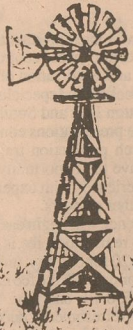

## Three More Candidates Throw Hat In The Race For Precinct 4 Commissioner

Three more Roaring Springs men threw their hats into their candidate ring when they filed for a chance at Commissioner Precinct 4. Harold Parks, J.T. Swim, and Doyle Shannon announced their candidacy this week. Also seeking election for this position is J.N. Fletcher, incumbent.

J.T. Swim has authorized the Motley County Tribune to announce his candidacy for Commissioner Precinct 4.

Mr. Swim stated, "It is with pleasure that I pause to say thank you for your friendship, goodwill, and vote of confidence when you elected me Justice of the Peace. I have worked hard to merit your trust."

## Participants Sought For Bucket Calf Project

The Motley County Livestock Directors are busy getting things in order for the Livestock Show on March 12, 1994. A project that began in 1991 at our local show to enable younger youth to have a cattle project that fits their physical size and maturity level is called the Bucket Calf Project. Children in Kindergarten through 2nd grade, and who are too young to enter 4-H are eligible.

A bucket calf is an orphan or newborn calf fed on bucket or bottle. The calf should be approximately 90 days old by show date. The main emphasis of this project is the record-keeping, to teach basic beef management skills without a large investment, and to teach proper health care and nutritional requirements

of young cattle.

The child's knowledge of the animal will be judged the day of the show. The animal and its appearance will not be judged; however, the child with parental guidance is encouraged to have the calf present and to perform any grooming they see fit.

Participants must have their bucket calf by January 15, 1994. The calf is not eligible for the premium sale so that true market value may be taught. 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# Motley County School News

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## 1994 College Information Hotline

The College Information Hotline (available via a toll-free call) provides timely information concerning postsecondary educational opportunities to Texas students and their families. One weekend in January is set aside for the Hotline operation each year.

The toll-free number (1-800-253-8989) is publicized through radio, television, newspapers, and high school guidance offices throughout the state of Texas. A Hotline information packet is distributed in December and early January.

Teams of high school and college admission counselors will man ten (10) incoming WATTS phone lines. Each year, about seventy-five (75) professional counselors from schools across Texas volunteer to field incoming calls. Spanish speaking counselors are available each shift. The Hotline is operated from the Freshman Admission Center at the University of Texas at Austin. All volunteers are members of the Texas Association of College Admission Counselors (TA-CAC).

During the calls, counselors spend much time counseling students and their parents about on planning for college and careers. Callers may also request information from specific colleges and universities. If counselors are unable to answer any of the caller's questions, they will research the answer and provide the information within the week following the call.

Admission representatives from over twenty-five public and private colleges and universities in Texas will be on duty throughout the weekend. Although it is impossible to guarantee that a counselor from a particular school will be present, we are often able to let the caller speak to a representative from the school of interest.

Hotline operators also field many questions about vocational and technical schools and community colleges. We will also provide information about any col-

The Hotline is directed to anyone in the state who has questions about any aspect of college admission, financial aid, degree programs, housing, student life and activities, or special programs.

Historically, callers are predominately high school students and their parents, but an increasing number of information requests are coming from middle school students, current college students, adults who did not complete college or have never attended, and veterans with questions about their benefits.

The 1994 Hotline is the ninth year the project has been in operation. Funding is provided by the Greater East Texas High Education Authority. The Texas Hotline is the largest project of its type in the nation. Last year, over a thousand (1000) calls about college admission and financial aid were handled by our volunteers.

## Caprock Cotton Conference To Offer 8 CEU's

The latest information to help area cotton farmers plan their 1994 crop will be presented in Crosbyton on January 25-26, 1994 during the Caprock Cotton Conference. The two-day program, featuring national leaders in the cotton industry, will be at the Crosby Cotton Pioneer Memorial Museum and Civic Center, 101 West Main Street.

The Conference is designed for the cotton growers of the Rolling Plains, South Plains, and West Texas. The program has been approved for eight (8) continuing education units (CEU) for recertification of licensed private chemical applicators who attend.

The first day's sessions will focus on environmental regulations and government legislation affecting Texas Agriculture. Rick Perry, Texas Agriculture Commissioner, will discuss the effect of NAFTA on agriculture in Texas. Congressman Charles Stenholm will cover the consolidation of the USDA agencies.

Harold Bob Bennett, State Executive Director of ASCS, will discuss the future of Government Farm Programs. In addition, various guest speakers will be on hand to address environmental concerns affecting agricultural producers.

Wednesday, January 26 will feature

information on the latest production, technology, insect control, weed control, water management, and fertilization of cotton. Top quality speakers and specialists from across the Cotton Belt and South Plains area will make presentations concerning current research production trails. Producers will have the opportunity to discuss their experiences with experts, specialists, and other growers.

The conference will begin each day at 9:00 a.m. The registration fee is \$35 for both days, or \$20 for one day, until January 17. After January 17, the fee is \$45 for both days or \$30 for one day. The fee includes lunch, refreshments, door prizes, and admission to the technical sessions and exhibits. Checks should be made payable to the Caprock Cotton Conference.

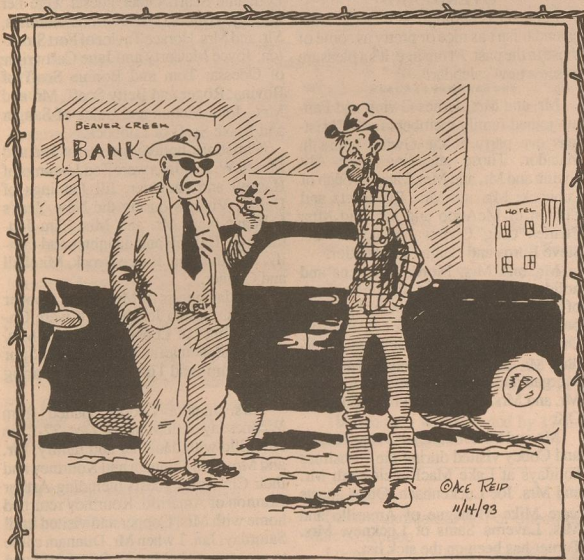
