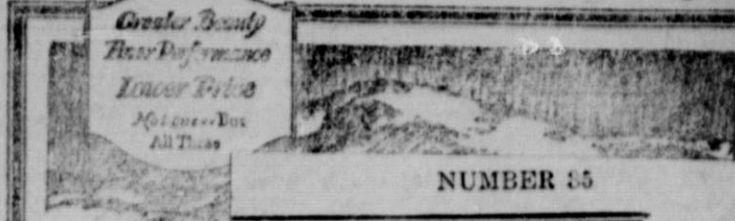

Eastland—Local citizens will vote on Oct. 29 to decide whether the city will take over the local gas company and operate it as a municipal utility.

Slaton—The City Commission has called an election for Nov. 17 to pass on a proposed \$100,000 paving program here. The Slaton Public Square will be the first unit paved.

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE MEETS

The Motley County Chamber of Commerce met in regular session in the Matador Cafe Tuesday, Oct. 27. President Homer Sheats presiding. The minutes of the last regular meeting read and approved.

The Secretary reported that the women of the Department Club had agreed to take over the Beautiful Yard Contest for next year and requested a meeting with the Chamber of Commerce committee.

The question of offering a prize to the high school student who wrote the best history of Motley County was discussed. Mr. Spangler was doubtful as to its advisability. After further discussion the matter was continued for further consideration.

Tree planting time will soon be here. During the past few years a number of shade trees have been planted along the streets and in the yards of Matador with varying degrees of success. Mr. R. F. Karper, formerly Superintendent of the Experiment Station at Lubbock, has had a great deal of experience with shade trees in north west Texas. Some of his observations concerning shade trees for the Panhandle are given here with the idea that some assistance may be obtained in selecting the kind of trees to plant in our yards and along the streets. It is thought that for trees to do their best they should be planted in December in this section.

American Elm, Green Ash, Black Locust, Russian Mulberry, and Texas Umbrella are probably our best deciduous trees, together with Hackberry. Chinese Arborvitae and Red Cedar are the best evergreens. For a beautiful evergreen for city planting in some of the best yards or some of your best farm homes we recommend highly the Arizona Cypress which is a new evergreen we have just tested out and found that it does well here.

The Chinese Elm is a new elm from China which has made a very exceptional showing with us here and we have in the past several years sent out a number of testing plantings into different towns on the plains. Reports from these coincide with our experience here. There is no source of these trees in this country that I know of. We have received several shipments of seed from China and have had good, bad and indifferent success in propagating them. We can supply small numbers of these trees but our supply is generally taken up in advance by people who have seen it growing and want it for their yards.

The Sycamore is slow and to my mind of questionable value. The Ash or Elm beat it. Russian Mulberry makes a good farm tree, especially for shade around the a hardy tree or shrub which chicken yards. The Tamarix is makes a good back yard hedge or screen or a good hedge or wind-break for the farm. It is propagated from cutting readily and one would do well to use it freely.

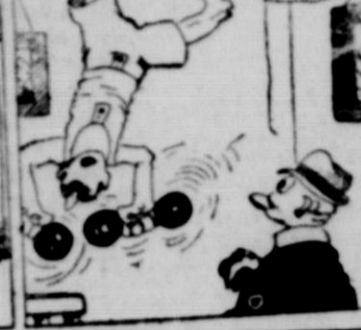
