

Six members of the Motley County FFA Chapter attended the 81st Annual Texas FFA Convention held July 7 - 10 at the Convention Center in Dallas Texas. This years convention set an attendance record of over 11,000 Texas FFA members and guests registered. At the convention more than 1,500 young men and women were honored for the FFA related accomplishments and more than \$2 million in scholarships were awarded to deserving members.

While at the convention members attended motivaprovide students with realworld lessons about leadership and positive goal-setting. The members heard keynote speeches from notables such as former National FFA President Mark Mayfield, Mr. Krish Dhanam who arrived in America in 1986 with nine dollars in his pocket and is today Director of International Operations for Ziglar Training Systems, and from former FFA member and current Texas Commissioner of Agriculture, Todd Staples. The members also elected a new slate of State Officers to lead

tional workshops designed to the association for the next year and conducted business including amendments to the state FFA constitution, approving the 2009-2010 budget, changes to the program of activities, and accepting the National Officer Nominating Committee Report.

The Texas FFA Association is one of the largest state associations in the nation with nearly 63,000 active members. FFA is an agriculture related association that encourages students to strive for leadership, personal growth, and career success through Agricultural Education.


4-H is the youth development and leadership program of the Texas AgriLife Extension Service, part of the Texas A&M system.



Unsung Hero Literacy Council honors local resident

Evelyn Smallwood was recently honored for her "contribution and service to the community," receiving the Lity Award for 2009 from the Hale County Literacy Council for her outstanding work as an adult volunteer.

Executive Director Lydia Castillo said teaching literacy to adults takes a very dedicated and committed person. "Evelyn has a heart for people," Castillo said. "When she walked into our office, she came in to inquire about curriculum. The desire to teach speaks volumes about a person. Evelyn became a real blessing to our council."

Evelyn was responsible for helping the Council set up a library. In 2006, through her coordination with MotleyCounty Library, about 2,000 books were donated to Hale County Literacy Council. This library is still used extensively today, Castillo said.

Way to Reading to about 10
students, ranging in age from 6to 50-years. Her first students
were three children from Flomot that couldn't read, write or
speak English.

"We have pictures, coupled with phonics used with an association of words," Evelyn said. All three children, 2nd, 4th, and 7th grades passed all their classes and graduated with flying colors, she said. And speaking of colors, associating words with colors may represent a daunting task for a 6-year-old who doesn't speak English.

"I was especially proud of my 2nd grader," she explained. In an exercise designed to help children identify their colors, Evelyn "laid out" the color brown, and asked her three children if "this was the color purple." Following a lengthy debate in Spanish, the 2nd grader said in perfect English, "I don't know the name of

this color, but it is not purple."

"Evelyn is an encourager," Castillo said. "She gives 110 percent to her students, taking them skillfully to a correlated reading skill level that is a lifechanging event."

She tutored two women that spoke English well, but wanted to learn to read and write. She currently has a student that is learning English. Referrals for tutoring usually come from the school or the library, Evelyn said, but on one occasion her daughter, City Secretary Debra Scott, referred a woman who went to City Hall to pay her water bill. She has been working with this student for three years now, and she is becoming proficient, Evelyn said. "She is a very apt student and she does her homework."

In addition to donating time, Evelyn also donates financially to the Literacy Council. And what do you get out of volunteering? "You feel so useful," Evelyn said, making changes in lives of people forever.

Evelyn's students become like family, she said. "In Mexico," her student told her, "Dad was the boss. Here he waves the flag on the highway."

This waving flag is for Evelyn Smallwood — an unsung hero in our community who is spending her free time helping others. There is a real life lesson to learn from Evelyn — a lesson from the heart.







County Agent's News

Texas 4-H/FFA Lamb and Goat Validation

Time has come once again to order state validation tags for lambs and goats. The deadline to get your order into the county office is August 21, 2009. Tags will cost \$7 each. Late tags can be ordered at an additional cost. Any lamb or goat that will be shown at a major stock show in Texas must be validated through the Texas 4-H/FFA Lamb and Goat Validation Program. Once tag orders have been received from the state office, a validation date will be setup.

TwoHorsesinEastTexas Die from Eastern Equine Encephalitis (EEE); Vaccinate Your Horses and Protect Against Exposure! Mosquito

Two horses, one in Jasper County and the other in Newton County, in East Texas have died from Eastern Equine Encephalitis (EEE). Humans also are susceptible to EEE, which causes inflammation of the brain. The disease is spread by mosquitoes, and measures should be taken to prevent human and animal exposure to the biting pests.

"As part of their routine health care, horses in all parts of the state should be vaccinated to protect against dangerous mosquito-borne diseases, including West Nile Virus, and Eastern and Western Equine Encephalitis (EEE and WEE)," said Dr. Bob Hillman, Texas' state veterinarian and head of the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC), the state's livestock and poultry health regulatory agency. "It takes a week to 10 days after vaccination for the animal to develop protective antibodadministered as directed by the vaccine manufacturer to maintain the highest level of protection," he said. "As effective as vaccines are, however, they are not foolproof, and rare instances of disease can occur. Therefore, it is essential that you protect yourself and your horses against mosquito exposure with a repellent containing DEET."

Dr. Hillman also said other preventive measures should include draining stagnant water, where mosquitoes can breed, and using approved products that kill mosquito larvae in desired water sources, such as troughs, ponds and fountains. Avoid being outside at night or at dawn, when mosquitoes are most active, wear long sleeves when possible, and consider sheltering horses at night.

"Contact your veterinarian immediately, if your horse acts erratically, is confused, staggers or collapses. These are clinical signs of an encephalitic, or brain inflammation, condition, and a blood test is needed to confirm the diagnosis. With appropriate supportive care, about half of infected horses may survive. An infected horse will not spread the West Nile Virus, EEE or WEE to humans," said Dr. Hillman. Although they are not regulatory diseases, these mosquito-spread infections are reportable to the TAHC, due to their potential to cause human illness. In 2009, a horse in Washington County, also in East Texas, has been confirmed to have West Nile Virus.

EEE also has been reported in





Illegal Dumping

There have been a lot of reports lately about people dumping trash on several county roads. I wanted to take a moment and let everyone know the penalties for dumping trash.

If someone throws a small piece of trash out their car window (lets say a soda can), the penalty for that crime is a \$500 fine. If you have previously been fined for littering, you could face a fine of up to \$2000 and up to 180 days in

Now, let's say that someone goes out on a county road and throws out a couple bags of household trash. If the weight of the trash is less than five

ticket I mentioned above. If the trash you dumped is between five and five hundred pounds (and most of them usually are) then you are looking at being criminally charged with Illegal Dumping. So, a five pound sack of household trash can get you a \$2000 fine and up to 180 days in jail. It just keeps going up from there. Also, if the trash that is dumped came from any type of commercial site, then you are looking at actual prison time.
