

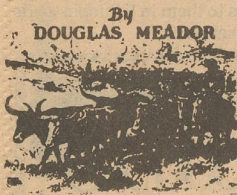

## Fire Dept. Receives New Fire Truck

The Texas Forest Service is working to bring fire protection closer to many rural homes. A 1973 amendment to the Texas Education Code authorized the service to develop rural fire protection plans and provide training and equipment to organized fire fighting groups in the state.

The Matador Volunteer Fire Department received a one ton, four wheel drive unit from the Forest Service in Lufkin, Texas, Wednesday, September 7. The unit will be used for range fires as well as for town and car fires. The unit is designed to pump from a self contained water supply or from a fire hydrant. Members of the fire department equipped the new truck with radio equipment and additional lights after its arrival here last Wednesday.

The Texas Forest Service, through the help of the Division of Disaster Emergency Services of the Department of Public Safety, obtains surplus military vehicles. These 2½ ton and 1 ton 6-wheel and 4-wheel drive trucks are then equipped with water tanks, pumps, hose and accessory fire-fighting equipment. The units are painted by prisoners at the department of Corrections in Huntsville.

The Forest Service provides these firetrucks to community volunteer fire departments on a permanent lease basis. An RFD firetruck will cost the community about one-fourth of the price of a commercial unit. Of the total cost, half of the outfitting of each rig is borne by the TFS. The community pays the other half. Since the program began in 1973, 78 communities have been provided with firetrucks.

## Ground Work Starts

City council members met with Matador Jaycees' in a special session at City Hall recently, to begin ground work on a housing project in Matador. During the meeting a Housing Authority Board was selected and consists of Kenneth Marshall, Chairman; Jerry Jones, Co-chairman; Rickey Lawrence, Secretary and Dude Speed and Danny James, members.

Architects for the housing project will be Pierce Pace and associates of Midland, Texas. Additional information will be presented to the public as it becomes available to the housing committee.

Public interest is urged in this housing project as Matador is in vital need of additional housing. With new families moving into this area, the problem of finding proper housing has become major.

## Russell Resigns

At the last meeting of the Motley County Hospital Board, Monday, Sept. 5, John M. (Sonny) Russell announced his resignation as president of the board, effective October 1. Russell stated that during the past year his personal business has suffered somewhat, due to his outside activities, and he felt that he had to eliminate one of these. Because the hospital has been opened, received medicare approval and seems to be running as smoothly as can be expected, Russell felt that it was time to let someone else take over this position.

In discussing his resignation, Russell said that there were rumors of dissent among board members. He stated that this was untrue, as board members worked closely together to accomplish their goals.

Russell also expressed appreciation to Hospital Administrator, Sut Braselton who handled all the necessary paper work required by state and government agencies. "Without his help board members would probably not have been able to accomplish all that they have," said Russell. In closing Russell said that the Hospital and Clinic are a business industry that is putting a \$100,000 payroll into the community and both need local support.

## City Council Meets

The City Council, City of Matador convened in regular meeting at 7:30 p.m. in the meeting room of the City Hall, Tuesday, Sept. 13.

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Kirby Campbell with the reading of the minutes of the last regular meeting. The minutes were approved as read. During the business meeting all outstanding bills were allowed and ordered paid.

City Council members discussed service by the Mini Bus, which provides transportation for the elderly and disabled citizens in the community. As the Mini Bus will not be funded by Motley County, council members decided to fund this service so that it will not be discontinued, as council members feel that this is a necessary service to our community.

A lengthy discussion followed about the need for larger water mains and fire plugs in the northwestern portion of the City. No definite decision was made on steps to be taken in this matter. Council members plan to find out if there are government funds available for this project.

With no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

## Matadors Edge Past Paducah

Motley Matadors edged past the Paducah Dragons in their opening home game Friday night, by a score of 14 - 13. The game was a hard hitting contest on both sides and both teams sustained mild injuries.

The Matadors moved the ball well behind a strong line. Bryan Timmons, Bobby McKelvey and Robert Parker continually opened up large holes off tackle. The offense was carried by a good ground game that netted 250 yards rushing. Jerry Lee was once again the leading ground gainer with 140 yards and two touchdowns to his credit.

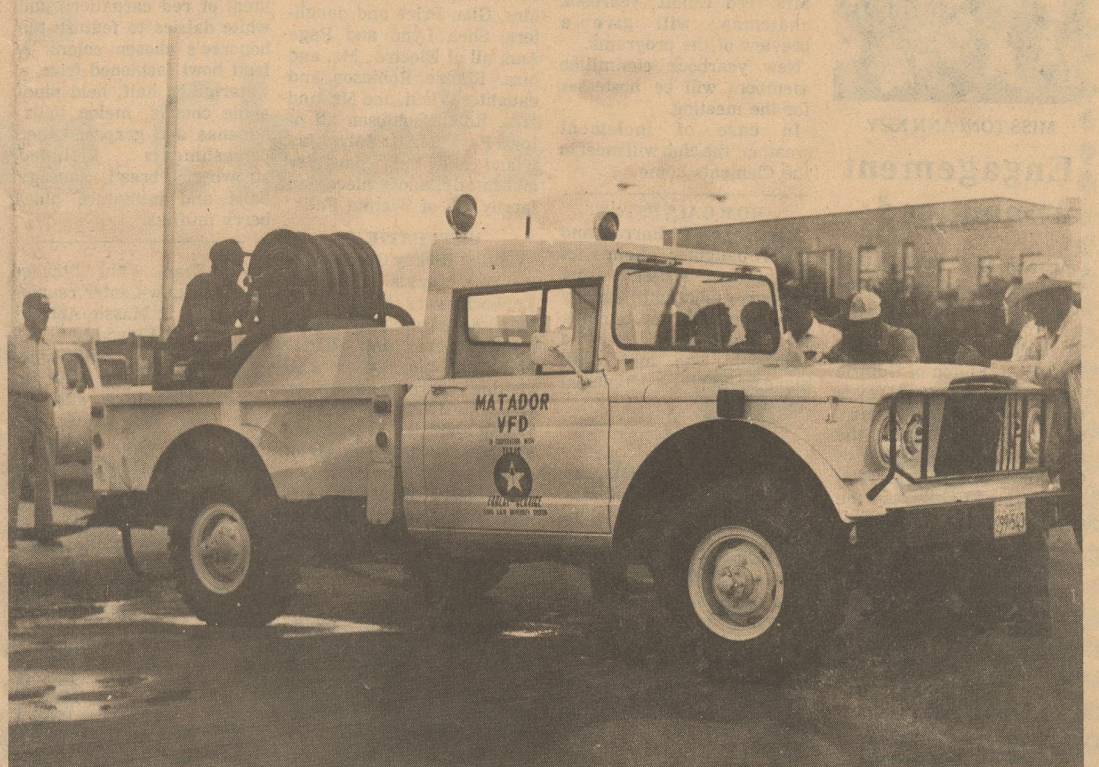
Defensively, the Matadors held Paducah to a 78 yard rushing total, but could not stop an aerial bombardment that netted 207 yards and a touchdown. Outstanding defensive players for the Matadors were Robert Shannon, Mike Green, Mark Wason and Ricky Turner.

The game was an outstanding victory for the Matadors since Paducah has such an explosive offense. Last week the Dragons gained 385 yards against Class AA Childress.

The local team led 14 - 7 with two minutes left in the game, when a 75 yard pass closed the gap with a Paducah touchdown. Two point run attempt failed, leaving Motley County in the lead.

Coach Randy Hicks stated, "I am pleased with the character and determination of the Motley County ball team. Several members played well, even with minor injuries and sickness."

## Town Meeting Day Spurs Involvement

Involvement in community affairs and projects, and the solution to a range of problems occupied the attention Sunday afternoon of a large group of interested Motley County citizens.

More than a hundred persons registered at the Motley County school building for a county-wide Town Meeting Day session which started at 2 p.m. and concluded at 6 p.m. following a barbecue supper in the school cafeteria.

Roger Marsh and Hosea Griego of Amarillo, volunteers of the Texas Committee for Town Meeting, met with the county delegation to assist in evaluating challenges and proposals. Many challenges were explored, such as lack of employment, especially for young people; the need for an industry; lack of leadership; lack of cooperation between communities in the county; unpaved streets, no street lights and no sewer lines in sections of Matador; no recreational facilities (skating, bowling, etc.) for young people; no vocational courses; no public restroom facilities, no child care center; and Senior Citizens needs.

Proposals were offered in the areas of industrial development, County-Cities cooperation, youth activities, and Senior Citizens.

A large number of young people participated in the discussions, and as an outcome, a Youth Council has been formed to meet with the City Council and other adult leaders in an effort to reach certain goals for youth activities.

Also, it was learned Wednesday, that the Green Thumb crew of workers has been enlisted to repair and paint the tennis court at Roaring Springs. This facility was built a number of years ago under the leadership of the Parent-Teacher Association, with funds raised in community projects.

Town Meeting is an extension of the national Bicentennial program instigated last year by the Institute of Cultural Affairs, "a not-for-profit research, demonstration and training group concerned with the human factor in community development."

The meetings locally, which began in August, were arranged through Mayor Kirby Campbell, Matador, who expressed his appreciation for the cooperation and participation of everyone who attended.

"The response has been tremendous," he declared. "There is no way I can personally thank all those who helped in organizing the program and making all the arrangements. A lot of people were involved and worked throughout the afternoon. For their efforts, and to all of you who attended, I extend my sincere thanks."

## Construction Begins On Water System

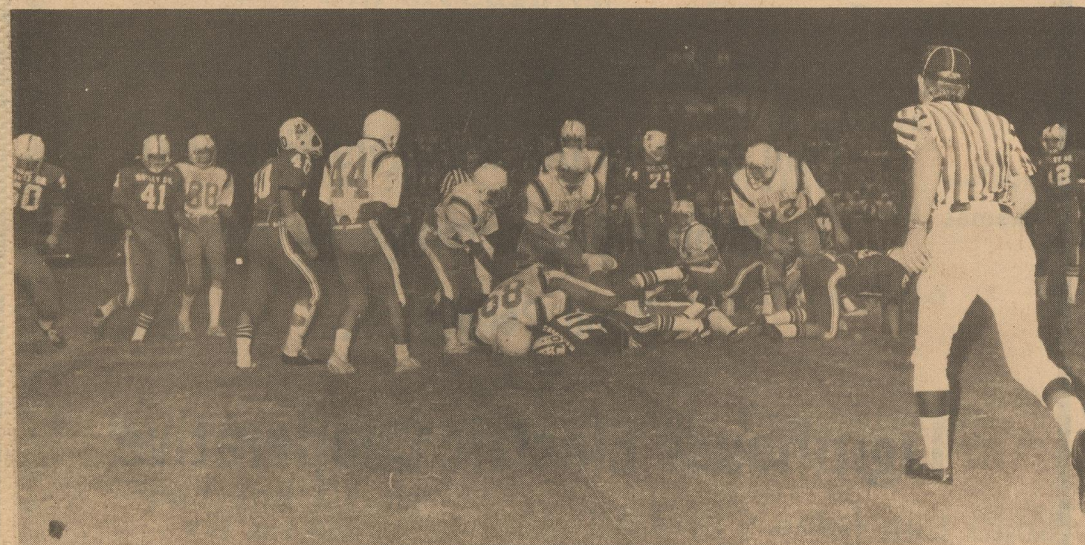
A work order was issued around August 10 to begin construction on the new water system for the City of Matador. The first delivery of pipe for the system arrived August 30 and work is underway with the clearing of the right of way. Water board members had anticipated that the new system would be in operation by Sept. 1. Construction was delayed however, when engineers had to comply with further requirements by the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). These requirements were met and gave a green light for work to begin.

In May 1975 voters in Matador approved the issuance of \$284,000 in bonds for a new water system after Mayor Kirby Campbell received a letter from the State Health Department issuing a warning that nitrate levels in the present water system were slightly over the acceptable mark and could be harmful to infants.

In December 1975, the city received authority to use funds in the amount of a \$100,000 grant from HUD, to be used along with the \$284,000 in bonds that city voters had okayed. The grant was approved in August of 1975 but the following months were required for legal procedures before clearance could be granted.

Bids were opened May 5, 1977 at a meeting of the Matador Water District and a contract let for construction of the new

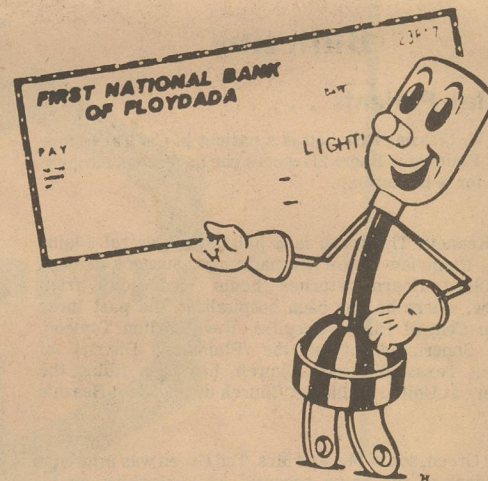

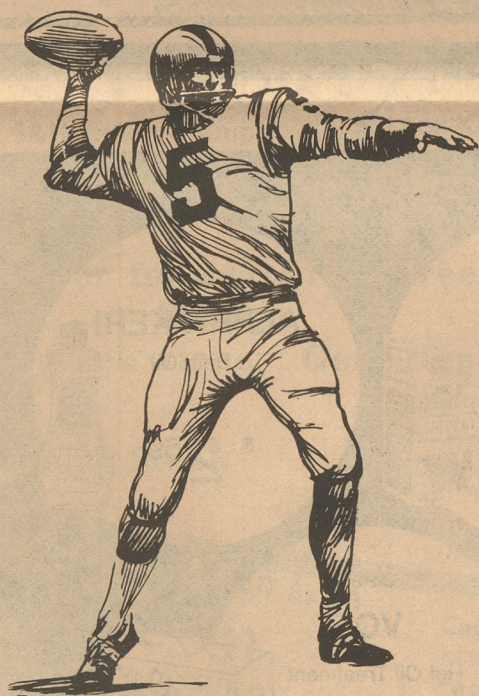

**ATTEND SPHS MEETING**  
Mrs. H. R. "Skeet" Jameson attended a board of directors special annual meeting of the South Plains Health Systems, Inc., Saturday at the Memorial Civic Center in Lubbock.

The board meeting began with the election of executive officers and Dr. John H.

Selby of Lubbock was re-elected chairman, John O. Peck of Floydada, Vice Chairman; Gordon Russell of Hale Center, former Matador resident, Secretary and Ramon Chapa of Lubbock, Treasurer.

The directors expressed their dis-satisfaction with the current medical program and voted to send a delegation of three to five persons to Austin to air complaints about the proposed state medical facilities plan they feel is unfair to the South Plains area.

The state medical facilities plan with DHEW has a national goal of a maximum of four beds per thousand population and an average minimum occupancy rate of 80 per cent. While the statistical methods may be appropriate for parts of the state, the SPHS area 2 members believe such rules could threaten effective health care in the mostly rural, widely spread 15 county area covered by SPHS.

The afternoon session was devoted to group discussion of a draft outline of proposed goals in the SPHS Health System Plan. The board members were asked to place in order of importance the health concerns and goals listed in the draft that would benefit their area. It was stressed throughout the session to keep foremost in mind our

government's inflationary situation when selecting the best SPHS health plans.

## Massingill Elected Scout Executive

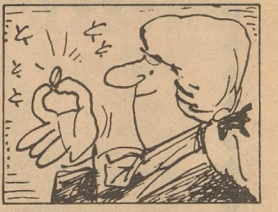

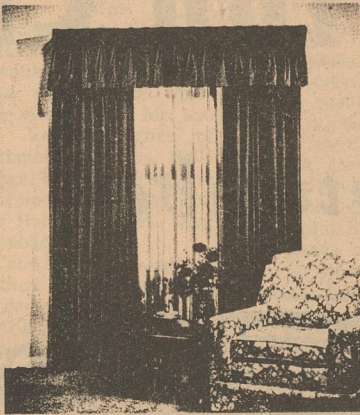

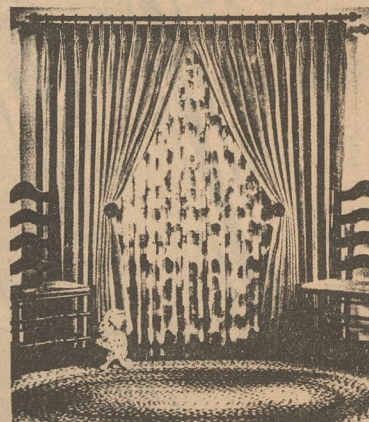

## PUBLIC NOTICE

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 8, 1977

### NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 18)

S.J.R. 18 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to provide for expanding the Court of Criminal Appeals from its current membership of five judges to nine judges and to permit the court to sit in panels of three judges.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment increasing the size of the Court of Criminal Appeals to nine judges, and permitting the court to sit in panels of three judges."

### NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 13)

S.J.R. 13 proposes a constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$200 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund and to allow surviving widows of veterans to purchase tracts under certain circumstances.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$200 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund and to allow surviving widows of veterans to purchase tracts under certain circumstances."

### NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 3)

Under current Texas law a person charged with a felony offense who has previously been convicted of two felony offenses may be denied bail. S.J.R. 3 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution which would also result in the denial of bail, for a limited time and subject to appeal, to a person accused of committing a felony while on bail for a prior felony for which the person has been indicted, or accused of a felony involving the use of

a deadly weapon after being convicted of a prior felony.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment permitting denial of bail to a person charged with a felony offense who has been theretofore twice convicted of a felony offense, or charged with a felony offense committed while that person was admitted to bail on a prior felony indictment, or charged with a crime involving the use of a deadly weapon where there is evidence such person has been convicted of a prior felony offense; providing for a 60-day limit to that person's incarceration without trial; and providing for that person's right of appeal."

### NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 5)

S.J.R. 5 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the legislature to grant exemptions or other relief from ad valorem taxes on property designated for the preservation of cultural, historical or natural history resources.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing tax relief to preserve certain cultural, historical, or natural history resources."

### NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 19)

S.J.R. 19 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the formation of associations authorized to collect certain refundable assessments from producers of poultry, livestock, and other raw agricultural or marine products and validating the 1967 law regarding the formation of such associations.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the formation of agricultural or marine associations which may mandate the collection of refundable assessments for improvement of production, marketing, or use of their products."

### NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)

S.J.R. 49 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to permit the legislature to authorize state and national banks to exercise banking privileges by use of electronic devices or machines located at such places as may be provided by law and authorizes the sharing of such electronic devices or machines among banks on a reasonable, non-discriminatory basis.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:










"The constitutional amendment to give the legislature the power to authorize state and national banks to exercise banking and discounting privileges by use of electronic devices or machines."

### NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 30)

S.J.R. 30 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution changing the name of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and making several changes in its powers and procedures. The most significant change would authorize the Commission to suspend from office judges and justices under indictment.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment changing the name of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct, and relating to the commission and the powers and proceedings of the commission, a master, and the supreme court, or court of civil appeals justices serving in place of the supreme court, for the suspension, censure, removal, or involuntary retirement of a justice, judge, or justice of the peace under certain circumstances."

1/2 cup water  
1 envelope unflavored gelatin  
4 cups peeled, pitted, ripe peaches (about 2 lbs)  
2 tablespoons lemon juice  
1 1/2 cups Karo light corn syrup  
In small saucepan sprinkle gelatin over water. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until gelatin dissolves. Place half of peaches and lemon juice in blender container; cover. Blend at high speed 1 minute or until liquefied. Add remaining peaches 1 at a time continuously blending until all are liquefied. With blender at low speed gradually add gelatin mixture and corn syrup until blended. Pour into 9 x 5 x 3-inch loaf pan. Freeze 1 to 2 hours or until almost firm. Beat until smooth but still frozen. Cover and freeze 3 hours, or until firm. Makes 1 1/2 quarts.

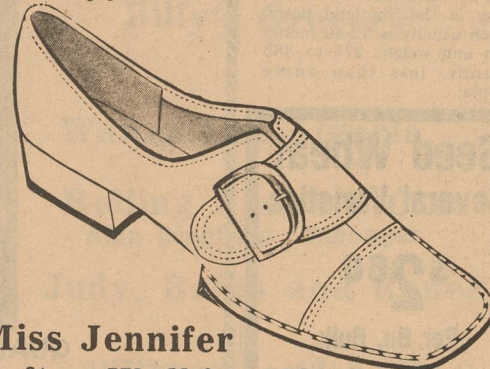

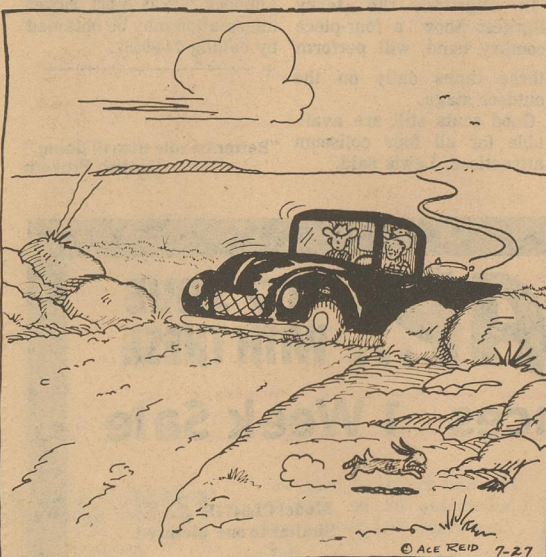

Of a total of five bids received, low bid was submitted by Bowles Construction of Burkburnett in the amount of \$269,026.01. This was for construction of line, pumps, pump station reservoir and other facilities necessary to complete the water system from the well field one mile east of Roaring Springs to the City of Matador.

Construction deadline for the new water system is December 1. The new wells will be capable of producing approximately 600 gallons per minute and will replace the present system which dates to 1928.

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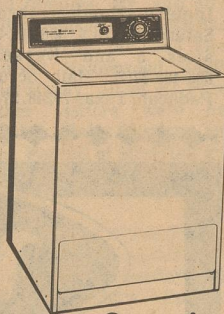
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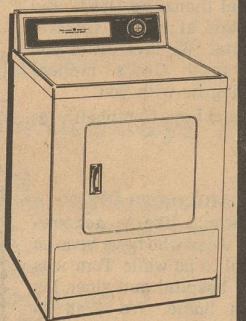
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
