Gus Mutscher Speaks To Large Crowd

The Tahoka Chamber of Commerce Banquet honored Joe Brooks as Conservation Farmer Monday night and Gus Mutscher spoke to the local crowd along with many dignitaries from over the state.

Speaker of the House, Gus Mutscher's topic at the Banquet was Challenges for the '70's with an accent on leadership.

"The key work is leadership from an effective source that reflects authority and responsibility," Mutscher told the large audience. He challenged them to evaluate all programs for their own "up through the state level" and do objective planning for the next decade.

The Chamber Banquet was held at the Tahoka High School Cafeteria where a full house gathered to hear the speaker.

Gus Mutscher was introduced by Tahoka's own representative E. L. Short as a "man who learned the values of agriculture as a boy working with his father."

"The decade began with the threat of communism and ended in dissension," he added

and said that the crime rate has increased six times faster than the population and "out flag" has been burned in the streets.

"The decade has seen citizens call for victory by our enemies" and "immorality peddled as sophistication and the minority acting for the majority."

Mutscher said it was time for the majority to join forces and act in the best interest of all for which the large crowd boomed applause for the speaker.

He mentioned opportunities the '60's brought of man walking on the moon twice and how studies also were going under the sea, "where there is more energy potential than in outer-space."

"But we aren't going to put everyone underwater or on the moon," he said, stressing the need to scrutinize the problems that make a young man reject "his family, community, the very society."

He urged the audience to apply the proper dedicated leadership that "requires courage and leads into fields of responsibility." He described the

coming decade as a battle pitting civil obedience against civil disorders to bring about a balanced, healthy society. Close to law and order he placed environmental control as a must "or we will be smothering ourselves in waste."

The large number of dignitaries that attended the banquet included State Sen. Doc. Blanchard of Lubbock and eight representatives, Elmer Tarbox and Delwin Jones of Lubbock, Renal Rosson of Snyder, Boll Clayton of Springlake, Walter Knapp of Amarillo, John Traeger of Seguin, Fred Head of Henderson and E. L. Short of Tahoka. Others were John A. Buesseler, M.D. and new Dean of the Texas Tech University School of Medicine, Nolan Swain of Southwestern Public Service in Lubbock, Johnny Sims of Pioneer Natural Gas in Lubbock, Ben J. Parsley, Vice President of Public Affairs at Texas Tech, Mr. and Mrs. Bart Burnett of the Lamesa Chamber of Commerce, Earl Bartley of the Slaton Chamber of Commerce, Dick Hartman of Slaton and Mr. and Mrs. Bob Capps of the Lamesa Chamber of Commerce. Mr. and Mrs. Brooks received the "family conservation award" from Allen Sheppard, conservationist for the Lynn Soil and Water Conservation District.

Jerry Brooks is a native of New Morre and a graduate of Tahoka High School. While in high school, she was a member of the Honor Society, worked in Library and Kennel Staff, on the student council and was FFA sweetheart. She was president of Young Homemakers, and has helped with Cub Scouts and Girl Scouts.

Joe is a native of Tahoka and attended Tahoka High School, lettered 3 years in football, Captain Sr. year, made all-district, lettered 3 years in basketball, Captain Sr. year, FFA 4 years, was on the FFA judging team, attended Texas Tech, coached Minor League and Little League, president of softball association and is past president of the Young Farmers.

E. L. Short Named To Committee

Speaker G. F. (Gus) Mutscher has named State Representative E. L. Short of Tahoka as one of his five appointees to the House Interim Committee to investigate and study all matters pertaining to the taxation of farm, ranch and forest lands on the basis of their capability to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops.

"Representative Short has been a rancher and farmer in Lynn County for 24 years," Mutscher said. "I know with his background and knowledge he will be a valuable member of this committee to try to ascertain a uniform method of assessment of farm, ranch and forest lands on a fair, just and equitable basis."

Other House members to serve on the committee will be State Representatives Steve Burgess of Nacogdoches, who authored H.C.R. 8 which created this committee, Jack Blanton of Carrollton, Honore Ligarde of Laredo and Bill T. Swanson of Houston. The 15-man committee will also have five Senators and five Governor's appointees, three of whom will represent the farm industry, the ranch industry and the timber industry.

Representative Short is a past director of the Farm Bureau and a member of Water, Inc., Co. He is on the Methodist Church Board, a 32 degree Mason and a member of the board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce and Rotary Club. The Tahoka law maker will be a candidate for re-election as the State Representative for District 73, which includes Andrews, Dawson, Martin, Lynn, Gaines and Yoakum Counties.

Voting Registration Near End

January 31 is the deadline for voters to register in Texas. Texans will elect a governor, other state officials, a U.S. Senator, members of the state legislature, and will troop to the polls to elect councilmen, majors and board of trustees.

If a person doesn't register, he cannot vote. Did you realize Lynn County has only registered 30 per cent to vote? Andrews County has 80 per cent registered.

RUSH NOW to the tax office and let George McCracken help you register. Voters are urged to qualify before the Jan. 31 deadline.

Linda Huffaker, CHD Agent, Says.....

Eggs play such a commonplace, taken-for-granted, role in the life of most every U.S. citizen that many shoppers simply pick up a carton from their grocer's display case with nev-

er a thought about size, quality or freshness.

Here are some questions and answers which might prove interesting and at the same time provide up to date and correct information on the buying and storing of eggs.

Answer true or false, and then check with the answers provided.

1. A U.S. Grade A large egg is better than a U.S. Grade A Medium egg.

2. You should never use a dirty or cracked egg in an eggnog.

3. To keep their quality, store eggs promptly and large end up in the refrigerator.

4. A U.S. Grade B egg will be just as nutritious as a U.S. Grade A egg.

5. All eggs in a carton marked "Large" are identical in size.

6. Not all cartons marked "Grade A" have been officially graded by the Federal-State Grading Service.

7. Eggs are no good after a week in the refrigerator.

8. If you want to serve poached eggs, U.S. Grade AA or A eggs would be best choice.

9. Shell color does not affect the nutritive value or quality of an egg.

10. Leftover egg yolks should be covered with cold water before storing in the refrigerator.

Check your answer with those stated here, and if each correct answer meant a prize of one egg, how big an omelet could you make?

1. False. A large egg is bigger than a medium egg, not better. Size refers to the weight of the egg, the grade refers to the quality.

2. True. Eggs eaten uncooked—as in an eggnog—should always be clean and shouldn't be cracked. This is just to provide an extra safeguard against possible contamination by bac-

teria. Never buy cracked or dirty eggs. USDA-graded eggs will be clean and sound-shelled and will be safe to use for all purposes. If one becomes cracked accidentally, use it only in thoroughly cooked dishes. Don't use dirty eggs for any purpose.

3. True. Keeping eggs large end up will keep the yolk from sticking to the shell and keep their natural quality longer. Keeping them in the refrigerator is essential to keep the egg's natural quality. Get the eggs under refrigeration as soon as possible. Holding them for any length of time in a warm place can result in quality loss.

4. True. The Grade B egg may not look quite as nice as the Grade A egg if you fry or poach it, but it will be just as nutritious.

5. False. If a carton of USDA-graded eggs is labeled "Large" all the eggs together must weigh at least 24 ounces. There may be some slight variation between individual eggs, but rarely should any be smaller than the average for "Large", 2 oz. per egg. If you find apparent disparity in egg size, chances are you'll have some eggs larger than the average marked, not smaller. Here are the minimum weights per dozen for commonly sold sizes. Extra Large, 27 ounces; large, 24 ounces; medium 21 ounces; small, 18 ounces.

6. True. Only egg cartons marked with the official USDA grade shield have been officially graded under the Federal-State grading service. Eggs marked simply "Grade A" are supposed to meet State or local standards for quality which usually are based on Federal standards.

7. False. Eggs will lose some quality (appearance) after a week in the refrigerator, but will usually be just as good in taste and in nutritive value. To prevent off-taste don't store eggs next to cheese, citrus, fish or other aromatic foods.

8. True. U.S. Grade AA and A eggs have high standing yolks, and thin whites and won't spread out in the pan. These highest quality eggs would be best for poaching or frying.

9. True. Shell color is determined by the breed of hen. It does not affect the nutritive value of quality of an egg.

10. True. Leftover egg yolks should be covered with cold water and stored in a tightly closed container. Use within

a day or two. Extra egg whites should also be refrigerated promptly in a tightly closed container and used within a day or two. Don't cover the egg whites with water.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Wilson 4-H Club
Brown Bread
1 cup raisins
1 cup dates
2 tablespoons baking soda
1 teaspoon salt
1 3/4 to 2 cups sugar
4 cups flour
2 eggs, beaten
1 cup chopped nuts
1 teaspoon vanilla
Place raisins, butter, baking soda, and salt in large bowl. Pour boiling water over all and cool. Add sugar, flour, eggs and nuts, vanilla mix well; pour into greased coffee cans, filled half full. Bake in 350 degree oven for 1 hour.
YIELD: 15-20 servings.

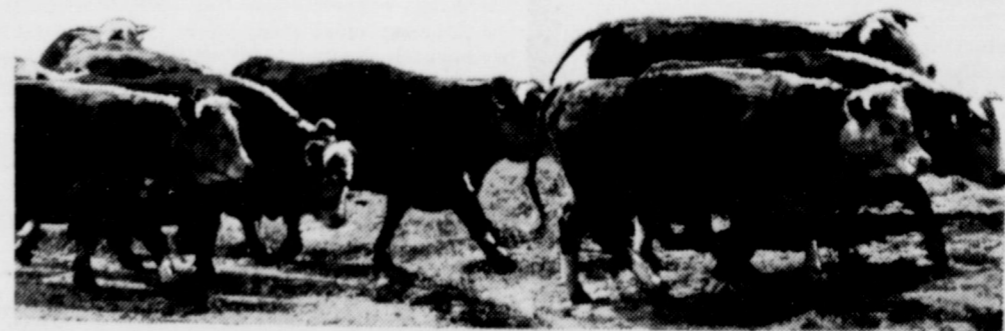

Highlights And Sidelights

From Your State Capital

As the January 31 deadline for voters to register draws near, Secretary of State Martin Dies, Jr., the state's election officer, issued a "last call" to those who are 21 or over.

Registration is at the county tax assessor-collector's office, but in many counties, deputies have been set up at convenient locations. Persons over 60 who live in towns of less than 10,000 or in rural areas must re-register every year.

Under the old law, persons past 60 in small towns and rural areas did not have to register, but it now is required every year. If they fail to register by January 31, they will not be able to vote in this year's important elections.

Dies also pointed out that young people who will become 21 during 1970 can register before their 21st birthday. Tax office will mark on their registration certificate the date on which they will become 21 and therefore eligible to vote.

Both political parties and a number of civic groups are putting on registration drives, seeking a goal of more than 4 million registered voters this year.

OIL IMPORT WORRIES--Concern over possible federal elimination of oil import quotas caused state political and industry leaders to hoist new storm warnings.

New taxes and serious economic losses are in store for Texas if the Nixon administration scraps the import quota for the tariff system, say informed officials.

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes called on the Legislative Budget Board staff to determine how much the removal of import barriers would reduce state revenue should oil prices tumble from \$3 to \$2.25 a barrel. Import problem, together with long range appropriation commitments, could create a "very, very grave" tax problem for the Legislature next year, Barnes said.

Gov. Preston Smith expressed a similar view in a press conference, terming the potential tax loss from tampering with import quotas "severe."

Democratic Senate candidate Lloyd M. Bentsen Jr. predicted that state tax revenues, 40 percent of which are derived from the petroleum industry, would "drastically decline" if the tariff system is imposed.

He noted that many school districts also draw the bulk of their local revenues for public school support from the oil and gas industry.

Alvin Hope, San Antonio independent oil man, told the Texas Railroad Commission that proposals to reduce crude oil through a sliding scale tariff collected by the U.S. Treas-

ury would be the "death knell of the domestic industry as we know it."

CAMPUS MADE--Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, had some jarring news for students.

Board voted though new regulations to curb the "alarmingly high" delinquency rate on repayments to the \$285 million Hinson-Hazlewood student loan program. Put into effect was a requirement that applications (except in extreme hardship cases) have co-signers. Colleges may also lose their eligibility to continue their students participation in the program if they don't help police delinquencies.

A careful system of interviews, followups, parental signatures and required letters of recommendation also will be invoked.

Chairman Manuel DeBusk of Dallas, the new board chairman said he thinks tuitions should be tied to a fixed percentage cost of the overall education program--which would mean a sharp increase.

DeBusk also recommended a separate board of regents for each undergraduate college and university. UT Board Chairman Frank C. Erwin Jr. replied that all boards have grave enough responsibilities to keep them busy "without any unnecessary and wasteful rivalry."

COURT SPEAK--Third Court of Civil Appeals, reversing an Austin trial court, granted a temporary injunction to block the Alcoholic Beverage Commission from enforcing its tough new private-bottle-club regulations, pending trial on merits. Court said the rule is invalid because the Commission adopted no supporting findings of fact, although proper regulations could be adopted.

Third Court of Civil Appeals also held that the cost of trading stamps cannot be deducted from sales tax payments made by merchants to the state.

State Supreme Court agreed that the driver of a city bus in Dallas was not obliged to remove from his bus an unruly passenger who later shot and killed another passenger.

A title insurance company is not liable for property damage under a "contract" that is not in the title chain, says the Supreme Court.

CUBERNATORIAL RACE--Texans once again will have a choice between Preston Smith and Paul Eggers for Governor of Texas.

Governor Smith was first to announce. On the first anniversary of his swearing in he stated that he would seek re-election.

Next day, Paul W. Eggers, Smith's Republican opponent in 1968, said he would make the

race again.

Neither of the two men has an opponent in his respective primary, as yet.

APPOINTMENTS--Governor Smith re-appointed William W. Bond of Hillsboro to the State Board of Public Welfare where he has served since 1957.

Other recent appointments include:

Rio Grande Compact Commissioner--Jesse B. Gilmer of El Paso (re-appointment).

Committee to Study Taxation of Farm, Ranch and Forest Lands--Alfred W. Negley of San Antonio, Michael F. Frost of McAllen, Sidney J. Dean of Waco, Jay Naman of Waco and Billy W. Hoffman of Jasper.

Texas Civil Judicial Council--Hugh M. Patterson of Houston Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin named Alfred W. Walker, former Dickens County attorney, his second assistant.

ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES--Workmen's compensation act covering municipal employees became effective on September 19, Attorney General Martin advised the Texas Industrial Accident Board.

In other new opinions, Martin concluded that:

Rule 10 of "rules of professional conduct of the state board of public accountancy" is in conflict with the Texas Professional Corporation Act (which allows creation of a corporation for the purpose of engaging in the practice of public accountancy within the state on a perpetual basis or for a period stated in the articles of incorporation).

Travel expense of a Texas A&M employee in presenting a research paper before certain learned societies is not reimbursable cost pursuant to agreement with the Cotton Research Committee.

TECHNICAL-VAOCATIONAL CONFERENCE--Governor's conference on technical-vocational education will be held here March 23-24.

About 1,000 are expected to attend sessions held in the Austin Municipal Auditorium and Convention Center.

Governor Smith said the state wants ideas about the types of training needed and the resources available, as well as to inform citizens of the importance of v-tech ed to the future prosperity of Texas.

AG PRODUCTS PROMOTED--State Department of Agriculture will promote the use of specific agricultural products through 1970 with its TAP (Texas Agricultural Products) program.

Fresh fruits and vegetables are being featured during January and February; red meats in March and April; watermelons, pork and eggs in May and June; and Natural fibers, rice and poultry the rest of the year. A special Easter-turkey promotion also is planned.

Fourteen thousand grocers are cooperating as are the various merchandising media.

SHORT SNORTS

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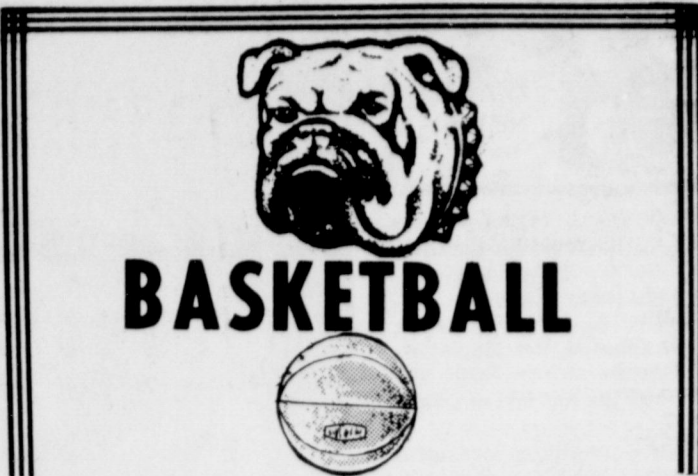

Rise In Local Pension Checks

What will the new social security legislation, liberalizing pension rates, do for residents Lynn County?

How much more will they be receiving from Washington per year? What will the average payment be, compared with what it was last year?

It is estimated that the change in retirement benefits, approved last month by Congress, will add approximately \$148,000 a year to the amount that local residents have been collecting.

The estimate is based upon the latest statistics for the county, released by the Social Security Administration. They show the number of retired and disabled workers, as well as dependent relatives, on the pension rolls, and the amounts paid them.

All of them will be aided by the legislation. Those who have been getting no more than \$660 a year, the minimum, will now get \$759. The ones who were receiving \$1,320 a year will go to \$1,518. Those who have been at the \$2,100 level will now collect \$2,415.

What is the most that is paid? Under the new schedule, a worker who has just retired at age 65 and has had maximum tax-

able earnings will now receive \$2,278 a year if single. If married and his wife is 65 or older, their total will be \$3,416.

It is expected that there will be further revision in the social security laws sometime this year. In temporarily dropping the Senate's call for a major increase in minimum payments there was a tacit understanding in Congress that this and other issues, left hanging, would be taken up in 1970.

As of the beginning of last year, pension payments in Lynn County averaged \$885 per year

per recipient, the Social Security Administration reports.

Under the new setup, they will collect approximately \$1,018 on average.

As for the total payments throughout the local area, based upon the number who were on the pension rolls at last count, they will amount to some \$1,132,000 this year, a considerable rise over the prior total of \$984,000.

Although the increase was effective as of January 1st, the checks covering the increments will not arrive until April.

Fertilizer Research Booklet Now Available At County Agents

A booklet which summarizes fertilizer research and demonstration work on the Texas High Plains over a 10-year period is now available from the county agricultural agent's office.

Title of the report is "Fertilizer Research and Demonstration Summary for the Texas High Plains, 1958-1967," according to W. B. Griffin, county agricultural agent. It was prepared by James H. Valentine, area soil chemist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, and Dr. Arthur B. Onken, assistant professor of soil and fertilizer at the Texas A & M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Lubbock.

Information on a large number of the more than 200 research tests directly pertaining to fertilizer use and response on the High Plains is contained in the booklet, points out Griffin. The publications summarized fertility research conducted with cotton, grain sor-

ghum, wheat, alfalfa and sugar beets. Also, a general description of area soils and their fertility status, fertilizer use history and a soil test explanation is included.

Griffin adds that in addition to this research information, fertilizer demonstrations are also conducted in the county each year with cooperating farmers. This information is published at the beginning of each year in a result demonstration handbook that is also available at the county agent's office.

Griffin points out that as yield potentials increase due to improved management and production practices, fertilizer use can be increased profitably. He urges all farmers and fertilizer dealers in the county to come by his office to pick up a copy of the booklet described above as it contains valuable information that may be helpful in planning a fertility program for this year's crops.

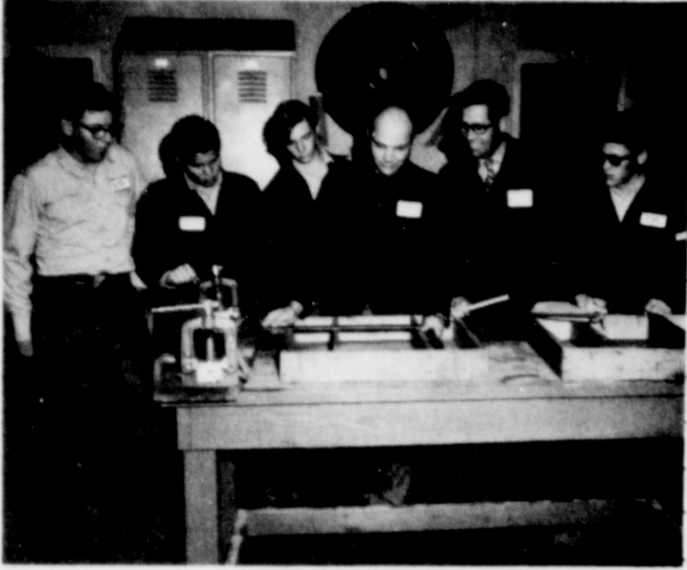

Bill Griffin, County Agent, Says.....

Parasitic nematodes are rough customers and the cause of millions of dollar losses to farmers and homeowners each year.

These microscopic animals, because of their size and the symptoms produced, often go undetected and never get the full credit for all of their damage.

Observation of plants while they are growing may give an indication that nematodes are at work; however, a sample of soil, and if possible plant samples, should be taken and submitted to a detection laboratory is now being operated by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Texas A&M University. For a small fee, the submitted sample or samples will be checked for nematodes and results of the test returned to the sender within 10 days.

Information sheets which must accompany the sample, plastic-lined soil bags for submitting samples and shipping cartons are available from his office, to discuss the testing program with any farmer or homeowner who suspects nematodes may be the cause of trouble around the farm or home. He added that he now has available a short leaflet which outlines plant symptoms under attack from nematodes and illustrations of their damage. It's free for the asking.

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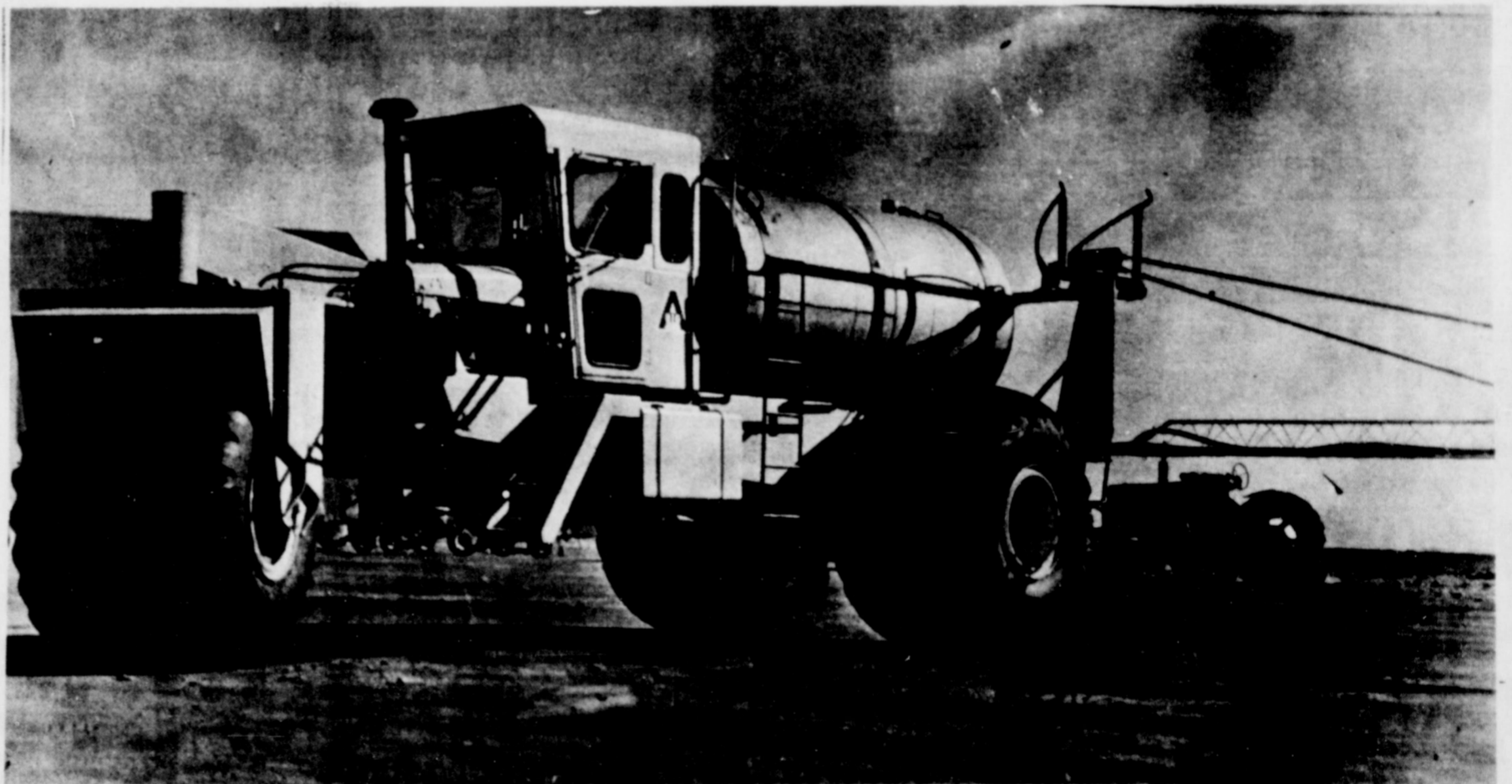
