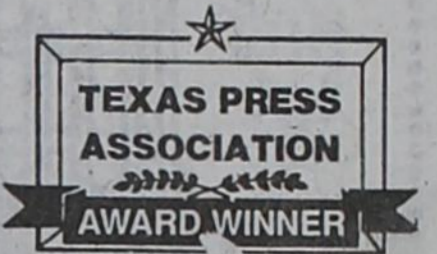

## Chamber speaker says Motley County is "a piece of paradise"

Sandy Parker, guest speaker for the 7th annual Motley County Chamber of Commerce Banquet on October 6, told the crowd of over 150 that they should appreciate where they live. "You live in a piece of paradise," said the executive director of the Llano Tourism Society. "And you have such wonderful people!"

Parker used humor to make her point and roasted several individuals in the audience. She mentioned, among others, rancher, a "cow whisperer" who was featured on CBS Good Morning Show, a doctor who drives 140 miles to work so he can live in Matador, an active and "awake" mayor, and the local sage who comes up with quotable one-liners.

Parker used her experiences at the Levelland Chamber of Commerce to illustrate things that work and some that don't. If a community in decline wants to grow, it must be ready to accept outsiders she said. "If, for instance, no one comes into your town, who will be willing to buy your property? Think down the road."

A consultant on regional tourism to small towns, Parker always stops at the local convenience store or cafe and asks, "What is there to do around here?"

Often she gets the reply, "Nothing!" These frontline people may be the only ones a tourist comes in contact with. So it is here that Parker wages a campaign to inform the employees of the benefits of the area. She suggested that the city or the chamber could sponsor free tea in exchange for a survey to find out who these tourists are, where they are going, and what they'd like to do in the area.

In a nutshell, Parker outlined these main points:

Be clear about change. Change takes place in the present, but makes a difference in the future. Each one of you is the heart of renewal. The time is now.

Capitalize on what you have. Keep money local. Shop at home whenever possible. Ask merchants to order for you to keep the business at home.

Manage your resources wisely, and market your area with pride. Preserve your history. Every town has a history, and it is a valuable asset.

People are the true assets. The people who come back are the true believers, even if they are only there a short time.

Don't wait for everybody to believe. Take your few believers and go with it. After all, there were only 12 disciples.

### AWARDS

A highlight of the evening was the Chamber's Outstanding Woman, Man and Business of the Year 2001. Shane Jones was named woman of the year. She is a big promoter of shopping at home. She is a partner in a business and strives to provide whatever her customers want and

will order anything available. Mrs. Jones serves on a city governmental board and has been instrumental in obtaining Christmas decorations and promoting late night shopping during Santa's arrival in town. She is currently remodeling the upstairs at City Hall to be used as hunter's lodging.

The man of the year is Jim Watson. Jim, another unstinting worker in the community, grew up here, went off to serve in the military, worked in the business sector, and then returned here to retire to a life of fishing, hunting, and golf, but it didn't happen. This Lions Club President took on a project to benefit senior citizens in the area. Not only did he offer his business expertise to the senior citizens advisory board, but he also got out his hammer and saw to complete the alterations necessary to open operations. Last week the Sr. Citizens Center opened their meal service to about 60 folks.

This year's winner of the Outstanding Business of the Year is Quality Discount Outlet and Snow Cone Stand, owned and operated by Carolyn and Doyle Rose and assisted by their extended family members. The Roses work hard to provide a service to Motley County and the surrounding region. Many of their customers are drawn to Matador to the outlet store for the items they can purchase economically, others for the variety, but some just stop to cool off by the misting machine and the beautiful crepe myrtle. They are greeted by name and treated like an honored friend.

### ENTERTAINMENT

Master of Ceremonies Ed D. Smith welcomed guests and members and presided over the meeting. The Reverend Jack Boggs of the First Baptist Churches of Matador and Roaring Springs gave the invocation.

A special patriotic flag ceremony was presented by the Brownies sponsored by Brenda Ferguson, the Girl Scouts sponsored by Andrea Hinzler, and the Cub Scouts sponsored by Shawn Elliott and Don Dillard.

With colorful table settings and western decorations by Debbie Shaw and family, a catfish and chicken dinner was catered by River Smith's of Lubbock. Offering dinner music was The Great Unknown Band, composed of Jason Jameson, Yancey Meredith, Ricky Carson and Brodie Davis.

Rodney Parker, a singer, guitarist, band director, as well as Sandy's

husband, performed ballads in his special West Texas style. When not performing and accompanying Sandy on her treks, Rodney teaches at Mackenzie Jr. High and assists at Coronado High School with the band program. He also finds time to tour with the Blue Prairie Band and write his own songs.

Master of Ceremonies Smith, who had vowed to never again serve as MC of Homecoming, was coerced to serve as MC for the banquet under duress and at the last minute. He retained his sense of humor, however, and read an amusing "public announcement" about a green snake. Then he introduced the following reports: Mayor Rodney Williams on the Nursing Home project; Jim Watson on the Sr. Citizens Meals on Wheels; Alex Crowder on the Highway 70 Assn.; and Marisue Potts on the Bob's Oil Well project. Smith later presented the merit awards and announced door prizes.

## Motley County Commissioners meet in regular session Monday

Judge Laverna Price informed Commissioners of the amount of coverage provided by West Texas Risk Management Pool when they met in regular session, Monday, October 8. Judge Price explained that this risk management package includes

Worker's Compensation, property (buildings & contents), Equipment, Automobiles, Personal Property, Crime (Bonds), Boiler and Machinery, General Liability, Employee Benefit Liability, Law Enforcement Liability, Automobile Liability, Public Officials Errors and Omissions, Employment Legal Assistance Risk Management Consulting, Employment Benefit Consulting, Safety, Loss Control, Pool and Claims Administration.

Commissioners discussed the inventory of Precinct 1, 2, 3 and 4. The inventory was listed for insurance purposes. All equipment was listed for each precinct.

Douglas Campbell, Roadway Maintenance Supervisor with Texas Department of Transportation and Sondra Layton from the district of

office in Childress, met with the court and discussed future plans for widening of right-of-ways at culverts on US 70 which runs east to west across Motley County. This project is scheduled for later this year.

In regular business minutes of the Monday, September 10 session were read and approved, as were the minutes of the Public Budget Hearing held Friday, September 21.

Bills were reviewed and approved for payment. Reports were approved from County Agent, Justice of the Peace, Library, Tax Assessor/Collector and Treasurer.

## Matadors fall to Kangaroos District play will kick-off Friday at Paducah

In a tough defensive ballgame, the Motley County Matadors beat the Kress Kangaroos in every way except the one that counts, on the scoreboard. The final score was Kress 17, Motley County 12.

Kress scored quickly in the game when the Matadors' first punt was blocked and ran back for a Kangaroo touchdown and the PAT was good. The Matadors responded with a 40 yard drive that resulted in a TD. The score came on a beautiful 24 yard pass from quarterback Tony Salazar to wide-out Quinten Rose. The PAT was no good. The Matadors put together another scoring drive of 48 yards with the help of a 25 yard strike from Salazar to tightend Clint Cooper down to the one yard line. After a 5 yard penalty against the Matadors, Ysef Alvarado rumbled into the end zone from 6 yards out. Again the PAT failed. After almost completely shut-

ting down the Kress offense for most of the first half, the Matadors let Kangaroo halfback Gabriel Vasquez catch a pass over the middle and race 45 yards for a touchdown. The PAT was good and the Kangaroos led 14-12 at halftime.

Stellar defensive play by both teams highlighted the second half. Even though the Matadors recovered four Kress fumbles (Quinten Rose recovered 2, Kyle Ashby and Justin Jameson each had one) and Shawn Marvel picked off a Kangaroo pass, the Matadors couldn't take advantage. Penalties helped kill several Matador drives in the second half. Twice they got inside the Kress 10 yard line and failed to score. The second time was after Kress scored on a 30 yard field goal to take a 17-12 lead. Starting on their own 43 with less than 3 minutes remaining in the game, the Matadors marched down

to the Kangaroo 9 yard line before a holding penalty backed the line of scrimmage to the 19. An incomplete pass and a sack on fourth down ended the game.

Defensively, Motley played an outstanding game by limiting a speedy Kress team to 4 first downs and 45 yards rushing. However they did blister the Matadors for 86 passing yards and a touchdown. The Matadors defensive stand was led by junior end Clint Cooper with 9 tackles, senior cornerback Shawn Marvel with 7, and senior safety Ysef Alvarado, and senior linebacker Frank Martinez with 6 each. Offensively the Matadors converted 11 first downs, and were again led by senior halfback Ysef Alvarado who had a game high of 73 rushing yards. Senior halfback Shawn Marvel rushed

### Charter Education program set for October 25

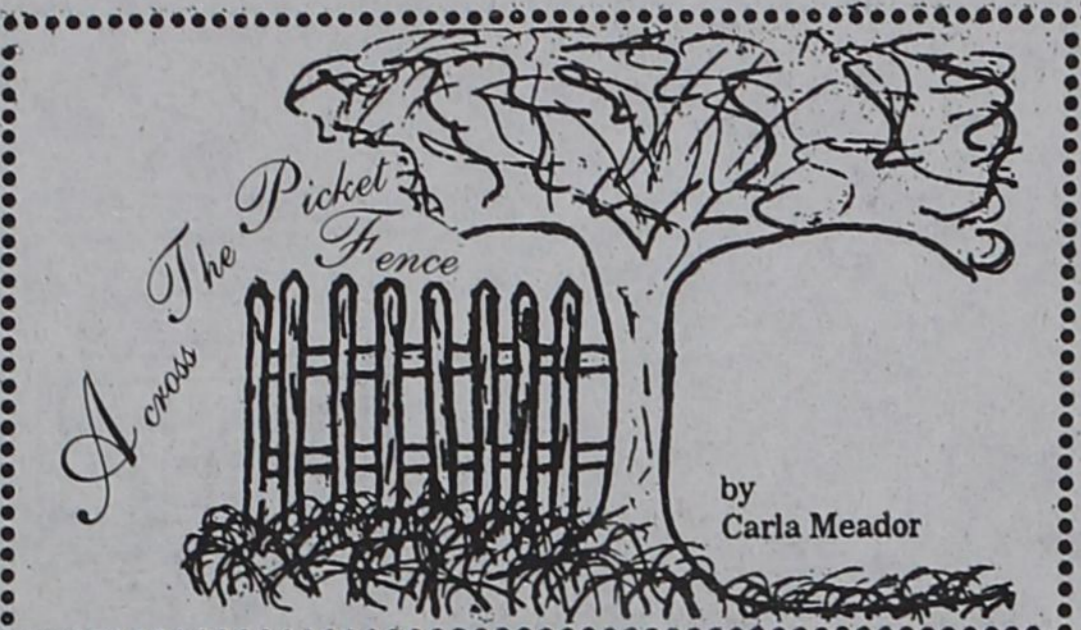
Do you want to develop a more responsible and respectful atmosphere in the home, school, workplace and community?

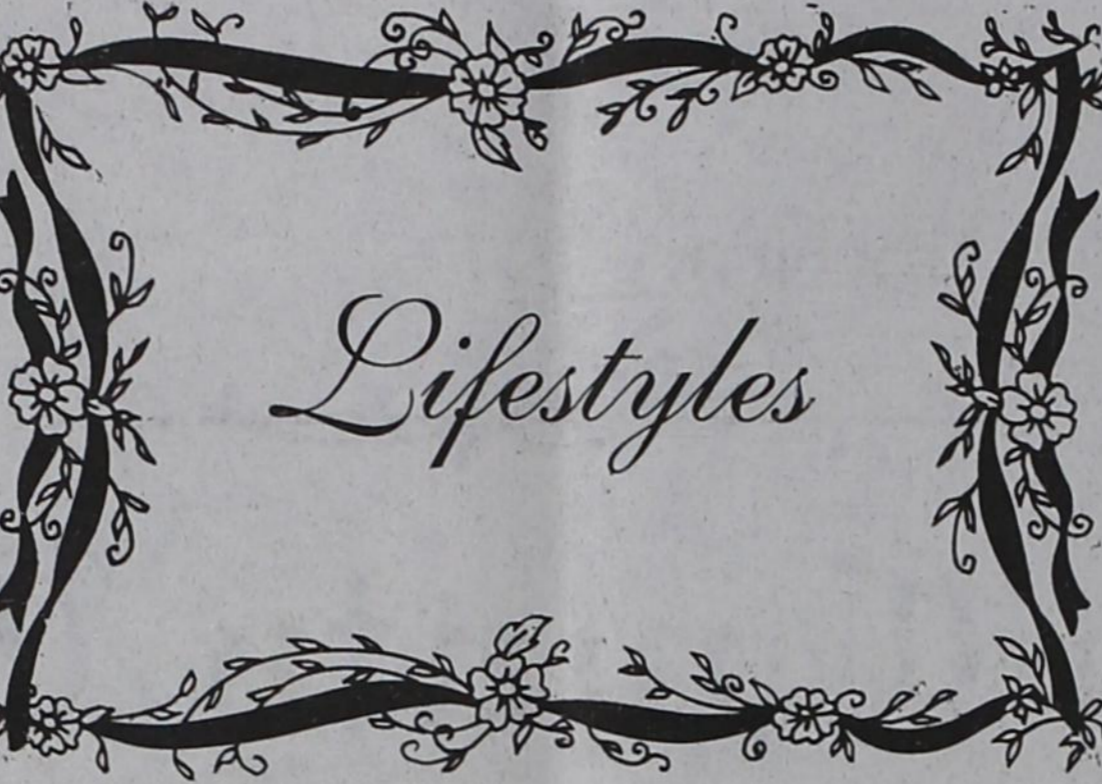
## Red Rovers attend women's program in Lubbock

**AG WINS BIG ONE HOUSE PASSES FARM BILL**  
 After some tough lobbying, some even tougher debate and a strong final vote the Farm Security Act of 2001 (H.R. 2646) was approved by the House of Representatives by a margin of 291-120 with 19 members not casting votes on the issue.

House Ag Committee Chairman Larry Combest and Ranking Minority Member Charles Stenholm masterfully steered their long awaited rewrite of the current Farm Bill to passage.

The House Bill provides \$170 Billion over ten years to provide a much needed strengthening of the safety net underpinning production agriculture and adds considerably to conservation, commodity promotion and trade enhancement programs.

That victory, however, came only after the defeat of an amendment offered by urban congressmen and environmental groups that would have gutted the safety net provisions of the Bill.

As it stands, the House has sent a strong message to both the Senate and the Bush Administration, that the farm sector deserves immediate assistance that can best be provided through a comprehensive approach that triggers support when times are bad.

H.R. 2646 completes a 2 1/2 year effort by the House Ag Committee to

research and hear pertinent testimony while weighing the pros and cons of literally hundreds of ideas on how to best support the heart of production agriculture in the U.S.

Opponents of the Bill were primarily led by environmental organizations that sought to divert farm support money to conservation programs.

Speculation and expectation now focus themselves squarely on the Senate Agriculture Committee. That Committee is led by Senator Tom Harkin (D-IA) and Ranking Minority Member Richard Lugar (R-IN).

Both Harkin and Lugar have failed to prepare for the possibility of a Senate farm package until just recently. That puts them well behind the curve and somewhat out of touch with the needs of farmers.

After passage of the House Bill, however, Harkin has announced plans to report a mark-up Bill by the end of October. Should the Senate remain in session through the end of the year as has been suggested by Senator majority Leader Tom Daschle (S-SD) then the chances for a Senate-House Conference on a new Farm Bill becomes a real possibility.

The only thing we know for sure is that the ball is squarely in the Senate Ag Committee's court and ability to secure a dramatic increase in Agriculture Program support hangs in the balance.

### TEXAN JIM BUTLER CHOSEN FOR TOP-RANKING USDA JOB

Secretary of Agriculture Ann Veneman has named Jim Butler deputy under secretary of Marketing and Regulatory Programs. This USDA office oversees the Agriculture Marketing Service, Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service, and the Grain Inspection, Packers and Stockyards Administration. The division safeguards the nation's animals and crops from pests and diseases, monitors the agricultural marketing system, ensures fair trade practices, and assures value and quality in agricultural products. Butler previously served as deputy vice chancellor of agriculture at Texas A&M University. For 10 years, he served as chief liaison with industry, federal, and state officials for the university's Agriculture Program.

### USDA AWARDS \$6 MILLION TO HELP MINORITY AND RURAL AREA FARMERS AND RANCHERS

The USDA recently awarded nearly 6 million dollars to 28 educational institutions or community-based organizations. The grants will be used to provide outreach, training, and technical assistance to minority and rural area farmers and ranchers. The objective of the program is to encourage and assist farmers and ranchers to own and operate farms, participate in agricultural programs, and become an integral part of the agricultural community. Participants are provided with training in farm management, record keeping, marketing opportunities, alternative farm enterprises, and other farm-related topics. Two Texas universities will receive a combined total of almost five hundred thousand dollars. The two universities are Prairie View A&M University and The University of Texas - Pan American in Edinburg.

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
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
