Land Men Busy A BIG TIME New Club Starts FARMERS!

Last week the local land men decided that the time had come to get together and get to work on ways and means of getting Lynn County better known to the world and thereby create more business for themselves. No line of business can make a creditable showing for itself in the commercial world unless it is well organized along lines of mutual co-operation instead of being divided into numerous factions, each wasting its energies in struggling for supremacy against the others to the detriment of all.

Already the organization has begun to do things and some of the results are already apparent in the organization Tuesday of a Commercial Club with some forty odd members, the employment of a paid secretary and the inauguration of a campaign of advertising, which it is predicted will be of immeasurable value to Lynn County and Tahoka by causing the tide of immigration to set this way with ever-increasing momentum. Another good thing accomplished by the organization was the adoption of a uniform land listing contract blank for the use of all its members. The use of this blank should save much time, misunderstanding and possible litigation. How nice it is, when a long hard rush of work comes, to realize that everything is in shape to keep up with it. And we confidently believe that before the year is out our land firms will not worry so much as to who is going to catch the next prospector, as to when they will get some time to rest a bit. The whole world is beginning to find out the truth about Lynn County and the homeseekers will soon begin pouring in here by the drove.

Maxwell Auto Wins Contest.

TWO CARS RUN AGAINST TIME IN ROUND TRIP FROM AMARILLO TO PLAINVIEW.

On last Tuesday afternoon the speed and durability contest between the Maxwell car and the Franklin in a race from Amarillo to Plainview and return, a distance of 170 miles, was entered into by Edgar Byers of Amarillo, who is general agent for the Maxwell car, and J. J. Eillard of Plainview, who is the general agent for the Franklin.

The towns along the line through which the cars were to pass were kept posted as to the time of leaving Amarillo, when they passed each station and their arrival at Plainview and the same information was given out on the return trip until they arrived safely at Amarillo. All along the line much interest was manifested in the contest, and in Canyon City many people were out to see the cars as they passed through each way. The roof of the court house as well as the roofs of many of the brick buildings were filled with spectators and along the streets were numerous shouting people. Sheriff Sanford and City Marshall Jowell were thoughtful and kept the streets through this town cleared of people and vehicles in order to prevent blockade and accidents.

There was a prize of \$1,000 for the round trip in the quickest time and you may be sure that each driver tried earnestly to secure the advantages in the race. The Maxwell made the trip in 23 minutes and 10 seconds less than the Franklin and thereby won the race.

The Maxwell car was gone from Amarillo 4 hours and 43 minutes and the time used by this car in the return from Plainview, 85 miles, was two hours and 6 minutes, the best previous time having been 2 hours and 30 minutes. When taking into consideration the fact that these cars had to go through two good sized towns on each trip, open and shut four gates each way it is conclusive that these people were certainly "going some."

There was only one delay during the trip, the Maxwell having had eleven minutes out for the tire trouble between Amarillo and Canyon on the down trip. This eleven minutes were counted out in the running time there having been a Maxwell timer in the Franklin car and likewise a Franklin timer in the Maxwell car. This was done in order that there might be no question about fair play and that the correct time out for tire troubles might be ascertained.

Left Amarillo at 1:20 p. m. Passed Canyon City at 1:59; Happy at 2:40, Tulia at 3:17 and arrived at Plainview at 4:06. Stopped 2 minutes. On the return the car passed Tulia at 4:56, Happy at 5:26, Canyon City at 6:03 and arrived at destination at 6:29.—Canyon City News.

State Commissioner of Agriculture Kone to Speak in Tahoka Next Tuesday Week--A.&H.A. at the Bat. Meet Saturday at Two At Court House.

Late last Friday we got news that this well known man would be in Tahoka on April 20, Tuesday afternoon at two o'clock for the purpose of addressing the farmers and business men of Lynn County. In the necessarily brief mention we made of the matter in last week's issue, we stated that Mr. Kone would be accompanied by Homer D. Wade, the talented and widely-known secretary of Stamford's commercial club, on their way to the meeting of the Commercial Club Secretaries and Newspaper Men of the Plains at Lubbock on the 21st.

Some time ago the able and efficient Secretary of the Lynn County Agricultural and Horticultural Association, Hon. John P. Marrs, wrote to Mr. Kone, asking him to send a man out here to address the Association, and now that Mr. Kone himself has arranged to come, The News, as authorized official organ of the Association, feels it to be its plain duty to remind the members of the Association and the farmers that Mr. Kone, by virtue of his high office and the above invitation, is their guest, and it is up to them to come out and hear him and to assist in his entertainment. He is a man of deep study and of life-long experience in his chosen line of work in the interest of scientific farming and horticultural methods. He is an orator of no mean ability and no one will regret taking the time to come out to hear him.

Now let every member of the A. & H. A. and every farmer who can be in town Saturday, come over to the court house promptly at two o'clock by railroad time (same being 45 minutes faster than sun time) and hold a short meeting so as to appoint a committee to wait on the newly-organized Commercial Club, which meets an hour later, for the purpose of devising ways and means to the end that both bodies may co-operate in the important work of properly entertaining our distinguished visitors. Only once before have we had a State officer of equal rank with Mr. Kone as a visitor in Tahoka. Let every farmer and every business man in Lynn county who can spare the time, come out Saturday and prepare to extend a royal welcome to these great men who will come here and entertain us and then go away and tell the rest of the world what sort of a town we have here, what kind of people live in it, and the character of the soil and climate which caused both the town and the people to be here.

Tahoka has long needed a modern, efficient, active commercial club. As a matter of fact, we organized a commercial club a year ago and it has never been disbanded, but as it had gone into winter quarters and failed to come out with the flowers, something had to be done to give Tahoka a better standing in the way of united effort for building a town here and filling up the county with more farmers of the same kind we now have.

Tuesday afternoon a meeting was called together at the land office of Brown & Alford to get the club re-organized on a solid financial basis. After a great deal of speech making, suggestion and various preliminaries, the meeting adjourned to meet at the court house the following afternoon, where much the same procedure was gone through with, but with more definite results. Organization was perfected, officers chosen and funds to the amount of about \$150 raised to start to work with. A regular full-time secretary was employed at a salary of \$100 per month. After this the meeting adjourned to meet in the same room Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock p. m. Let every citizen of Tahoka be present.

Stands by News. Program Of Last Week.

R. R. Dick was a caller at the News office Wednesday morning. He is farming east of town and as he is putting in a great deal of new land this year he is in the cut stove-wood business until crop season starts. Mr. Dick stated that he thoroughly endorsed the position of The News on the pool all issue and had us send to his outside friends a number of copies of the paper containing Mr. Wise's letter on the subject. Legislative Letter.

Austin, Texas, April 7th. During the regular session of the 31st Legislature every bill passed cost the tax payers an average of \$400 for each law but the special session promises to raise the price of the commodity considerably. Not due, however, to a scarcity of material for they have 200 bills on hand but that the legislative hopper can find no grist in the grain. Up to the present time the special session has passed one bill, an insignificant amendment to an amendment of the Robertson Insurance Law passed by the regular session and the cost of the special session up to this time is \$30,000.

The veto ax fell heavily on the bills passed by the regular session, fourteen bills being vetoed by the Governor. This action led to the report that the Governor had joined the Commercial Secretaries Association and was working for "Fewer Laws and Better Laws" and a resolution was introduced in the House complimenting the Governor on his progressive attitude.

The house spent the week discussing the Bank Guarantee Deposit Law and receiving the blows from the "big stick." The Farmer's Union took a strong hand in this legislation placing the vote of the farmers of Texas behind the Love bill. The house passed the bill on a vote of 90 to 17, absent 11, not voting 15. The Senate refused to be influenced by the Farmer's Union or to be intimidated by the administration and voted down the Love bill, substituting the Senter-Hume Bill by a vote of 14 to 10, absent and paired 6. The Love Bill forces any one bank to guarantee the deposits of all other banks and the Senter-Hume Bill requires each bank to guarantee its own deposits. A free conference between the House and Senate my result in a compromise bill or in no legislation.

YOU ARE HEREBY COMMANDED to summon Millie B. Farris, whose place of residence is unknown, by making publication of this Citation once in each week for four successive weeks previous to the return day hereof, in some newspaper published in your County, if there be a newspaper published therein, but if not, then in any newspaper published in the 64th Judicial District; but if there be no newspaper published in said Judicial District, then in a newspaper published in the nearest District to said 64th Judicial District, to appear at the next regular term of the District Court of Lynn County, to be holden at the Court House thereof, in Tahoka, on the fifth Monday in May A. D. 1909, the same being the 31st day of May A. D. 1909, then and there to answer a petition filed in said Court on the 15th day of March A. D. 1909 in a suit, numbered on the docket of said Court No. 48 wherein W. J. Farris is Plaintiff, and Millie B. Farris is Defendant, and said petition alleging that Plaintiff and Defendant were married on the 8th day of August A. D. 1906, in Nolan County, Texas, that Plaintiff met Defendant in the early part of the year 1906, that she, defendant was going by the name of Sells, and represented herself to be the widow of one, John Sells, that Defendant was receiving company, as a single and marriagable woman.

That Defendant represented herself to be single, and that her former husband was dead, and that he believed her statement, to be true and that he believed her to be the surviving widow of John Sells, deceased, and as such widow married her, while in fact and truth, she had just merely absented herself from her former husband.
Plaintiff shows the court, that they lived together and cohabited as husband and wife, but a very short time. They located in Lynn County, about the third day after their marriage, and lived together there about three weeks when plaintiff says he ascertained that the woman that he married was not a widow but had a living husband, and as soon as he learned these facts, he took Defendant to the nearest Rail Road point and paid her expenses to Tennessee.

Plaintiff shows to the Court that his marriage to Defendant was illegal and invalid, that he had no means of learning these facts of Defendant's marriage except by her statement.

Premises considered, Plaintiff asks that Defendant be cited, by publication, to answer this petition, that the marriage be declared null and void and held for naught, and the bonds of matrimony be dissolved, that he have his judgement for costs and for such other and further relief as may be, in law and equity entitled.

LARD ECONOMY.

Considerable is saved in the household expenses by buying leaf lard and suet. Take two pounds of leaf lard and one of suet, cut in small piece and place in a bread pan in the oven to try out. It needs no further attention, unless the oven is too hot, until done, when the lard should be strained into the lard pail. The cracklings can be used in making cornbread. As leaf lard is cheaper than rendered lard and suet costs less, the difference in your bill in a year will surprise you.
