## Bank Deposits Reach All-Time High

### 22,168,000 Is Figure Reached By Co. Banks

Lynn county bank deposits reached the all-time high figure of \$22,168,000 last Wednesday for a December 31st call, nearly four million more than at the same time a year ago when deposits totaled \$18,332,743.00.

Actually, since January 1, deposits had jumped to approximately \$24 million by Tuesday of this week when the News talked to the three county bank presidents.

Biggest increase was at Tahoka's First National Bank, where President F.B. (Pete) Hegi reported \$13,672,774.69 on deposit when the Dec. 31 call was made.

At Wilson, President Dan Cook reported deposits on Dec. 31 totaling \$5,387,141.38, very close to the record high there.

O'Donnell's First National Bank president, J. T. Forbes, reported Dec. 31 deposits totaling \$3,108,000, not quite a record there due to the fact the crop was not up to some years in the past.

All three reported a rush of deposits since the beginning of the new year as many farmers held off deposits until after the first so that income will be reported on 1970 returns.

Deposits at the First National in Tahoka passed the \$5 million mark Monday, Mr. Hegi said.

All three banks also reported unusually heavy payments on notes since the first of January, more than \$3000,000 in notes being paid off at the First National here the morning of January 2nd.

Bankers declare the county as a whole is in fine financial shape despite the dry weather last summer. Although not a record crop, both cotton and milo production turned out better than most people expected on most farms and the prices held fairly well.

Farmers and leaders of farm organizations are invited to meet with Congressman George Mahon in Lubbock on Friday, January 9, at 10 a.m. at the Koko Palace for a general talk session concerning farm problems. The present farm program expires at the end of this year and Mahon wishes to get the views of the people and report to them in regard to the prospects for farm legislation at the forthcoming session of Congress.

Mahon said that farm legislation which is expected to be enacted this year will have a vital impact on the economy of the area, affecting both farmers and non-farmers. Mahon expressed deep concern over the difficulties involved in securing the passage of suitable farm legislation, pointing out that most members of Congress represent urban areas and are becoming increasingly unsympathetic toward the problems of agriculture.

Congressman Mahon will be in Tahoka today to speak to the Rotary Club as well as be a guest. We are very proud to have George visit Tahoka as he has helped Tahoka and West Texas tremendously throughout his years in office. It will be a sad day for this area when George retires from office.

The Lynn County News ran a column last week explaining about registration applications being received by mail early this month. Although you have probably already received your application actual sale of license tags for the New Year will be the same as usual, beginning on February 1st.

Here's an interesting piece of information. Chairman K.A. Randall of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation today announced that the maximum insurance coverage for each depositor in banks which are members of the FDIC has been increased from 15,000 to 20,000.

### Construction To Begin On Roads

The Texas Highway Department has announced a construction project on U.S. Highway 87 from 5 miles south of Tahoka to 6 miles south Tahoka, Loop 472 from north edge of Tahoka to south edge of Tahoka, U.S. Highway 380 from Terry county line at A.T. & S.F.R.R. in Tahoka, and F.M. Highway 3112 from U.S. Highway 380, 6 miles west of Tahoka, south of F.M. Highway 2053. The construction will consist of reconstruction of the grading, base and surfacing, and lengthening culverts. The Texas Highway Department and the contractor, Henry L. Stafford, stated that the construction will begin about January 1, 1970, and all construction will be completed about October 1, 1970.

Traffic will be routed through the construction work and adequate barricades and warning signals will be prominently displayed. Motorists, however, should be extremely cautious in passing through the area as it will be heavily traveled by large highway construction equipment. The construction area will be speed zoned for the protection of motorists and workmen alike. The length will be patrolled to minimize inconveniences to motorists. Cooperation of the public is requested in obeying all traffic signals, warning signs, and speed zones.

### Bond Sales 46% of 1969 Goal

November sales in Lynn County totaled \$3,762,000, according to Mr. F. B. Hegi, Chairman of the Lynn County Savings Bonds Committee. Sales for the eleven-month period were \$59,373.00 and this is 46 per cent of the 1969 goal of \$130,000.

Texas sales during November totaled \$12,962,108 while the first eleven month sales amounted to \$161,490,677 which is 95 per cent of the 1969 goal of \$170.1 million.

"Recently the interest rate on United States Savings Bonds was raised to 5 per cent when held to maturity of 5 years and 10 months (4 per cent for the first year and 5.20 per cent when held to maturity.) **SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS**

We are the world's most extravagant user of land. Our nation has over a million acres of land going out of agricultural production each year. We Americans give little thought to the consequences that will result in the future. With the expanding areas used for homes for our growing population, the industrial development, and expanding transportation systems such as airport and highway, it is easy to see where it all goes.

We in Lynn County haven't been affected by this as much as people in other locations. However, building sites have used some of this land in the past several years. The new highway in this county took 46 acres out of one section and large interstate highways take as much as 85 acres for each mile in some areas. So, we don't have far to look before the problem becomes apparent to us. Many of us can remember when 34th St. in Lubbock was the south boundary of the city limits and College Ave., now University, was out of town to the west.

Now your saying, "So it is a problem, but what does it have to do with me?"

If we, the farmer and agricultural communities, of tomorrow are to feed, clothe and house the now expanding 200 million citizens of the U. S., we must act now. It is predicted by the U.S.D.A. that it will take 20 million more acres than was harvested this year to feed the population in 1980 and that is just 10 years away.

This means farmers must get the most efficient use of their land. Unplanned urban development must become an orderly adjustment in land use as related to the total needs and suitability for such needs. We must stop building on unstable soil and bad location; we must stop floods; pollution, sedimentation damage and other forms of erosion. Seventy per cent of the Americans now live in only one per cent of the space in the nation; and paraphrase Churchill, "Never before have so many eaten so much of the abundance produced by so few."

Those of you planning to build on new sites, be it small such as a barn, tool room or large such as a school, housing development or whatever, should contact the Lynn County Soil Conservation Service. These trained technical people will discuss the soil type, the location and suitability with you. This might prevent costly regrets at a later date.

Those of you that farm can call on the Soil Conservation Service in Tahoka to assist you in developing long range and short term plans to protect and conserve the most valuable resources you have, your soil and water. The SCS can provide you with soil information and will be glad to interpret it for you. They may offer alternatives and help to solve problems with soil and water conservation. This is where we must start to combat the complex problems that face this Nation and the generation to come. If we don't care for what we have now and manage the resources that we possess, there will be no reason to worry for all will eventually be lost.

It has been said that "cattle don't graze on parking lots, cotton doesn't grow well on rooftops and gutters are no substitute for water courses." Yet, the increasing population that creates the demand for all the construction must have milk, beef, bread, clothes and water to survive. Many people are aware of these problems, but many are not. Those that aren't aware of them should be made aware. Some eight hundred farmers are cooperating with the Lynn County Soil and Water Conservation District to combat this problem. If you are not working with them, you can contact Richard Christie of the SCS or any SCS employee and start helping conserve the land Mother Nature entrusted us with.

Do not attempt to make up the whole batch at one time (so many persons spoil the entire lot in this way), but prepare one day at a time, as follows:

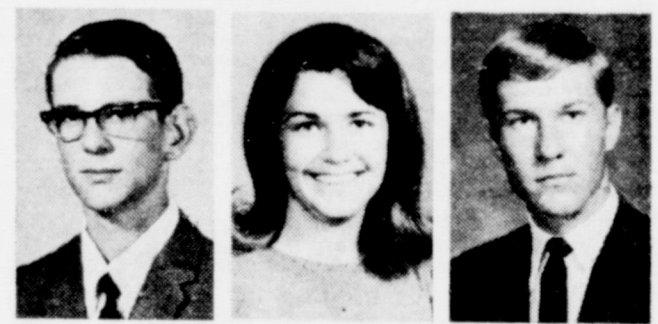

**4-H Abilities Earn Trips To Congress for Texas Teens**

Meeting a need, being a challenge and planning a future have been the things that 4-H has meant to three Texas youths to win state awards and recently attend the National 4-H Congress in Chicago.

Winning in the agricultural project sponsored by International Harvester Company, he plans a career in agriculture. During the seven years he spent in 4-H and in this project, he grew 35 acres of cotton and 70 acres of milo. Through the help of his father, who gave him 15 acres when he was nine, Wood has learned the importance of crop rotation, irrigation and tilling.

During his four years in the project, he has built 6,200 feet of terraces, sprayed 490 acres of mesquite, deferred 800 acres of pasture, contour-farmed 500 acres, rotated crops for 500 acres and stubble mulched 500 acres among many other things.

One of the most interesting projects he had during his eight years in 4-H was range and pasture grass identification.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Willie Thorman, he is a freshman at Texas A & M University. His trip award was donated by John Deere.

During her eight years in 4-H and her dress revue project, Miss Block has found that sewing is both enjoyable and challenging.

She has made more than 50 garments. She also has had to rip apart many of the things she has made. A high school senior, she plans a career in either home economics or nursing.

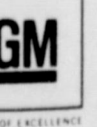

**Bill Griffin, County Agent, Says....**

"Closing time", as it related to 1969 farm records, is at hand. This means totaling up the balance sheets on farm and home enterprises and taking a good look at what happened during the past year.

It is also a good time to analyze production practices. Were the desired results obtained from the application of fertilizers and chemicals? Did the seed used grow well and produce good yields?

Many factors contribute to profitable crop production including weather. The proper combination and application of all inputs result in the best production. In a sense there is a team at work in crop production, and seed is a very important member of the team. High quality seed is needed to get the full potential production from fertile soil.

Certified seed is quality seed. Why take a chance on seed of unknown quality and performance for next year's crop?

It is good business, to make arrangements early for the certified seed that will be needed to plant next year's crop. Get the varieties or hybrids which best suit the conditions found on your farm and are recommended for the area.

For easier cleaning, scrape and rinse away all loose food. Soak glass cookware with burned-on food: cold water for utensils with egg or starchy mixtures and hot water for other foods. A little detergent helps loosen the food.

Wash glassware with mild soap or detergent and hot water. Glass has more sparkle after drying if detergent is used.

A few drops of ammonia or blueing in the wash water adds luster to glassware. Do not suddenly douse glasses in hot water if they held iced drinks. Sudden temperature changes break some glasses.

Handle stemware carefully; hold by the base of the bowl, not the stem. Rinse in extremely hot water for sparkle. For a high polish, dry with a lint free absorbent towel.

For proper storage, line shelves with felt, rubber mats or paper to cushion glasses. Store with rims up. Do not stack or crowd.

Honey is excellent sweetener for baked goods. If a recipe calls for 1/2 cup sugar or less, you can omit the sugar and use an equal amount of honey in its place. In recipes calling for 1 or more cups of sugar, omit the sugar and use the same amount of honey—but reduce the amount of liquid called for by 1/4 cup. Add a little extra salt to bring out the sweetness of the honey. Lower baking temperature by 25 degrees.

Cherry Crumble Squares  
1 Package (17 oz.) yellow cake mix  
1/4 cup butter melted  
2 eggs  
1 can cherry pie filling  
1 package coconut pecan frosting mix  
2 tablespoons butter melted  
Combine cake mix, butter and eggs, until dry ingredients are well mixed. Put in 13x9 inch pan (grease) top with cherry filling. Combine frosting mix with butter; sprinkle over cherries. Bake at 350 degrees F. for 30 to 35 minutes. Cool and cut in squares.

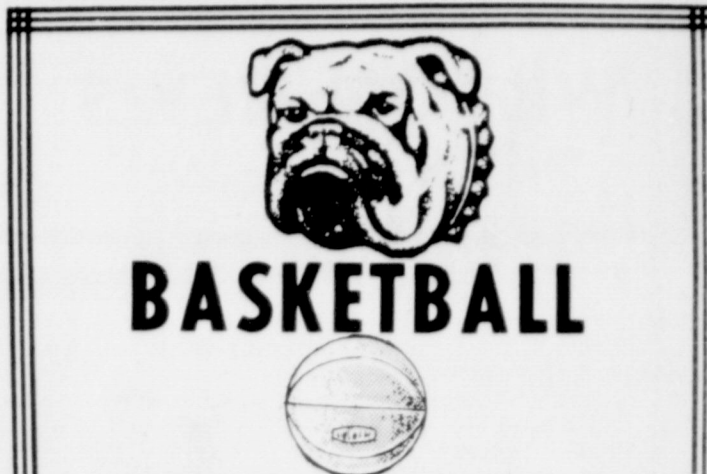

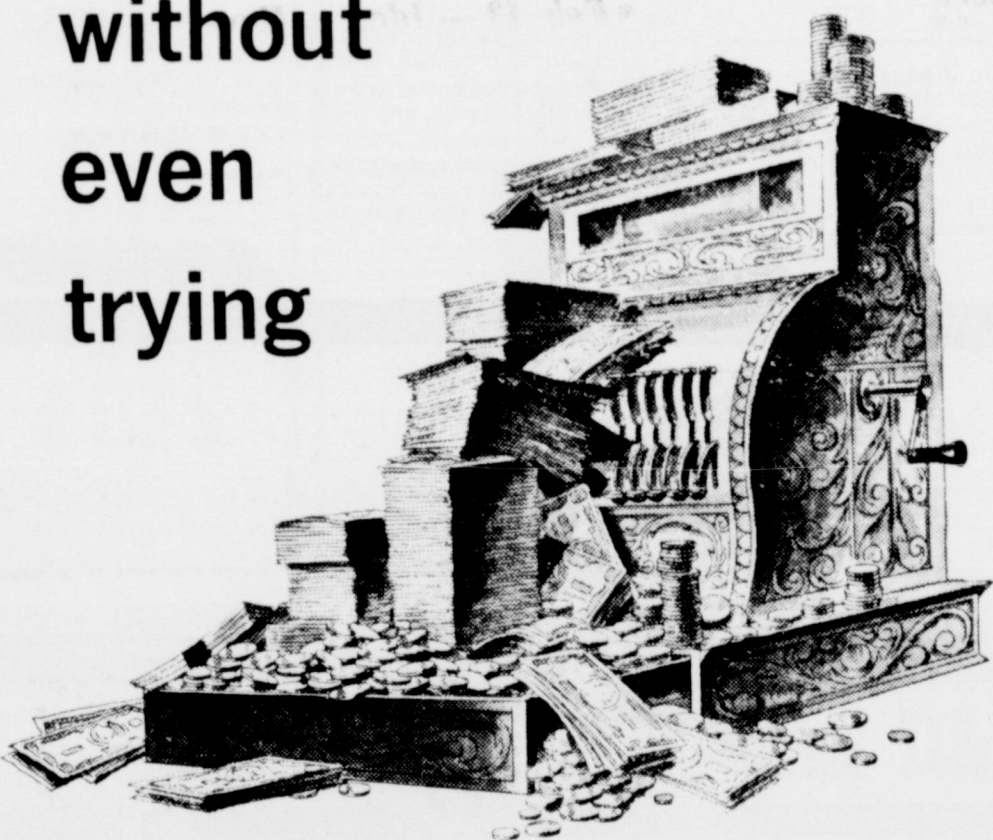

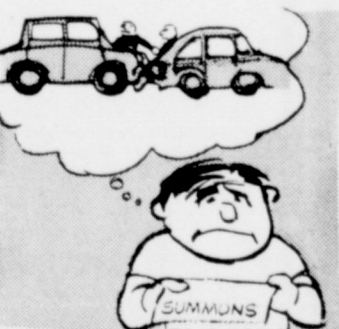


### Unreported Accident

Coming to a halt at a stop light, you bump bumpers with the car ahead. A quick look by both parties indicates that no harm was done, so you dismiss the matter from your mind.

Months later, you are served with a summons in a lawsuit. It seems the other driver is claiming that he was injured by the collision after all. This question arises:

Are you left stranded, without the protection of your liability insurance, because you failed to give prompt notice of the accident to the insurance company?



Generally speaking, you are required to give notice within a "reasonable time" after you have an accident. Still, the law does grant you some leeway if there is a good excuse for delay.

Obviously, you have a good excuse if you simply were not aware that an accident happened at all. Likewise, in the case above, the court decided the motorist's excuse was good enough. As one judge put it:

"Not every trivial accident should be reported. An accident that an ordinarily prudent person would consider as inconsequential, not the basis of any claim, the insured was not bound to report."

Nevertheless, if there is reason to fear a claim (even an unfair claim), then it is indeed up to you to tell your insurance company about it.

For example, a motorist who knocked down a pedestrian was held not justified in failing to report the accident, since he knew the victim had been taken to a hospital. His excuse, that a policeman had told him it was "nothing serious," was held not good enough.

And another motorist was held at fault for not notifying his insurance company that the other party, in a seemingly harmless collision, had telephoned to say his knee was "starting to feel stiff."

In short, when in doubt report the accident. It isn't a difficult thing to do. And it might save you, some day, from having to "face the music" on your own.

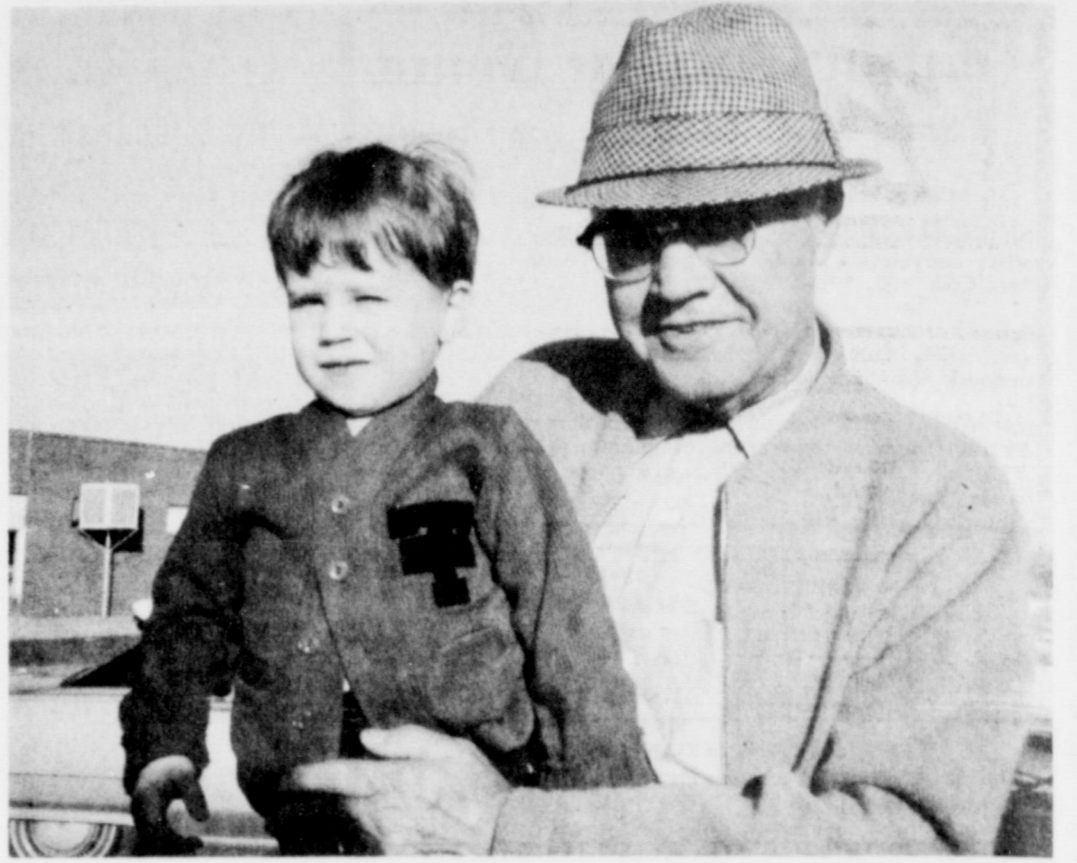

**Balance Pollution**



(Editor's note: The Sandhills Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm attacks the air pollution problem in his own peculiar way this week.)

Dear editor:  
Although I fought against it, at the turn of the year I had to make a trip into Lubbock and the man I was riding with got caught in a traffic jam, cars in four lanes backed up for 15 or 20 blocks in both directions with all motors running and I have concluded the articles I've been reading in the newspapers lately about air pollution are right. It's terrible.  
Then last night, after reading another article, I got to thinking and have figured out what we ought to do about it.  
According to it, the Russian people are clamoring for more cars,

in the entire country could ride around at the same time, if they could get by the trucks which aren't included in these figures. This literally means everybody and his dogs and in-laws too.

It's this Russian demand for more cars that interests me.  
I don't care what it costs, if the United States is smart it'll start shipping cars to Russia by the hundreds and thousands. It doesn't make any difference what the terms are, even if we have to take two cans of cabbage soup and a loaf of black bread as the downpayment, just so we get the cars over there and running.  
It's not the balance of power it's the balance of pollution that's going to make one country equal to another and if we don't get Russia and the rest of the world up on our level we're in trouble.

To get the program started, I've got a 1951 model car out here on this Johnson grass farm I'll be glad to export to Russia for a very reasonable figure provided it goes to somebody living in the heart of the metropolitan area of Moscow. It burns a quart of oil every 25 miles.  
In fact, in the whole of Russia there are now only a million passenger cars, which means one car for every 3 people, which means if the nation struck them everybody

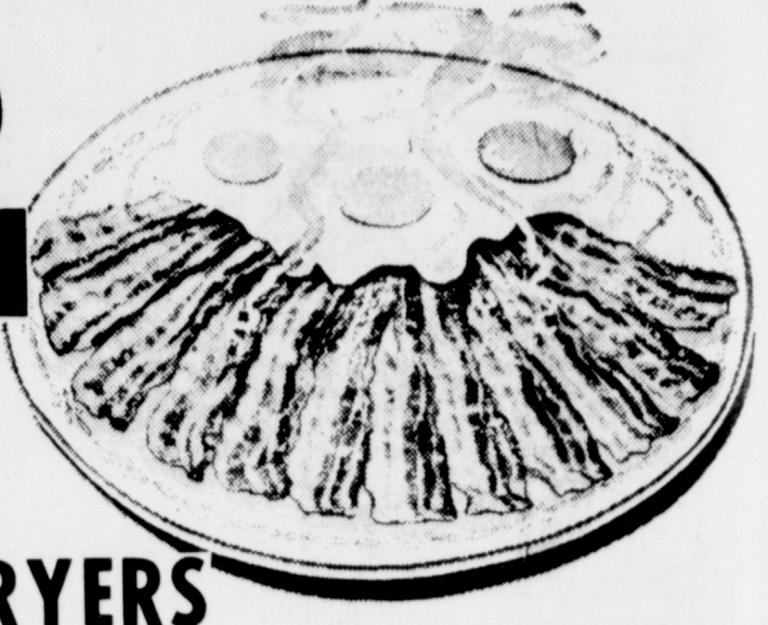
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
