ANNUAL Harvest Thanksgiving Service and dinner will be observed Sunday at First United Methodist Church, with Rev. Kenneth Wyatt of Tullia, well-known as evangelist, pastor, and artist, as the speaker.

Rev. Wyatt was pastor of the First Methodist Church, Paducah for five years during 1963 to 1968, and had formerly served as pastor at Chillicothe. Since that time he has served as an appointed Conference Evangelist. Currently he is one of two evangelists appointed by the Northwest Texas Conference of United Methodist Churches.

In addition to his evangelistic work, Rev. Wyatt is much in demand as an after dinner speaker for civic clubs.

In recent years he has become famous for his ability as painter, sculptor, draftsman and poet, and his art is accepted by the strongest of professional art critics. He is a charter member and first president of the Texas Cowboy Artists Association.

The annual Harvest Day service is used by the United Methodist Church as a day for ingathering of offerings to its budget. "A goal of \$3,250 has been set to meet our outreach obligations," said Rev. Lloyd Hearn, pastor. "This should be a great day in our church. Let us join in prayer for God to bless and lead us, and that our expression of our gratitude may bless many others around the world."

Gonzales, senior tailback, rushed for 229 yards for an average of about 15 yards a carry in the Matadors' 48-16 rout of Whiteface. Gonzales also scored 4 touchdowns and set up another with an excellent punt return.

The line was also recognized by the Globe News for their outstanding performance of blocking for the backs.

Gonzales joins quarterback Steve Stevens and fullback Joe Campbell as Matadors to receive the award. Campbell won the award for his performance against Nazareth and Stevens for his against Chillicothe.

He was employed by the Texas Highway Department here for 25 years, retiring 15 years ago. He was a member of the First United Methodist Church of Matador and was also a member of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows.

The Matadors were paced last week by the running of Joe Campbell and Castulo Gonzales. Campbell rushed for 193 yards and Gonzales added 129 more. In all the Matadors gained 387 yards on the ground.

The Matadors struck early in the Sudan game. Taking the opening kickoff, they scored three plays later on a 28 yard run by Joe Campbell and Motley County led 6-0.

In the first quarter Will Palmeyer recovered a Hornet fumble. The next play Joe Campbell rambled 62 yards for a touchdown and now the Matadors led 12-0.

Castulo Gonzales intercepted a Sudan pass. Two plays later Campbell was off and running again, this time 68 yards for the score to up the lead to 18-0.

The Hornets narrowed the score in the second period with a touchdown and PAT to 18-7. But it was short lived as a fullback pass from Campbell to Frank Welling was good for 6 points and Motley County led at halftime 24-7.

In the third quarter Sudan again scored and at the end of the third quarter the score stood at 24-13.

But the Matadors put the game with two scores in the final stanza. The first was on a 23 yard run by quarterback Steve Stevens for 6. Castulo Gonzales added the extras to up the score to 32-13.

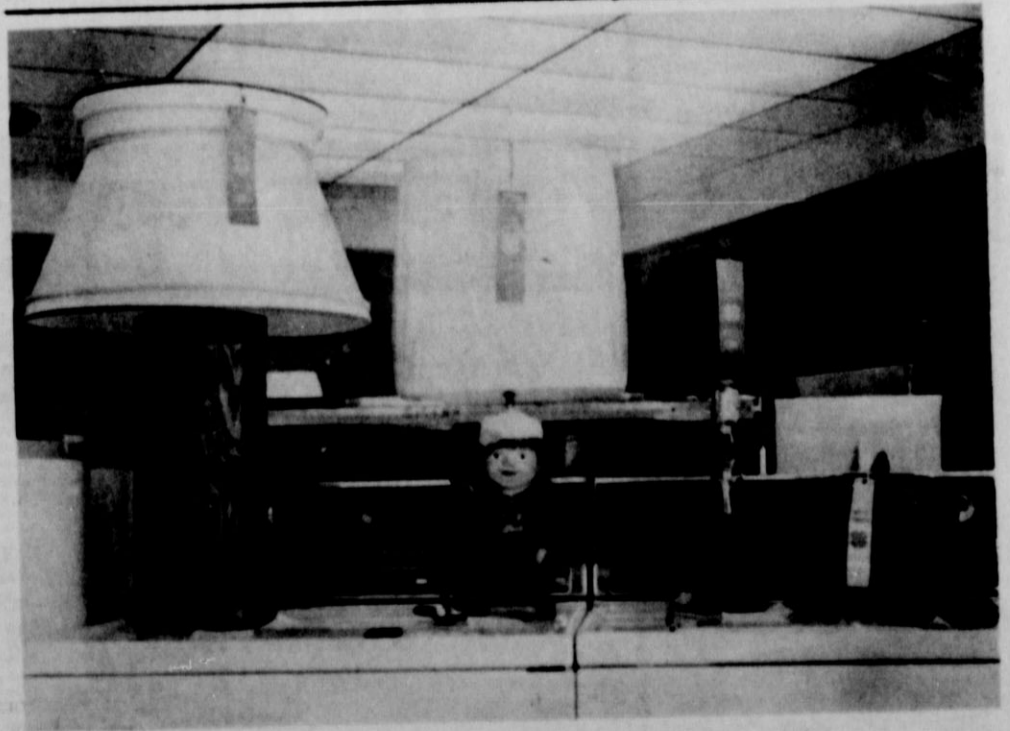
The final Motley score came on a 35 yard Stevens pass to Campbell and the score was 38-13.

Sudan added two touchdowns in the closing minutes, but it was not enough as the Matadors won it 38-27.

The Matadors now own a 9-1 season record. They went undefeated in zone play with a 6-0 mark. Sundown, this week's opponents, also own a 9-1 season mark, but the Matadors have the longest winning streak on the Panhandle with 9 consecutive wins.

Public Health Aid To Serve County

Operating as a "central umbrella agency," the Lubbock headquarters of Public Health Region 2 has opened its office at 3411 Knoxville Ave. to serve 32 West Texas counties with Texas State Department of Health programs.

Dr. John P. Board Jr., regional director of the new office, said the region stretches south to the Mexican border and north to Bailey, Hale, Floyd, and Motley counties.

"Our office is part of a decentralization of the state health office in Austin," Dr. Board said. "All health programs will be directed through our office for 21 West Texas counties currently not being served by city or county health departments."

"The health needs of West Texas are completely different from the health needs in East Texas. That is one reason for decentralization of the Austin headquarters -- to find out what those needs are," Dr. Board said.

Board said the budget for the first year of operation of the Lubbock regional office is \$2 million.

"Much of our effort will be directed to improving health services to children. Infant mortality in this region is a major problem," Board continued.

Other programs the regional office will be heading are general disease prevention, health aspects of water supply and sewage disposal, tuberculosis, hospital certification, immunization and physical exams for children who are welfare recipients.

Board said those programs, if done at all, were headed through the Austin office prior to the opening of the Lubbock headquarters.

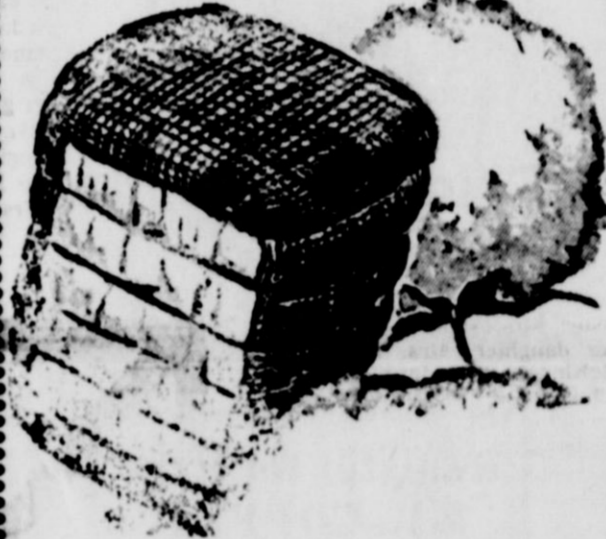

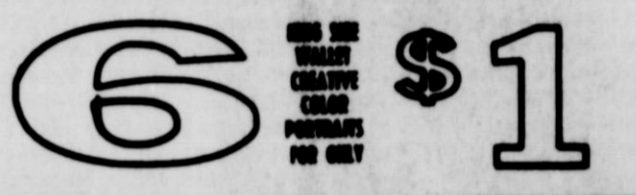

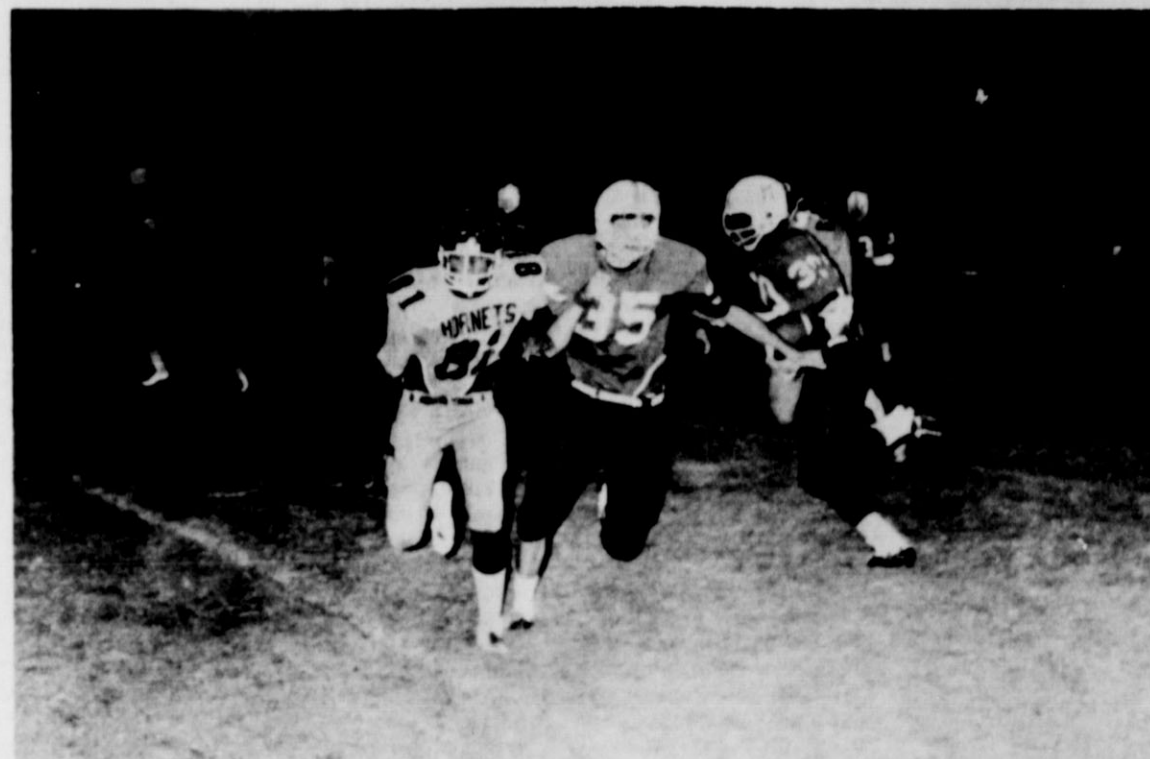
