Meador Lauded At Book Fair

Tribune publisher Douglas Meador received surprise plaudits Sunday while attending the Book Fair and autograph party at Quanah for Winston M. Estes.

During an introduction intermission in the autograph party, Harold Brown, President of the Cimarron Valley Historical Association with headquarters at Cushing, Okla., made the announcement that a historical marker will be erected in Matador in the near future, honoring Meador.

The inscription will read: "Douglas Meador — Country Editor, Cowboy, Printer, Poet and Philosopher... Editor of the Matador Tribune and creator of Trail Dust, one of the world's great users of the English written word. From these red-bluffed banks of the 'brakes' country has come the stardust that is Trail Dust."

The announcement came as a complete surprise to Meador. Television and radio reporters were present and made tapes of the event, and it was seen locally Sunday night on KGNC's 10 o'clock news report from Amarillo. Local residents also heard the announcement over radio.

Estes has just authored his second book, "A Streetful of People," with Quanah as the locale. A native of Quanah, he received national recognition two years ago, following publication of his first novel, "Another Part of the House." Both are published by J. B. Lippincott Co., of Philadelphia.

Recognition was given to several other authors from the area including J. W. Williams, noted Wichita Falls Historian and author of "The Big Ranch Country," Glenn Shelton, columnist for the Wichita Falls Record-News and author of "Groundhog Up a Tree;" Elmer Kelley of Byers, veteran school bookman and author of "They Left Footprints;" and Dorothy Forster of Dallas, radio personality and speaker and author of "Dishpan Dreams."

Also introduced was Mrs. Tra-week, whose history of Motley County, "Of Such As These," will be published by Nortex Offset Publications Inc., sponsors of the Book Fair.

Remodeling Work Is Started on Bank

WORK was started last week by a bomb as workmen remove on completely remodeling the interior of the First State Bank the old ceiling and duct work of here. When completed the bank will have a changed appearance.

Windows on the south and east have been covered on the inside and the walls will be paneled. Floors of the pioneer financial institution will be carpeted. Exterior of the building will not be changed.

Modern heating and refrigerated air conditioning will be installed. The ceiling will be lowered to conform with the overall plan of improvement.

John Barnhill, Executive Vice President of the bank said that more extensive plans had been considered but the structurally sound building was taken into consideration.

The center lights have been removed and the bank is much darker since the windows have been covered. The repair work may require two or three months, Mr. Barnhill declared.

The building has been altered several times since it was built. It once housed the Matador post office with a south entrance on the west end. A new steel and concrete vault was built when the building was remodeled following World War II.

The second floor housed the General Telephone exchange before dialing telephones were installed. The ceiling was lowered in the previous work, but will again be lowered during the present remodeling.

Turkey Will Dedicate Marker Saturday, Honoring Bob Wills

A historical marker honoring Bob Wills, originator of Western swing music, will be dedicated in ceremonies at 1 p.m. Saturday, April 29, at Turkey.

Festivities will begin with a parade at 9:45 a.m. followed by an Old Fiddlers Contest at 10:15 a.m. and a barbecue dinner at 11 a.m.

Following ceremonies at 1 p.m. the marker will be placed about 14 miles northeast of Turkey on Farm to Market Road 657, a mile west of the John Wills home between the Red Rivers, in an area called Oxbow Crossing.

Although ill, Wills plans to attend the dedication. He has been making his home in Fort Worth where a celebration in his honor was held early last month.

Wills and his Texas Playboys became internationally famous during the 1940's, and 1950's as America's No. 1 western dance and show band. In the early days of his career, Bob and his band played for country dances in this area.

A square dance exhibition from 6 to 9 p.m. sponsored by the Turkey Square Dance Club, and a western dance at 9 p.m. will wind up the dedication activities. The Sound Drifters of Turkey will play for the western dance. Members of the Texas Playboys, led by Johnny Lee Wills, also will perform some numbers after the 1 p.m. dedication.

Membership cards in the Jim Bob Wills Foundation will be sold. Honorary memberships are \$25, full memberships are \$10 and associate memberships are \$5. Each of these cards will entitle the holder to eat at the barbecue, which will serve buffalo meat as well as beef.

Those who do not purchase a membership may eat at the barbecue for \$2 for adults and \$1 for children.

Funds raised by this venture will go to the erection of a steel monument near the home of Bob Wills in Turkey at a cost of \$25,000.

The historical marker to be dedicated Saturday is sponsored by the Cimarron Valley Historical Society, headed by Harold Brown, President, of Cushing, Oklahoma, in conjunction with the Bob Wills Foundation, Inc.

Since May, 1968, Durfey has been director of performance and research for the American-International Charolais Association in Houston. He has worked closely with university and research stations carrying on animal research, while coordinating the Association's research activities with cooperating institutions.

Develops Charolais
Durfey guided development of the Charolais Herd Improvement Program (CHIP) through committee action to adoption by the

Association's board of directors. The program, in effect since the start of 1972, has been described as one of the most complete with in-herd performance and selection programs devised by any breed association.

Durfey also aided development of a progressive artificial insemination program for the Charolais breed, recently enacted by the Association's membership. The program is based upon performance and genetic improvement tools, including testing of sires used in out-of-herd breeding and progeny test information.

During his four years duty with the Charolais Association, Durfey has become widely known and respected among performance-oriented producers and scientists.

He has also been responsible for coordinating the AICA's programs with Performance Registry International with the various state beef cattle improvement associations for effective performance testing programs among Charolais herds.

His knowledge of the field of performance and research has made him a popular and in-demand speaker for universities, all segments of the beef industry and national beef cattle organizations.

His successor has not been named by AICA officials.

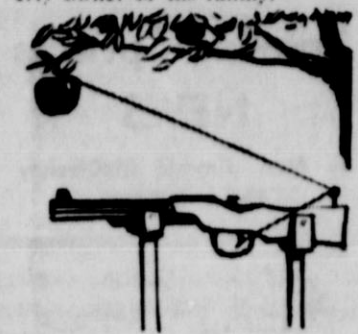
Booby Trap for Trespassers

"NO TRESPASSING" signs, posted on Harper's farm, failed to discourage teenagers in the neighborhood from stealing his apples. Finally he set a booby trap in the form of a spring gun, cocked and ready to fire.

Sure enough, that very night a trespassing youth touched off the gun and received a bullet in the leg.

In due course, the victim filed suit against Harper for damages. At the trial, the latter insisted he had a right to use force to protect his property against intruders who were bent on mischief.

But the court held that the method he had chosen was too drastic, merely for the prevention of petty theft. The judge said deadly weapons could not be used when there was no personal danger to either the property owner or his family.



Generally speaking, a property owner cannot use greater force by means of a booby trap than he could use if he were on the scene in person. Even vicious dogs, left at large, have been frowned upon as a kind of booby trap.

"A savage dog," observed one judge, "is a dangerous instrument."

Nonetheless, milder measures may be justified. Take this case:

A suburban home owner, tired of having trespassers tramping across his lawn, stretched a barbed wire fence from a corner of his house to a corner of the lot.

Not long afterward, a man was hurt trying to scale the fence. Suing for damages, he charged that such a fence was "meant to injure people."

But the court decided that the fence, with its barbs in plain sight, was meant simply to make trespassing more difficult — a perfectly legitimate purpose for a property owner.

It is worth mention, however, that this particular fence was not placed alongside a public sidewalk in some communities, that would be forbidden by local ordinance. Reason: too much chance of injuring an innocent passerby.

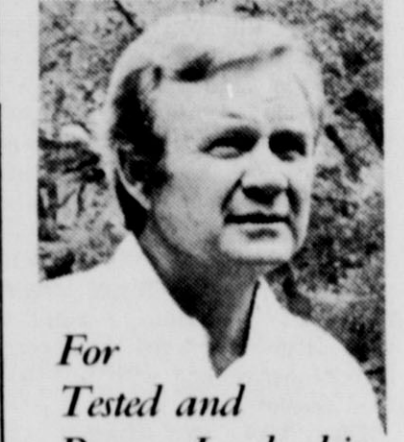

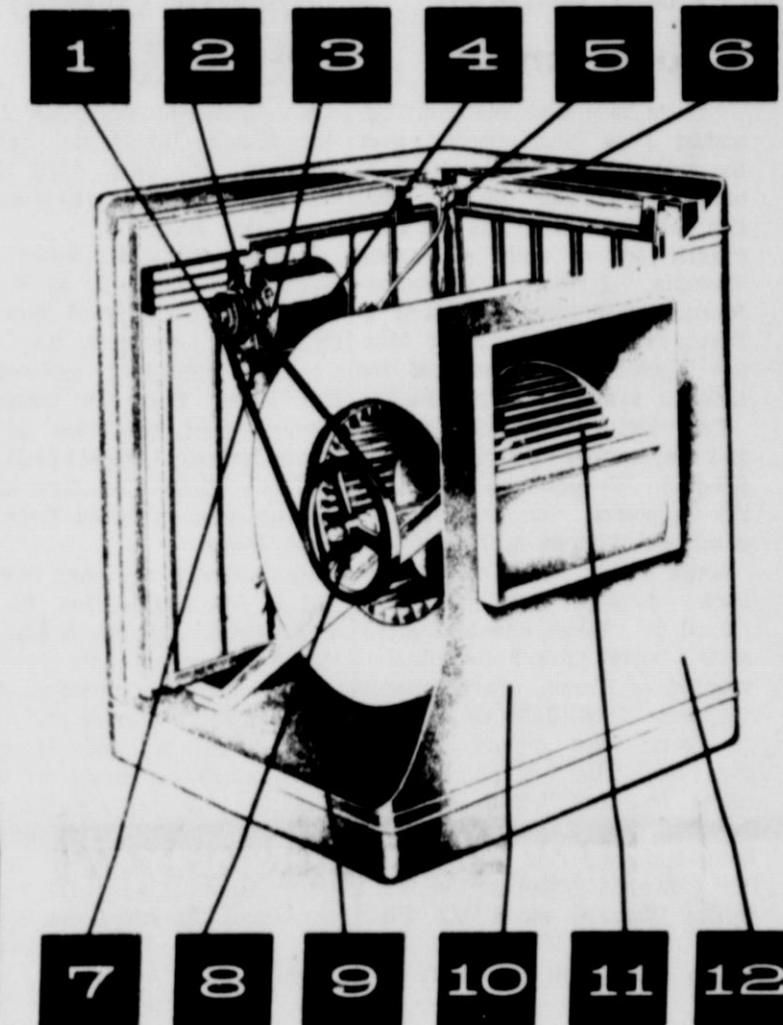
