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# Commissioners Court announces bridge inspections

The Commissioner's Court met in regular session September 8, 2008, covering a 14-item agenda, including an announcement of bridge inspections, a jail restoration update, and approval of an reimbursement equipment agreement.

A full court was in attendance, consisting of County Judge Ed D. Smith, Commissioner's Ronnie Davis, Donnie Turner, Russell Alexander, Franklin Jameson, and County Clerk Kate Hurt. Also attending were County Attorney Tom Edwards, Sheriff Michael Crutchley, County Treasurer Eva Barkley, Justice of the Peace Cora Smallwood: and Assistant to the County Judge, Carol Campbell.

The judge read a letter from the Texas Department of Transportation (TXDOT) informing the court that offsystem bridge inspections will be conducted on county roads and city streets beginning September 1, 2008, and continuing through mid-December, 2008.

Sheriff Michael Crutchley asked the court for approval of an equipment program whereby the Sheriff or Deputy would purchase equipment using county funds, for example, a firearm, and then reimburse the county from payroll deductions. The equipment would be owned by the county until reimbursed by the sheriff or deputy, at which time the county would relinquish ownership of the equipment. He recommended that the county set up a small account for this purpose. He said the county treasurer had recommended that the money come from a special funds account that was set up in 2003 as a "building fund line item." This fund has \$3,000 of unused money. A motion was made to create an order to change the building fund to a law enforcement equipment fund to be used as outlined. The motion passed by unanimous vote.

In a jail briefing to the court, Carol Campbell reported that reimbursement from Texas Historical Commission on the masonry restoration at the jail had been received, allowing repayment of the loan to the county of \$15,000, including \$59.53 interest. "I am pleased to report that the project was able to pay back the county with interest in such a timely way," Campbell said. "The applying for Preserve America status for the community. Campbell reported that Guy Campbell, a local rancher, had donated fill dirt to the jail project to be spread around the base of the building to aid in proper drainage. "We are fortunate to have this donation, and very appreciative," she said. "I would also like to personally and publicly thank the road hands that have worked to deliver stone and fill dirt to the site. They have done an outstanding job for the county," she said.

Edwards suggested that "the highest officer in the county, the county judge, be designated as a backup signatory on fee accounts in case of the treasurer's absence."

Cora Smallwood, Justice of the Peace, said she had been advised by the bank to change her fee account name to the Motley County Justice of the Peace account, rather than have her name attached, with signature authority backup by the county judge. This way, she explained, the account would go with the office in case something happened to

Following a lengthy discussion, it was decided by a 4-1 vote to restructure names on all fee accounts, destroying the old signature cards and including the county judge and the county treasurer as the only signatory authorities. The dissenting vote was cast by Commissioner Turner. It was also agreed to write a letter to the First National Bank of Seymour, Matador Branch, explaining the restructure of all Motley County fee ac-

counts. The County Clerk's office has two fee accounts that will be turned over to the county treasurer's office for disbursement: 1) a fee account that consists of birth and death certificate fees, and all recording fees, for example, deeds of trust; and 2) the county and district clerk account which includes all court fees, including probate, district civil and criminal and county civil and



#### Traweek Family Honored by Memorial to Benefit the Museum

A granddaughter of pioneer physician Dr. A. C. Traweek, Dorothy Traweek Hanesworth, has made a generous donation to the Motley County Historical Museum, housed in the hospital he built in 1927. The memorial honors her

grandparents, Dr. A. C. and Irene Traweek, and her parents, Dr. Albert and Irene Traweek.

The timely gift will assist with the much-needed replacement of a faulty heating and air conditioning unit located in the downstairs. In addition, if funds stretch far enough, the museum's goal is to apply for a Texas Historical Commission subject marker for the historic two-story building, considered state of the art eighty years ago.

In what was considered a modern hospital of that era, the doctors Traweek performed tonsillectomies and appendectomies rou-

tinely. The operating room boasted of foot controls at the sink to turn the hot and cold water on as the staff scrubbed

A steam autoclave and later an electric one sterilized instruments that were cleaned and reused many times. Likewise syringes and needles were used over and over, hard to imagine in this culture of "use it once and throw

it out." Breathing assistance came with a balloon that was squeezed to force air into the lungs.

Babies, even one as ancient as myself, were delivered in the operating room and shown off through a large window at the nursery. Room lights and

downstairs. Sometimes they slipped out to sit on the patio to take a breather from the back-breaking, manual labor required to take care of pafients, up and down.

grandfather Her graduated from Fort Worth University medical school in 1897 and brought his fifteen yearold bride, Allie Rainey, first to Memphis and then to Matador. They became the parents of six children: Albert, Mary, Lucile, John, Allie, and Howard.

Dr. A. C. was a country doctor for sixtyone years, calling on his patients by horseback, buggy, motorcycle, a Bendix touring car, and

Cadillacs. He performed operations by lamplight, whittled out his own splints, performed intubation for diphtheria on his own daughter Mary, delivered lots of babies, and doctored folks for horse wrecks, pneumonia, snakebites and whooping cough. And he built a very fine hospital.

Due to the generosity of the above-mentioned entities and citizens, the library has always been able to pay its

Whenever refreshments are needed for a special program or for the summer reading program for children, the Friends generously provide delicious cookies, cakes and other goodies. The Friends provide the money that buys the prizes for the summer reading program. The Friends also pay to have the library cleaned each month. The Friends buy the extra books for all of the book discussions.

The Library Board members, Charley Johnson, Marihelen Wason, Patricia Green, Ruby McGuire, Susan Jameson and Deanie Edwards, give of their time to govern the library. They are also the first to volunteer when work needs to be done. What a joy it was to work with this board.

#### TTHM **Mandatory Public Notification** Language

The CITY OF ROARING SPRINGS has been notified by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) that the water this system supplies has exceeded the maximum contaminant level (MCL) for total trihalomethanes (TTHM's), as set in the Commission's Drinking Water Standards.

The MCL for TTHM's is 0.080 milligrams per liter (mg/L). Compliance with this level is based on running annual average of quarterly sample results. The CITY OF ROARING SPRING's running annual average for quarter 2 of 2008 was 0.089 mg/L,

Trihalomethanes are a group of volatile organic compounds that are formed when chlorine added to the water during the treatment process for disinfection, reacts with naturally-occurring organic matter in the water.

Some people who drink water containing trihalomethanes in excess of the MCL over many years may experience problems with their liver, kidney, or central nervous systems, and may have an increased risk of getting cancer.

You do not need to use an alternative water supply. However, if you have health concerns, you may want to talk to your doctor to get more information about how this may affect you.

We are working to correct the problem. (A) Flushing of the main lines.

Please share this information with all the other people who drink this water, especially those who may not have received this notice directly (for example, people in apartments, nursing homes, schools, and businesses.). You can do this by posting this notice in a public place or distributing copies by hand or mail.



#### COOL IS ABOUT HERE

COOL (Country of Origin Labeling) is scheduled to go into effect September 30. Among other commodities, beef sold at retail will have to be labeled with what country it came from. Under COOL, a producer affidavit will be considered acceptable evidence so long as the person involved has first-hand knowledge of origin. Questions have been asked as to exactly what must be included in such an affidavit. According to a recent news update from the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association, USDA will not create any sort of standard affidavit, so the National Cattlemens Beef Association plans to work with various segments of the industry to develop something that could be used by producers.

Producers should consider maintaining possibly relevant. records to support affidavits. The USDA site for COOL is http://www.ams.usda.gov/ cool/. Click on Examples of Records for COOL Verification on the right under Resources and then on Cattle, Beef, Muscle Cuts of Beef, Ground Beef under Additional Information on the right.

Also, participation in the Texas Beef Quality Producers Program (Texas BQA) will provide "records that may be useful to verify compliance with the Country of Origin Labeling provisions". More information on the BQA program can be found at http:// texasbeefquality.com

#### ESTIMATING CRUDE PROTEIN IN FORAGE

USDA-ARS researchers in central Oklahoma compared two reflectance techniques to estimate crude protein in four varieties of bermudagrass. The techniques were remote sensing of standing forage using spectral reflectance (RS) and near infrared reflectance spectroscopy analysis of fecal samples (IS). Plant samples were also analyzed using conventional laboratory methods. Pastures were grazed in three successive years from June through August with calves of predominantly British breed-

Typical grazing systems of these forages in this area include protein supplementation beginning at about the midpoint of the grazing period. In this study, both techniques signaled at about the same time that crude protein levels dropped below 7 percent, the targeted minimum when supplementation was considered to be beneficial. Such signals occurred 6 days before grazing midpoint in the first year but 5 days and 14 days after midpoint in the second and third years. Using lab analysis as the standard, RS ranked CP of the four varieties at the beginning of grazing better than IS.

The authors concluded that economics more than supplementing too late. (Prof. Anim. Sci. 23:696)

Buy-In Waiver

Producers can establish 2008 eligibility for the new disaster assistance programs by paying a fee as required by the Food, Conservation and Energy Act of 2008 (the 2008 Farm Bill), I to men at only their I

Ordinarily producers: who wish to participate in the new disaster programs would need crop insurance or non-insured crop disaster assistance (NAP) coverage on all farms in all counties in which they have an interest. Since the 2008 Farm Bill was enacted after the application periods had closed for those programs, producers who did not have NAP or crop

insurance coverage could not comply with this requirement in order to be eligible. However, the Farm Bill authorizes September 30 - Deadline a waiver that allows producers to pay a fee, called a "buy-in" fee, to be eligible for the new disaster assistance programs.

The buy-in fee is due no later than Sept. 16, 2008, 90 days after the date of enactment, as required by the 2008 Winter Grazing applications Act. Payment of the applicable fees will allow the producer to be eligible for financial assistance under the Supplemental Revenue Assistance Program (SURE), Livestock Forage Disaster Program (LFP), Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honey Bees, and Farm-raised Fish (ELAP) and the Tree Assistance Program (TAP). Those who miss this opportunity will not be eligible for 2008 disaster assistance. Producers are also reminded that the payment of the applicable buy-in fee does not provide the producer crop insurance or NAP coverage for the 2008 crop year; it only affords eligibility for the disaster programs.



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


