City meets again Monday

City To Have Budget Hearing

The city council of Spearman, employees of the city, etc. has received more than their share of publicity from area media this past week. The latest splash centered on the Tuesday session when the budget for the coming year was discussed.

The article seemed to have more misinformation about city affairs than information.

The total bonded indebtedness of the city is \$1,037,000, with retirement expected 1986 of this indebtedness.

The insurance bill for the city, including workmen's compensation, general liability and fleet insurance, insurance on the building and the gas explosion policy will amount to about \$15,000 yearly, according to J. L. Brock, local insurance man, with whom the city has their policies.

The suit which the city lost due to a gas explosion at a local residence occurred in 1973 not 1963.

Police Chief Phillips said in an interview Thursday that he had not said that "He was doing his job too well", saying that doing a job too well is pretty difficult.

The budget hearing is scheduled for Monday night at which time the council will set the tax rate, and will also appoint a councilman to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Roscoe Nelson early this week.

There has been no re-evaluation of property in Spearman this year.

The proposed budget for the year beginning October 1 is for \$908,081.

The city has experienced many problems this past year as we all know. They have replaced many dangerous gas lines and done much work on the city gas & sewer systems. Rising costs in supplies, labor and everything else, has played havoc with the budget for this year.

The Future Of Palo Duro Dam Project

On September 8th the Palo Duro River Authority Board met in regular session in the Board Room of the Farm Bureau Building in Spearman.

During the course of this meeting an audience was requested by Commissioners Webb, Sell, Tevis and Wilson of the Ochiltree County Commissioners Court. Mr. Webb acting as spokesman for the group presented a Resolution of the Ochiltree County Commissioners Court requesting that Ochiltree County be detached from the PDRA. Such request was based on the recently passed Texas State Legislature H. B. 985, which was prepared for introduction into the Legislature under the supervision of Craig Davidson, General Manager of the PDRA and was approved for introduction by the PDRA Board.

In response to a question concerning this portion of H. B. 985, Mr. Davidson stated "The provision to allow a County to withdraw from the PDRA, with the permission of the PDRA being mandatory prior to such detachment, was inserted in the expectation that Ochiltree County would take advantage of it. This expectation was based on the obvious lack of cooperation and support exhibited by the Ochiltree County Commissioners Court in virtually all matters concerned with and at several

meetings of the PDRA.

This detachment of Ochiltree County in no way impairs the future possibility of Perryton joining the PDRA should its present water supply prove inadequate, as HB 985 also includes a provision for a city to petition the PDRA Board for admission.

Further and most important, the detachment of Ochiltree County is not in the least harmful to the best interests of either the people of Hansford County or the PDRA dam project. On the contrary, we can now devote our entire efforts toward the accomplishment of the Project through the acquisition of state and federal aid for building the dam. Also the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department can continue its planning for a State Park and Fish Hatchery in the vicinity of the reservoir.

Mr. Davidson also stated "Recently the PDRA was notified by the office of Representative George Mahon, chairman of the Appropriations Committee of the U. S. House of Representatives, that a \$210,000 appropriation for flood control studies for the U. S. Corps of Engineers on behalf of the House and the Senate and would be ready for the President's signature in late September or early October. This flood control study from the dam site to Canton Reservoir in Oklahoma is necessary for

three reasons. One, it determines how much dam is needed above the conservation pool level. Two, it determines how much of the dam is the obligation of the U. S. Government. Three, it determines then how much of a non-reimbursable appropriation of money the U. S. Corps of Engineers recommend that the PDRA be granted by the U. S. Congress.

This is a somewhat cumbersome procedure; however, it is what the law requires and it works pretty well if one is not dying of thirst or is not immediately downstream from a rapidly approaching flood. In any case, it does provide some unknown at this time, amount of grant money that we do not have to repay for the construction of the project.

In conversation with the Corps of Engineers District Office in Tulsa, the Engineers stated that the study would be started as soon as the appropriated money is released to them; possibly as soon as the latter part of October.

The PDRA Board, after the detachment of Ochiltree County and the departure of the four representatives of Ochiltree County, continued its meeting.

Mr. Dee Jackson was elected Vice-President of the Board and Mr. Archie Nelson was appointed Secretary; together with Mr. Bob Skinner, President of the Board and

Mr. Gus Renner, Director, these four constitute the PDRA Board of Directors. The Board also appointed Mrs. Faye Lynch Treasurer of the Authority to replace Marie Gould who was appointed Treasurer prior to her taking office as County Clerk of Hansford County.

In response to questions concerning future financing of the Project, Mr. Davidson said that the Authority is now in the position of having some prospective 6 1/2 million gallons of water for sale, with an additional three fourths to one million gallons per day reserved for Spearman and one half to three quarters of a million gallons per day reserved for Gruver. This 6 1/2 MGD could be sold by contract to Dumas and Sunray. It could be sold to the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority and delivered to Lake Meredith for distribution or it could be sold to Lubbock and delivered to Lake Meredith for delivery to Lubbock. In any case, we can move toward an early contract with any of those mentioned and once we have a signed contract, negotiations can continue with the federal and state lending agencies for purchase of revenue bonds based on the contract, and together with the local contribution in the form of tax revenue bonds not to exceed 50¢

per \$100 valuation, when voted by the people of Hansford County, plus any grant money for flood control from the Congress, all together constitute the total financing package needed.

Concerning the addition by election, of Moore County to the Authority. Presently it is my thinking that as a matter of enlightened Hansford County self interest, at the next meeting of the PDRA Board, it will be my recommendation to the Board that an election in Moore County not be called until the Board has validated a water sales contract with Dumas and, perhaps, Sunray. The 6 1/2 MGD of water is a commodity that will become increasingly valuable to the Authority, thus, it would appear that while the present Board members have control of it to the exclusion of any other interests, such control should be maintained until it is mutually beneficial to ourselves and to those with whom the water sales contract is made before additions to the Authority are considered.

As regards the importation of water from the Closed Basin of the San Luis Valley in Colorado. It appears at this time, that such water as will become available to us, something between 1 and 2 million acre feet per year, could well be on its way before we have a dam to contain part of it. Should Moore

County join the Authority, it is contemplated that the Authority will negotiate with the Water Resources Board of Colorado and with the Water District Court of Colorado for 2 million acre feet annually: one million for Hansford County and one million for Moore County, for irrigation purposes. This water would be delivered yearly beginning around April 1st and ending around October 31st. During the intervening months the water would go to Ute Dam in New Mexico for the use of that State in its Eastern New Mexico Water Supply Project. As some are aware, the New Mexico Legislature appropriated \$7 1/2 million to be used by the State Engineer of New Mexico to almost double the size of Ute Dam.

When it is all added up, we are in better shape right now for going ahead with the Project that we have been at anytime in the last two years and with care and forethought we can keep it this way. And inasmuch as the Palo Duro River Project is on the Governor's list of 27 priority projects to be completed by 1980, we can count on the full support of the Governor's Office and that of Senator Max Sherman, Chairman of the Senate Natural Resources Committee, in Authority negotiations with both State and Federal agencies."

Then someone began calling for help. "There's a lady in the front yard who needs help badly." I ran from inside the building into the front yard. There was a lady lying there being given mouth to mouth resuscitation by Charles Martin, while the skilled hands of Hoyt Biles were administering heart massage. The ambulance came and took the lady and the two attendants to Hansford Hospital.

Then, suddenly, it was all over. Reload the hose, replace the ladders, make sure that everything is ready in case of another emergency. Time: 12:30. Twenty-three tired but happy firefighters climbed into bed knowing that they had helped save a life and property.

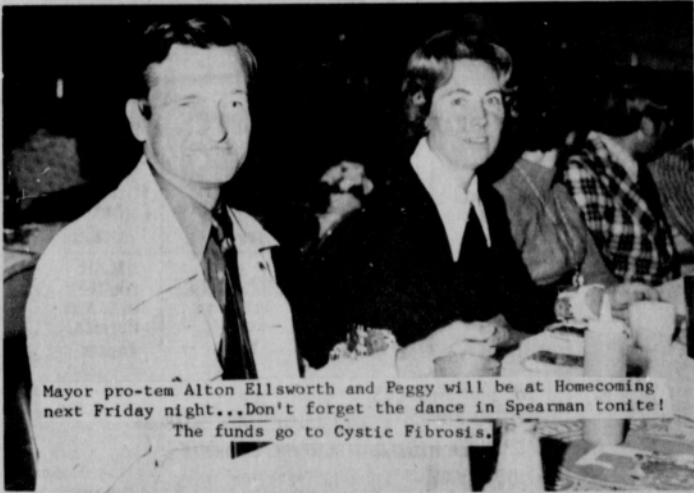
