Quannah—A solid train load of cement plaster was shipped from a local plaster mill this week. The commodity will be sent via train to Savannah, Georgia from whence it will go via steamship to Florida. Florida is at present buying enormous quantities of cement plaster and west Texas gy mills are reaping great benefit from the building boom in Florida.

Lubbock—A whirl wind campaign for six thousand dollars is being waged by the local chamber of commerce. This money is needed to pay off out standing debts and continue operations to January 1st. An election will be held before January 1st to vote an amendment to the city charter providing for a board of city development.

Abilene—The Abilene Chamber of Commerce is preparing a booklet giving the names of citizens who have been active in putting over the civic programs. This is intended to stimulate Chamber of Commerce activities and support as well as give proper credit to the workers.

Sweetwater—The Texas Hereford Association held its annual auction sale of reistered Herefords here. A total of 28 head were sold at an average price of \$295.64 per head. Top was \$726 for a bull consigned by D. L. McDonald of Hereford and bought by Mrs. H. C. Meriwether of Alpine. All cattle offered were enter in the Nolan County Fair.

NORTH OF 36

What "The Covered Wagon" did for the romantic pioneer days of '49 "North of 36" does on the same sweeping scale for the rollicking, turbulent after-the-war period of the '70's. It is the time when the great republic, having weathered the storm of war, is setting sail for further advancements and dangers. The first trans-continental railroad has reached as far as Abilene. Huge herds of longhorn cattle roam the vast plains of the Lone Star State. There are other roamers professional "bad men," of which Jessie James is most famous, and cattle thieves, carpet-beggars and cowboys. It is a time of hard riding and hard drinking, strife and progress, love and sudden death.

Irvin Willat, producer of "Wanderer of the Wasteland," has caught the glamour and fascination of this remarkable period of our history perfectly in "North of 36" no less perfectly than did Emerson Hough, who wrote both the novels "North of 36" and "The Covered Wagon." On the same wide-flung plan on which "The Covered Wagon" was produced, Willat has pictured the story of "Taisie Lockhart" (Lois Wilson), girl rancher, who has inherited the greatest herd of cattle in Texas. How "Taisie," to avert poverty, drives her gigantic herd North, aided by her ranch foreman "Jim Nabours" (Ernest Torrence) and a certain handsome, mysterious stranger "Dan McMasters" (Jack Holt), is harassed at every turn by the villainous "Rudabaugh" (Noah Berry) and his cohorts, by Indians, stampedes, raging rivers, and all sorts of perils, and finally fights through to victory, is unfolded in a picture that will thrill Americans to the very marrow.—Cozy Theatre, Thursday, Friday and Saturday, November 12, 13, 14th. Practical Instructions in HOME SEWING
By Ruth Wyeth Spears



Wool Embroidery for a Little Girl's Dress.

The frock sketched here is of peacock blue Kashmir embroidered in wool yarn in three colors, brick-dust red, golden yellow and brown. The dress is made along very plain lines with the embroidery outlining the square neck, the side front opening and the cuffs.

To make this embroidery design first block in the main part with cross stitches about an inch and a quarter long as I have shown in A. This part of the design is the brick-dust red.

Next make horizontal stitches of the yellow yarn over each of the cross stitches as shown in B. Vertical stitches of the brown are then made as in C.

The dress is made of the brick-dust yarn, the threads being tied together at the top with the brown and the thread bound around three quarters of an inch below the top with the gold colored yarn.

Alleviating Bronchial Distress

"Winter Bronchitis" is a real affliction, peculiar to those already aged or approaching old age. It is a very common complaint, as every practicing physician knows. It becomes a problem to many families who number older folks among their treasures. To old people, life and comfort are paramount blessings. Cough mixtures are legion, and many are palliative but seldom curative. Indeed, proper conduct does more permanent good than medicine. The "fresh air cure" comes in and demands the inevitable wide-open windows. No matter how cold—how damp—or how laden with floating gases and micro-organisms, the windows must be open, and the cough goes on, to the distress of the sufferer and of those about him. To stifle such ailments with narcotic cough mixtures is the general rule, but how futile!

Remember this: Warm air may be just as pure as cold, and is usually much more comforting than cold night air. Bedrooms should be regularly "aired out" thoroughly during the day. Beds are much better un-made, and allowed to air thoroughly. When night comes close the windows, and allow as the change of temperature as possible in the bedroom till morning. Do not close bedroom doors the sleeping apartment is small and this suggests airing the entire house as often as necessary for the air, but do it in daytime. Sleeping-rooms should be where bright sunlight can enter freely during the day. And, remember this: Cold night-air never benefited a cough—on the contrary, it aggravates and prolongs the difficulty. Night-airs are laden with impurities, and, in winter, chill the delicate respiratory membranes, becloud their recuperative power. The best bedroom is not an "old" idea.

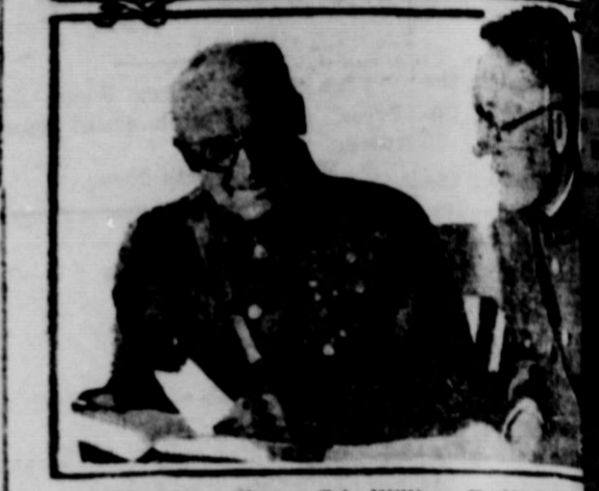
