Dexter in "Congregationalism as Seen in Its Literature" (1880) as from a book in the British museum, believed by the experts of that institution to have belonged to him. This book is a pamphlet, "a Persyvasion to the English Recusants," by John Dove, D. D., printed in 1602. It is presumably by the same hand as the lower signature, which is upon the title page of Sir Edwin Sandys' "Relation of the State of Religion" (London, 1605.) which belonged to the late Charles Deane of Cambridge. It was supposed that John Robinson once owned the treatise. Of the new authentic signature the London Graphic

The portrait of Governor Edward "The Leyden deed signed by John Winslow is the only authentic likeness. Robinson, of whose autograph Dr. Eekhof is assured, refers to a debt acknowledged by Robinson, Thomas Brewer, and William Jepson-the latter being also well-known members of the Pilgrim community. Brewer possessed money and position, and, jointly with another, set up a printing press in Leyden. Jepson is described as a carpenter and merchant. AGAINST INTRIGUE

Executive Voices Hope for International Peace and a Better Understanding Among Nations-Says United States Has No Unworthy Designs.

Washington, Nov. 14.—America took eadership Saturday in the first movement in history for the elimination of international menaces that threaten civilization with future war. Reduced to simple terms, the United

States seeks: First--To prevent competition among the great powers in the construction of war machinery-naval, land and air. Second-To remove sources of international friction in the Pacific ocean zone that may lead to future con-

Recognizing the general belief that the Far East is the new danger spot, America has sought the co-operation of eight other powers with vital interests in the Orient to allay the danger of a "next world war."

This is generally regarded as the greatest humanitarian crusade in the history of mankind. But it is also a practical scheme for material relief from the overwhelming burden of taxation and debt.



In brief, China wants guarantees for territorial integrity and political and admin trative independence; she proposes the open door for all in all parts of the country; she wants all spheres of influence relinquished; she wants no treaties made affecting her without being consulted about them.



The gentle south wind deceived them, so they loosed from Crete, only to be soon overtaken by the tempestuous wind, called Euroclydon. They did everything possible to save the ship. They took up the boat which was towed behind; they bound great cables around the ship to strengthen it for the storm; they lightened the ship by bringing down from the masts and rigging everything that was superfluous; and finally, the cargo and tackling of the ship itself were thrown overboard. All this seemed to be of no avail, so that all hope of being saved was removed. It seemed that wicked men and material forces were combined to prevent the great apostle from reaching Rome. However, this is only apparent, for these very experiences were overruled by God to bring good cheer and salvation to many on the way. We should remember that tempestuous winds, as well as the soft breezes. await God's faithful ones. The presence of storms does not prove that we are going the wrong way.
