## Planning & Zoning Commission To Make Recommendations

The Planning & Zoning Commission met Thursday, May 1 at City Hall. Consultant Brown Hudson led the discussion with members: Mrs. Kenneth Loftin, Mrs. Joel Lackey, J.L. Brock, Ab Abston and Max Baggerly.

Chet Wise was present and showed slides of different areas in Spearman, including some of the areas the commission is in favor of cleaning up. These include various sites in the business section of Spearman. Also included in the slides were some of the historic sites in Spearman; the old bus station, the Cates Hotel and the F.W. Brandt building on Main Street. There were also some slides of some of the new and remodeled businesses in Spearman.

The committee decided that there is a great need for a park in the east part of town. This will be recommended to the Parks commission for further action.

Roscoe Nelson, local building contractor was present to report findings on a building code for the city. He had reviewed several area building codes, but submitted The National Building Code for consideration of the commission. He stated this was the best code for our city and could be made better with amendments. Members voted in favor of the code and will recommend

adoption to the City Council.

Mr. Hudson discussed the utility easements for the city. He has made new maps of water, gas and sewer lines. All city property owners have been notified of these and all but 2 of the 88 property owners have agreed to these easements. The city is responsible for maintaining all lines under these easements. The commission voted to recommend that the City Council accept the easements before they can be recorded in County records.

Mr. Hudson looked into the matter of solid waste at the request of Mayor Palmer. He stated that the city needs an engineer to design the landfill for the disposal of solid waste. He gave the following statements to the commission:

The Texas State Department of Health is the responsible State agency related to the collection, handling, storage and disposal of municipal solid waste. The Texas Water Quality Board has similar power.

Permit applications submitted to each agency must be reviewed by the other agency, the mayor and health authorities of Spearman or any other community within whose extraterritorial jurisdiction the waste disposal site may be located, as well as the Hansford County Judge, and health authorities.

Mr. Hudson stated the goals and problems facing Hansford County in relation to the landfill.

The goals of the committee are as follows:

1. Reduce the environmental degradation associated with the existing solid waste disposal facility.
  2. Utilize where feasible those economically valuable resources currently being discarded as waste.
  3. Improve the economic efficiency associated with the reduction, control, reclamation, and environmental assimilation of wastes.
  4. Plan a suitable method and location for disposal which can be approved by the State Department of Health.
- A number of problems are associated with solid waste, such as public safety, air and water pollution and other health hazards having a complex

nature. Outstanding solid waste problems facing the Spearman community are evidenced as follows:

1. Elimination of the vast amount of waste which has accumulated through the years at the existing site, occupying approximately 15 acres and providing habitation for harmful vermin, etc.
  2. The steady increase in solid waste production.
  3. Inadequate handling of junked automobiles and appliances.
  4. Lack of financial and administrative resources necessary to support a high level of solid waste services.
  5. General public apathy toward management problems.
  6. The existing site location has an adverse influence on urban development.
  7. Inadequate fencing.
  8. Inadequate access.
  9. No shelter for landfill equipment.
- Surveys on housing, heating, electricity and plumbing are being made and will be brought to the committee for discussion.
- The next meeting of the Planning & Zoning Commission will be June 5 at 3 p.m. at the Spearman City Hall.

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## The American Alcoholic Woman

The American Alcoholic Woman... who is she... where does she come from... and most importantly, why is she the victim of an illness which is estimated to affect more than two million women?

Women are believed to account for the largest increase in the problem drinking population in recent years. Observers of the alcoholism field agree that the problem is more serious than statistics reveal since women are traditionally "hidden drinkers". Fearing societal stigmas, alcoholic women tend to conceal their problem, and if discovered, they are often protected by their families and friends.

However, changing attitudes toward women and a greater acceptance of the concept of alcoholism as an illness have spurred increased efforts to research the causes of alcoholism in women and to expand the available treatment for women drinkers.

Now studies are helping to illuminate significant factors in female alcoholism. Among the findings so far:

Family patterns seem to have a significant bearing on a woman's susceptibility to alcoholism. Indicators are that homes in which the mother is domi-

nant and emotionally distant and the father is weak and passive are more likely to produce alcoholic women than alcoholic men.

Women, far more frequently than men, are able to point to a specific problem as the precipitant of heavy drinking. Some of the problems most frequently mentioned by alcoholic women are divorce, death of a family member, children growing up and leaving home, and obstetrical and gynecological ailments.

Divorce rates for alcoholic women are much higher than for alcoholic men. Non-alcoholic wives are far more likely to remain with their alcoholic husbands than non-alcoholic husbands with their alcoholic wives.

Preliminary studies have pointed to the danger of birth defects in the children of alcoholic mothers. The study samples have been small and further intensive research is called for.

There also exists the possibility of a correlation between drinking and child abuse and neglect.

In the area of treatment a number of programs aimed specifically at women are being funded and evaluated. More and more treatment facilities are opening their doors to wo-

### Living Benefits On The Rise

For those of you who assume that you have to die to receive value from your life insurance policy, let it be said here that more money is paid out to policyholders in living benefits than for death benefits. As a matter of fact, the spread between living and death benefits has been widening each year. Over the past decade, the pay-out of "living benefits" by insurance companies has just about doubled - from \$5.2 billion in 1961 to \$9.8 billion in 1971. The increase was felt every year during the decade, with a rise of \$322 million from 1970 to 1971.

"Living benefits" a-

mount to 57% of all payments made by life insurance companies. The 1971 total included \$3.7 billion in policy dividends \$2.9 billion in annuity payments, \$990 million in matured endowments, and \$257 million in disability payments under life insurance policies.

men, and halfway houses are springing up around the country in an attempt to accommodate the increased number of women seeking help. Within these programs, women are being urged to question the assumptions that underlie their life roles

and to develop their skills and talents in order to prepare for coping with a sober lifestyle. Treatment facilities are being discussed which would provide child care alternatives for women with young children.

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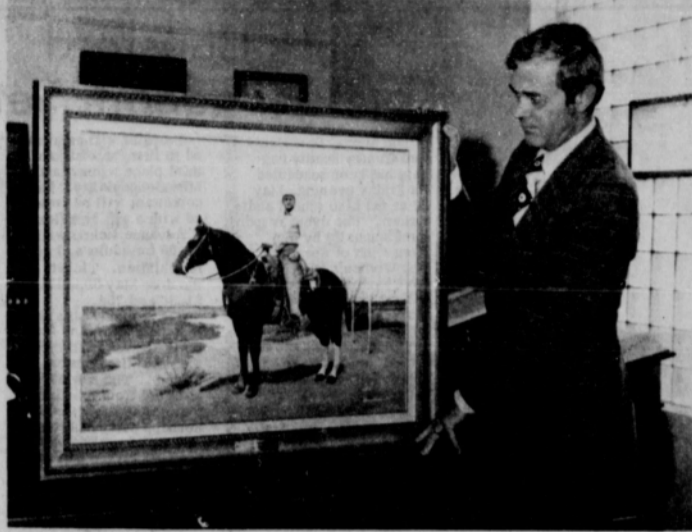

## Wichita Falls Man's Paintings On Display

The artist of the month with paintings on display at Hansford Library is Brown R. Hudson of Wichita Falls, Texas.

The range of the art work on display includes pencil sketches to oil paintings. One of the paintings is of a rancher of Crowell, Texas, Walter Ramsey on his horse Castle Badger. Mr. Ramsey commissioned the artist to do the painting for \$10,000.00.

Mr. Hudson has since 1969 devoted his time to planning and improvement and development of small communities in Texas. He is a consultant for the City of Spearman.

Hudson said he was always sketching as a boy. A pencil or crayon in his hand was as fascinating as an engine, machine, electricity, of musical instrument, etc. By drawing a person or object, he experienced a feeling of being associated with it—security, achievement, or

better understanding of composition and motivation.

While he was in India during World War II, the language barrier prevented communication; however, this was solved by sketches on paper or in the earth soil.

He was a cartographer during the war—having compiled the navigational and bombing charts utilized on the atomic bomb missions on Hiroshima and Nagasaki.

After the war, he enjoyed 700 hours at the American Academy of Art in Chicago where he also got a job as an errand boy for an art company at \$35 a week. It wasn't long, however, until he got a chance at the "board", preparing art work for reproduction purposes for such accounts as General Foods, Motorola and Zenith radios, Mengal Furniture Co., Pepsodent Toothpaste, Rexall Drug, etc. This type of art work required long hours of hard work in or-

der to meet press deadlines—often 36 hours at a stretch. His doctor advised a change. The change took him to Colorado Springs where he was employed as an artist and cartographer for the Directorate of Intelligence of the Air Defense Command.

He then went to Phoenix, Arizona to prepare a downtown plan for Phoenix after which he was employed to prepare a community development program for the City of Oklahoma City which resulted in the current action of rehabilitation of downtown Oklahoma City. While living in Oklahoma City he won first prize in the Businessmen's Art Show.

Hudson uses every spare moment to paint or draw what pleases him now without the pressure of a deadline. His wife, Jeanne, is his inspiration and motivation.

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## Weese To Coach AAU All-Stars

PLAINVIEW--Dean Weese, who has led the Hutcherson Flying Queens of Wayland Baptist College to two straight National Amateur Athletic Union Championships, has been named head coach of an AAU All-Star basketball team that will play eight games in the Soviet Union this summer.

Assisting Weese will be Dixie Woodall of Seminole Junior College. Weese, who took Spearman to three state AA championships before coming to Wayland, will also be assisted by his wife, JoAnn, who will serve as team manager. Weese has posted a 71-5 record in two years coaching the Queens.

Twenty-four players who received All-American votes at the recent AAU Tournament in Gallup, N.M., have been invited to a tryout camp at Wayland April 27-May 4. Then, the final 12 players will be selected, Weese said.

"We'll be developing a post-oriented offense and will use the fast-break and press just as the Queens did this past season," said Weese who guided the Wayland girls to a 34-1 record.

The team will play in Moscow May 17-18, in Rega May 21-22, in Frunch May 25-26 and in Alma Ata on the Indochina border May 30-31. The team will leave New

York May 14 and will return on June 2.

Last year, the Russian National Team won all seven games on a USA tour, including five wins over the U.S. All-Stars. Among the 24 hopefuls will be four players who were on the All-Star team last year, Brenda Mceller and Rosie Brown of the Queens (Brown was selected from Ranger Junior College last year), Nancy Dunkel of National General West of Fullerton, Calif., and Julie Simpson of the Gallup, N.M. Falcons, a former All-American at John F. Kennedy College.

Others trying out are Carolyn Bush, Pearl Worrell, Leann Shieldknight and Breana Caldwell of the Queens; Kathy Woodyard, Sherri Luetz and Rhonda Pinquite of Ankeny, Iowa; Judy Schneider and Debbie Oing of Marion-Kay, O.; Sheila Patterson and Alberta Ransom of Federal City College in Washington D.C.; Marion Washington and Sheila Moorman of Raytown Pipers; Carolyn Strong of Seattle; Sue Rejeliviez of Allentown, Pa.; Barb Wischmeier of Barnes Sneakers of Omaha, Neb.; Belinda Candler of Seminole, Okla. Junior College; Faye Rex of Sand-Knit, Wisc.; Debra Waddy of Temple, Tex. Junior College; Annie Meyers of UCLA.

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# TORNADO Safety Rules

TO KNOW WHAT TO DO WHEN A TORNADO IS APPROACHING MAY MEAN THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN LIFE AND DEATH!

### I If you are near a tornado cellar:

When time permits, go to a tornado cellar, cave or underground excavation which should have an air outlet to help equalize the air pressure. It should be kept fit for use, free from water, gas or debris; and preferably equipped with pick and shovel. THERE IS NO UNIVERSAL PROTECTION AGAINST TORNADES EXCEPT UNDERGROUND EXCAVATIONS.

### II If you are in open country:

1. Move at right angles to the tornado's path. Tornadoes usually move ahead at about 25 to 40 miles per hour.
2. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression such as a ditch or ravine.

### III If in a city or town.

1. Seek inside shelter, preferably in a strongly reinforced building. STAY AWAY FROM WINDOWS!
2. In homes: The corner of the basement toward the tornado usually offers greatest safety, particularly in frame houses. People in houses without basements can sometimes be protected by taking cover under heavy furniture against inside walls. Doors and windows on the sides of the house away from the tornado may be opened to help reduce damage to the building.
3. Standing against the inside wall on a lower floor of an office building offers some protection.

### IV If in schools:

1. In city areas: If school building is of strongly reinforced construction, stay inside, away from windows, remain near an inside wall on the lower floors when possible. AVOID AUDITORIUMS AND GYMNASIUMS with large, poorly-supported roofs!
2. In rural schools that do not have strongly reinforced construction, remove children and teachers to a ravine or ditch if storm shelter is not available.

### V If in factories and industrial plants:

On receiving a tornado warning, a lookout should be posted to keep safety officials advised of the tornado's approach. Advance preparation should be made for moving workers to sections of the plant offering the greatest protection.

### VI

Keep calm. It will not help to get excited. People have been killed by running out into streets and by turning back into the path of a tornado. Even though a warning is issued, chances of a tornado striking one's home or location are very slight. Tornadoes cover such a small zone, as a rule, that relatively only a few places in a warned area are directly affected. You should know about tornadoes though, "just in case."

### VII

Keep tuned to your radio or television station for latest tornado advisory information. Do not call the Weather Bureau, except to report a tornado, as your individual request may tie up telephone lines urgently needed to receive special reports or to relay advisories to radio and television stations for dissemination to thousands in the critical area.

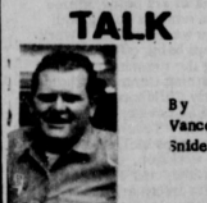

Centers make available such resources as discussion groups and lectures, a library with suggested reading lists, opportunities for observing how skilled teachers deal with children, and personal conferences designed to help in preventing, or at least in working through family problems.
