## Motley County Livestock Show Set for March 8

Plans are underway for the 57th Annual Motley County Jr. Livestock Show which has been set for Saturday, March 8, 1997 at the Bill Moss Agriculture Building. Young people in FFA and 4-H are busy feeding and working with their animals, consulting with advisors, and getting invaluable support from local businesses and family. These projects are fundamental opportunities that help teach responsibility, and help develop pride in ownership as well as showmanship. Even though most of the animals shown will be sold on show day, the project has not ended; the youngsters will finish tabulating books and records to see how they came out financially. Making plans for next year, or the next big project, is an ongoing cycle for all of us. Teaching these fundamental (and sometimes hard) lessons early in a young persons life through these kind of projects is an outstanding opportunity for the community to continue contributing in a positive way - a legacy that has lasted 56 years in Motley County.

### Bucket Calf Project

Youngsters between the ages of 4 and 8 years that are interested in caring for an orphaned calf for the next few weeks and then show the calf at the stock show are encouraged to contact Billy Wayne Denison at 347-2671 or 347-2703. This project class has been offered for about the last 5 years and has been excellent learning ground for very young people. It is generally inexpensive, but the time, effort, and learning are great. The calf is not judged on appearance, but rather the youngster showing talks to the judge at the show about the calf - how old was the calf when taken as a project, how much did he weigh at the start and end, average daily gain, type of supplement/feed, medication given, complications, etc. The only competition involved is between the participant, the project and the elements.

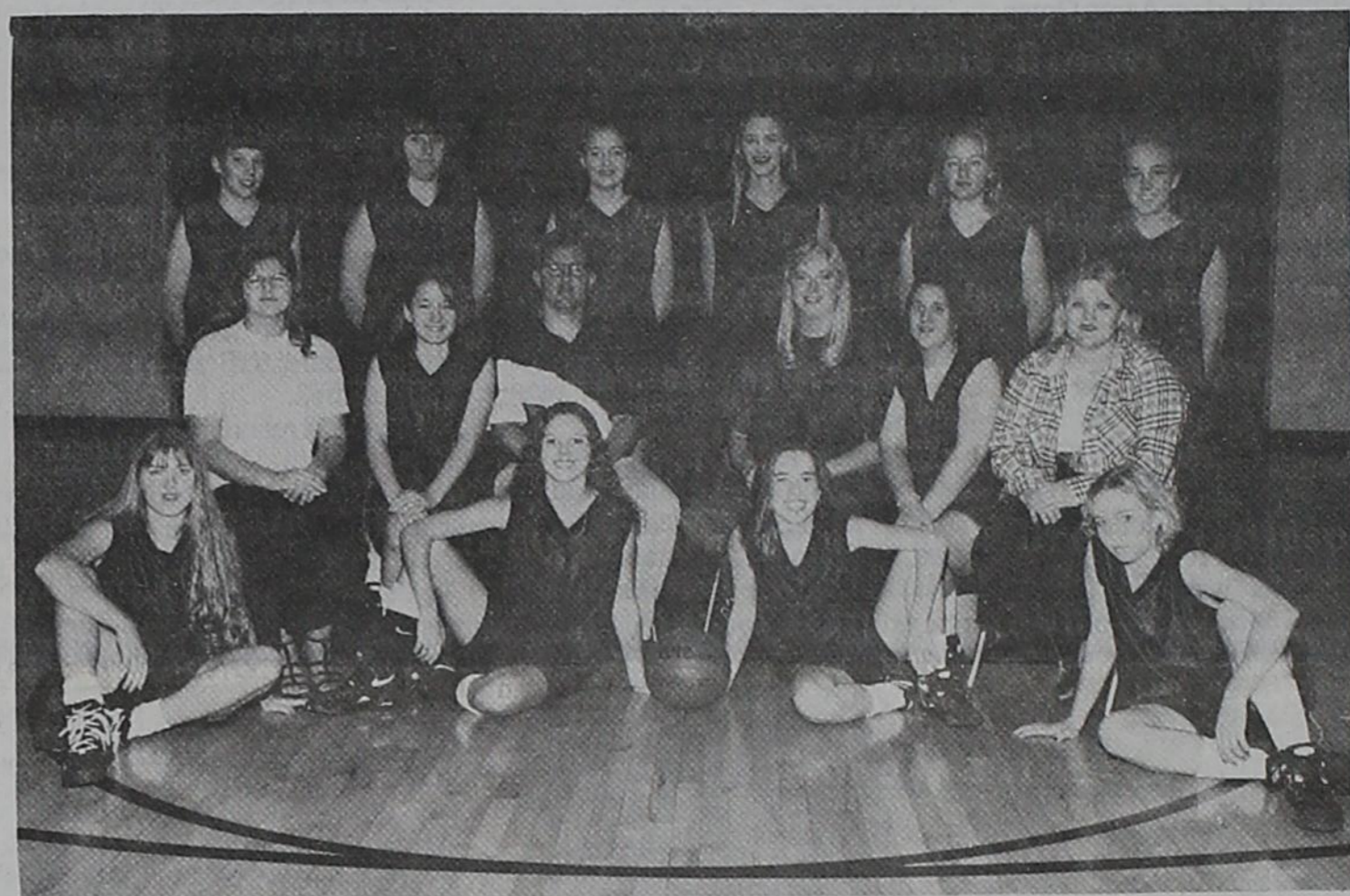
