Annual Farmer-Businessman Banquet Scheduled Feb. 20

Tahoka's annual farmer-businessman banquet, sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce, will be held on Tuesday night, February 20, at 7:30 o'clock in the school cafeteria.

An outstanding speaker has been secured for the occasion. He is Dr. Earle Williams, a Dallas oral surgeon and friend of Dr. K. R. Durham, who has a nation-wide reputation as a popular after-dinner speaker who mixes humor and philosophy into his address.

A native Texan, he has long been prominent in Dallas professional and civic life, served as a colonel in the U. S. Army, and as a public speaker has appeared in 45 of 50 states.

The banquet meeting is open to the general public, especially to farmers and

and their wives as well as the business people. Tickets will go on sale this weekend and may be obtained from any C. of C. director, or from Secretary Maurice Small or President Warren Embree.

Conservation farmer of the year and essay winners will also be honored at the affair.

New Amendments Will Increase VA Payments

During 1967, according to V. F. Jones, County Judge, Congress passed and amended some laws with respect to benefits payable to Veterans and widows of veterans of World War I and II, Korea, and Vietnam.

Some of the benefits payable to veterans and widows will be automatically increased, while other benefits and increased benefit payments will not be made unless applied for. These increased benefits apply particularly to veterans who have some disability and to certain infirm widows of war veterans.

Mr. Sid Lowery of Lubbock, having many years of experience in veteran claim work, will be in the County Courtroom in the Lynn County courthouse on February 16 and again the 23rd, to give assistance to persons needing information of veteran and widow benefits or having problems on claim benefits.

No charge is being made for the service.

Tahoka Soldier Receives Wounds

Jerry Ray Isham of Tahoka, now serving with the Army artillery in Vietnam, was wounded in action February 3.

Isham's father, Mr. C. A. Isham of Tahoka received word last weekend that his son had been wounded when a Viet Cong booby trap exploded. He was hospitalized for treatment of a wound in the arm and abdomen, but the wounds were not thought to be serious.

Tahoka Implement To Sponsor Program, Movies and Lunch

Farming Frontiers '68, a new program devoted to the business of farming, will be held here Saturday, February 10, it was announced today.

The program, featuring movie pictures about the electronic revolution in agriculture, new crop varieties, agricultural research discoveries and new livestock developments, will be sponsored by Tahoka Implement, Inc.

In addition to the program featuring money-making ideas for farmers, other movies will feature TV Newscaster Chet Huntley introducing new farm

equipment that will be available for 1968 and a film about Japan, a rapidly growing customer for North American farm exports.

Jack Jaquess said the program will present a number of ideas to help farmers improve the efficiency of their operations. He said a tractor Roll Gard with safety canopy and seat belts and other prizes will be awarded at the meeting.

The program will be held at Tahoka Implement, Inc. on Saturday, February 10 at 12:00 noon.

Presently, Ratzlaff is employed as manager of Blanco Offset Printing, Floydada which prints newspapers from Floydada, Lockney, Tahoka, Crosbyton, Ralls, Slaton and Wayland Baptist College. He has also leased the Crosbyton Review's commercial shop.

Ratzlaff came to Floydada from Western Oklahoma, having been in the commercial and newspaper printing fields for 15 years. His experience includes both letter press and offset printing.

Scout Units Are Rechartered In Tuesday Meeting

Adult Scouters of the County Scout Committee, headed by E. B. Gaither, Tahoka, met Tuesday morning to conduct the business of rechartering the five Tahoka units, consisting of two Cub Packs, two Scout Troops and one Explorer Post.

Other business at hand was the appointment of L. A. Forsythe as representative of the Quannah Parker District Council Exposition Committee, to plan and promote the 1968 Scouting Exposition scheduled April 6 at Texas Tech's coliseum in Lubbock.

Jack Jaquess, chairman of the finance drive reported the total well over the quota.

Approximately 100 boys are active in Cubbing, Scouting and Exploring, which is 25 per cent of the boy potential. The percentage is equal to that of the national average.

Present adult leaders of local units are Rudy Johnson, Scout Master of Troop 782 and Charlie Jaquess, Scout Master of Troop 721. Post Advisor is M. L. McGehee. Scout Master of Troop 750 is Erwin Hatchet and Tommy Graves is Cub Master of Pack 750. The Webelos program, the last year of Cubbing is headed by Wes Owens.

Tax Collections Near Completion

Lynn County tax collections for 1967 are 93% complete, according to George McCracken, Tax Assessor-Collector. At the same period in 1966, the collection was 96% complete.

Total collections to date are \$42,018.75 with no January discount. At the end of December, 1967 the collection was 77% complete with \$23,534.64.

Sales Tax Approved by 2-1 Vote In Special Election

Tahoka voters, in a special election February 3, voted 21 to approve issuance of a one per cent Sales and Use Tax, to go into effect July 1, 1968.

City officials consider the vote a good cross-section of representation with 263 ballots being cast. Residents marked 183 ballots in favor of the tax with 79 persons voting against.

The new tax will enable city officials to plan needed projects to bring Tahoka up to a first class city and aid continued growth and progress.

Several projects are underway including the Canadian River Water Project, and updating the inadequate sewer plant, which must be brought up to standards set by the State Health Department.

Other uses of the tax will be to maintain and improve city streets and continue land fill operations at the city dump.

The sales tax will apply to items now taxed under the present sales tax and the same exemptions will apply. Tax will be collected by the comptroller, retaining 2 per cent of the total collections for administration costs and return the rest to the city.

'State of Tahoka' Address Presented At Rotary Club

Local Rotarians were given first hand information about community affairs and city business, in a program last week, presented by Meldon Leslie, Mayor of Tahoka.

The 1967 city budget was \$196,019 and according to Leslie the city operated within the budget.

Several improvements are being planned and now un-

derway for Tahoka. A sanitary land fill has been started at the dump grounds and the Canadian River Water Project has been completed. The city will be ready to begin taking water in April. A 150,000 gallon storage tank has been placed and pump station erected.

This project has a fixed payment of approximately \$12,700 plus a \$12,000 operational, maintenance and treatment cost.

Mayor Leslie gave a report of the bypass right-of-way at a cost of \$50,000 bond issue of which there is one payment left.

He closed his presentation with facts concerning the special I Sales Tax election which was held February 3.

Frank Greathouse Announces For Commissioner

Frank Greathouse, Jr. announces that he is a candidate for Commissioner of Precinct I, subject to the May 4 Democratic Primary election.

Greathouse has lived here since he was three years of age, attended the local schools, and following graduation from high school he was in the grocery business. During World War II, he served with the U. S. Marines. On returning from service, he entered the water well drilling business and has engaged in this line of work ever since.

He and his wife, Lois, have two children, both married.

Although he has served on Tahoka School Board, Frank says he has never before sought a public office.

"If elected," he says, "I expect to give my full time to the duties of the office. I feel my experience as a businessman qualify me to help handle the affairs of the county and precinct in a sound and judicious manner."

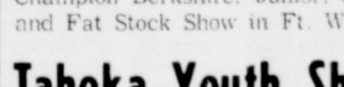

To qualify for nomination to the teams the students had to be classified as seniors, maintain much better than average grades and he must have been selected to represent his school on an all-district team.

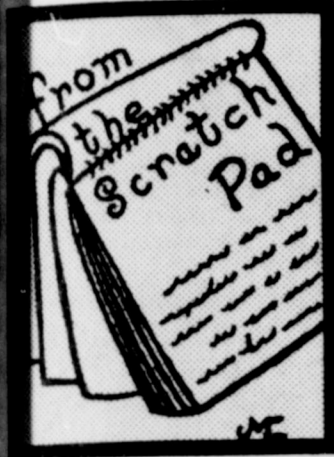
Both students were selected to the A football team. Thomas is listed as a running back and has a 93.0 grade

average. Tyler was selected on the defensive unit as a deep back and has a 95.0 grade average.

Possible Record For Vote Sign-up

County voter registration reached a possible record for 1967, with 3,957 names listed as qualified voters of Lynn County. It is reported that not more than 20-25 voids and duplications will be noted on the final tally.

Registration records from 1958-1967 show that the next high year was 1959 with 3,061 voters registered. For the same period, 1964 had the least number registered with 1,542 names on the rolls. 1958 and 1962 each recorded just over 1,800.

Instructions were given in safety, selecting fuses and proper wire size, adequate and proper wire sizes, practical applications to save time and labor.

Installations were made by class members. Part of the time was spent in grounding equipment, operating cost of equipment, making splices and connections, motor protection 120 volt and 240 volt circuits, 2 way, 3 way, and 4 way switches, methods of wire wiring, and labor saving tools.

1968 Vehicle Plates Available In County

1968 Texas vehicle license plates went on sale February 1 and will continue until April 1, 1968. Deadline for displaying the new tags is midnight, April 1.

Tags are on sale at the following places, for your convenience: Lynn County Court House, Tahoka, Farmer's Co-op Gin, New Home, Moore Insurance Agency, O'Donnell and the Wilson Farmer's Co-op Gin in Wilson.

According to George McCracken, Lynn County Tax Assessor-Collector, state law requires that you bring your 1967 registration receipts and title when applying for the 1968 tags.

Four items are necessary this year to acquire your new plates. You must have your title license receipt, correct address and proper Zip Code.

Registration fees for passenger cars are \$12.30, \$22.30 and \$30.30 according to weight class. The minimum fee for licensing any vehicle is \$5.30.

McCracken stresses the importance of purchasing 1968 vehicle tags early to avoid delay during the last minute rush.
