Traweek Hospital Sold For Clinic

A deal was closed Saturday in which the Motley County Hospital District purchased Traweek Hospital from Dr. Albert Traweek. It was announced this week by J. M. (Sonny) Russell, president of the hospital district.

The facility, built by the late Dr. A. C. Traweek Sr., will be remodeled into offices to be used as a clinic for practicing physicians. First occupants will be Dr. Thuy Danh Do and Dr. Y Hoang Do, who have been residents of Matador since last November.

The two physicians will go to Houston to take the State Medical examinations on June 13 for their Texas licenses permitting them to begin their practice here.

Negotiations to acquire the hospital building for clinical purposes have been underway for several months. Dr. Traweek will retain his office in the building as long as he continues his practice here, according to terms of the transaction.

Graduation exercises for the Eighth Grade are scheduled for 10 a.m. Monday, May 24.

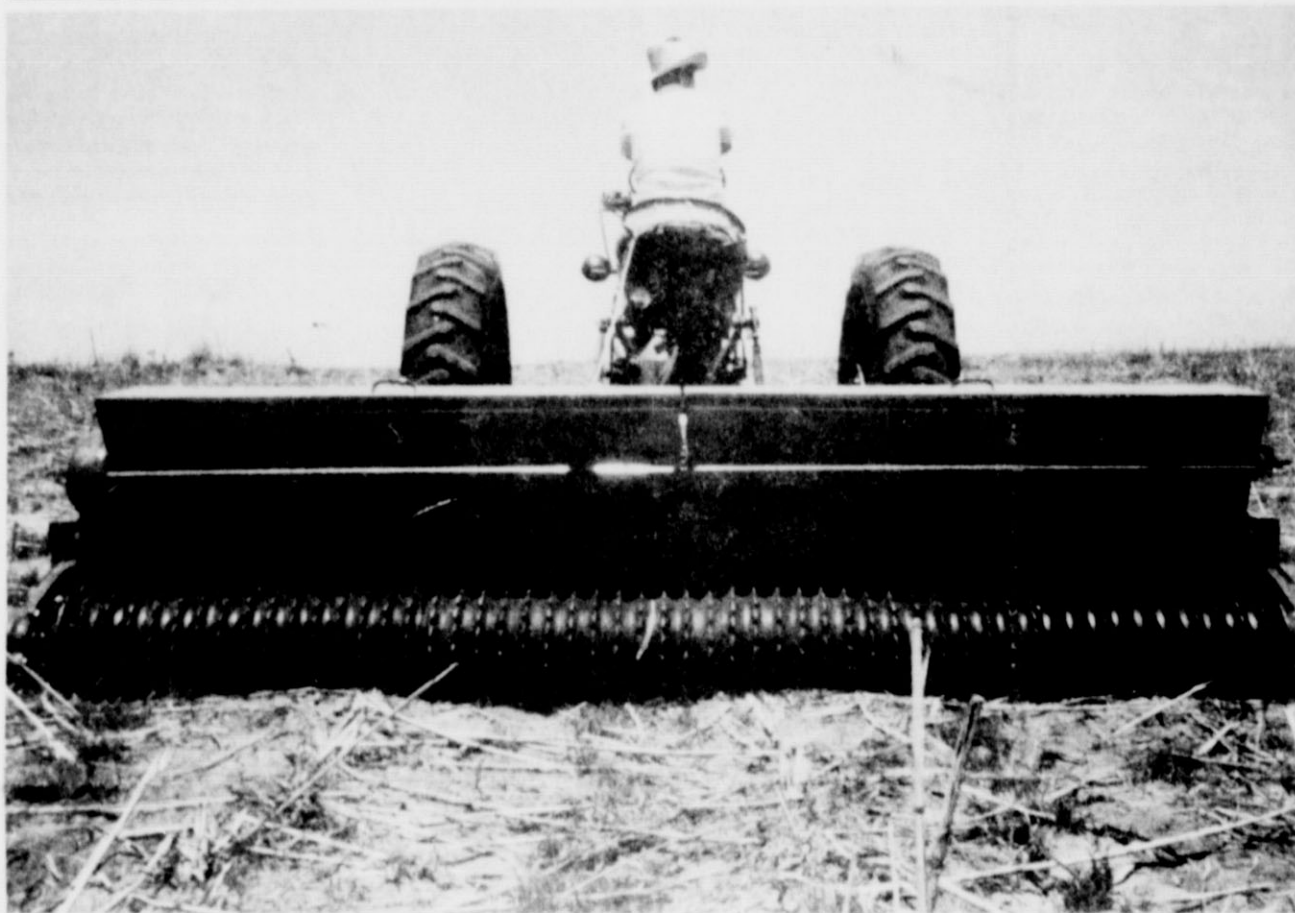

Years With Bob Wills Is Saga Of Western Music

Al and Bob Wills first met at radio station KFJZ in Fort Worth where Al was staff pianist. Bob, along with a guitarist and a vocalist, walked into the studio and asked for an audition.

"What kind of music do you play?" Al Asked.

"Different," said Wills. Bob Wills was born into a poor family and was picking cotton by the time he was five, where he worked side by side with black people, listening to them hum their blues tunes. This undoubtedly influenced the future musician, for when he played his first fiddle at the age of nine, a unique blend of country western and swing emerged.

So Wills' music was different. Al had never heard anything like it. "I'll have to admit, I thought at first they were making fun of some kind of comedy song. But then, they went into other songs and I realized they were playing with feeling. Straight from the heart."

The Wills Fiddle Band, as it was then called, received so much fan mail the post office called the station and told them to send someone down there to pick it up. They did and hired Bob for fifteen dollars a week - and his star-studded career began.

AFTER WILLS LEFT the Fort Worth station, Al lost track of him for a few years. Al had been picking up some extra money during his tenure as schoolteacher by playing the piano on Saturday nights. He looked up during one of these sessions to see Bob Wills walking through the door. Wills had on an expensive western suit.

a little black tie with a large diamond stickpin, and a big, white western hat. He walked directly to Al and said, "Hi, Mr. Stricklin."

"Are you Bob Wills?" Al could hardly believe it was the same young man who had played for the audition at the station three years earlier. Wills said he was, and when their conversation ended, Wills had hired Al as his lead pianist.

Thirty-six years later Al stood on the grounds of the Eastwood Baptist Church in Tulsa.

The King of Western Swing was dead. Al thought it fitting that Bob's last rites would be at a Baptist Church, and in Tulsa, where his parents are buried.

Yarbrough's Name Confuses Lawyers

AUSTIN, Tex. - It was Don Yarbrough - not Don Barrow - who won the Democratic nomination for the Texas Supreme Court Saturday in an upset that had many lawyers talking to themselves.

If the names are confusing, think how Texas voters must have felt.

It was Yarbrough, a young Houston lawyer, not Yarbrough, the three-time gubernatorial candidate who defeated Chief Justice Charles Barrow of the San Antonio Court of Civil Appeals.

The final unofficial tally was Yarbrough 757,254 and Barrow 489,542, and Yarbrough has no Republican opponent in November.

Even a lawyer who follows state government closely was unaware on election day that the supreme court nominee was not the one-time "Billy Graham of Texas politics" - the Yarbrough who almost defeated John Connally in his first race for governor.

Yarbrough, a liberal who was a fiery orator, lost to Preston Smith in 1968 for governor.

Yarbrough built up the name identification that is often necessary in statewide races, and Yarbrough probably benefited from it.

Yarbrough, 35, also ran a statewide race, losing to Jesse James - who may have the best name identification of all - in a 1974 race for state treasurer, Yarbrough got 45 per cent of the votes in that race.

The magnitude of the upset over Barrow, 55, grows in checking the campaign reports that the candidates filed with the secretary of state's office.

that arch-political foes Ralph Yarbrough and Allan Shivers - at opposite poles of Texas politics - each gave Barrow \$100.

Calvert of the Texas Supreme Court, \$50; former Justice Ruel Walker, whose resignation led to the vacancy on the court, \$100; former State Bar president, Jim Bowmer of Temple, \$137; criminal defense lawyer Percy Foreman of Houston, \$100; Hall Timanus, state director of the George Wallace presidential campaign in Texas, \$100; and the 90 partners of the Houston law firm of Fulbright-Jaworski, \$2,500 - one of several contributions by law firms throughout the state.

Yarbrough said he would not accept a penny from a lawyer for his campaign because, "It would be a conflict of interest."

Yarbrough, a graduate of the University of Texas Law School, served five years as general counsel for the Texas Water Development Board and for two years as general counsel for the Campus Crusade for Christ International.
