## David Martin Wins Tennis Tournament

David Martin, son of Mr. and Mrs. Wilburn Martin, won the Division C Boys Singles Tennis Championship Trophy, Saturday in the 1973 Lubbock Invitational Tournament.

Tournament director, Allen Holtman, stated it was the largest tennis tournament ever to be held in West Texas with 632 entries from 50 schools.

The C Division drew 398 netters and Brownfield won this division with 17 points, Denver City rated second and Matador and Phillips tied for third.

There were 101 entries in the C Boys Singles competition which included non seniors from AAA schools, and any player from AA, A, and B schools. In the two day run, Martin out-played seven opponents, and an upset occurred in Saturday's semi-final action when he defeated top-ranked Roger Kennedy of Denver City H.S. 3-6, 6-3, 6-1.

Others he defeated were James Scoggins, Estacado, 6-2, 6-1; Tony Love, Colorado City, 7-6, 6-1; Joe Nagy, Evans Jr. High, 6-2, 6-0; Brad Stout, Dalhart H.S., 6-3, 6-2; Ronald Knighton, Dunbar H.S., 6-4, 2-6, 6-2; won the championship from Allen Hope, Brownfield, 6-4, 2-6, 6-1.

## Water Problem Is Discussed At Club

PIONEERS hauled water in barrels in their wagons to supply livestock and for household use. The supply was from creeks and springs and later windmills.

Later the windmill supplied the source to almost everyone until someone discovered there was enough water in places for irrigation and that changed the water picture in West Texas and Eastern New Mexico.

The great Plains area developed the largest irrigated area in the world in the

production of food and fibre. It has been growing by leaps and bounds. The only problem is that the underground supply is being depleted.

The water problem was discussed Monday night by Tommy Swann and Duncan Ellison, both representatives of Water, Inc. They were the principal speakers at the scheduled meeting of the Matador Garden Club, and followed a buffet supper prepared by club members.

Mr. Swann, who was introduced by club President, Mrs. W. N. Pipkin, explained that Water Inc. is designed to replenish the water supply of West Texas and Eastern New Mexico, an area of 56 counties. The water would be supplied from near the mouth of the Mississippi River and transported by vast concrete canals, by means of giant pumps.

Mr. Swann said the Plains water level is dropping three to four feet each year and will be exhausted by 1980 according to estimates. The irrigation country is currently supplying approximately \$2 billions to the economy.

The plan to import water is feasible, the two men declared, although it will entail a great amount of money also the use of electric energy to supply the 40 pumping stations.

Mr. Ellison, who is executive director of Water Inc. explained that nine reservoir storage areas will be located between the Mississippi River and West Texas. He said Motley County is in a good position since one of the reservoirs will probably be immediately south in Dickens County.

The talks were followed by a question and answer period in which concerned Garden Club members asked a number of questions.

An album of religious songs, "Sweet Sounds of Jesus," by Richard Campbell has just been released for distribution. The album was cut in Nashville, Tenn., and is comprised of nine songs by the talented young native son of Matador.

Besides fame as a former Texas Tech football player, Campbell has won wide recognition for his singing. Saturday night he sang with the Lubbock Symphony Orchestra at the Sacred Music Festival in the Coliseum. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. R. E. Campbell Jr. of Matador.

The albums are on sale at the Matador Variety at \$5 each, including tax.

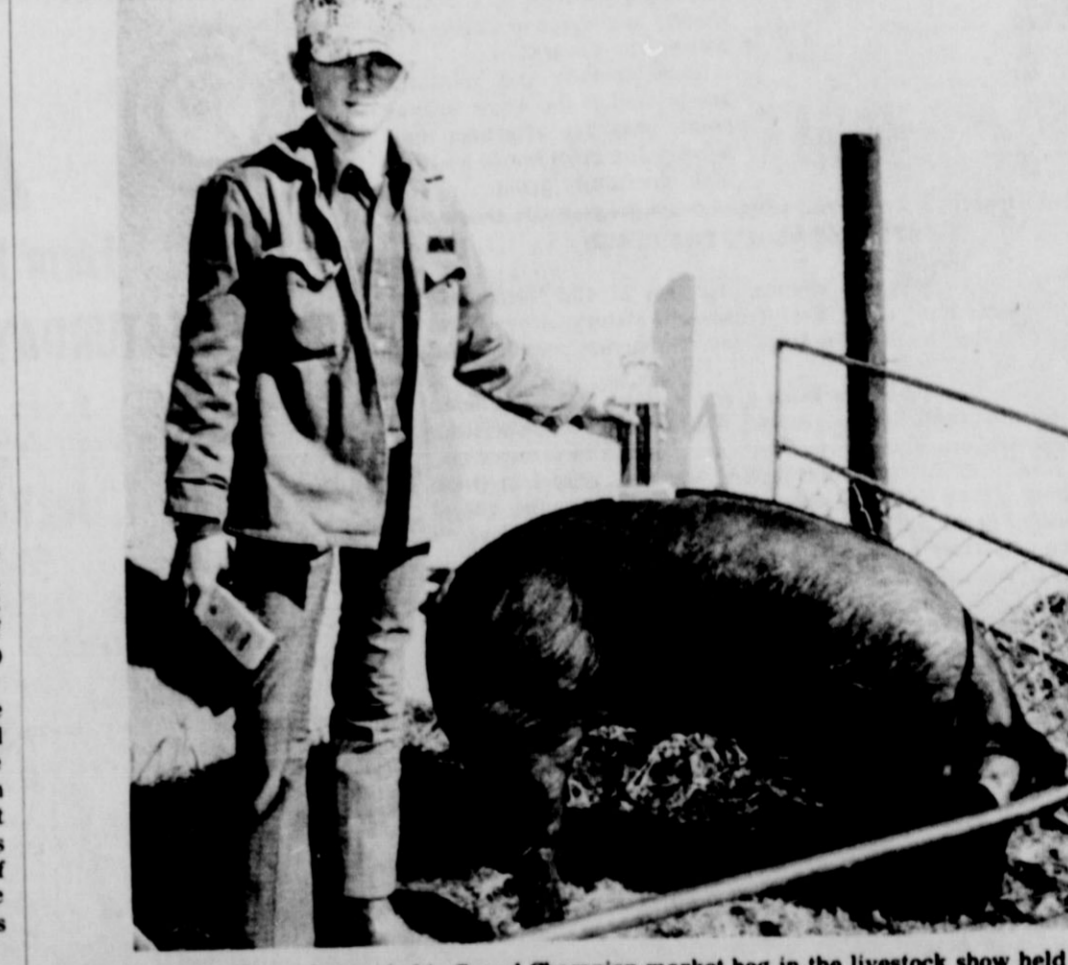

GRAND Champion steer in the 33rd annual Motley County Junior livestock show, Saturday was exhibited by Ben Grundy, Matador. The 1064-pound Angus was bred by L. B. Campbell, and was first in the heavy steer class. The animal sold for a premium of \$330 over market

price, to the First State Bank of Matador.

The 36 exhibitors in the show received a total of \$12,618.67 for their year's work. The show is sponsored by the Motley County Livestock Assn.

Floor bids on the steers (Hill Farm Feed Lots, Hart, Texas) was 49c. The floor bid on hogs was 43c (Farmers Hog Market, Plainview). Veteran auctioneer Ken Bozeman of Lubbock, said

the floor prices were the highest he had ever known.

### MRS. CLAUD JEFFERS OBSERVES 89th BIRTHDAY AT HOME HERE

Mrs. Claud Jeffers, Motley County pioneer, recently celebrated her 89th birthday. She was born March 9, 1884, near Knoxville, Tenn.

Her sons and their families spent the week end of March 10-11 here and attended services at the First United Methodist Church with Mrs. Jeffers. Here for the occasion were Mr. and Mrs. Elmo (Joe) Jeffers of Pampa; Mr. and Mrs. George Jeffers of Panhandle (6666Ranch) and their daughter, Miss Linda Jeffers of Tulsa; Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Jeffers of San Angelo and Mr. and Mrs. Jim Ward Jeffers and daughter, Carol Ann of Carrollton.

Mrs. Jeffers came to Texas in November of 1897, with her brother, Rufus M. Stevens, following the death of their mother in September of that year. Their father had died in 1895. They lived with relatives in Quannah, later moving to Eldorado, Okla. Betty, as she was called (she was born Susan Elizabeth Stevens) then accompanied her aunt and uncle to Carey, in Childress County, where they lived until her uncle's death, when she and her aunt moved to Childress.

"Miss Betty" came to Matador in 1902. She taught school in the Flag Springs community one year, then went to Nocona to take a course in typing and shorthand. She returned to Matador and taught at the Clements School near the Ford Ranch, for two years. "I found that I didn't care for typing. I never did use it after I left the school," she said.

She and Claud Jeffers, a cowboy on the Matador Ranch, were married here, November 1, 1906. After her husband's death, April 14, 1937, Mrs. Jeffers continued to make her home here for a time, then moved to Quannah, and later to Paducah, where she lived for four years before returning to Matador. Their youngest son, R. C. died in 1959, while living in Wyoming.

#### STUDIES ABOUT THE BIBLE

The four "gospel" writers, by use of Old Testament prophecies and recent New Testament history, proved that Jesus is the Messiah, the Holy One, the Savior, and the Lord of lords.

After that He appeared to more than five hundred brethren at one time, most of whom remain until now, but some have fallen asleep; then He appeared to James, then to all the apostles; and last of all, as it were to one untimely born, He appeared to me also."

This new message, acquainting the world with the last and greatest sacrifice of all, was first preached with power and completeness in Jerusalem, as recorded in the second chapter of Acts.

A brighter day for humanity had dawned.

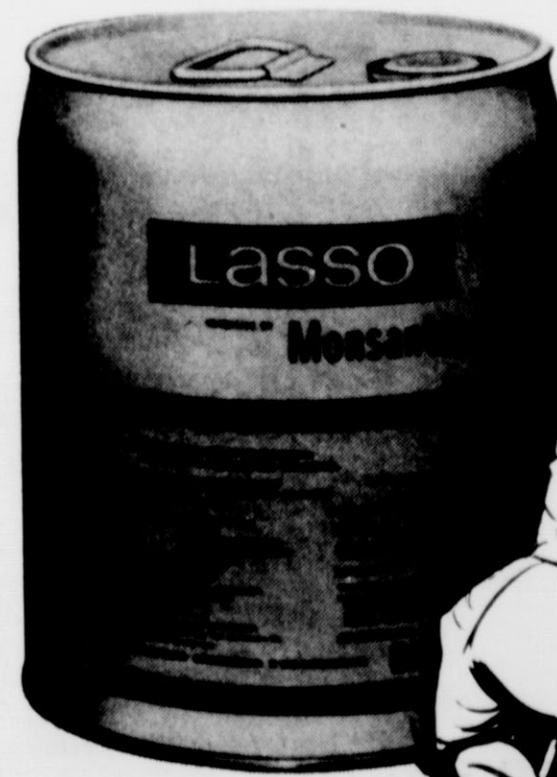
