In the small plan at the right I have shown the process of making the slot seams that are used to trim many of the more tailored costumes. To make this kind of seam you will need a stay strip of the material as shown at A. This strip should be cut as long as the seam is to be and about an inch and a half wide. The edges of the seam should be turned back and basted to the stay strip so that there is a narrow opening or slot between them. The stitching as shown at B and C is usually made about three-eights of an inch back from the edges.

It is always best to press a seam of this kind both before and after It is stitched.

INFLUENZA. The onset of influenza is invariably sudden and intensive. There are no warnings of its approach. One point, of which we are reasonably certain is, that the infection enters the system thru the breath-ing passages. During epidemics, the gargle and nasal douch should be used freely after all exposure, a possible preventive. Contact with suspected cases should be corupulously avoided if possible. Large or small public gatherings, where a dozen or more are coughing, are very dangerous, and traveling in over-heated trains that are

usually crowded, often scatters millions of influenzal germs. Weakness is the predominant symptom-indeed that may be the only diagnostic symtom. No other case prostrates the victim so thoroughly from its moment of on-set. There is nothing like this weakness. Sometimes there is fcver-at other times none, or so little as to escape notice. delirium is common in febrile cas-It is in this stage that pneumonia a nally supervenes, if at all. Absolute rest in bed is imperative, and should be resorted to promptly. 'Alcohol in diluted form, has prov-

nent of influenza, if its use carried on until free sweating occurs. It appears to be antago-nistic to the poison, and is useful in combatting the terrible weakness. It should only be used with and observation of the physician. Many doubt the efficaof vaccines, though I have found them of great value in my cases, and am never without them. Strict should not be neglected in locali-ties where influenza is prevalent. Good nursing is an essential upon which too much emphasis cannot be

Mr. J. W. Butler, Galveston. President Texas Pulic Health Association, in a statement recently said that this organization had reached over 170,000 people personally with a healty massage. This is exclusive of the large centers of population.

A large amount of work was done among the school children. Nearly 8,000 were iven a complete physical examination and 45,000 children were taught habits through the Modern Health Crusade. This is a system that teaches health by having the children do the things that will help improve their heath.

Nearly a quarter million pieces of health literature was distributed. A Mexican and a Negro lecturer worked among members of their race. Joint work was also carried on with other health agencies.

Mr. Butler further stated that it was estimated that there was at present 72,000 active cases of tuberculosis in Texas. 


