### Tornado Warnings, Hail Hit County On Monday

Sheriff Alton Marshall said when contacted by the Tribune, "We have no idea who reported the tornado."

Residents of Motley County are asked to report any serious weather or tornado sightings to the local Sheriff's Office instead

of calling the Weather Bureau in Lubbock.
Shortly before ten o'clock the storm warning siren was sounded by cloud watchers, but no damage has been reported in the Matador vicinity.

Matador Received .40 inch of rain and pea size to golf ball size hail. No serious crop damage has been reported to the Tribune.

About .15 inch of rain was reported South of Flomot along with some hail, but it was reported that crop damage was not too severe.

Roaring Springs reported .88 inch of rain along with marble size hail.

On the Curtis Ozborn farm south of Afton the roof of a chicken house was lifted off and wrapped around an old pickup, It is assumed that a small tornado did the damage.

In a strip to the Southeast of Afton marble size to baseball size hail was reported along with 1¼ inches of rain. Several roofs were reported damaged by the hail along with some crops in that area.

One and one-half inch of rain and some marble size hail was reported on the Robert Forbis farm North of Afton.






