While abroad I paid tribute to some of the world's greatest men. I visited the shrines of Shakespeare, Racine, Moliere, Victor Hugo, Goethe, Dante, Virgil, Raphael, Michelangelo et al. Today I stood before another shrine, that of Rudolph Valentino.

According to his contemporaries, who possibly shorter lived, his greatness has meant probably more than all those others.

Affixed to the marble slab were two bronze vases which today were filled with pink carnations and maidenhair fern. And it was a married woman who had placed them there. Scarcely fifty feet away rested her still-born child. The crypt bore the name of Rudolph Valentino Cuppola. On the anniversary of Valentino's death-day, August 23rd, this Mrs. Cuppola brings a lighted candle and sets it in a window-recess nearby. Then she gets down upon her knees and murmurs a prayer for the repose of his soul.

This interesting information was vouchsafed me by the care-taker of this Mausoleum, Mr. Roger Peterson. Mr. Peterson said, "There are many women from different parts of the world who come here to pay their respects. Some there are who fervently kiss the marble slab and tearfully implore him to call them to him 'overthere'. Then there are those who 'snitch' flowers from his crypt to take them home to be pressed and who knows, perhaps kissed. Women are like that sometimes."

Only recently Mr. Peterson received a letter from a lady from Austin, requesting a rose from his tomb.

Rudolph Valentino lies all that is mortal of June Mathis, the brilliant scenario-writer, who gave Valentino the screen world. I enjoyed an acquaintance with Miss Mathis and ever have I beheld such a fine vision of her. Her eyes vibrated with a vision of better, finer (Continued on Page 3)

HOME ACCOMMODATION IN TRAILER MADE BY ROARING SPRINGS MAN

All the comforts of home are incorporated in the camping trailer which Clyde Brown is completing at the Higginbotham-Bartlett Lumber Yard. With built-in ice box and running water on tap above the kitchen sink, the trailer resembles a modern tourist cabin on wheels.

With full accommodations for four people including ample sleeping quarters, the camping trailer folds into a compact case which is easily pulled behind any common passenger automobile.

The two wide berths which unfold quickly when a camp-site is decided, are screened-in and afford weather protection. Two long lockers on either side are suitable for seats as well as storage space. In the front end, when the portable camp house is set up, is a regular built-in cabinet, with space for cooking utensils and food compartment. Running water for the small sink is provided by a storage tank and pressure achieved by compressed air.

FARMERS PROMPTED BY RAINFALL AND WARMTH ARE PLANTING COTTON

In order to avail themselves of what moisture the soil possesses and also to take advantage of the unusual warm weather for this time of year, many farmers are planting cotton. Several reports have been made of farmers who already have cotton up to a good stand.

Some old cotton men predict that the early planting will result in loss of seed and time while others believe that in case of favorable weather the early planters will realize a better crop and have great advantage in control of weeds.

Many farmers have found listing necessary to stop weed growth and with the low price for which cotton seed is selling, believe the small additional expense well worth the chance of being successful in getting their crop started early.

WHEAT SELLS FOR 81c ON FT. WORTH MARKET

Wheat sales on the Ft. Worth market Monday at 81 cents per bushel—some at slightly above that figure—emphasize the gains in commodity prices since the low points of the depression.

At this price 35 car loads of wheat reaching the Ft. Worth market for Monday's selling brought a total of about \$45,000 which was paid Texas-Oklahoma grain shippers.

At the low prices ruling not many months ago the same amount of wheat would have brought approximately \$24,000, the increase in price bringing shippers of the grain about \$21,000 above what they would have received some months ago.

First State Bank Of County Seat City Takes Over Local Institution

DEPOSITS SUBJECT TO DEMAND FULL PAYMENT

All Restrictions Removed As Consolidation Becomes Effective

Arrangements were completed Wednesday afternoon whereby the First State Bank of Matador assumed full control of the First State Bank of Roaring Springs in a merger to become effective immediately. Plans were started at once to move the local bank to Matador.

A. B. Echols, President of the Matador bank, renowned cattleman and financier of this section of the Panhandle, during a visit here late Wednesday said, "We are prepared to pay all depositors in full on demand of their money, at the bank in Matador. We hope to retain the confidence and goodwill of the people served by the Roaring Springs bank and render a service worthy of a continuation of their business, however, any depositor who is uneasy regarding his money will find it ready for withdrawal at the windows of our bank tomorrow morning." Mr. Echols visited numerous local business establishments in a personal assurance of dependable banking facilities and complete cooperation with customers of the Roaring Springs bank in the new arrangement.

Local business men who were stockholders and directors of the local bank, altho regretting the loss resulting from removal of the institution from Roaring Springs, expressed much satisfaction that not one cent will be lost by depositors.

The First State Bank of Roaring Springs was established in 1914. After the banking holiday it was placed under restrictions allowing withdrawal of only 5 per cent of deposits made before March 1.

The merger resulted from the Federal policy demanding greater safety for depositors.

S. W. Weatherall, who has been an official of the Roaring Springs bank for a number of years, has assumed duties as an addition to the personnel of the Matador bank.

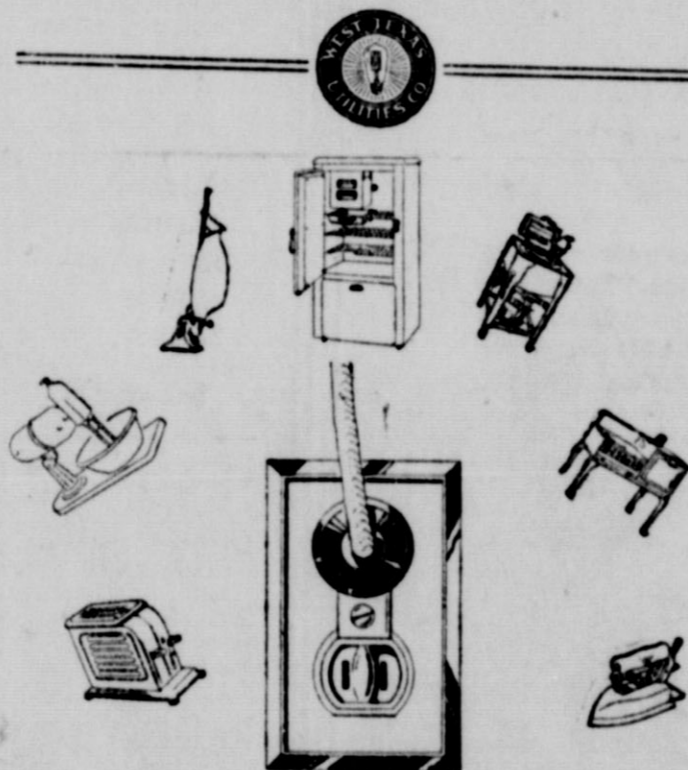
