E. L. Short Named To Committee

Speaker G. F. (Gus) Mutscher has named State Representative E. L. Short of Tahoka as one his five appointees to the House Interim Committee to investigate and study all matters pertaining to the taxation of farm, ranch and forest lands on the basis of their capability to support the raising of livestock and or to produce farm and forest crops.

"Representative Short has been a rancher and farmer in Lynn County for 24 years," Mutscher said. "I know with his background and knowledge he will be a valuable member of this committee to try to ascertain a uniform method of assessment of farm, ranch and forest lands on a fair, just and equitable basis."

Other House members to serve on the committee will be State Representatives Steve Burgess of Nacogdoches, who authored H.C.R. 8 which created this committee, Jack Blanton of Carrollton, Honore Ligarde of Laredo and Bill T. Swanson of Houston. The 15-man committee will also have five Senators and Governor's appointees, three of whom will represent the farm industry, the ranch industry and the timber indus-



OIL IMPORT WORRIES -- Concern over possible federal elimination of oil import quotas caused state political and industry leaders to hoist new storm warnings.

New taxes and serious economic losses are in store for Texas if the Nixon administration scraps the import quota for the tariff system, say informed officials.

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes called on the Legislative Budget Board staff to determine how much the removal of import barriers would reduce state revenue should oil prices tumble from \$3 to \$2.25 a barrel. Import prolem, together with long range appropriation commitments, could create a "very, very grave" tax problem for the Legislature next year, Barnes said. Gov. Preston Smith expressed a similar viewin a press conference, terming the potential tax loss from tampering with import quotas "severe."

> CAMPUS MADE -- Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, had some jarring news for students.

Board voted though new regulations to curb the "alarmingly high" delinquency rate on repayments to the \$285 million Hinson-Hazlewood student loan program. Put into effect was a requirement that applications (except in extreme hardship cases) have co-signers. Colleges may also lose their eligibility to continue their students participation in the program if they don't help police delinquencies.

A careful system of interviews, followups, parental signatures and required letters of recommendation also will be invoked.

Chairman Manuel DeBusk of Dallas, the new board chairman said he thinks tuitions should be tied to a fixed percentage cost of the overall education program -- which would mean a sharp increase.

DeBusk also recommended a separate board of regents for each undergraduate college and university. UT Board Chairman Frank C. Erwin Jr. replied that all boards have grave enough responisbilities to keep them busy "without any unnecessary and wasteful rivalry."





How To Avoid A Heart Attack ...

The world's imagination has been stirred by the recent transplantation of human hearts - the most dramatic surgical feats of the century.

But, spectacular as they are, these operations have not changed the basic situation as far as heart disease is concerned. And that situation is serious: Heart disease affects an estimated 22 million Americans and causes more than 1 million deaths each year.

Can this tragic loss be curtailed? It can, say the medical experts. They tell you how and why, in the following discussion. The questions were asked of a group of California doctors by the San Francisco Examiner. If you have further questions, you should consult your own doctor. The questions here are the kind any patient might ask his physician.

O. What causes a heart attack?

A. A heart attack is not primarily due to an abnormality in the heart muscle itself, but rather is the result of disease in the coronary arteries which supply the heart muscle with blood. Like other arteries in the body, they are subject to deterioration, in what is called atherosclerosis or "hardening of the arteries.

This occurs when deposits of fatty material build up in the inner lining of the arterial wall, gradually narrowing the channel through which the blood flows, much as accumulated rust will clog a water pipe

Q. What is a heart attack?

A. When the narrowed arterial channel becomes blocked by a blood clot (thrombus) the blood supply to a portion of the heart muscle is cut off. This muscle (myocardium) is strong and active, constantly contracts and relaxes, and demands an ample supply of blood and the oxygen it carries. The portion now deprived of its supply is severely damaged by the lack of oxygen. Most of the damaged muscle, known as an infarct, will die, and scar tissue will form. The edges of the damaged muscle may be supplied by surrounding arteries, and may recover.

The term "heart attack" is the layman's way of describing this process. The medical terms for heart attack are coronary thrombosis, coronary occlusion, or myocardial infarction.

Q. What causes atherosclerosis?

A. It tends to be most common in the middle years, although it can appear earlier. Heredity may be a contributing factor. An increase in the lipid (fat) or cholesterol content of the blood, cigarette smoking, and stress are

Q. What are the symptoms of a heart attack?

A. The most common symptom is severe pain and a sensation of pressure on the front of the chest, sometimes spreading to the arms or throat. The focal point is under the sternum (breastbone).

The pain is usually accompanied by profuse sweating and sometimes by intense shortness of breath, nausea and vomiting. Occasionally the patient may be unconscious. Almost any of these symptoms alone might indicate a different disorder, but whenever they are present in combination, a doctor should be called promptly.

Q. How is a heart attack treated?

A. The primary aim is to promote healing in the damaged tissue, which becomes a weak section in the muscle wall. As healing takes place, the injured area is replaced by scar tissue, which gradually toughens until the heart is able to resume normal activity. That's why rest is the single most important element in the treatment of a heart attack.

The doctor may give morphine to relieve pain in the early days of the attack, and oxygen may be administered.


Q. What is the outlook for the person with a heart attack?

A. For most people it's good. Heart attacks are fatal in only a minority of cases, and those who survive the first few hours or days have an increasingly favorable prognosis. The length of the healing process depends on the size of the artery involved, severity of the attack, and presence or absence of complications.

The average patient should expect to stay in the hospital several weeks. Activity is resumed gradually. The diet may be restricted, either to lose weight, restrict intake of cholesterol and or salt, or for all these purposes. Most patients can anticipate a return to full time work and normal family life, though they may be advised to be moderate in all activities.

Q. If I have had one heart attack, does that mean I will certainly have others

A. Not necessarily. Second attacks do occur, but are not predictable with certainty in the individual patient. However, the cardiac patient who faithfully follows his doctors'

instructions does strengthen his chances of avoiding a recurrence.

Q. Is angina the same thing as a heart

A. No, although in both the heart muscle is not getting an adequate blood supply. Angina (technically called angina pectoris or coronary insufficiency) is a pain in the chest, due to a temporary lack of adequate oxygen by a portion of the heart muscle. Unlike a heart attack, the blood is not cut off completely and the heart muscle is not damaged.

However, a narrowed coronary artery, though ordinarily adequate, may prove incapable of supplying enough blood to the heart when the patient is physically

. Thus the pain characteristically comes on with exercise and is relieved by standing still or sitting. It can also be brought on by excitement. Some persons with angina may have a heart attack, but many people have mild angina for years and never have an attack.

Q. Can anything be done to relieve

A. Yes, it can be relieved promptly by nitroglycerine tablets, which dilate the coronary arteries.

Patients are usually advised to take this before engaging in vigorous physical activity. Some angina sufferers must curtail their physical activity, stopping short of the type of exertion which produces pain. More frequently, they are advised to take a moderate course with respect to exercise, resting when necessary and avoiding anything excessively strenuous.

Q. What is heart failure?

A. This describes what happens when the heart's blood-pumping efficiency is reduced. It is not a total failure, but a weakness of heart function, and it usually develops because of a disease such as high blood pressure or a leaking heart valve.

Blood pressure in the veins goes up because the heart cannot pump away all the blood they carry to it. Because the circulatory system is below par, some fluid in the blood may seep out and accumulate in surrounding tissues, causing edema or swelling - a common symptom of heart failure. The fluid frequently collects in the legs and ankles, but it may also go to the lungs, causing uncomfortable and sometimes alarming shortness of breath.

Q. Can heart failure be relieved?

A. Yes - although the most important aspect of treatment is to find and treat the underlying cause. Patients are usually given digitalis, which has a seemingly magic power to increase the strength of the heart's contractions. They may be given a diuretic to stimulate kidney action and thus reduce edema. Patients are urged to slow down their pace of living, to ease the strain on carrying its load. A low-salt diet is

Q. Can diet prevent a heart attack?

A. There is no guarantee that any specific course of action will prevent a heart attack. However many doctors, noting the association of heart attacks with a high blood cholesterol level, believe a reduction in cholesterol is a wise precaution.

This means to avoid animal fats, butter, cream, and other high cholesterol foods such as eggs, shellfish, liver, kidney, and brains. Fish and poultry contain less saturated fat than meat. The animal fats are replaced by polyunsaturated fats - such as liquid vegetable oils and low-saturated margarines - which lower blood cholesterol.

There is also a medicine, clofibrate, which tends to lower the blood cholesterol. In any case, it's wise to control the weight, since overweight

persons are particularly prone to heart

Q. Is smoking bad for the heart?

A. Yes, in the opinion of most doctors. In one significant study, the health of more than 4,000 men - all free of coronary artery disease at the outset - was followed for 6 years. The death rate for cigarette smokers was more than 3 times that of non-smokers, and the primary cause was heart disease. Smoking increases the turbulence of blood flow and thus speeds arterial damage.

Q. Does exercise prevent a heart

A. There is growing evidence to suggest that the ability of the heart to meet emergencies is strengthened by calling upon it regularly. When the muscles are exercised, the rate and force of heart action is increased, and, in effect, the heart is exercised as well.

Although regular exercise does not guarantee a heart attack will not occur, heart disease is particularly prevalent among men who lead sedentary lives. It is important that exercise be regular (rather than in great bursts of weekend activity) and that it be vigorous enough to make demands on the muscles and the circulatory system...





Bill Griffin, County Agent, Says.....

Parasitic nematodes are rough customers and the cause of millions of dollar losses to farmers and homeowners each year.

Theses microscopic animals, because of their size and the symptoms produced, often go undetected and never get the full credit for all of their dam-

Observation of plants while they are growing may give an indication that nematodes are at work; however, a sample of soil, and if possible plant samples, should be taken and subis now being operated by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Texas A&M University. For a small fee, the submitted sample or samples will be checked for nematodes and results of the test returned to the sender within 10 days.

Information sheets which must accompany the sample, plasticlined soil bags for submitting samples and shipping cartons are available from his office. to discuss the testing program with any farmer or homeowner who suspects nematodes may be the cause of trouble around the farm or home. He added that he now has available a short leaflet which outlines plant symptoms under attack from nematodes and illustrations of their damage. It's free for he asking.


