Pecora Delves In Security Investments

Thousands

WASHINGTON (UP). - Senate stock market investigators were to press Dillon, Read & Co. for an explanation of the manner in which millions of dollars entrusted by the investing public were poured into railroad securities now valued at only a few thousand.

Ferdinand Pecora, committee ounsel, has shown that the largest investments of the two investment trusts organized and controlled by Dillon, Read & Co., were in two

railroad stocks.

The United States and International Securities Corporation, one of the investment trusts, bought \$11,386,000 of Rock Island and Frisco securities. The stock now is worth approximately \$194,000 at

current market quotations.

Pecora has shown that Dillon,
Rend & Co. placed on the directorates of their two investment trusts men largely interested in other enterprises and in various securities. Matthew C. Brush, an investment trust director, was one of half a dozen persons summoned by the committee more than a year ago when it sought to question some really large market operators.

Charles Hayden, senior partner of Hayden, Stone & Co., bankers of New York, was a director of Dillon, Read Investment Trust when large purchases of Rock Island stock were made. He also was chairman of the board of the Rock Island road.

Frederick Ecker, resident of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Co., was an investment trust director and likewise a director of the Frisco railroad when its securities were being purchased.

Pecora is seeking to determine whether the huge blocks of rail securities were bought at a time when interested or influential indi-

viduals were unloading.
If individual holdings of railroad securities were unloaded on the public through the medium of the investment trusts, Pecora hopes to establish the circumstances of the transaction. So far there has been no proof that such was the case.





Hundreds Of Texas Horses Dying From Sleeping Sickness

FORT WORTH (UP).-More ptember 1 in the Texas Panhandle of a strange "sleeping sick-ness," Dr. J. J. Reid, laboratory director of the State Livestock Sanitary Commission, said. Many others, he said, have died on the gulf coast.

The malady has baffled veterinarians for the past five years, Reid said. It does not kill the animals until late in the summer and fades at the approach of cool weather, he explained. One cause of the disease, he said, is the bite of a mosquito, known as acces

The disease first appearer in Cal-ifornia, Dr. Reid continued five ears ago and two years ago broke out in Kansas, killing many horses. It appeared last year in New Mexico and El Paso county, Texas,






