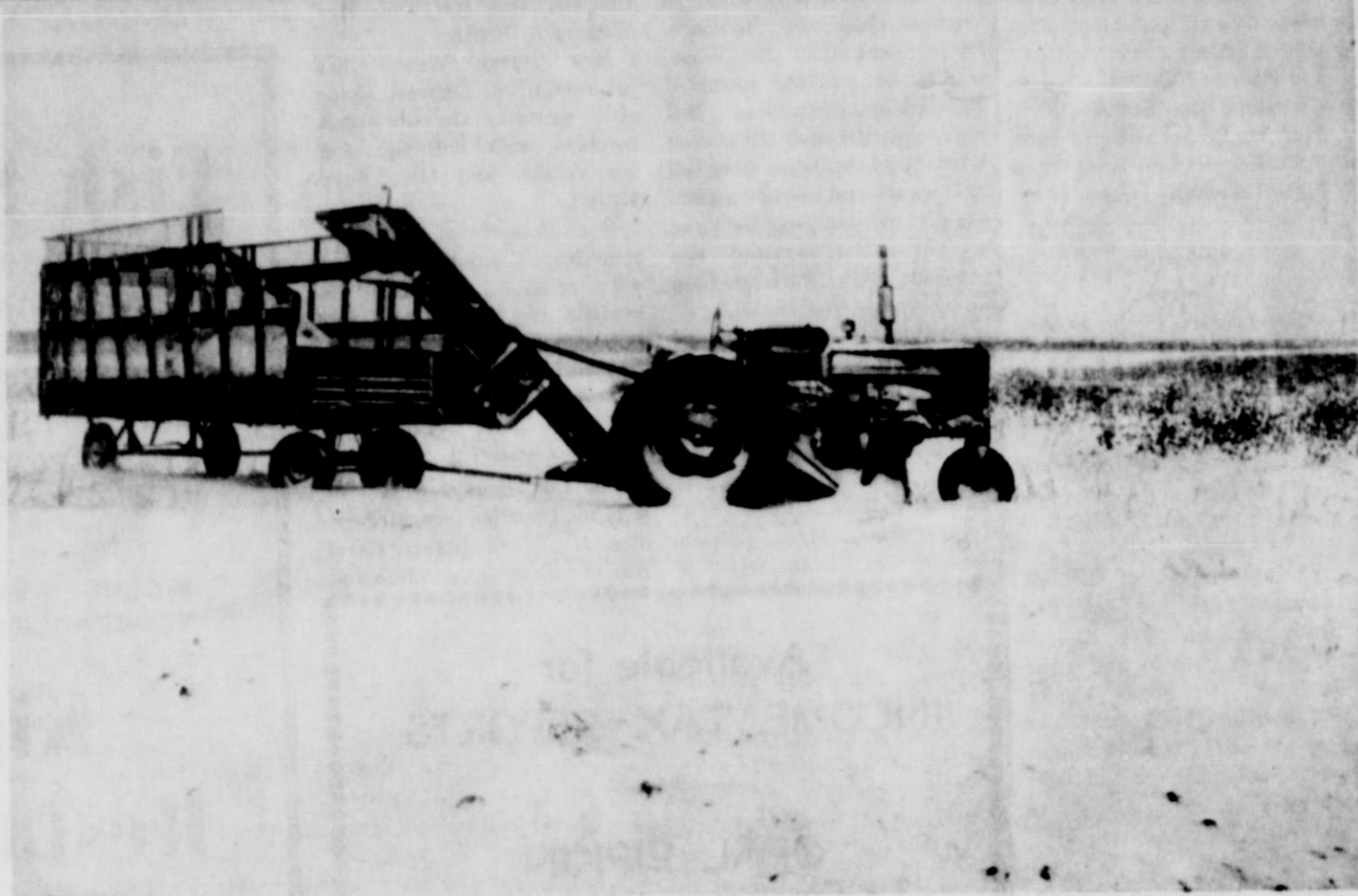

## Cattle Dipping Requirement Off

The mandatory dipping requirement for cattle has been rescinded, it was announced last week by the Texas Animal Health Commission. The release received by the Tribune this week is as follows: "Required movement dipping for the 34 county Panhandle scabie quarantine area has been suspended effective 12:01 a.m., Wednesday, January 3. However, the 34 counties remain under the State-Federal quarantine for scabies. The revised quarantine order will require inspection prior to movement, with one exception, animal may be moved directly to a livestock market for inspection on arrival."

State Representative Bryan Poff made public the lessening in requirements, which for

more than a year have been berated by cattlemen. Cattlemen throughout the Panhandle have been vociferous in their attempts to have the commission's dipping requirements rescinded.

More than 70 cattlemen, most of them from the Panhandle area, attended two hearings conducted by Poff's committee (Dumas and Tulia). Witnesses testified to death losses in their herds of up to 20 per cent because of scabies eradication regulations.

In the release which the Tribune received, was the announcement that L. H. Dirickson of Matador has been employed by the Texas Animal Health Commission, phone 347-2353.

Mrs. Eubank became ill Thursday night, Dec. 28, at her home and passed away about 11:30 in Baylor Hospital. Death was attributed to a massive heart attack.

Funeral services were held at 11 a.m. Saturday, Dec. 30, in St. John's Methodist Church, Dallas. Mr. Eubank died several years ago.

Mrs. Eubank is survived by one sister, Mrs. W. E. Wood, 2825 Rosedale, Dallas.

#### Son Died In Service

Lt. Paul Eubank was a former teacher in the Matador schools, coming here in 1936. It was under his leadership and deep interest in boys' welfare that the annual Father-Son Banquet was organized in 1937.

He retired from his teaching profession to run for the Legislature, and was elected Representative from the 121st district, in 1940. He was serving when he enlisted in the Navy in February, 1942, beginning his training at the Dallas Naval Air Station and receiving his wings in Corpus Christi in November of that year.

He ran a second time for his post in the Legislature after entering the Navy, and was re-elected to serve the counties of Childress, Hall, Cottle and Motley.

He had been at sea since May, 1943, stationed in the New Caledonia area in the southwest Pacific, and serving aboard an aircraft carrier, when word was received in Matador on January 14, 1944 that he had been killed in action and his body not recovered. He was pilot of an Avenger torpedo-diver with Admiral Halsey's fleet and had been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross. His death is believed to have occurred January 12 or 13, 1944, 29 years ago.

## Blizzard's Icy Grip Holding Panhandle

### Cattle, Crops, Traffic Hit by Massive Storm

A WINTER storm for the book is holding the Texas Panhandle and a large section of the United States with icy fingers. It has blanketed the Foothill Country with six to eight inches of snow, with a foundation of sleet and ice. The storm has dropped mercury here as low as ten degrees. It has stopped all type of farm activities and kept ranchers' pickups on the roads hauling feed to drawn and freezing cattle.

The Tribune has made a check of ranchers in this area and no cattle loss has been reported. Some ranchers say that loss may result in young calves. On the high Plains it is a different story according to the Amarillo Sunday News-Globe. Fred Wortham Jr., Farm and Ranch editor said area herd losses topped the 50,000 mark. The figures were based on reports of the past two weeks and did not include the more

severe weather of the past four days. No relief is in sight, with snow falling here most of Tuesday and weathermen predicting another storm to hit tonight.

On the go almost day and night have been the butane fuel dealers as homeowners fight the continuing cold. Many schools in the Panhandle closed earlier, but the school system here held classes Monday, but decided to dismiss classes Tuesday.

Traffic is almost at a standstill on US 70 and State Highway 70 which intersect in Matador. No serious accidents have been reported.

All roads are declared extremely hazardous and the public is warned to remain off of them except in extreme necessity.

Here in Matador city employees have fought a continuous battle to keep the streets clear of snow. Great mountains of the white stuff were put in "wind rows" in the centers of downtown streets and have later been removed in

most instances. The storm began Saturday with chilling rain which later turned to sleet, then was followed by a series of snow showers and a continued dropping of the temperature.

### Doves Freezing

Hundreds of doves are freezing along the highways, country roads and in fields according to three different reports received yesterday. One man said an employee had picked up a large amount and

given to his cats and dogs. Melvin Meason said he had a large barn on his Roaring Springs farm, where he feeds cattle. The livestock leave as soon as they eat and the barn has become a haven for cold, hungry doves. He said they fly out by the hundreds when he drives up.

Farmers, ranchers and sportsmen have been concerned about quail, but say they can stand more cold weather than doves.

## Power Firm Seeks Increase In Rates

A request for the first general rate increase in West Texas Utilities Company 50-year history was presented to the Matador and Roaring Springs City Councils by WTU Manager F. C. Welling.

The company requested a six percent increase in each step of the residential, commercial and industrial rates and the application of a fuel adjustment clause to municipal water pumping rates.

The increase will not apply to minimum bills, fuel adjustments, municipal rates and power interchanges with other utility companies. "As a result," Mr. Welling said, "the increase in the Company's total revenue will be less than five percent."

The increase will add about 2 1/2 cents per day to the average residential bill, according to Mr. Welling. He pointed out that since 1952 the average residential cost has dropped from 3.64 cents per kilowatt-hour to 2.59 cents, a decrease of 29 percent. During the same time, the average residential usage has increased more than 3 1/2 times.

While this is WTU's first general rate increase, the general company manager noted that WTU had voluntarily reduced rates 14 times. The firm's last major rate reduction was in 1964.

In asking the City's approval of the new electric rate schedules, the WTU Manager said that the new rates would be applied to bills rendered on or after March 1, 1973.

Mr. Welling pointed out that almost every electric utility company in Texas has found it necessary to request rate adjustments and that WTU is one of the last to make such a request.

"The spiraling cost of nearly everything we buy or use to provide electric service makes the rate adjustment essential," the WTU Manager said. "The increase is the minimum needed and nothing more."

He emphasized that WTU had been caught in the "cost squeeze" as a result of the increases in the cost of equipment, services and labor, cost of new power plants, lines, and environmental controls.

With interest costs more than doubled, he pointed out:

that the cost of borrowing money was one of the major problems. To supply future needs, the Company expects to spend about 77 million dollars for new facilities in the next five years.

Funeral services for Glen D. Bird, 73, former Motley County resident, were held at 2:30 p.m. Wednesday at the Rone Funeral Home in Azle.

Mr. Bird died Monday at a Weatherford hospital following a long illness.

He was born July 23, 1899 on the Bird Ranch, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. C. D. Bird, area pioneers and ranch family. He was married in about 1916, to Mae Bailey at Roaring Springs, and they made their home on the Bird ranch for a number of years. He had resided in Azle since 1950.

He is survived by his wife; two sons, Charles Bird of Azle and G. T. Bird of Weatherford; a daughter, Mrs. Hal Courtney (Sue) of Madill, Okla.; a brother, Gus Bird of Matador; a sister, Mrs. John Moore (Lila) of Bethesda, Md.; four grandchildren, and a great-grandchild.

The action will affect lands in Motley and Cottle counties. The hearing will begin at 1:30 p.m.

#### HIGHWAY CREW HELPS MOTORIST

A west bound motorist Monday night may owe his life to the Texas Highway Department crew who found his car in a narrow ditch west of Matador. Sheriff Jinks Wilson and Deputy Pete Williams had received a report of the stranded driver but the Highway Department had already brought his vehicle back on the road.

Deputy Williams said the man was thinly clad and very cold but continued his way. The Highway Department crews have been working almost around the clock in effort to keep the roads open and to aid stranded motorists.

Another unconfirmed report has been received of another driver's car leaving the road west of Roaring Springs, but that he was found, after suffering severe cold. No names of the motorists have been available.

### MRS. TIMMONS TO DIRECT MOTLEY CO. SPELLING BEE

Mrs. Grady (Edith) Timmons, Flomot Elementary Principal, Flomot, has been named to direct the activities of the 1973 Spelling Bee for Motley County.

The 1973 Regional Bee - the Silver Anniversary Bee - co-sponsored by the Amarillo Globe-News and West Texas State University - will climax in Amarillo on April 28, 1973 with the naming of the Golden Spread Champion.

More than 11,000 students in the eighth and lower grades are expected to participate and the area includes 46 counties in the Panhandle. There are 26 Texas counties, 10 in Oklahoma, four in New Mexico and three in Kansas.

The rules of the National Spelling Bee stipulate that any boy or girl who has not reached his 16 birthday or passed beyond the eighth grade by June 1, 1973, is eligible to enter.

Each county director has complete control over the respective county and may conduct the contests as a verbal "battle of the words," or it may be by a written test. However, the regional bee in Amarillo will be conducted verbally.

The study book, compiled by the National Spelling Bee, New York City, contains more than 3,000 words, many of which have been used in the annual national contests. New in design and content, the booklet is available from the Amarillo Globe-News, P.O. Box 2091, Amarillo, Texas 79105. The price is 25 cents.

The only secondary contest conducted within the areas of the National Spelling Bee is also sponsored by the Amarillo newspapers and the University.

To acquaint boys and girls in the sixth and lower grades, a junior division contest is conducted. These county winners are special guests of the sponsors on Bee Day in Amarillo. Unless they hold a dual title, they do not spell.

**COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:**

Weeds and insects can take a heavy toll of small grains if infestations become heavy. One application can control both pests, if both are present at the same time.

One-half pound of 2, 4-D will control most of the weeds, and several insecticides are available for the control of the green bug.

One weed per square foot reduced the yield by 10%, and even under dryland condition,

weed control will pay. Don't wait too long to spray if weeds are a problem though. While weeds are young, they are easier to kill, and by so doing, they won't use the moisture needed for crop production.

When blossoms begin to appear, you have waited too long, so don't delay spraying until this stage. Also, the temperature should be over 60 degrees for good results, no matter if herbicides are used for weeds, or insecticides used for insects.

As for the control of insects, make sure you have only damaging numbers of harmful insects present. If predators are present in considerable numbers, they may control the harmful insects for you.

Check the field at least twice a week, and when harmful insects start building up (100 or more greenbugs per foot of row for grain 3 to 6 inches high; 200 for grain 4 to 8 inches high; and 300 or more for grain over 8 inches high), it's time to consider controls.
