In his characterization of the cowboy, the average narrator neglects to emphasize a predominant quality. The humor and repartee to be heard around a chuck-wagon will vie with the finest type of comedy to be found on the stage or screen. True, a great amount of it could not be used without revision but it is new and as original as the situation that prompts it. If you study the typical cowboy's face with inlaid wrinkles on a background of sun and wind-cured leather, inset with devilish twinkling eyes, the reservoir of many smiles and much laughter is evident. In accepting one of the world's most difficult jobs, the cowboy rarely takes himself seriously. His jokes ranging from the subtle to the exceedingly rough, seldom fall short of the mark.

A healthy body and a healthy mind denied many forms of diversion, demand an outlet. The result of many years spent in following cow-ouths is plainly noticeable in the humor of old-time cowboys whose cattle activities are possibly limited to the care of a milk cow and a saddle horse.

She will never know that on the night I heard of her marriage I decided to become a traveling salesman and to start becoming worldly I smoked my first cigar. The result that followed left me no time in which to tend a broken heart.

Casualties of the American Revolution, War of 1812, the Mexican War, the Civil War, the Spanish-American and World Wars totaled nearly 300,000. Auto accident fatalities over the past 15 years numbered 325,000, Van Duzer declared.

TWO THEFTS HERE; ONE AT MATADOR RELATED

Matador Wholesale Gas Station Loses Gas And Containers

A Chevrolet coupe belonging to W. C. King, local Magnolia agent, was stolen from in front of his home in the west part of town Friday night. Sheriff J. E. Skinner began an immediate search, and phoned a description of the car to various neighboring officers. A telephone message from the Collingsworth county sheriff Monday morning notified Mr. King that the car had been found abandoned on the highway near Wellington.

On the same night the automobile was stolen, thieves entered the E. B. Gober Blacksmith Shop and removed a sledge hammer and three hand punches. Also the Conoco wholesale storage tanks in Matador were robbed of gasoline and several gas and oil containers removed.

Mr. King, returning to Roaring Springs Monday night with his automobile, stated that three Conoco gas containers were returned to Matador agency. They were found in his automobile, thus establishing the supposition that the three thefts were committed by the same parties.

Three men were seen leaving Mr. King's car on the Wellington Highway early Friday morning. A broken battery support had caused a short in the ignition system. No arrests have been made.

Hollywood

Although there are other places that held Easter Sun-rise services, by far the largest contingent went to the Hollywood Bowl. This is a vast natural amphitheatre nestling in the foot-hills of Hollywood. There is seating capacity for thirty-thousand people, even this at times proves inadequate for the crowds that attend.

The worshippers started to arrive shortly after midnight. They carried pillows, robes, blankets in fact everything that ministered to their creature comforts. Over-head the blue-black sky was powdered with star-light—the very air seemed to be surcharged with the tenseness of anticipation—the coming of

a great miracle. All through the night a slowly moving dark column of people could be seen winding their way through Pepper Tree Lane—up the inclines—the grey patches of vacant seats were darkened as the people filled the amphitheatre.

Suddenly a javelin of sunshine shot through the heavens and illuminated the large cross, golden trumpets on which the sunshine blazed and danced, were blown—reverberating through the silent hills—reverberating in the hearts of the auditors—many children, hundreds of them clothed in white sang Easter songs—followed by adults singing solo and ensemble. After the last notes had died away a great silence followed—the hush of it gripped your heart—then a single voice cut its way clean through it—the sermon had begun. A few more songs and the services had come to a close.

Recently I saw the "Sign of the Cross." I expected a great deal and, as is usual in such cases, I was disappointed. The things that were stressed in the picture—gory cruelty bordering on sadism, and lascivious wantonness bordering on the pornographic—almost completely crushed the beautiful religious feeling which you were led to expect.

Through this mire, love sought in vain to rear its head. Frederic Marsh, a very fine actor gave an earnest dramatic intensity to his role and Elissa Landi, the object of his devotions, rose like a white lily out of the mire. Somehow, Miss Landi reminds me of the women Curne-Jones has immortalized in his paintings. A rare type hardly a denizen of this earth. Nero was made even more repulsive than his

tory depicts him. And, of course, he played (but not a fiddle) while Rome was burning, one of those historical myths that has come down to us through the ages. And his wife, played by Claudett Colbert, out-vamped the vamps. You never got the feeling that she was Nero's wife but rather that she was the royal courtesan. Her bath in milk was almost featured in the picture. This was the inevitable De Mille touch—No picture of his could hardly be called complete without its bathtub episode.

Bacchanalian revelry, torture, barbaric cruelty—all these things remain in mind. And as the lovers, arm in arm, slowly ascend the stairway from the subterranean chambers to the arena, to be the prey of vicious lions, and when the doors finally close on them and you see the sign of the Cross, you somehow wish that a tender religious feeling

might have been the main theme instead of merely an incident.

A flamboyant spectacle produced with only the Box Office in mind seems to be this shrewd director's sole idea.

Nevertheless see it if it comes your way maybe the things that are not expressed in the picture you will admire the most.

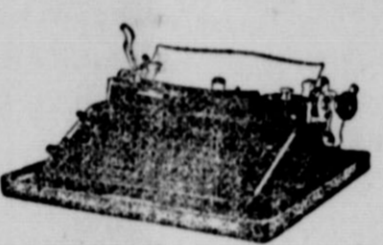

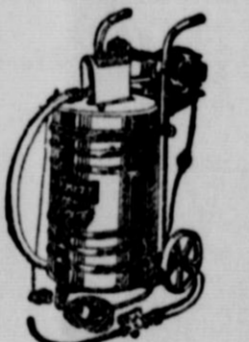

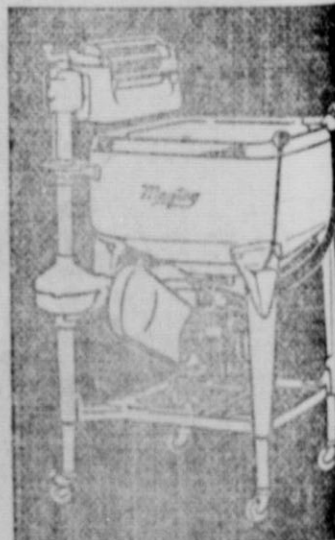
