



Montana Rancher, Ready to Repel Winter Invasion, Yields to Wildlife Federation Plea

GREAT FALLS, Mont.-Machine ing of a thousand elk by an outraged rancher has been averted through the appeals of the Montana Wildlife Federation, L. W. Wendt, state representative of the National Wildlife Federation announces.

In a display advertisement, the Circle H Ranch, Augusta, Montana, recently asked for bids from hunters who would camp on the ranch during the coming winter and kill off the elk, furnishing their own machine-guns for that purpose. He promised them at least 1,000 elk.

Lacking winter range on public lands, the Sun River elk herd invades the Circle H ranch from the Lewis and Clark National Forest and, according to Rancher Rath-"Elk by the thousands have travelled across our ranch, destroyed our feed, destroyed our tences and interfered with our

ranching operations." The owner of the Circle H was persuaded by a delegation of Great Falls sportsmen to grant the elk a reprieve on the understanding that the Great Falls Wildlife Association would make every effort to have the Fish and Game Commission put through a Pittman-Robertson project providing winter range for the

elk herd. "Since the Pittman-Robertson act is the Federation's achievement," says Mr. Wendt, "we will feel mighty proud if it becomes the means of permanently saving thousands of magnificent animals that are making their last stand against civilization."

"Louisiana has effectively capitalized on their trade-mark of the Pelican. A glance at one of their plates and everyone knows the car is from Louisiana. Other states employ like symbols, and some of them use the map of their respective states. Due to the fact that so many other states have maps of their states already in use, the Longhorn head would be much more impressive and would be readily recognized all over the United States.'






