**Second Negro Shot To Death By Georgians**

DARIEN, Ga., Sept. 9 (AP)—"Rubber" Bryan, 24, sought as the second negro who participated in a gun fight yesterday in which a police officer was slain and three others wounded, was found shot to death in a woods near here today,

according to a report from deputy sheriffs.

Bryan's body was lying in a woods near his home, authorities said, in the opposite direction of the swamps where George Grant, 40-year-old negro believed to have shot Bryan's companion in yesterday's gun battle, was captured.

Grant later was lynched in the county jail and a detachment of National Guardsmen was sent here.

Bryan apparently had been fatally wounded in the back with a shotgun.

Just before word of the finding of the body reached here, militiamen prepared to thrash through the Altamaha River swamps with tear gas bombs.

Grant was said to have been identified by R. J. Anderson, Darien night marshal, as one of the two negroes who wounded him when he found them approaching the Darien bank early yesterday.

Robert L. Freeman, acting chief of Glynn county police, was fatally shot, and Deputy Sheriff J. H. Collins and John Fisher, wounded in pursuit of the negroes.

Last night authorities visited the homes of both Grant and Bryan and reported the finding of a quantity of stolen goods in each.

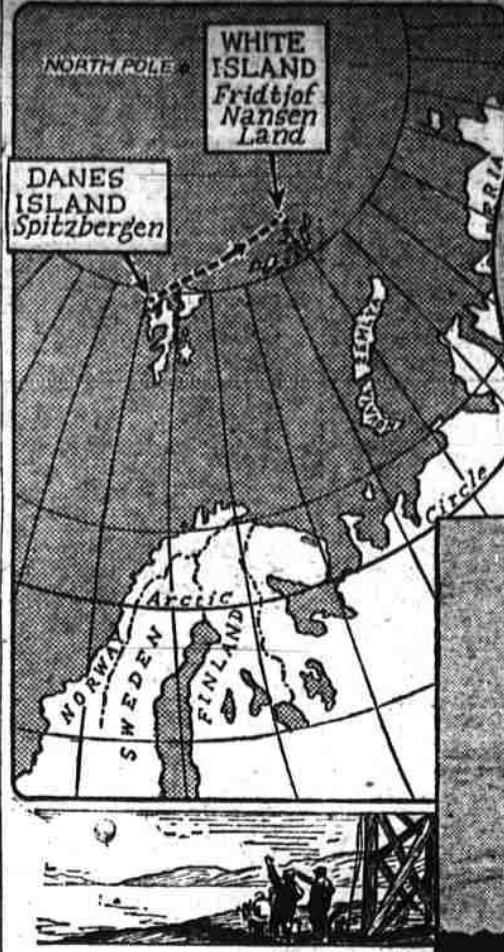

Michigan To Make Decision Upon Couzens

DETROIT, Sept. 9 (AP)—Whether Michigan Republicans will punish by their votes the party irregularly of Senator James Couzens, numbered among the independents in the United States Senate, is one of the questions to be decided by the statewide primary today.

Chase S. Osborn, of Sault Ste. Marie, former governor, has made the accusation that Senator Couzens is not a "regular" Republican.

The wet and dry issue has received only passing mention in this campaign. Although Senator Couzens has said he is not in sympathy with prohibition, he has promised to support laws for its enforcement as long as it is on the books.

The wet and dry issue has been paramount, however, in the sixth congressional district which has the largest population of any district in the United States.

BUENOS AIRES, ARGENTINA, Sept. 9 (AP)—The streets of the capital were cleared of gun brandishing mobs today, only after seven persons had been killed, 50 wounded, and pillage had ruled for several hours.

G.W.P. Hunt Seeks Eighth Arizona Term

PHOENIX, Ariz., Sept. 9. (AP)—George W. P. Hunt, six times governor of Arizona, sought his eighth Democratic nomination for the chief executive's office in the state's elections today.

Hunt, former prospector and cowboy, was opposed in his party by Frank H. Lyman, former justice of the Arizona supreme court.

Gov. John C. Phillips, who administered Hunt his first defeat since Arizona became a state in 1912 by riding the Hoover landslide into the governor's chair in 1928, was unopposed for the Republican nomination.

Hunt was Arizona's first governor and served until 1919, when he was appointed United States minister to Siam.

Lewis W. Douglas, Democrat and incumbent, had no opposition from either party for election to Arizona's lone seat in the house of representatives.

Santa Domingo Problem Now Food, Water

SANTO DOMINGO, Sept. 9 (AP)—Furnishing of food and water to Santo Domingo's strikers thousands today became a problem of increasing importance to national and Red Cross authorities.

The city was calm on the surface today, but there still were cases of looting in the armories by young civilians who, having no arms, took vigorous steps to get them.

The guard on duty on the roof of the general postoffice apparently precipitated terror by shooting but the electric lamps around the building as a means of quickly making ready for defense.

The shots were mistaken for enemy gunfire by the guards at government house three blocks away.

Machine gun and rifle fire, exchanged between the forces at the government house and postoffice, swept the plaza with deadly effect.

Several thousand young civilians determined to defend the newly established government, raided stores and handling firearms.

During the confusion, reports spread that the Argentine navy squadron of 13 vessels lying in harbor at Buenos Aires had begun to bombard the capital.

Five sharpened shells were fired at the light artillery defending the government house in the direction of the harbor, all falling close to the ships of Admiral Storni.

Provisional President Uriburu issued a statement ordering the surrender of all arms in the possession of private persons within twelve hours. Martial law was threatened.

While considerable food has been brought for relief purposes by the steamships Ruth Lykes and Castorine and the Grebe from Puerto Rico, and in the steamship Tryon's cargo of rice from Europe the amount has been little compared to what is needed.

A survey shows that more than 1,200 seriously injured patients are receiving treatment in many hospitals and impromptu first aid stations in the city. Many of them suffer from gangrenous infections.

The loss of life has been so great that no effort to report deaths to a central office has been made. Cremation still continues.

## Answered By Dr. S. Parkes Cadman

Questions from readers are answered daily by the Rev. Dr. S. Parkes Cadman, Radio Minister of the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America. Dr. Cadman seeks to answer inquiries that appear to be representative of the trends of thought in the many letters which he receives.

Sayre, Pa. If all the space visible to the modern telescope were represented by the radius of a mile the planet we occupy would be an invisible electron within it. No brain, however brilliant, can conceive what that comparison really signifies. Sir H. Jeans is your best guide through these infinitudes. Dante himself could not do them justice, nor begin to depict the illimitable life movement they enshrine. Maurice Maeterlinck claims we are able to deduce the laws govern-

What works would you recommend for a layman to enable him to get some idea of the discoveries of modern science? Today the mazes of the time space are almost mind defeating in their revelation of the infinitely vast and the infinitely small. Scientists and thinkers who explore the microscopic world or the freezing frontiers of the outer universe report marvels that challenge imagination.

ing the stars, and further declares that only life reigns there. He says: "Up to the present we have not detected the operations of true death—that is, annihilation. There is nothing but uninterrupted, pitiless movement and not a single dead star. The universe would not know what to do with one. Our moon, for instance, which we consider a corpse, if she slowed up her march through the heavens would be instantly swallowed by her neighbors and become, under a new form, as living as on the day of her birth."

These are the directions in which western science is progressing, and they are headed for the incomprehensible aspects of the one reality we call God. Consult the works of A. S. Eddington, Jeans, Whitehall, Maeterlinck and Michael Pupin.

Hallifax, N. S. Upon what do you base the doctrine of the Atonement and how could it be that an innocent

victim like Jesus should suffer for the guilty? I personally cannot see it.

Even so, the innocent suffer for sins they have not committed, and their sufferings are very often more intense than those of the sinners themselves. Moreover, the higher natures agonize for the lower natures, the humane for the brutal, the good for the evil, the parent for the child. This law of the spiritual kingdom is universal, and Jesus is its supreme exemplar. That Christ died for all men is the witness of the church and of the New Testament Scriptures. How His death applies to all men is the gist of your inquiry. The best answer I know is not theoretical. It is experiential. Sin has had a prolonged and terrible inning. It was rampant in humanity from the first, and had wrought its direst results upon the race for countless ages before Christ appeared. The best and wisest of our kind had not checked its tyrannical sway.

He announced its impending defeat in Himself and its final extinction in His reign of purity and righteousness. He authorized His disciples to preach the forgiveness of sin through faith in Him and His sacrifice on the Cross. Their literature repeatedly emphasizes that forgiveness, and numberless souls of every succeeding age and condition have testified to its reality in them.

Of course, the great doctors of the church formulated such glorious news in a variety of ways, and every historic theory of the Atonement which Christ made, bears the marks of the period to which it belongs. Just as St. Anselm's speculations show the influence of feudalism, so do modern speculations show the influence of psychology. Yet beyond all theories is the outstanding truth which is the heart of the Christian Gospel, that those who sincerely repent of their misdoings, and accept the blessings of God's pardon promised by

Christ, are conscious of their deliverance from the guilt and power of sin. History supports their claim to a spiritual recreation which is as unique as it is unmistakable.

Augusta, Ga. Was Machiavelli actually an cold blooded a scoundrel as is commonly supposed? For generations he has been regarded as the tutor of perjury, revenge and tyranny who is supposed to have given his name of "Old Nick" to the Devil himself.

But that is not the whole truth about Machiavelli. He simply reflected in his book, "The Prince," the political beliefs and practices of his age, and he is now regarded by scholars as the founder of modern political science. In judging him we have to reconceive the conditions of sovereignty existing during the Renaissance period, and the then universal reliance upon diplomatic duplicity and physical violence as the twin pillars of the

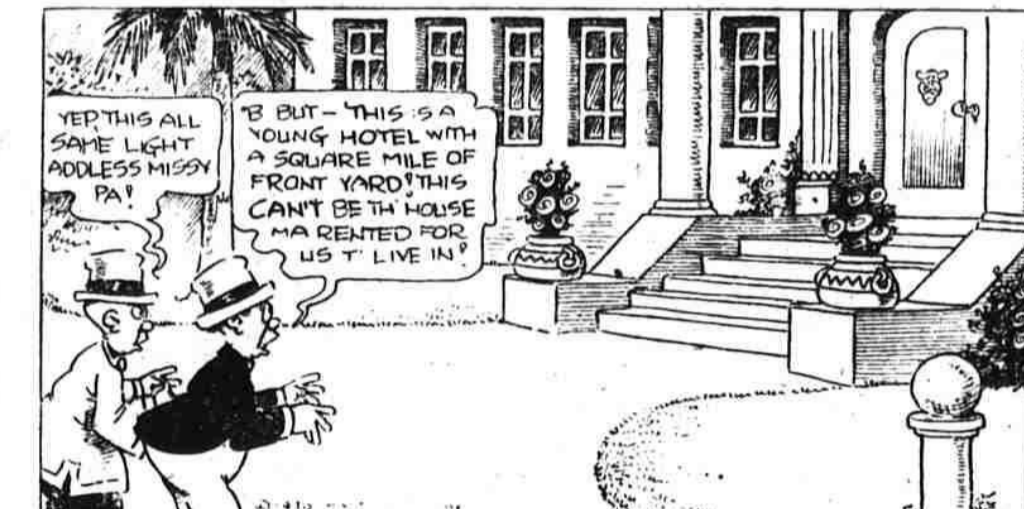
state. What better methods have some modern nations devised until recently? This despised and castigated man was the martyr of freedom as well as the apostle of oppression. At heart Machiavelli was a convinced believer in republicanism in an age when arbitrary rule was the basic principle of church and state. Nor would he dissimulate when confronted with persecution. He testified from public life rather than betray what he really held as true. Hence the paradox of his career presents

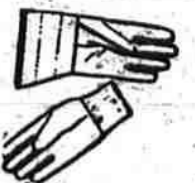
