


SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

The Great Plains Conservation Program cost share in Lynn County amounted to \$1,000, 270.18 for 1969 Fiscal Year. It is estimated by the Soil Conservation Service that it will be more than ninty-seven thousand dollars this Fiscal Year ending June 30, 1970. This money goes into the local economy as a per cent of the cost of installing permanent conser-

vation practices on the land. These payments are made to land owners and operators.

This is just one of the few benefits outside of conservation that the Great Plains Conservation Program brings to Lynn County. It has helped to increase crop yield, limit the hazardous effect of drought by insuring more stable production and increase value of land in addition to conserving our natural resources and preventing polution of them.

We in Lynn County should be greatful for such a program and let our leaders such as congressmen, Secretary of Agriculture and others know how we feel about it.

Rays extending to and from the house indicate the influences of the home and the community on each other. The emblem bears the FHA motto TOWARD NEW HORIZONS.

History of Future Homemakers of America

This year marks the 25th anniversary of the founding of Future Homemakers of America as a national youth organization in vocational education. co-related with the home economics education program.

The signing of the first National Vocational Education Act by President Woodrow Wilson brought into being federally-supported, state-conducted programs of vocational education which included home economics. Through home economics education the foundation was laid for the development of Future Homemakers of America as an integral part of the program.

An outgrowth of various state and local high school home economics clubs known by different names, Future Homemakers of America was founded June 11, 1945 as an incorporated, non-profit national organization for home economics students in junior and senior high schools, both public and private.

Members of The American Home Economics Association and the Home Economics Education Staff of the U.S. Office of Education took the lead in forming this national organization to provide an opportunity for all home economics clubs to combine efforts in working together on improved home and family living on a national scale.

Kentucky was the first State Association to affiliate with the national organization. By the end of the first year, membership had almost doubled and national offices had been moved into the U.S. Office of Education.

Future Homemakers of America begin their twenty-fifth year with 604,000 members in 12,000 local high school chapters. The record shows affiliated associations in all 50 States, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and The Virgin Islands-and affiliated chapters in American Schools located in Germany, Japan, Iran, and The Canal Zone.

In its twenty-five years of existence Future Homemakers of America has served more than fifteen million high school youth.

Parents can help build good discipline in their child. Here are some suggestions for par-

1. Parents can remember their child's ability and stage of development. Expectations should be in line with what a child can actually do.

2. They should remember that what a child needs and what he wants are often very different. For example, he needs rest but he doesn't want to go to

3. Parents can distinguish between the act and the person when they condem. The child needs to know that "I love you but can't have you doing this." 4. A child needs his parents to set limits for him, even if he has trouble accepting the restriction. These limits are

part of the security he needs. 5. Parents should be firm and not apologetic about reasonable demands. Don't give the impression you doubt the wisdom of your action.

6. They need to be consistent about rules.

7. Occasional outbursts or inconsistencies by parents will not undo a good relationship. Parents are human and children can accept weakness and limitations on the part of loving

Parents should remeber individual difference between children and tailor discipline to fit the personality, age and deverlopment of each child.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK: Cheddar-Crust Apple Pie 11/2 cups flour

dash salt cup shortening 11/2 cups shredded sharp ched-

dar cheese 4 to 6 tablespoons water

l cup sugar 2 tablespoons flour

1 teaspoon cinnamon cups sliced peeled apples

2 tablespoons margarine Combine flour and salt; cut

in shortening until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Stir in cheese. Sprinkle with water while mixing lightly with a fork; form into ball. Divide dough in half. Roll one part to 11. inch circle on lightly floured surface. Place in 9" pie plate. Combine sugar, flour and cinnamon, Mix with apples. Place mixture in pie shell; dot with margarine. Roll out remainder of dough to 11-inch circle; place over apples. Seal edges of crust and flute. Cut slits in top of pastry. Bake at 425 degrees for 35 minutes.



New Concepts For Home Appliances



A "menu-matic" food preparation unit (left) and a multipurpose food storage center (right) are two of the space-age household appliances in Concept II, an exciting new design program developed by Rohm and Haas Company, Philadelphia, Pa., plastics manufacturer. The purpose of the program is to present new concepts in home appliances and consumer electronics products and to stimulate use of Plexiglas acrylic plastic by designers and manufacturers of these lines

A leading American chemical company has been busy working on your kitchen. And it's cooked up some interesting prototype appliances that provide a fascinating preview of what the home preparation center of tomorrow will be like.

Consider, for example, a stove that "computerizes" cooking through the use of programmed menus. Here's how it works. A card - containing a picture of the dish to be prepared along with cooking instructions - is popped into a slot near the oven. A picture of the meal to be cooked - roast beef. for instance - appears on a Plexiglas acrylic plastic panel along with recommended cooking time. Colored lights flash on the oven's control

panel when the meal is ready. Another item is a compact food storage center that makes today's refrigerator seem as outmoded as the old ice box. Additional Concept units are multicolored "youth cubes" that serve as tables, storage units and lighting elements; and a movable "entertainment wall" containing a TV, hifidelity phonograph, tape recorder, study desk and projection screen for viewing home movies and slides.

Unfortunately, these Concept II products can't be purchased today. But it's a good bet they'll be finding places in your version of the
