved and the first Christmas Stamp campaign was a success!

Seventy years have passed since the first Christmas "stamp" was issued. Since then, stamps have changed to "seals" and the Red Cross symbol has been replaced with the familiar red "Lorraine Cross." Participation by the American Red Cross ended in 1920 when Christmas Seals became the responsibility of a volunteer organization that had worked with the campaign since 1910 (the same year the word "seals" was first used). The same organization is today called the American Lung Association, and its symbol, the Lorraine Cross, has been a registered trademark since 1920.

ALA's focus has broadened through the years. Today, modern medicines that replaces "rest" as the treatment for TB also make it possible to cure the once dreaded "White Plague" and prevent it too! In 1976, the Christmas Seal People work to defend the lungs against such respiratory diseases as influenza and pneumonia; against cigarette smoking—the chief cause of emphysema and chronic bronchitis; and against air pollution.

It still takes people like Emily Bissell but more volunteers, physicians, and educators are needed. It still takes money, but today's inflation prohibits the dollar from going as far as it needs to go in fighting lung disease.

This year, as the Bicentennial comes to a close, 1976 Christmas Seals pay tribute to Christmases past, present, and future. A complete
