The Proposed Relief Bond Amendment; Main Clause

Following is reproduced an exact copy of the principal section of the proposed constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to issue relief bonds. The most significant clauses are printed in capitals for the information of our readers:

"Section 51a. The Legislature shall have power to authorize by law the issuance and sale of the bonds of the State of Texas, NOT TO EXCEED the sum of Twenty Million (\$20,000,000) Dollars, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed Four and a half (4 1/2) per centum per annum; and payable serially or otherwise not more than Ten (10) years from their date, and said bonds SHALL BE SOLD FOR NOT LESS THAN PAR and accrued interest, and NO FORM OF COMMISSION SHALL BE ALLOWED in any transaction involving said bonds. The proceeds of the sale of such bonds to be used in furnishing relief and work relief to needy and distressed people and in relieving the hardships resulting from unemployment, but to be FAIRLY DISTRIBUTED OVER THE STATE and upon such terms and conditions as may be provided by law, and the Legislature shall make appropriations as are necessary to pay the interest and principal of such bonds as the same becomes due. The power hereby granted to the Legislature to issue bonds hereunder is expressly LIMITED TO THE AMOUNT STATED AND TO TWO YEARS FROM AND AFTER THE ADOPTION of this grant of power by the people. Provided that the Legislature shall provide for the payment of the interest and redemption of any bonds issued under the terms hereof FROM SOME SOURCE OTHER THAN A TAX ON REAL PROPERTY, and the indebtedness as evidenced by such bonds SHALL NEVER BECOME A CHARGE AGAINST OR LIEN UPON ANY PROPERTY, real or personal, within this state."

MUSIC CLASS

Miss Allie Traweck will begin a class in piano in the Roaring Springs Public Schools Sept. 5. One class lesson, weekly, and two private lessons weekly, will be given each child studying piano. These class lessons will consist of the study of Key Board Harmony and Theory of Music. These lessons will be given as outlined by the Texas Music Teachers Association, and with the idea of entering the outstanding students in the Lubbock Division of the West Texas Music Festival, held at some time during the school year, in Lubbock, Texas. Five dollars a month for two private lessons and the class lesson weekly, will be charged. Each child will be required to take the class lesson in connection with his private lessons. He shall also furnish his own music, the selection of which will be under the supervision of Miss Traweck.

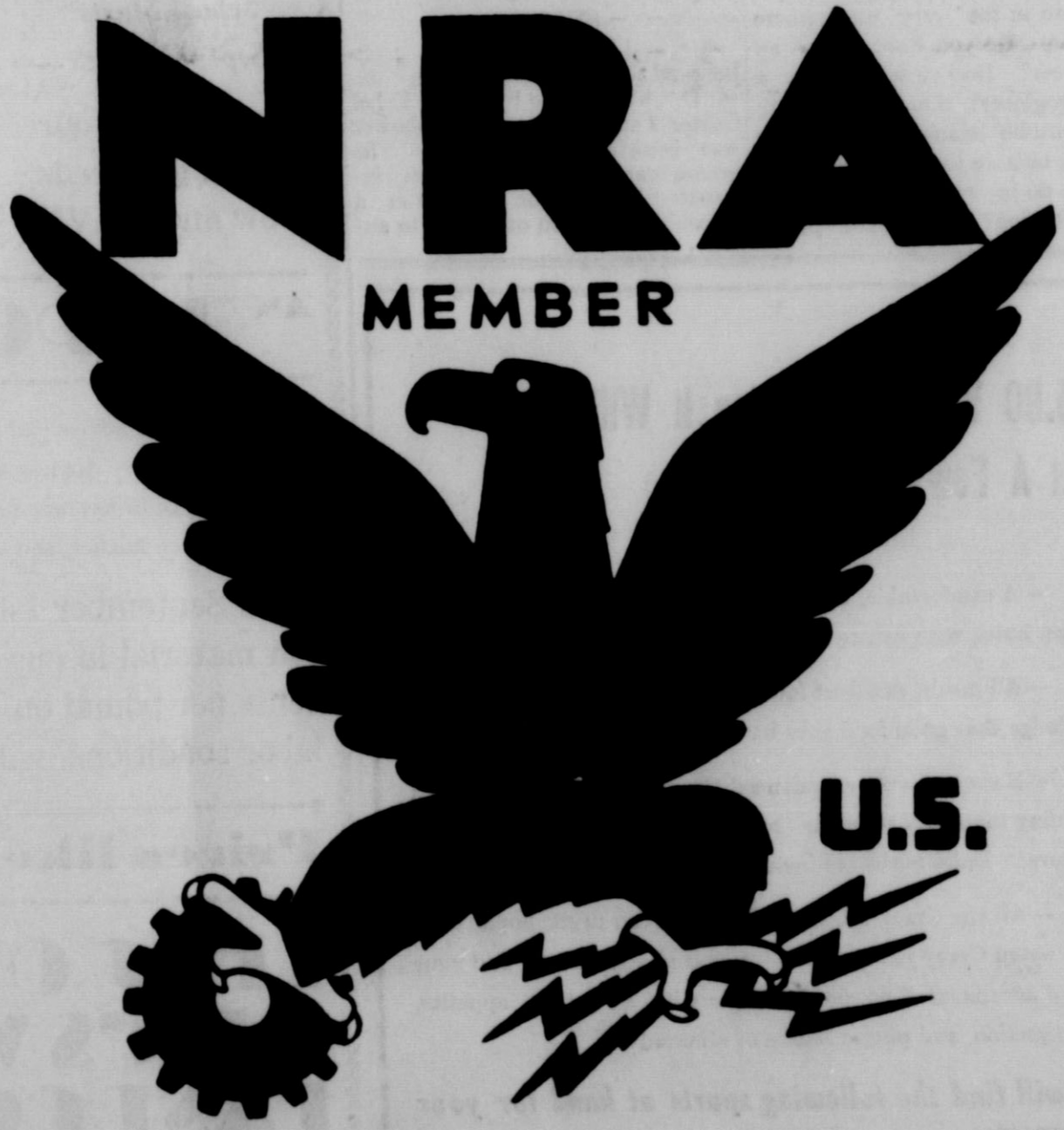
