The returns came in from Precinct 4 or T-Bar Ranch first; No. 1, or Lynn second; No. 3, or T-Bar School House third; while No. 2 or Tahoka; was the last to be heard from, and as a glance at the figures will show, the last box, as is often the case, changed the results in several instances, the excitement was intense, and when the results were finally known, burst all bounds and the cheering and yelling was heard at Lubbock (over the telephone) 30 miles away. While the excitement ran high in Tahoka all day there were no disturbances and the day passed off very creditably to the town and shows that anyone can live and vote as they please in this country, which is more than can be said of some places in the lower and older counties.

"Only the women who have come in close contact with our would-be citizens," writes Miss Elizabeth Howard Westwood concerning foreign women immigrants in the NEW IDEA WOMAN'S MAGAZINE for August, "understand the wide gulf between having a home, working, even playing in America and being an American woman. For our future citizens settle, not as a single pioneer, but in battalions. Once a pioneer has reported favorably of the opportunities of a district, an European village emigrates EN MASS, and settling together, bringing customs, priests, teacher text-books with them, bid fair to shut out everything American but American wages.

"It is very well for us," the writer continues, "to throw wide the gates of Castle Garden and to allow the down trodden and unfortunate of Europe to swarm in, 1,000,000 by the day 1,000,000 by the year. But it then becomes our duty, more for our own sakes, even than for theirs, to see to it that they become citizens in reality as well as in name." It appears that the public schools, the vacation schools, the public library, and settlements of various kinds are doing much toward assimilating the diverse elements concerning the country but concerning the grown women immigrants there seems to be little hope. "It is an unfortunate pathetic fact," says Miss Westwood, "that a large portion of the would-be citizens who come as grown women never learn to speak our language and until they die are strangers in a foreign land."
