Too many times, special weeks are set aside for trivial things, leaving the important ones to fall by the wayside unnoticed.

It was apparent Tuesday morning that some of our citizens fail to recognize an emergency vehicle, and the laws governing the same. Four Pennies Required To Spend Dollar Bill

The beginning of an additional 1 percent state sales tax, recently passed by the legislature, came about Wednesday, October 2, making 4 percent the amount to be collected on the dollar, by local merchants.

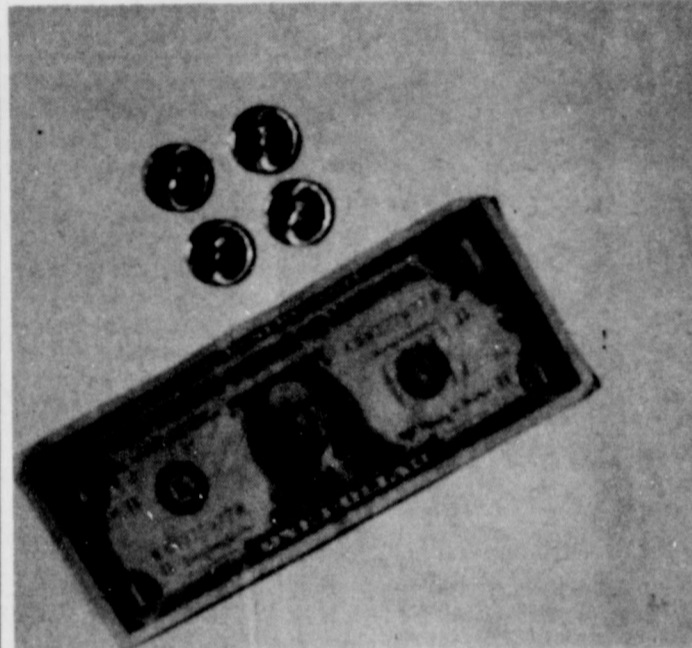
Cities, like Tahoka who have adopted a one percent city sales tax are now faced with a four percent levy, instead of the three being used through last week.

The four percent sales tax starts at a one cent tax at 13

cents, through 37 cents. Two cents will be collected up and including 62 cents with three cents stopping at 87 cents. The four cent tax will be collected from .88 to 1.12 with another penny added from 1.13 to 1.37.

As before, the city and state taxes will cover those items taxable under the original 2 percent tax measure.

All merchants should have the new tax charts available as the tax is added at various percentage points.

Registration Opens For County Voters

Voter Registration for the year 1969 started October 1 in Lynn County according to George McCracken, county tax assessor-collector.

Everyone must register all persons 21 years of age or over may register at the county tax office located in

the courthouse. Deadline for registration is January 31, 1969. Application blanks for registration by mail will also be available at the courthouse. Other plans to be carried out during the voter registration period will be announced at a later date.

Persons recently moving into the county may register, but will not become eligible to vote in county elections until residing in the county six months.

Current 1968 Voter Registration Certificates must be held in order to vote in the General Election this November and will not expire until February 28, 1969.

Weevil Hot Spot Found In County

Cotton farmers in Lynn County are urged to take steps which will aid in controlling boll weevils along the edge of the caprock. The weevils have infested numerous fields in the county, says W. B. Griffin, county agricultural agent, and seem to be moving westward and northward. Overall in Lynn County the infestation is light, however a Hot Spot with high population is located one mile east and one mile north of Redwine.

About one-half pound of methyl parathion or one-fourth pound of guthion per acre does an effective job of controlling the weevils. These materials, however, should not be added to chlorate desiccants or defoliants. Producers should take it upon themselves to use this insecticide automatically if they're planning to defoliate or desiccate their cotton.

big step in avoiding infestation of next year's crop. The green bolls can be burned or plowed under or destroyed by any means available to the farmer.

Producers can play a major role in curbing this present buildup of the destructive pest, points out Griffin. Much of the infested area will be sprayed within the next two weeks as part of the High Plains Diapause Boll Weevil Control Program, but individual spraying in conjunction with the harvesting operation is important for effective control of the weevils.

A number of farmers will soon be getting ready to harvest their crop and this is where they can really assist in effective control of the weevils, points out Griffin. One step to take is to add methyl parathion or guthion to the defoliant or desiccant being used on the crop. Another "clincher" is to destroy all green bolls left in the field or dumped on the turnrow during and after harvest. Immediately after harvest, stalks should also be shredded and plowed under.

Destroying the green bolls and shredding the stalks removes the weevils' food supply which is necessary for overwintering. This can be a

Bulldogs Ruffle Owls' Feathers Friday Night

Tahoka Bulldogs tucked another one under the belt Friday night, knocking the Hale Center Owls off the perch, with a final of 26-8. The local team stands now at two wins and one loss, facing the Plains Cowboys here Friday night.

Neither team scored in the first period, with Hale Center crossing the stripes on a pass play for the touchdown. A conversion pass jumped the total to 8 for the Owls.

Hale Center led the Bulldogs 8-0 at the end of the first half. During the third period, the Bulldogs marched 76 yards downfield with Martin Warren making the last five for the TD. Charlie Brown lateraled to Robert Montemayor for the two extra, tying the game at 8-8.

After nine plays and 33 yards, Larry Arnold dropped in from the nine-foot line to score another six for the

Bulldogs. The conversion failed, with the score at the beginning of the fourth period being 14-8.

Early in the fourth, Charlie Brown intercepted an Owl pass, at the Tahoka 48-yard stripe, bringing the pigskin down to the 25. After six plays, Brown, on a keeper, went in from three yards for the score. Jim McCord's extra point kick failed with the scoreboard showing 20-8.

The Bulldogs set up a 60-yard march in the fourth, with the TD being set up by Larry Durham on a 45-yard run. Charlie Brown, on a keeper, slid the last four yards for the final touchdown. After a bad pass fumble, McCord attempted the conversion run. Final score was 26-0.

Tahoka piled up 20 first downs against the Owl's 8. Net yards rushing for Tahoka was 340 against 25 for Hale

Center. Hale Center dominated the passing with 11 complete for 96 yards, the Bulldogs none.

Other statistics were: Incomplete passes, Tahoka, 1; Hale Center, 10. Interceptions: 0 for Tahoka and 3 for the Owls; Punt average, Bulldogs, 5 for 20 and Hale Center, 7 for 35; Fumbles, Tahoka 2, Hale Center 1.

Thirteen penalties were assessed during the game, with Tahoka tallying 7 for 55 yards and Hale Center, 6 for 50 yards.

Larry Arnold traveled 99 yards on 26 carries with Martin Warren carrying 18 times for 92 yards. Larry Durham had 7 for 73; Robert Montemayor, 7 for 50 yards. Charlie Brown, 12 for 27 and Greg Thomas took a kick for a 33 yard run-back.

The Bulldogs will meet the Plains Cowboys here tomorrow night.

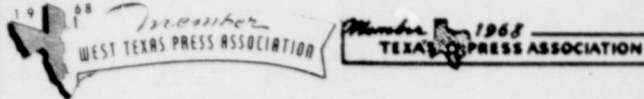

Several persons attended the annual Soil Conservation and Crop Demonstration Field tour held September 19. Tour members visited several farm plants in the area.

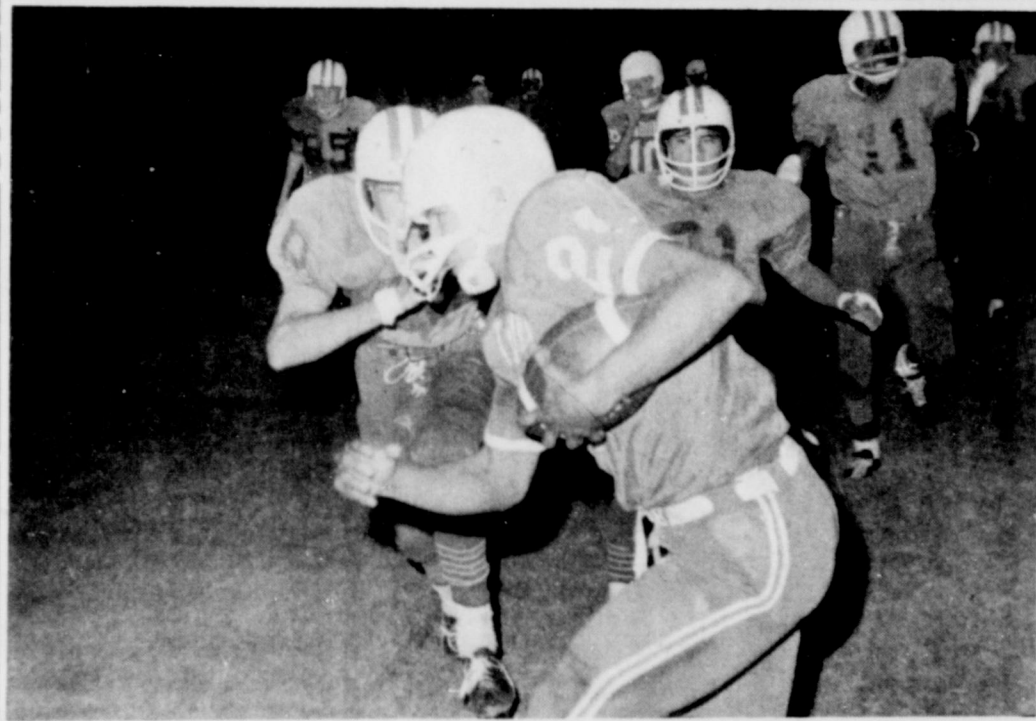
Purpose of the tour was to

Fire Prevention Is Theme For Week Of October 6-12

Fire Chief Pat Patterson and Howard Moore, president of the Lynn County Farm Bureau, urge Lynn County Citizens to pay special heed to the observance of National Fire Prevention Week, October 6-12.

"We ask that everyone develop good fire safety habits including care with matches and smoking, good housekeeping to rid the home of rubbish and proper use of electrical fuses, appliances and extension cords," the chief said. He added, "Fires killed more than 12,200 persons and cost more than \$1.7 billion in the U. S. last year."

Mr. Moore said the fall and winter months are the most vulnerable times of the year for rural fires. "When fire occurs on farm or rural property, damage is three to

six times greater than in the average city fire," the Farm Bureau president added.

Farm Bureau has two programs designed to help curtail fire losses. The county Farm Bureau, in cooperation with the Texas Farm Bureau sponsors the attendance of local volunteer firemen to the annual Firemen's Training School each summer in College Station. More than 600 firemen have attended under Farm Bureau sponsorship during the past six years. Attending from Lynn County this summer were Jerry Ford and Leroy Mensch.

The state and local Farm Bureaus also pay \$75 to fire departments for fighting rural fires on Farm Bureau insured property.

In addition to these programs, county Farm Bureaus

sponsor a graphic fire prevention demonstration before schools, clubs and other groups. The TFB Safety Department during the past school year, almost 20,000 fire extinguishers have been sold. Farm Bureau members are continuing program of fire protection.

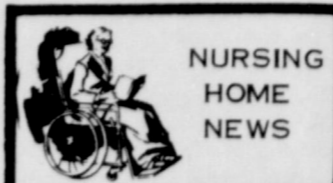

Linda Cribbs, CHD Agent, Says.....

Versatile beef is a favorite choice of homemakers. Although each beef cut can vary in quality, depending upon the carcass from which it came, all are nutritious and can provide good eating if properly prepared. The secret lies in suiting the cooking method to the grade and cut of meat selected.

The grade most widely sold at retail is USDA Choice. Retailers have found customers like this grade best.

Regardless of quality grade, some cuts of meat are more tender than others. Cuts from the active muscles such as the shoulder, flank or round will be less tender than the cuts from the less used muscles along the back of the animal such as the loin and rib sections. The more tender cuts which are in greatest demand make up only a small portion of the beef carcass.

Dry heat methods are used to cook the tender cuts; whereas, less tender cuts should be prepared by moist heat methods, suggests Miss Cribbs. Dry heat methods include broiling, roasting and grilling. Pot-roasting and braising are examples of moist heat cookery.

Salt the roast before, after or during the cooking process. It makes no difference when it's added because it doesn't penetrate the roast much more than one-fourth of an inch.

However, when broiling meats like steaks or chops, season after each side is browned. Salt tends to draw moisture out of the meat during this cooking process and may retard the browning that's so desirable.

Meat spoils, especially ground beef, readily unless it is stored properly. Unless it is frozen, it should be used within 24 hours. Steaks and roasts may be kept two or three days in the refrigerator. Leftover cooked meat may be held in the refrigerator for four or five days without spoilage.

If fresh meat is to be kept more than three days, it should be frozen. Meat stored in the freezing compartment of a refrigerator may be kept up to 30 days. Beef stored in a food freezer may be kept 6-12 months. Frozen cooked meat should be used within two or three months. Do not refreeze meat after it has been thawed.

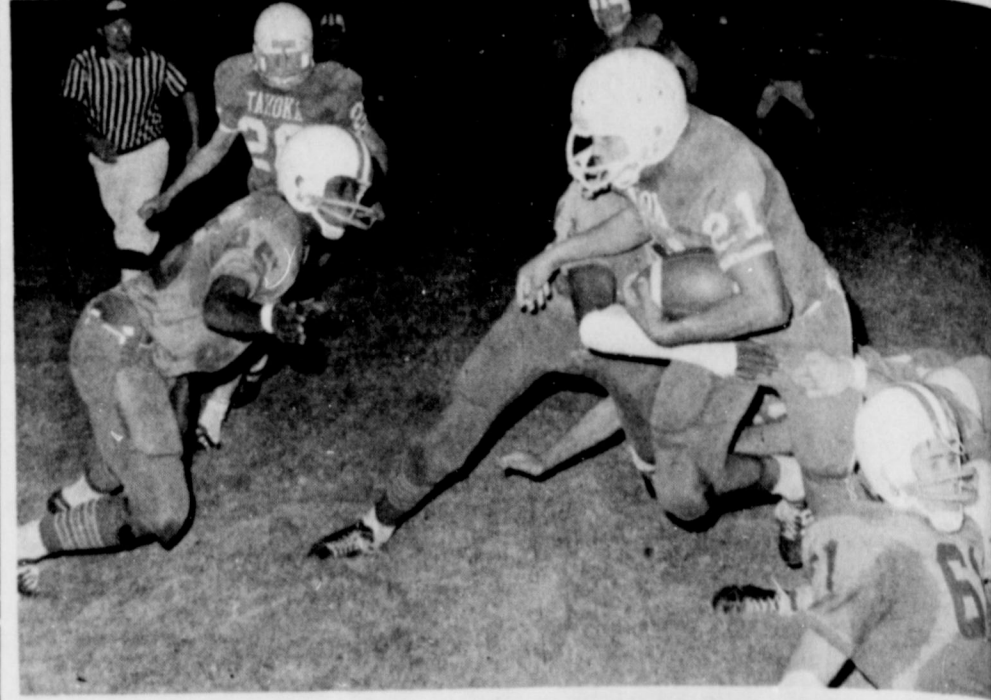

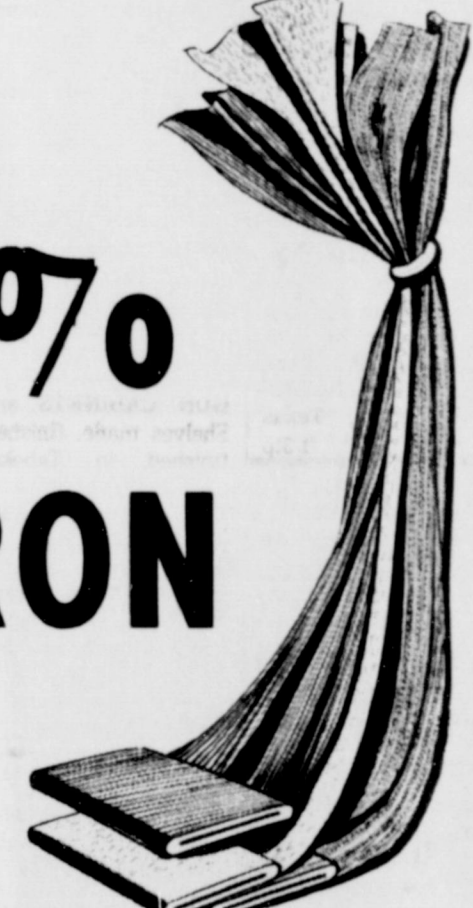

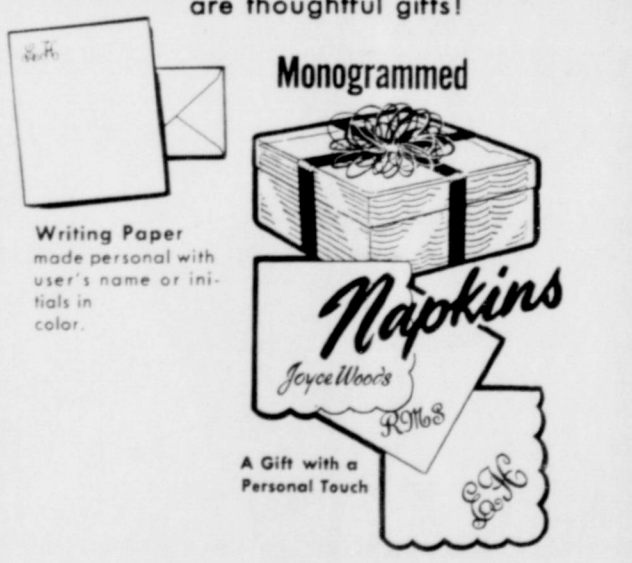

Farm Home Administration Loan Services Aid Over Four Million More than four million rural people, a record number, benefited from Farmers Home Administration loan services during fiscal year 1968, Billy H. Stewart, County Supervisor, announced today. Funds totaling \$1,359,100,000 were advanced through the agency and the repayment of principal and interest totaled \$721.7 million. Stewart stated that the financial and technical support that the Farmers Home Administration provides rural areas is a major factor in strengthening the rural economy and checking the flow of rural people to urban areas. Benefiting from the agency's services in fiscal 1968 in Lynn and Garza Counties included 218 farm and non-farm families with loans totaling \$1,640,550,000. Some 38 family farmers received \$421,560 to aid them in making farm operating adjustments and financing annual operating costs. There were 6 farm families receiving \$230,500 to purchase or enlarge their family size farms. Another 108 farmers were helped by \$837,600 in Emergency loans to restore their operation to a normal level after being hard hit by drought, frost, and early freezes. Approximately 19 farm and non-farm families benefited from \$374,280 in Rural Housing loans that included housing made for senior citizens.

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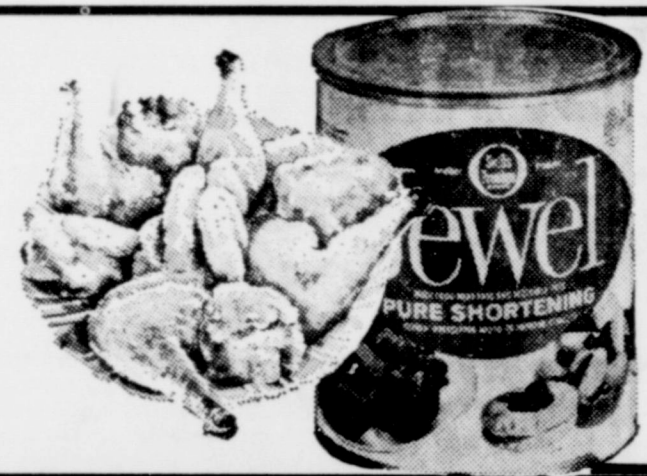

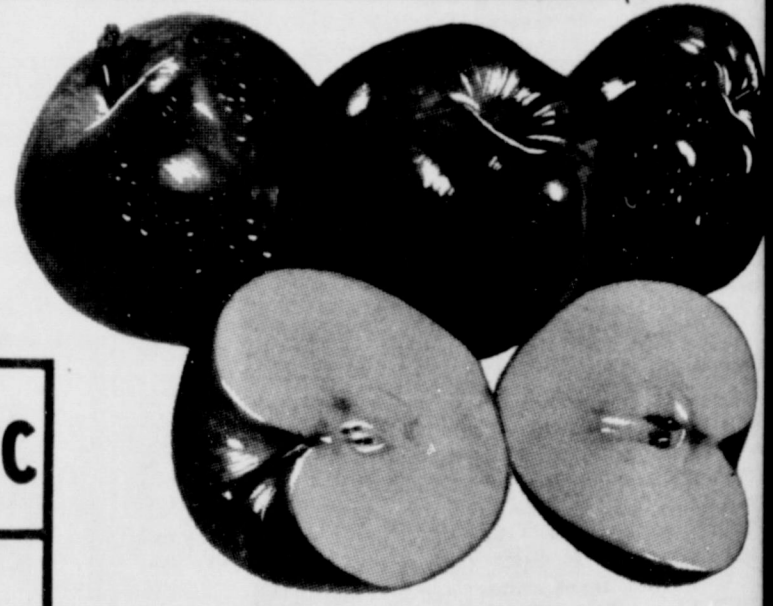
