

Tree Fumigating Screen.

Farming a century ago consisted principally of planting the seed, keep, ing out the weeds and waiting for the harvest, with little or no conception, Adjustable tent to inclose the shrub, of the chemical processes through which the soil induced the plant growth and, consequently, no knowledge of how the plant growth could be forced by the addition to the soil of the chemical constituents which were lacking.
