Jurors get system lesson

The recorded telephone message to 160 prospective Snohomish County (Wash.) Superior Court jurors was clear: Report for orientation at 5 a.m. sharp Monday morning.

The message also was wrong. It was corrected by the previous Sunday evening to give the correct time, 8:30 a.m., but by then many had quit checking the call-in phone message.

About 70 arrived on Monday morning to find that the room where they had been told to go was unlit, unheated and - except for themselves - unoccupied.

Finally, the court staffer who made the mistake appeared and tearfully apologized, receiving applause from many of those who had arrived 3 1/2 hours early.

Family really spits pits

Rick "Pellet Gun" Krause - 12time winner of the annual Cherry Pit Spitting Championship in Eau Claire, Mich. — was defeated this year by his eldest son, Brian "Young Gun" Krause.

Brian Krause, 24, spit a cherry pit 61 feet, 2 inches to beat his 48-year-old father's 55 feet, 10 inches.

Rick Krause's youngest son, 19-yearold Matt "BB Gun" Krause, was third with 45 feet, 2.50 inches. Brian's son, Braden, won the under-5 division with a spit of 14 feet, 4 inches.

The Krauses have come to embrace their status as pit-spitting royalty. Rick Krause appeared for his turn to spit wearing bright red tights and riding a sparkling purple motorcycle as rock music played in the background.

Mule football faces challenges this year

"New season, new players, new coaches,

new defense, new look." That pretty well describes the 2002 Mule football team, according to head coach David Wood.

"You could count our returning starters on one hand," he said. "This is the fewest returning starters since I've been here. We're learning a new defense that is best suited for this year's team — we're smaller

but quicker than we've been in the past."

The new coaches — just in football are Gilbert Ramírez, varsity tight end coach and freshman offense; Ross Lassiter, varsity secondary and freshman defense; Benjie Jay, outside linebackers and special teams; and Jeff Withrow, junior high (various sports).

"With so many new faces and so many new varsity kids, we're as far along as we've ever been in two-a-day workouts.

The kids started practice this year in better shape and have gone through the conditioning part easier and are in better shape than normal at this time.

"The seven weeks of conditioning at the beginning of the summer probably helped us as much mentally as it did physically," he continued. "We had the opportunity to visit with individuals about expectations

Muleshoe district gets 'recognized' on TAAS

JOURNAL STAFF REPORT Muleshoe students scored just a few points lower in some areas on the 2002 TAAS tests as opposed to 2001 results, but it was enough to drop the high school from exemplary (the top category) to recognized (No. 2 out of four categories).

The district was recognized for the third year in a row, with all four Muleshoe campuses in that category. The Pep alternative school was rated acceptable, the third of the four categories, which Superintendent Gene Sheets said is pretty good for an alternative school.

"We're not satisfied, of course, but it's still pretty hard to be disappointed when you're at 88 or 89 percent," he added Monday. "We just missed it (exemplary status) again - it's unbelievable."

In most cases, he said, a campus or district must have 90 percent of its students passing the tests in order to be rated exemplary.

There were spots of perfection in Muleshoe's scores. At DeShazo Elementary School, 100 percent of the students tested passed the writing test.

Also making a stronger showing was math, where 95.7 percent of the high school students passed, 97.7 percent at Watson and 92.6 percent at DeShazo.

Statewide testing will not be repeated until 2004.

Flap over jail location apparently resolved

Bailey County commissioners will soon be looking at another floor plan for the proposed new jail, and County Judge Marilyn Cox said Thursday the change apparently will re-unite the commissioners' court.

Commissioner Joey Kindle had said last month that he wasn't

in favor of building a new jail on the current site of the courthouse parking lot (and utilizing the old jail), pushing the commissioners to "do it right" and build a new structure from scratch.

"Joey is comfortable with doing it this way, knocking down the old jail and building so that we have all the cells together in

the new jail," Cox said.

At the July 31 commissioners' court, Cox said consultant James Parkey had described the proposal to build around the old jail as "like building around a cow patty," and reported that Parkey said razing the old building and starting over probably wouldn't cost any more.

West Nile virus detected in Haskell County horse

A horse in Haskell County, 50 miles north of Abilene, tested positive for the West Nile virus Wednesday — the most western case in Texas so far.

Authorities have said it is only a matter of time until the virus - known in America for three years enters the South Plains.

Horses are especially susceptible (the Haskell County case was the 21st horse known to be infected in Texas), but it also affects people. Seven people had

died in Louisiana from the disease, which only shows up as flu-like symptoms in most people.

"We're continuing to urge owners to have their horses, donkeys, mules and other equids vaccinated against this form of 'sleeping sickness,' "said Linda Logan, Texas' state veterinarian and head of the Texas Animal Health Commission.

Muleshoe veterinarian Barry Cowart has said the vaccine is available locally for \$15 per dose.

Elsewhere in the coach-



sonal" view to which some tourists in New Orleans recently were "treated."

According to the Associated Press story, the tourists in question, ten visitors (including four children) to the Aquarium of the Americas, were standing on a catwalk viewing the 24 or so fishy residents of the aquarium's shark tank. Some of the sharks, nurse sharks and tiger sharks, were as large as 10 feet

Reportedly, the aquarium's Web site "warns visitors: 'You'll be glad you're on the outside looking in.'" But suddenly the visitors were on the inside looking out when the catwalk on which they were standing collapsed into the water!

As the AP described the scene, when the catwalk "buckled, the group was thrown into the 20-foot-deep, 400,000-gallon tank along with a 38-foot section of the platform."

Now what?

Well, the visitors had a problem. The water level was about three feet below the top of the sides of the tank, the glass walls of the tank were more than a little slick, and 10 visitors found themselves trespassing in territory occupied by 24 sharks. A mock oil platform was set up in the center of the tank and lots of the fearful folks treading water quickly gave up on climbing up the sides of the tank and instead decided the time was right for oil exploration. They clung to the platform and tried to hold the small children up above the water. About fifteen minutes later, the last visitor was pulled out, presumably by aquarium staff who'd had little practice fishing people out of their shark tank. Not everyone is excited about that kind of swim!




Some words get tested more than others. They may seem academic until you find yourself treading water and your life depends upon their truth.

Ellis Funeral Home handled arrangements.


Mr. Wilson was born July 20, 1937, in Crowell, Texas. He died Wednesday at home.

Spoon the tuna salad on the







Controlling blood pressure can fight disease SPECIAL TO THE JOURNAL

COLLEGE STATION — High blood pressure has been called the "silent killer," not because it is deadly in and of itself, but because it can be the under-

lying cause of serious conditions such as heart attacks, strokes, kidney failure and dementia.

The good news is high blood pressure can be controlled — and through that control, some serious medical conditions can be prevented.

Blood pressure can be loosely defined as the amount of force of blood against artery walls as it is pumped through the body, according to Dr. Carol Rice, Texas Cooperative Extension health education specialist, and Janet Pollard, Extension health associate.

Normally, the human heart beats between 60 and 80 beats per minute, they said. Although the pressure rises and falls throughout the day, when the rate rises and stays that way over a period of time, that's high blood pressure.

According to information from the American Heart Association, although high blood pressure can be found in children or adults, it is most often found in people older than

who are obese, heavy drinkers, heavy tobacco users and women taking birth-control pills.

People with diabetes mellitus, gout and kidney disease are also frequently diagnosed with high blood pressure.

A recent study published in the Journal of the American Heart Association stated that high blood pressure also is more often found among those living in the South than in other parts of the country.

The only way to diagnose high blood pressure is to get regular blood-pressure checks, Pollard said.

This relatively painless procedure involves a medical professional using a stethoscope and a sphygmomanometer.

A rubber cuff is wrapped around the upper arm and inflated; as the air is released, the medial professional uses the stethoscope to listen to the blood flow in the arm.

For adults age 18 and older, normal systolic readings are 130 or less, normal diastolic are 85 or less or 130 over 85

"A single reading of high blood pressure does not mean you will be classified

is a sign that you may need sure," Pollard said, "but it is a sign that you may need to watch your blood pressure carefully. High blood pressure is typically classified after two or more high readings."

Those who are diagnosed with high blood pressure can take steps to control the condition, Rice said

"The first step in both preventing and controlling high blood pressure is to modify your lifestyle."

This includes:

- Maintaining a healthy weight. If weight loss is prescribed, do it gradually — one-half to two pounds per week.
- Increasing exercise and other physical activities. At least 30 minutes of moderate exercise per day, five or more days a week is recom-

 Quitting use of tobacco products. Not only can tobacco use lead to buildup of cholesterol in the arteries, but it can promote constriction of blood vessels, according to information from the Mayo Clinic.

· Reducing stress. Longterm stress can cause higher blood pressure.

· Taking prescribed medications (if necessary) to lower blood pressure.

"It is important to understand that, if you are using medications to control your blood pressure, your blood pressure is only under control if you are taking the medication," Rice said.

"For this reason, you may have to take bloodpressure medication for your lifetime. Don't let this discourage you. Treating high blood pressure may require time, patience and care by both you and your doctor.

"It may be frustrating to take pills, especially if you felt fine before being diagnosed with high blood pressure. Still, enduring the inconvenience of medication is better than suffering a stroke or heart attack, losing your vision or developing kidney problems."

New food-safety system to be tested

COLLEGE STATION

— The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and FoodHorizon have agreed to test a new food-processing safety system called SENTRY9000, which will involve testing, research and teaching activities within Texas A&M University's Rosenthal Meat Science and Technology Center.

The food-safety system, which is a remote computer system using both hardware and software applications, can monitor various food-safety programs for processing plants.

"It has the potential to be used in all types of meat-processing plants," said Dr. Jeff Savell, professor of animal science at Texas A&M. "With this type of system, there's the potential to have real-time monitoring instead of the paper-based systems that are currently in use."

The Texas A&M department of animal science's faculty and students will participate in the research efforts and activities. Savell said the system could be linked to handheld computer devices used to track meat products distributed through processing plants.



Individuals can recognize depression

Recognizing the early signs of clinical depression is usually something that individuals have to do for themselves.

People are reluctant to confront others with the possibility that they may be experiencing a depression — even many physicians dealing with their patients may hesitate to say anything.

On the surface, it sounds innocent enough, a helpful suggestion, reaching out to someone to help him or her take that first step toward getting better.

But here's the risk: Saying "you could be depressed" frequently can be heard as "you're really weak" or "you're out of your mind."

Does this sound absurd? Maybe, but recent surveys still show that more than half the American population regards depression as a weakness of character or a serious mental illness.

The other reason people hesitate to call attention to depression is that the signs and symptoms are emotions and behaviors everyone experiences. To identify depression in another, a person first must be willing to admit to it in themselves.

An individual may be having trouble sleeping. They may be extremely sensitive and easily hurt. They may feel overwhelmed by worry and see no solutions to their predicaments. But before the physician can be comfortable in connecting these distresses together into the full picture of depression and pointing it out to the patient, the doctor has to be prepared to acknowledge

his or her own vulnerability.

This is one reason why someone who has been successfully treated for depression is in the strongest position to reach out to others, if he or she can put aside the stigma that still surrounds needing psychiatric therapy.

Recovered individuals have another important asset: When they say to an individual that they understand what that person is going through, they mean it. It's called empathy, the ability of one person to truly know what another is experiencing.

Whether empathy is found in a family member, a friend, a doctor or a counselor, it has a remarkable power to heal.

But for the moment, each individual is largely on their own. It's a little like a woman examining herself to be sure she doesn't have a suspicious lump that warrants investigation. It's like sitting in the waiting room and filling out the doctor's health questionnaire so the receptionist can scan it and identify trouble spots before the examination.

Fortunately, this self-appraisal is straightforward.

All it requires is a little selfdiscipline and a splash of honesty. Anyone who answers these questions with a YES should seriously consider talking with a primary-care physician, psychiatrist or mentalhealth professional to find out

sleeping? Do you wake up early in the morning, feeling just awful and unable to get back to sleep?"

- · "Has this insomnia been going on for more than a few weeks?"
- "Has your appetite been poor for a while and have you lost 10 or 15 pounds in a few weeks without even trying?"
- "Have you gained 15-20 pounds or more over the past weeks because you're the kind of person who eats anything in sight when you're unhappy?"
- · "Has your sexual drive diminished, if it's there at all?"
- · "Do you have a hard time concentrating?"
- "Do you have a hard time making decisions?"
- · "Do you have a negative outlook?" (Here consider the whole range of pessimistic thoughts, from total hopelessness to the more subtle tendency to assume whatever is going to happen won't turn out right.)
- · "Are you a little bit afraid most of the time? Or very afraid without apparent cause?"
- "Have your relationships with those around you, at home or work, deteriorated? Do you find yourself irritable, short-tempered, getting into arguments? Do you feel rejected?"
- "Have you begun to avoid social contacts? Have you

started to let your phone ring until the answering machine picks up the message, after which you do not return calls even to the best of friends?"

· "Do you put things off, including answering these questions?"

The more yesses, the more suspicious one should be about depression. This can be a good thing, not a bad thing, because it can be a way to head off more serious things - such as the wrecking of a life and the bringing of pain to loved ones.

Next stop: a doctor (who hopefully is up-to-date), a clergyman (who hopefully has the prerequisite knowledge and perspective), a very-wellrecommended psychiatrist, or a very-well-recommended mental-health professional.

A final footnote: Depression isn't always subtle. It can hit some people like a 10-ton tank, leading them to be utterly hopeless, demoralized, considering suicide as a way out. It can also disguise itself in the form of physical complaints - a wide variety of symptoms like headaches, fatigue and intestinal upsets
