## Automobile Accident Proves Fatal

**Mrs. Melvin Meason Lies  
From Fall When Car  
Door Opens**

**MACHINE MOVING SLOW  
WHEN TRAGEDY OCCURS**

**Entire Community Grieves  
Loss Of Beloved Young  
Woman**

The sinister hand of tragedy ruthlessly tore a young wife from the side of her husband near 12 o'clock last Friday night; when Mrs. Melvin Meason fell from the opening door of an automobile in southwest Roaring Springs, striking her head on the hard street. She was rendered unconscious, from which state she did not recover. Death came at 9:30 Sunday night.

Talking with her husband as they drove homeward in the warm summer night, Mrs. Meason was resting her weight against the car door when it suddenly opened. Mr. Meason groped vainly in the darkness to avert the fall. Stopping the car, which was moving at a moderate rate of speed, almost instantly, medical aid and assistance was immediately summoned. Dr. J. F. Hughes, near whose home the accident occurred, upon examination pronounced concussion of the brain and declared life only a matter of short time.

Funeral services were held at the Baptist Church at 3 o'clock Monday afternoon by Rev. T. Marvin McBrayer assisted by Minister Ben West. A large funeral procession of sorrowing relatives and friends followed the body that had housed the beloved spirit, to the City Cemetery, where interment was made. A profusion of floral offerings were tendered in tribute to the passing of the noble character.

Allene Winkle Meason was born in Roby, Texas, on Sept. 23, 1913. She moved with her parents to Roaring Springs about 1920, where she has since made her home. She had been a member of the Baptist Church for some seven years. She was married in September, 1930, to Melvin Meason.

Beautiful, kind of disposition, her friends were those who knew her. Perhaps no more beautiful tribute exists than her love and devotion for her husband—their extreme, but short-lived happiness.

She is survived by her husband, Melvin Meason of Roaring Springs and two sisters, Mrs. Merwin Green of Roaring Springs and Mrs. Elzie Donovan of Afton.

**GOVERNMENT TO HOLD  
EXAMINATION COTTON  
STATISTICS COLLECTOR**

**APPLICATIONS MUST BE FIL-  
ED NOT LATER THAN  
JUNE 27**

The United States Civil Service Commission announces an open competitive examination for the position of Collector of Cotton Statistics in Motley county at a salary of \$210 per year. Applications must be on file with the U. S. Civil Service Commission at Washington, D. C., not later than June 27, 1933.

Residents of the county, not connected with the cotton industry in the past five years, between 21 and 60 years of age, of good health, furnishing photograph and fingerprints will be eligible for examination.

Application forms may be obtained from Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C., preference will not be granted unless veteran documentary proof is submitted.

Examinations will possibly be held in Floydada, Paducah and Spur.

**STAGE STARS MAKE UP  
"42ND STREET" CAST**

In staging the production of "42nd Street", which opens at the Palace Theatre, Spur, on Sunday, Warner Bros. selected its all star cast, not only with an eye to their ability to play for the screen, but also for their stage training. The picture, a dramatic story of the American stage taken from the novel by Bradford Ropes, is so intimately associated with backstage life that it was considered that every player must have had such an experience.

All the stars of the cast were on the stage before entering the picture work. They are Warner Baxter, Bebe Daniels, George Brent, Una Merkel, Ruby Keeler, Guy Kibbee, Ned Sparks, Dick Powell, Ginger Rogers and Allen Jenkins. As every part represents some character of the stage even the featured players and technicians were recruited from the ranks of the legitimate stage. Ropes, the author, started his career as a "hooter." Rian James and James Seymour, who wrote the screen play, have both been connected with the stage, the former as a playwright and Broadway columnist, and the latter as playwright and dramatic critic.

Lloyd Badon, the director, is a son of Frank Bacon, of "Lightnin'", and followed in his late father's footsteps on the stage before entering pictures. Busby Berkeley, who created and staged the dances and ensembles, is famous as a Broadway director.

Al Dubin and Harry Warren, noted Broadway song writers, both wrote the songs for the picture, they also played the parts of song-writers in the picture. Harry Akst, the rehearsal pianist in the picture once did that work in real life before becoming a composer of such song hits as "Am I Blue?"

**WESTS COLORFUL PAST  
WILL BE RECALLED AT  
RODEO COWBOY REUNION**

**"SCANDALOUS" JOHN SEL-  
MAN ARENA DIRECTOR  
FOR OLD RIDERS**

Stamford, June.—A genuine western rodeo featuring actual cowboys from the ranches of Texas and adjoining states will be the central attraction around which is being arranged the program of entertainment for the Fourth Annual Texas Cowboy Reunion to be held in Stamford July 3, 4 and 5.

Rodeo performances will be held twice daily, at 2:30 p. m. and 8 p. m. in the natural amphitheatre on the Reunion grounds. Grandstand seating capacity has been doubled this year to accommodate the crowds which have been increasing in number each year. Several downtown ticket booths will be operated this year to avoid delay and confusion at the grounds.

The rodeo program will include contests in bronc-busting, steer-riding, calf-roping and wild-cow-milking at each performance. Two special features will be the contest for the best "cutting horse" and the calf-roping contest for cowboys over 55 years of age. A handsome saddle will be the prize for the champion roper among these veterans of the lariat.

Special prizes also are offered for the champion ropers among the younger generation of cowboys. The ten ropers making the best average time in calf-roping and wild-cow-milking during the three days of the rodeo will compete for these prizes in the closing performance on the night of July 5.

In addition to the special prizes, some \$1450 in cash will be paid the winners in various events, the money being awarded at the close of each day's contests. Low admission prices will prevail, general admission being 50 cents plus tax and grandstand seat 25 cents additional.

Entry fees for rodeo contestants will be \$4 a day for calf-roping, \$3 a day for bronc-riding, \$4 a day for wild-cow-milking, \$5 for cutting-horse contest and \$2.50 a day for steer-riding. There is no entrance fee for the old-time cowboys' calf-roping contest.

Day money in each of the roping events—calf-roping and cow-milking—is \$130 for each day, divided into five prizes ranging from \$50 or first prize to \$10 for fifth prize. The purse each day in bronc-riding is \$100 and in steer-riding \$75. The purse in the cutting-horse contest is \$150 for one day only.

The Reunion management has just published a folder containing the rodeo rules and detailed prize list. "Scandalous" John Selman, who was selected last year as the most typical cowboy under 55 years of age, is rodeo arena director.

"Thunder Beast" Breathes Again at World's Fair



Portion of the Sinclair Prehistoric Exhibit at the World's Fair—the first attempt ever to reproduce out of doors the conditions of life as they existed a hundred million years ago.

Called "Thunder Beast" by scientists because the ground trembled under his 40-ton tread, the heavy Brontosaurus will "breathe" and "live again" at the Chicago World's Fair. How this 70-foot dinosaur and his reptilian kin will appear to visitors to the Sinclair Prehistoric Exhibit is shown in the above picture. The Brontosaurus, largest of dinosaurs, appears to the left in the illustration. In the center, the ferocious Tyrannosaurus Rex, fiercest of dinosaurs, is engaged in a battle with his ancient foe, Triceratops, while a Dusk-billed Dinosaur watches the fray from the coolness of a nearby pond.
